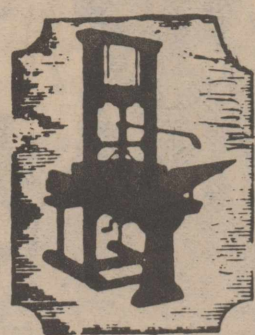

County Hospital Board Gets \$6,300 Lost Linen Bill, Buys New Equipment

The members of the Fisher County Hospital Board met in regular session last Monday night and voted to enter into a lease/purchase agreement for two important pieces of medical equipment at a total cost of \$7,200, according to Jerry Weatherly, Administrator. The hospital board voted to enter into a two year lease/purchase agreement for a re-furnished cell counter and a "Lifepack 5" portable lifesaving machine. The total cost of the two pieces of equipment will be approximately \$7,200. The motion to purchase the equipment was made by Glenn Copeland and seconded by Frank Mitchell

and passed unanimously. Board members discussed the possibility of looking into purchasing a cable television dish to update additional channel at the hospital. No action was taken and the matter was tabled on a motion by Dave Williams and seconded by Frank Mitchell. Board members discussed laundry expenses at length. West Texas Linen Service has submitted a bill to the Fisher County Hospital District for \$6,300 for linen it claims has been lost or stolen over the past 24 months. According to West Texas Linen Service the hospital is short 347 pillow cases, 987 sheets, 93 hospital gowns, 659

CHOCOLATE CHIP BROWN BROWNIES

2/3 cup butter
2 TBS hot water
2 cups brown sugar
2 eggs
2 tsp vanilla
2 cups flour
1 tsp baking powder
1/4 tsp soda
1/4 tsp salt
Melt butter and hot water in brown sugar, add eggs and vanilla. Beat well, add dry ingredients and mix well. Spread in a 9x13 pan. Sprinkle chips over top and bake at 350 degrees 25-30 minutes. Cut in squares while still warm. They're good eating!!!

BANANA CAKE

Preheat oven at 350 degrees and sift together the following:
2 1/4 Cups All purpose flour
1/2 tsp baking powder
3/4 tsp baking soda
1/2 tsp salt
Set aside after sifted.
Put into a bowl:
1/2 Cup butter (Melted)
1 1/2 cup Sugar
Beat until light and fluffy. Add to these ingredients okne at a time, 2 eggs. Add dry ingredients to the above mixture, and add 1/4 cup buttermilk. Set Aside.
On a plate mash 3 bananas and add 1 tsp vanilla. Mix this mixture with the ingredients you set aside. Mix well. Pour into oblong pan and bake until cake is brown.

EGG AND CHEESE STRATA

8 slices bread, remove crusts and dice into 1/2 inch cubes
1/2 lb American cheese, grated
dash cayenne pepper
1/2 lb sharp Cheddar cheese, grated
6 eggs, beaten
3 cups milk
3/4 tsp dry mustard
dash salt
Alternate layers of bread and cheese in a 2 quart buttered casserole. Mix eggs, milk, mustard, salt and cayenne pepper. Pour over bread and cheese. Leave in refrigerator overnight. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Serves 4 to 6.

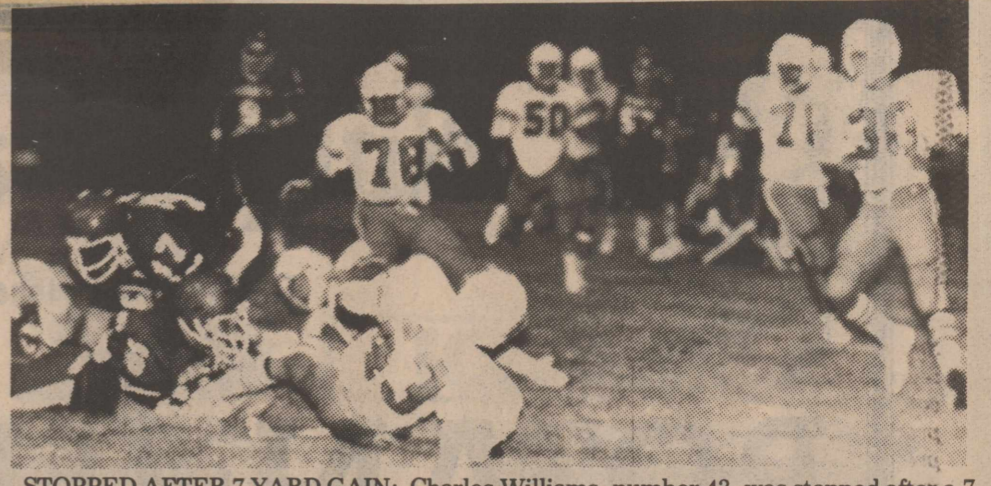

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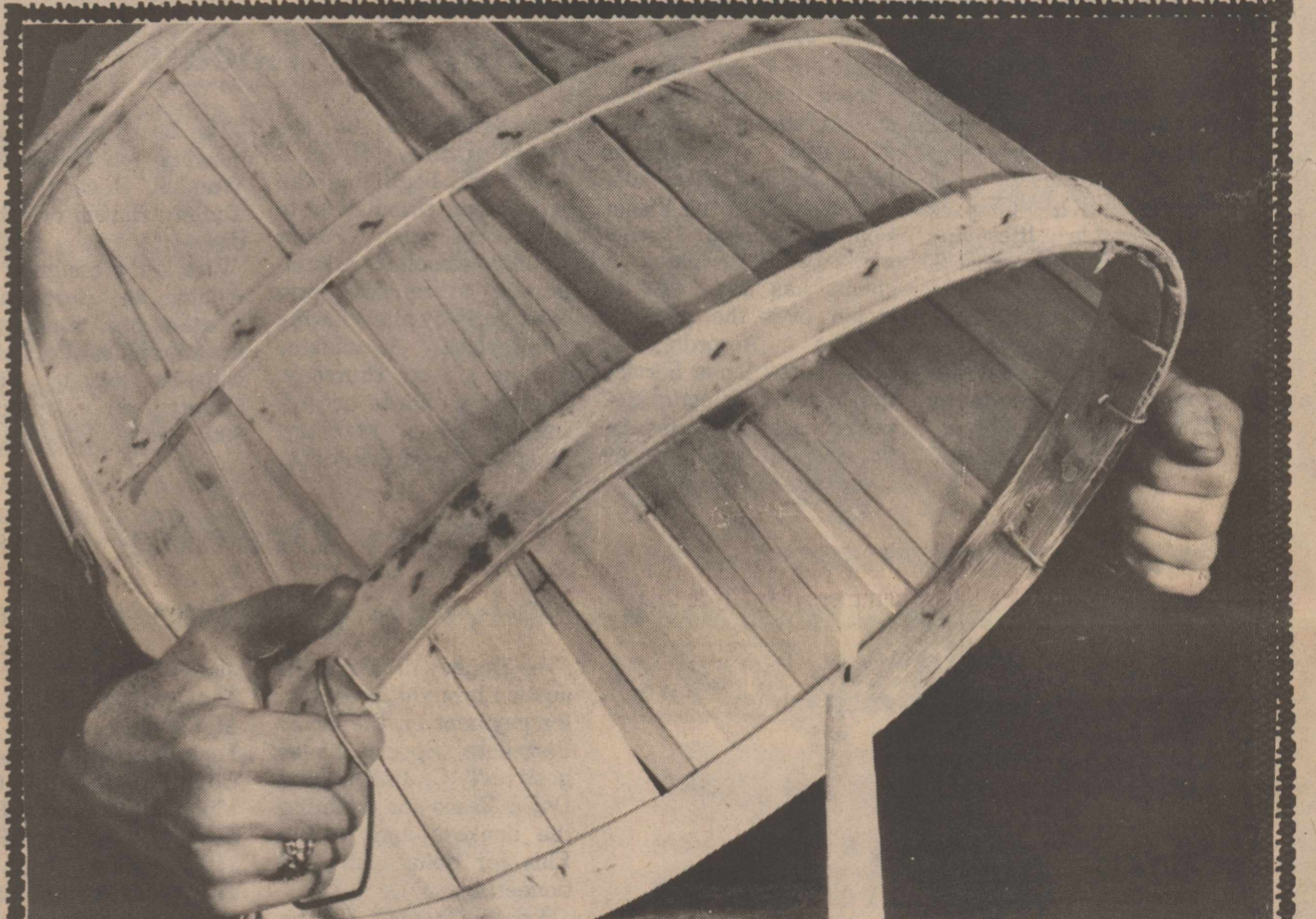

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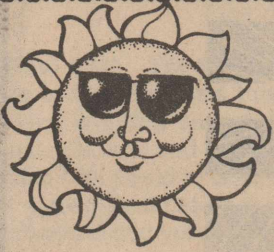
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Looking Back

Casting A Little Sunshine On The Past
10 yrs. ago, 5 yrs. ago and last year.

Ten years ago September 21, 1972: The tearing down of the old courthouse cornerstone proved to be a major project. When the project was completed the cornerstone contained a copy of the Roby Banner, a Bible and a few battered candidate cards. All the contents except the newspaper were rotten and hardly legible. The newspaper, dated May 27, 1910, was damp but readable. Mr. Bill Hardy was elected State THDA President. Jana Jeffrey was chosen new head of McCatley 4-H Club. Navy Fireman Recruit Travis L. Wallace graduated from recruit training at the Naval Training center in San Diego. The Rotan Yellowhammers

defeated the Anson Tigers. The Jim Ned Indians defeated the Roby Lions 7-6. Gaylon Daniel and Harroll Freeman were united in Rotan five years ago September 22, 1977: Linda Dickson was named the new Rotan Tennis Coach. The county gins expected to gin 50,000 bales of cotton. Rotan Police Chief Chuck Renfro resigned his position. F and M Chevrolet held a special Show Day where the 1978 Chevrolet Chevette was unveiled for the first time. Ralph Ammons announced he would not seek re-election for another term as Fisher County Hospital Board president. The Roby School Board approved a 1,900 dollar band budget.

Calistro Hijares had the distinction of being the first Fisher County farmer to gin the first bale of cotton of 1977, that was ginned by Hobbs co-op Gin. The Roby Lions were defeated by the Bronie Longhorns 21-20. Tubby Moore was elected Fisher County Young Farmer. President. Nettie Ethredge Postal employee at Roby retired after 23 years of service. Lisa Berry and Mike Cade announced their engagement. James Goodwin was named new Rotan Ag. Club President. The Roby Volunteer Fire Department received a new fire truck. The Hobbs Panthers defeated the Leuders-Avoca Raiders 56-3. Timmy Morton was named President of the Roby Jr. class. One year ago

September 17, 1981: Grace Heatley employed as the new Fisher County Juvenile Officer. Construction was begun in Rotan on the Rolling Plains International building. The Roby Senior class officers were Lisa Hoodenpyle, Sec., Tami Jeffrey, Treas., Tana Mauldin, Reporter, Chris Kiser, Vice-President, and Mark Mauldin, President. Charla Wiley was named President of the Fisher County 4-H club. Robin McFather and R. L. Hale announced their engagement. Dale Rogers and David Markham announced their engagement. Chris Kiser was named president of the Roby FFA. The Fisher County Commissioners voted to purchase two maintainers.

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Roby Blasts Bronte 14-0

The Roby Lions came away with their first win of the season Friday with a 14-0 win over the Bronte Longhorns.

The Lions win the toss and elect to receive and after the kickoff they started with a 1st and 10 at their 32. Roby picked up a 1st down in 2 plays. Lions Sr. tailback Kirk Williamson rushed for 4 yards then sr. quarterback Roby King ran for 11 more. Williamson ran the ball for 3 more yards on 2 plays. The Lions then on a 3rd and 7 on the Bronte's 49 yard line ran a quarterback keeper around the right end, picking up good blocks by end Larry William and flanker Tommy Duckworth. King went the 49 yards for a TD for teh Lions but an illegal procedure against the Lions wiped out the TD. On the next play, the Lions receiver was unable to hang on to the ball on a good pass from the quarterback. Roby then punted on 4th and 12 with jr. guard Chad Terry getting off a good 45 yard punt.

On Bronte's first possession, the Longhorns ran 6 plays, the 1st the Lions were penalized for off side, the next play went for no gain, on the third play Bronte's jr back Jon Lee made a good 19 yard gain. With 1st and 10 at their 34, Roby's Ricky Gordon and John Etheredge team up to throw Lee for a loss of 3 yards then on a 2nd and 12 a host of Lions stopped Bronte quarterback Webb for another loss of 1 yard, Webb then was hit behind the line again for another 2 yard loss by Lions jr defense end Noel Fields. Then on the 4th and 16 Bronte fumbled.

The Longhorns began to move the ball on this drive in 5 plays. Bronte had moved the ball 34 yards to the 50 yard line. Bronte's Lee had carried for 33 of the 34 yards. Then with a 1st and 10 at the 50, the Bronte pass was picked off by the Lion's Kirk Williamson.

After the interception the Lions had a 1st and 10 on their 40 yard. The Lions attempted to quick pass that fell incomplete, then on a deep pass the Lions received again and took

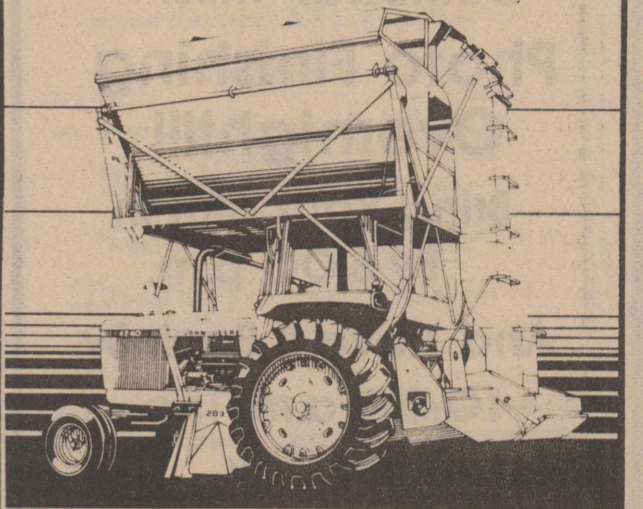

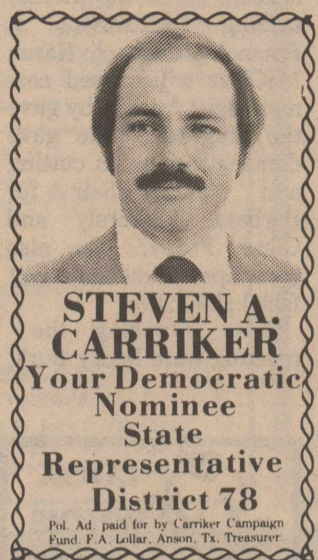

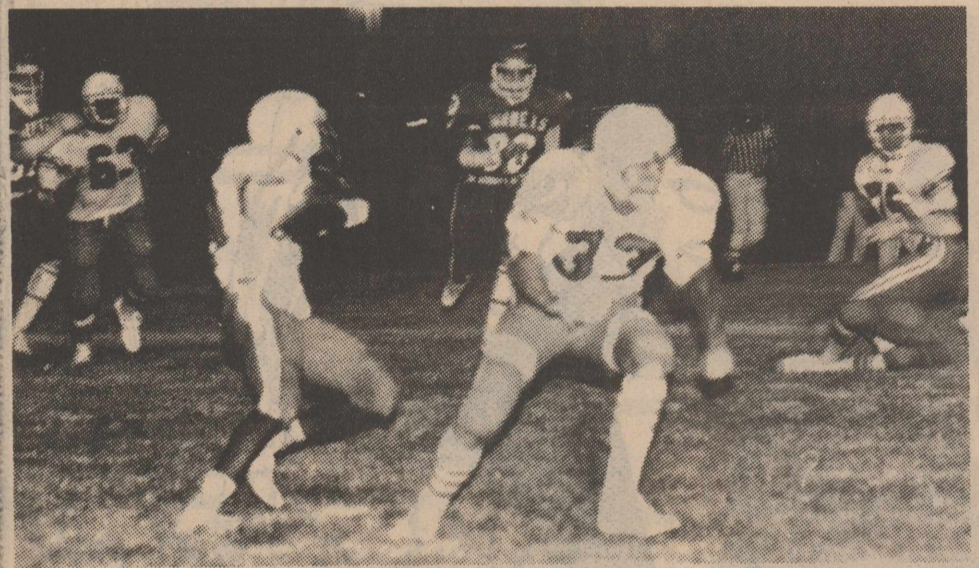

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 2, 1982

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for a construction fund for 17 state colleges and universities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 62 as amended by Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the \$80,000,000 ceiling on state welfare aid during any fiscal year. The amendment would set the state welfare spending limit at \$160,000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium. The amendment further provides that, for each subsequent biennium, the maximum amount spent for state welfare shall not exceed one percent of the state budget.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one percent of the state budget."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

PROPOSICION NUMERO 5 EN LA BOLETA

Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12%."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

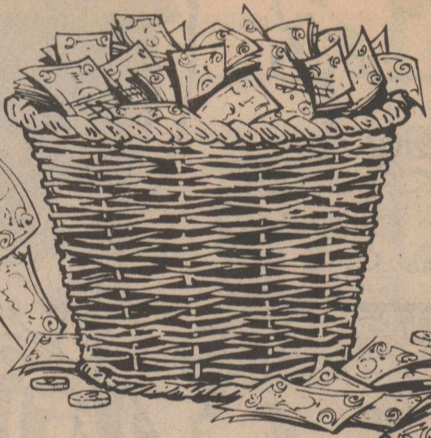

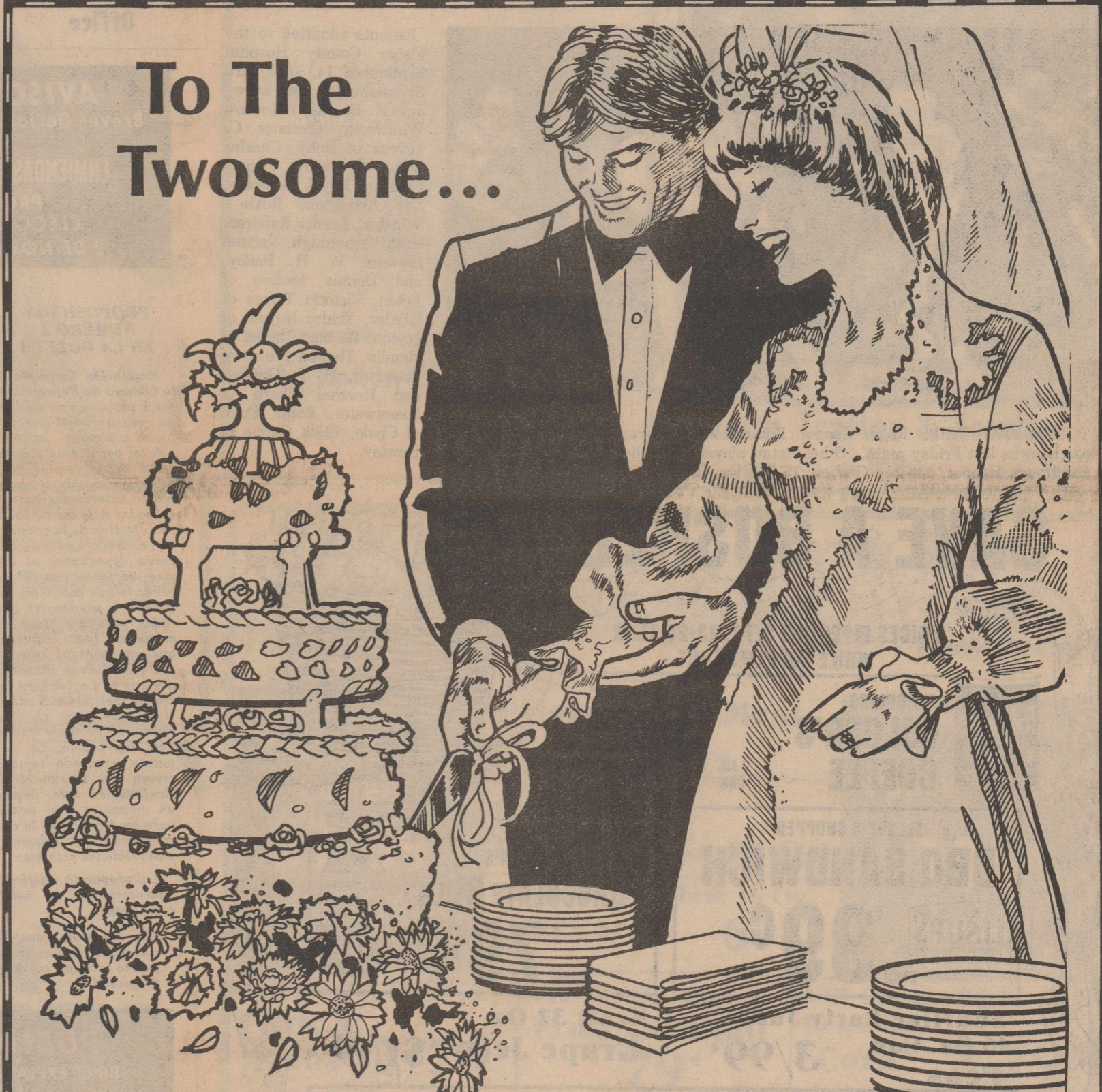

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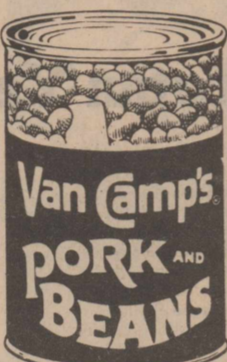

TAX PLANNING

"TAX PLANNING"

An individual in the 50 per cent tax bracket does not pay 50 cents to the government out of each dollar he earns. Nor is it possible for \$1,000 of additional income to cause your taxes to go up by \$2,000.

Taxpayers pay at various percentages up to their "top bracket." The minimum tax bracket is 12 percent starting at \$3,400 of taxable income and the maximum bracket is 50 percent on taxable income over \$85,600. The taxable income is arrived at by deducting from adjusted gross income your itemized deductions and family exemptions.

A typical tax return with adjusted gross income of \$31,000 might pay income taxes of \$5,300. This taxpayer is "in the 29 percent bracket;" however, his total income tax bill is 17 percent of his adjusted gross income. Remember the adjusted gross income is first reduced for various deductions and exemptions. Then income tax is paid at 12 percent on the first \$2,100, 14 percent on the next \$2,100, 16 percent on the next \$4,300 and so on through the various brackets up to 50 percent.

An individual's top tax bracket represents the percentage at which the last dollar was taxed. Additional income could cause you to slide into the next higher bracket, however, this will not cause the income in any of the prior brackets to change in any manner whatsoever. The 29 percent bracket runs from \$24,600 of taxable income to \$29,900. If a 29 percent bracket taxpayer is at the very top of this bracket and earns an additional \$1,000, it will be taxed at the next higher bracket which is 33 percent. The prior \$29,900 would still be taxed in its respective brackets.

I have often heard the statement, "I'm doing it because it's tax deductible." The 29 percent bracket taxpayer is only saving 29 percent out of each dollar spent, therefore, the decision should be made on the economics of the transaction, or the personal pleasure derived on the 71 cents of actual cost to the taxpayer.

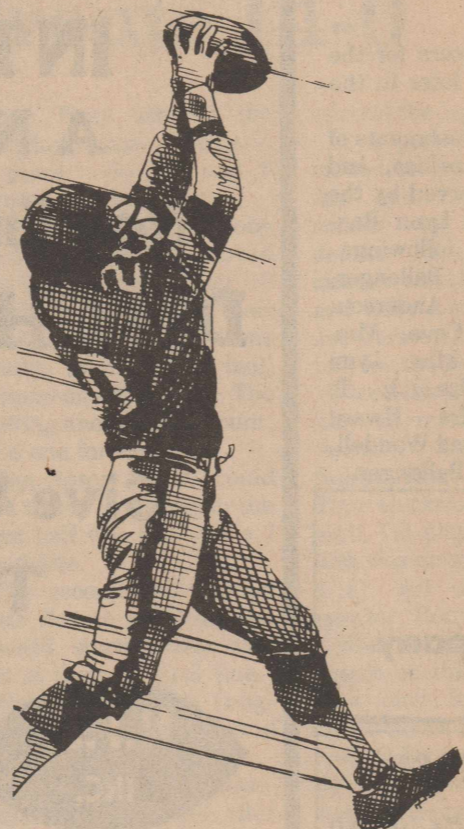

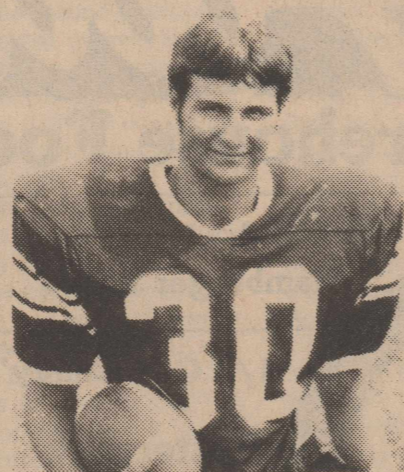
