
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

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

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Boll Weevil Control

Plenty of hot weather this past week. Some cotton is showing signs of moisture stress. Bollworm egg and larvae numbers have been down in most places.

Most producers in the Lawlis Flats area are on their 3rd boll weevil spray. It will take 5 sprays on 5 day intervals to break the cycle. This is because a boll weevil egg takes 17 days to develop into an adult weevil and the fifth spray on day 20 would be your clean-up spray. Thirty percent weevil punctured 1/3 grown squares is the point where control measures should be considered. If your cotton is moisture stressed and is shedding small bolls, the decision to spray is more difficult.

Tom Fuchs, the area Extension Entomologist at San Angelo, has put together the following report on the economics of boll weevil control.

We have been asked by many dryland producers whether or not to try to control weevils. In my opinion the producer needs to answer the following before making that decision:

1) What is the yield potential of your crop pased on fruit load and moisture levels?

2) Are you financially able to commit a minimum of

\$25-30 per acre to a spray program? 3) Are you willing to scout

your field twice a week so that you can make intelligent management dec-

If he has a potential of more than 1/2 bale per acre and is willing to make the financial and time commitments, I believe he stands to gain from controlling weevil populations which are causing 25-30% damaged squares. To break even, a \$30.00 spray program would have to increase yield by 1/10 bale per acre if cotton brings 60 cents/pound of lint. I believe he can do this plus a good profit if the spray program is properly carried out. How long should the

cotton be protected from weevils? Cotton should be protected from weevils until most of the potentially harvestable bolls are more than 10 days old (larger than the diameter of a quarter). A fruit with a white bloom is considered a 1 day old boll. You might have to protect the cotton from worms a little

How many applications will I need? This could vary a great deal depending upon insect populations and age of fruit on the cotton but I would be prepared to make 4 or 5 applications.

When should I treat the first time? The first application should be made as soon as damage levels hit 25-30%. The next application should be made 4-5 days later. Additional applications should be made when the damage level from weevils again reaches 25% or worm numbers exceed 5 or cation because the benefi-. cial populations will usually be very low). I sincerely believe that you must be willing to scout your cotton or have someone that will in order to come out a winner at this game!

Bollworm numbers have been very low this past week. Most worms being found are medium to large in size and will soon cycle out. Egg numbers are also extremely low. We are still running 3 bollworm moth pheromone traps in Fisher County. The moth trap catch numbers are now at the lowest point that they have been so far in August. We have a peak egglay predicted for August 31 in most areas. This means that we should see some egg lay activity toward the latter part of next week increasing to the end of the month. Bollworm economics is discusses in the following article by James F. Leser, Area Extension Entomologist, at Lubbock.

It is imperative in this day of high control costs and low cotton prices to make care ful determinations of the need for bollworm control. The following information may prove useful in assessing bollworm infestations and the economic feasibility of control. Do keep in mind that we have a long way to go before we can call bollworm management a science. There still are a lot of data gaps which must be filled by research before bollworm management decisions are more science than art.

The number of bolls destroyed by a bollworm will depend largely on how many small bolls there are between theworm and any full-sized bolls, and how rapidly the worm moves down the stalk. Frequently, a bollworm will move quickly down the stalk eating just a little out of each fruiting form. This damage sometimes is followed by boll rotting organisms. If this occurs, the whole boll can be lost even though bollworm damage was not heavy. If you have mostly fullsized bolls, then assign a value of 1-1.25 bolls destroyed by each worm. If you have a lot of smaller bolls you think will make it, use 1.5-2 bolls in the

Generally, I expect about 75% (0.75) control from a properly selected chemical applied correctly. Certainly the level could be lower or high in some instances.



residents due to Clear Fork River, which was a live stream in those days and flowed through the townsite. In the meantime D.C. and M.S. Roby of Mississippi were contacted by Thomas H. Cosby heirs who owned one league and three sections of land in vicinity of present Roby. The two Robys' had townsite laid out for another proposed county seat.

Following this action, the competition between the two places--Fisher and Roby--began to wax warmer in regard to which was the more suitable location for the county seat site.

When the fight concerning the site for the county seat began to become too heated, the adherents of the Roby's remembered quite well that what profit they had gained came fre the possession of their land. Consequently, they sur rted the Robys through "thick and thin" to by became the official site for the courthouse. see that winter of 1865, the adherents of Roby as a site for e county seat discovered that settlers were coming into the territory adjacent to Fisher faster than they were moving into Roby. For this reason the wheels of organization in regard to the establishment of a county government were speeded up. The adherents of the Roby site concluded that it would be desirable to stage the election for the determination of the site for the county seat before the Fisher settlers had time to acquire. their legally required six months' residence in the county; the requirement which would have qualified the Fisher residents to vote in a county seat site election.

Fisher County, prior to this organization move, was attached to Nolan County for judicial purposes (after a transfer from Shackelford County). In 1885 the Texas Legislature had provided that, when Fisher County should organize, it should become a part of the Thirty-ninth Judicial District of which J.V. Cockrell was judge. Consequently, it became necessary for the Robys and their followers to present to the Commissioners Court of Nolan County a petition ordering an election for the selection of a county seat.

In March of 1886, the friends of the Robys presented to the Commissioners Court of Nolan County a petition, containing about one hundred seventy names. The petition asked permission to hold an election which would grant the organization of the county and the designation of a county seat site.

Mr. Strang and his friends did not want an election held in 1886; therefore, when the election for the organization for Fisher County was called for April 20, they contested before the honorable Commissioners Court of Nolan County the sufficiency and validity of the petition for election as presented by the adherents of the Robys, claiming that the petition was padded with signatures and that the county did not contain one hundred fifty qualified voters. If this could be proved, the petition was faulty in praying for an election to organize Fisher County. The Commissioners Court held, in this case, that the burden of proof fell on Strang to show that the signers of the Roby petition were not qualified voters. Judge J.V. Cockrell later said that the contesting of the Roby document waxed "exceedingly warm" for several days. Those interested in Fisher as the proposed county seat were not able to reduce the Roby petition list to less than one hundred fifty signatures. The failure of Strang and his friends to bring the list of Roby petitioners below one hundred fifty qualified voters was followed by action of the Commissioners Court of Nolan County, ordering the election for April 20, 1886.

Years later when the heat of battle for the site of the county seat had faded away, the fact was brought to light that Bill Purp was shown on the Roby petition as a qualified voter of Fisher County. Bill Purp was, in reality, a cur dog that belonged to Bob Simpson of the Cottonwood settlement which was about eight miles southwest of Roby. Strang was unable to get any trace of this particular "voter", but the incident in later years

amused Strang as much as it did Simpson. When the election was held, one hundred thirty-one votes were cast for the organization of Fisher County and the naming of Roby as the proposed county seat. Strang contested, futilely it seems, that there were not one hundred thirty-one voters in the county, but he lacked sufficient support to trace each new citizen that was claimed for Roby.

The fight for a county seat left scars for several years in the memories of county voters. Many who had been close friends parted as enemies for a period of several years. In the end, however, when construction of the county's first courthouse was decided on, the citizens of the county · became more closely united than they had been before the election fight.

Few present day citizens of the County realize that in 1910 a strong effort was started in Rotan to move the county seat there. This never came to a vote as Roby being the geographical center of the county would take a 3-4 majority of votes to move the county seat. This did not seem probable as with transportation in those days '. mainly horsepower. Rotan proponents realized their chances were so remote they abandoned the idea.


