

If you are not satisfied with the outcome, you will be given an opportunity to schedule a hearing with the Appraisal Review Board. In order to be entitled to a hearing, you must file a written protest with the Appraisal Review Board by OCTOBER 15,1982. A copy of the protest form can be obtained from the Central Appraisal District office of your county or from the State Property Tax Board. The Appraisal Review Board by OCTOBER 15,1982. The Texas Legislature does not set the amount of your local taxes. Your property tax burden is decided by your locally elected officials, and all inquiries concerning your taxes should be directed to these officials. If a taxpayer objects to increasing taxes and government expenditures, he or she should complain to the governing bodies of these taxing units. The Appraisal District determines the value of your property. Only complaints about value should be presented to the Appraisal District or the Appraisal Review Board.

# Roby Lions Defeat Miles Bulldogs 32-9

The Roby Lions made it 3 wins in a row Friday by running over the Miles The Lions record now is three wins two losses to end their non-district schedule.

Friday will start district play by playing Klondike at Roby-7:30 starting time. The Lions beat Miles by

the score of 32 to 9 on an impressive 2nd half running game. The first half was pretty much the bulldogs though the Lions led on the score board.

Miles started the game by receiving the open kickoff and began play with a 1st and 10 at their 38. The bulldogs tried a pass and then a run when Roby's Terry Coker met the runner and threw him for a 3 yard loss. Miles on 3rd and 13 tried another pass but a good job rushing on the quarter back by Joel King caused an incompletion and on 4th down Miles punted.

The Lions took possession with a 1st and 10 at their 47 yard line. The Lions could only make 2 yards and 4th punted.

The bulldogs began their second possession with 1st down at their 21. They gained 1 yard on the first play, then on 2nd and 9, Roby's Noel Field and Steive Rivas broke thru the Miles line to throw them for a loss of 5 yards with 3rd and 14. Miles completed a pass for 11 yards. Faced with 4th and 4 Miles punted again.

The Lions again could not make 1st down yardage and punted on 4th and 5.

Miles got a good punt return set up and a saving tackle by Joel King kept the runner from going all the way. With 1st down at their 27, the bulldogs got only 9 yards in 3 plays and punted on 4th and 1.

Roby took over for the 3rd time in the 1st quarter at their 32 yard line and a busted play lost 10 yards. Being unable to make any yardage on the next 2 plays the Lions punted for the 3rd time.

Miles 4th pocession in this quarter began on their 45 yard line. The bulldogs in 3 plays moved the ball 12 yards and made a first down at the Lion's 41 yard line. The next play went for 2 more yards. With 2nd and 8 at the 39, Joel King and Ricky Gordon stopped the Miles runner for a one yard loss. This ended the first quarter. The bulldogs then tried a pass on 3rd and 9 that went incomplete on 4th and 9 at the Lion's 40 yard line. Miles lined up in punt formation but passed the play good for 10 yards and a 1st down. After a gain of 1 yard, the bulldogs quarterback made a good run for 25 yards and Miles was then at the Lions 6 yard line with a 1st down. Miles tried to go up the middle, but the runner was met with a hard tackle by Chad Terry for no gain. On 2nd and goal, the Miles receiver lost the ball on a jarring tackle in the end

Miles had one move possession before half, but with good pressure by Bob Burk, Rick Gordon and Joel King, the Miles quarterback could not set up and throw. John Etheredge had a sack of the Miles quarterback for a loss of 10 yards on one of the last plays just before the half ended. The 1st half ended with the Lions leading 12 to 9.

In the first half Roby rushed for only 19 yards and passed for 81. The Lions did not make a 1st down in this half. Miles rushed for 57 yards and passed for 57 yards and made 6 first downs.

The Lions came out in the 2nd half a different team. The Lion's first drive of the third quarter started at their 30 yard line. In 6 plays the Lions had moved the ball 24 yards on the running of Williamson, Etheredge and Carreon, then on a 2nd and 9 at Miles 46, Joe Carreon busted through the line and with good blocking by his teammates went 46 vards for the touchdown. The PAT run by Etheredge was good and with 8:47 left in the 3rd quarter Roby was leading by the score of 20 to 9.

Miles came out in the 3rd quarter and was shutdown by the Lions defense. Miles could not make a first down on their first possession and punted back to Roby on 4th.

Roby's 2nd possession began at their 35 and on two runs by Williamson had moved the ball 11 yards. Etheredge was then thrown for a 5 yard loss and then a pass was incomplete. On 3rd and 15 at the 48, the bulldogs were called for pass interference and the Lions had a 1st down on the 39 vard line. Etheredge then went for 4 yards and the Lions were then penalized 15. Faced with 2nd and 25 at the 46, the Lions pass was intercepted by Miles to stop the drive.

Miles had the ball then with 1st down at their 37 but the Miles quarterback was thrown for a 2 yard loss by Etheredge and on the next play Joel King threw him for another loss of 5 yards being incomplete on the 3rd down pass play, Miles punted on 4th and 17.

The Lions got off 6 more plays before suffering their 3rd interception of the night.


Time ran out on Miles after 5 plays, the game ended with Roby winning 32 to 9.







County Courthouses have intrigued us from childhood. We were one of the last to admit that our old domed Fisher County Courthouse should be replaced in the early 1970's. For so many years, we along with scores of other citizens had admired the old courthouse, the clock and bright copper dome. Now we are indeed proud of the new \$375,000 modern courthouse which will be entirely paid for March 1, 1983. Commissioners courts in the 1970's as well as other county officers are to be commended on their foresight and citizens their support of the \$375,000 bond issue September 9, 1972. This also reflects the healthy financial condition of Fisher County.

Our research indicates this is the fourth courthouse for the county. The third, which was our pride and joy for many years was constructed with a \$65,000 bond issue approved August 4, 1909. The copper dome of this courthouse had a large clock with four faces to accomodate people in each direction. A 1,500 pound bell sounded the time of each hour. It was installed at a cost of \$1,500. Task of the caretaker was to climb up into this dome each Monday morning and wind up the clock weights. In 1951 this dome was removed because high winds were damaging the dome and structure below. Much protest was voiced for a time and the old clock and dome were legend to so many of us.

This old Courthouse had much history within its walls. Many criminal trials were held including local murder and murder cases transferred from other counties. During the 1930's some of the outstanding legal battles in the state were staged here. The Judge, District Attorney and defense lawyers all like to come to Roby for their business and to board and bed with Mrs. 'Doc' Davis, who ran the hotel in her spacious home. Her noon meal always bore four kinds of meats and all the fixins'. An entire day could be spent in the spacious courtroom listening to eloquent pleas from both prosecution and

After the county was organized in 1886, all county business was transacted in a storeroom adjoining Captain Anderson's home. His home was one kof the first landmarks in Roby. The first Courthouse was 24 x 30 ft. box and strip building and served several years until a \$6,500 bond issue was voted to construct a two-story frame building with steeple atop. Part of this building was moved just west of the present Roby School system and is at present two nice homes. This was the second courthouse of the County.

THE COMPANY CAR Tax advisors are often asked whether it is better to own a business vehicle in the name of the company or in the name of the individual taxpayer.

The deductibility of a business vehicle is not going to be determined by who owns the car. It will be determined by the business usage, and upon close examination by the IRS, that usage will determine the percentage of the business deduction. It is possible that a vehicle taken as a deduction on your personal return would be more of a red flag than if it were listed on a business return.

If a vehicle is used for business and personal, you will be required to pro-rate all the tax benefits appropriately. It should be noted that all travel to and from "work" is personal and nondeductible even in company cars.

If you have a 1002 business use vehicle, the actual after-tax cost is determined by your tax bracket. A 50% bracket taxpayer purchasing a \$20,000 business vehicle would have an after-tax cost of \$8,800 plus one-half of the operating expenses over a three year period of time. The current tax laws permit you to write off light-weight cars or trucks over three years with no consideration for salvage value, and you're entitled to an investment credit of six percent of the purchase price of the vehicle.

A business vehicle may also be leased rather than purchased. The portion of the lease payment attributable to business use of the vehicle will then be deductible.

Instead of depreciating the vehicle and expensing the actual operating costs, you may choose to deduct the "standard mileage rate" of 20 cents a mile for the first 15,000 miles of business use each year and 11 cents a mile for each additional mile. The use of the standard mileage method does away with the need for keeping detailed records of expenditures, though it remains necessary to keep a diary of business mileage and total mileage. This method is limited to self-employed individuals or \* employees who use only one automobile for business purposes.
