

## Two Killed In Train Wreck Sat

Two Sweetwater residents were killed last Saturday when their 1966 Chevrolet pickup was struck by a train near the Eskota community in southeast Fisher County.

Texas Highway Patrolman Albert Hataway investigated the accident. He indicated that Clifford Gene Black, age 28 of Sweetwater and his stepson Marty Franklin, age 14, also of Sweetwater were pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Geneva Chandler. The accident took place at approximately 3:42 p.m. Saturday, October 9th, 1982.

According to reports the pickup crossed the tracks and was struck on the passenger side by a west-bound MoPac freight train. Services for the two were conducted at Cate-Spencer Funeral Home in Sweetwater.

## Sheriff Investigates Burglary

Fisher County Sheriff Mickey Counts investigated a burglary at the Big Rough Sand and Gravel plant last weekend where approximately \$2,000 in miscellaneous items were removed, according to the investigation report.

The incident took place on Friday night, October 8th and was reported to law enforcement officials on Saturday, October 9th by Big Rough Sand and Gravel manager Shorty Martin. Counts indicated that the person or persons involved broke the lock off the gate, knocked the lock off several storage buildings and removed batteries, tools, parts, radios, and calculators.

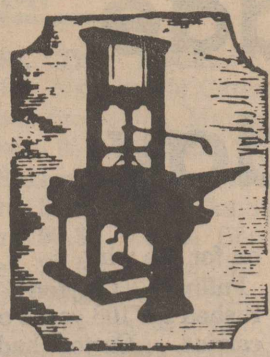
Sheriff's department officials are still investigating the incident.

## Commissioners Receive State Lateral Road Funds

The members of the Fisher County Commissioners Court met last Monday morning and during that meeting authorized Fisher County Attorney Rudy Hamric to

begin drawing up a draft of an ordinance to control solid waste dumping at the Sylvester dump ground. The action came as a result of information presented to the court by Commis-

sioner W. A. Cross concerning an ever-growing number of people outside of Fisher County using the dump facilities. In addition, Cross indicated that those using the

grounds are hauling in dead animals and in some instances not properly disposing of dangerous chemical containers. Cross and the other commissioners are in

hope that the Sylvester dump facility can be better operated and made a more safe facility with the addition of an ordinance spelling out rules for use. County Attorney Hamric is to begin making the initial draft of the ordinance and as soon as it is approved by commissioners will be advertised and finally implemented.

In other action the commissioners were read a letter by Judge Marshall Bennett indicating that Geneva Chandler had successfully completed a 20 hour course in "Texas Justice System". Commissioners were also informed of a \$22,065.37

payment from the State of Texas to be used in the lateral road fund at the county level. This amount is to be equally divided by each of the four commissioners for use in their precincts.

Commissioner W. A. Cross made a motion seconded by Commissioner Billy Henderson to sell a used copy machine to Margie Kisselburg of Fisher County Abstract for the total amount of \$1,858.00. This was the only bid received on the machine.

Commissioner Henderson informed the other commissioners present that considerable work had been done at the Fisher County Airport in an attempt to clean-up the facility. Henderson said that a week had been spent mowing; prisoners had been used to assist in clearing weeds from around the runway lights but that additional work needed to be done in order to completely clean the grounds. Henderson requested that a letter be sent to one firm using space at the airport requesting that debris around their location be cleaned.

In connection with talks at the airport, commissioners discussed purchasing some type of chemical application that would kill shinnery around the fence borders. This matter is to be studied by commissioners.

Commissioners authorized Eula Mae Hull, District Clerk and Geneva Chandler, Justice of the Peace to attend a training school in Tahoka, Texas.

Commissioners discussed the possibility of reviewing the county insurance program with regard to the \$250 deductible on accidents by employees. No action was taken.

County Attorney Rudy Hamric informed commissioners of a Midland Oil firm interested in leasing some county owned mineral rights at the Fisher County Airport. A motion was made and passed by the court to advertise for bids on the sale of the mineral rights.

Hamric also informed the court that a firm had approached him on purchasing some oil and gas books containing laws, cases and statutory laws governing oil and gas information. The cost of the 5 volume set of books was approximately \$400. Commissioners did not take any action on the purchase request.

In final action Judge Bennett read a letter from Judge Weldon Kirk requesting the court to give consideration to providing some training for District Clerk Elect Betty Hargrove. Commissioners, after some discussion, decided to wait for a formal request for training from Mrs. Hargrove.

## Rotan's Baptist Church To Take Pastor Vote Sunday

Rev. Derrell Monday, age 33, a graduate of Hardin - Simmons University and current pastor of the Bethel Baptist Church in Eastland will be delivering the Sunday morning and Sunday evening service at the Rotan First Baptist Church. Immediately following the evening service the membership will be voting to issue a call to Rev. Monday.

Rev. Monday and his wife Janna are originally from Floydada, Texas. They are the parents of three children: Lychelle, age 8 and twin daughters - DyLynn and Emily, age 5. He is a graduate of the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas.

Prior to accepting the position of pastor at the Bethel Baptist Church in Eastland Rev. Monday was Associate Pastor of the First Baptist Church in Hillsboro, Tex. He was involved in youth and education work at the

Calvary Baptist Church in Brownfield and the Lamar Street Baptist Church in Wichita Falls, Texas.

## Rotan 8th Grade Defeats Munday

Rotan 8th grade held on to win a close ballgame 14-10 in Munday Thursday night. The outcome of the game was not decided until the final 9 seconds as a swarming defensive effort by the Yellowhammers stopped a Munday drive.

Rotan scored first in the 2nd quarter on an off tackle run by halfback Darrin Pinkard with 45 seconds gone in the second quarter. This touchdown was set-up by a fumble recovery by Leo Castillo.

Munday went ahead 8-6 with 3:41 left in the 2nd quarter on a 65 yard run.

on for the win. Fullback Clayton May rushed for 103 yards on 19 carries. Carter had 63 yards on 9 carries and 1 td. Pinkard rushed for 9 yards and had 1 pass reception for 19 yards and 1 touchdown. They will host the Roby Lions at 6:00 p.m. Thursday.

## Roby Lions Defeated By Strong Klondike Team

The Roby Lions lost their first district game Friday night to a strong Klondike team. The cougars won with a good running game that the Lions were unable to stop all night.

In the first quarter, the Lions had the ball 3 times but were unable to sustain a drive.

The cougars on the first possession of the night moved the ball 88 yards in 8 plays for their first score.

On their 2nd possession they weren't able to move to a first down and punted then their third possession ended when Roby Kirk Williamson intercepted a cougar pass.

The first quarter ended with Klondike leading 6-0. The second quarter started with the Lions on their 4 yard line after the interception by Williamson.

The Lions moved the ball to the cougars 33 yard line in 8 plays, one being a good run of 45 yards by Bennie Putnam and a pass play good for 13 yards from John Etheredge to Todd Coker. The Lions next possession of the second quarter ended with a punt and their third possession was stopped by an interception of a Lion pass.

The Lion's defense began to stiffen in the second quarter. The cougars had three possessions in the second quarter. The first ended on a 4th down punt, the second ended on a fumble and the half ended while in their third possession.

The third quarter, the Lions had the ball twice and the cougars three times, with each team scoring.

The Lions score coming on their first possession of the third quarter after a punt. The Lions began on

their 24 yard line in two plays they had their first down. Then with first and ten at their 37, Roby's Robby King on a keeper went around left end and went 73 yards for a touchdown, but a clip was called against the Lions. After the yardage was marked off against the Lions, they had a 21 yard

gain. The Lions went on to score in five plays with Williamson going the last five yards. The PAT was no good and the score was tied 6-6.

The cougars came right back on their next possession and scored going 58 yards in 9 plays to take the lead again. The score 12-6.

In the 4th quarter the Lions lost the ball three times on interceptions. On their fourth possession the game ended.

The cougars had the ball five times in the last quarter and scored on their fourth possession having to go only fourteen yards after an interception of a Lion's pass. They also had a touchdown pass called back because of a penalty. The game ended with the cougars win 18-6.

Rushing for the night, the Lions had 128 yards and

the cougars had 246, passing the Lions had 30 and the cougars had 56.

The Lions had eight first downs and Klondike had seventeen.

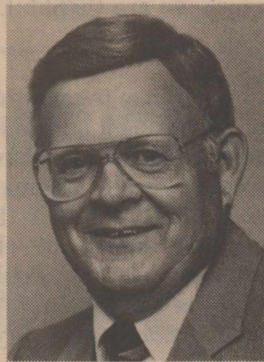

### Preparing for major industry changes

Two changes are coming up which will have a significant impact on how Southwestern Bell provides telephone service to its customers.

First, there's the decision by the Federal Communications Commission (which regulates telecommunications on the national level) that AT&T (the parent company of the Bell System) should set up a fully separate subsidiary to market telephone equipment.

An even bigger change is slated for January 1, 1984. That's the target date for Southwestern Bell being divested from AT&T.

After this divestiture, Southwestern Bell will be primarily a local telephone company. Most of our long distance calling facilities will remain with AT&T.

The 22 divested Bell telephone companies, like Southwestern Bell, will be reorganized into seven re-

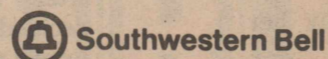

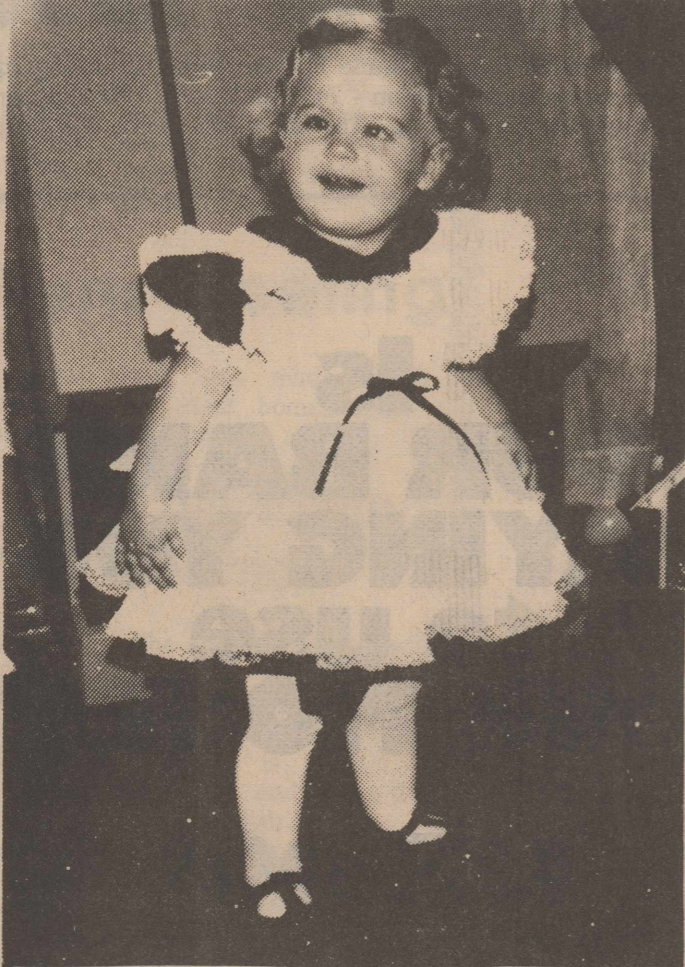

## The Recipe Box Favorite Recipes From County Folks

Recipes for this week's column came in the mail today but sounded different and good. Hope you like them.

### GRANDMA'S GRAPEFRUIT CAKE

2 cups cake flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup freshly squeezed Texas Ruby Red grapefruit juice  
1/3 cup cooking oil  
4 eggs  
1/8 teaspoon cream of tartar  
1 cup sugar

Combine flour, baking powder and salt; sift into bowl. Strain grapefruit juice and combine with vegetable oil. Set aside. Separate eggs. Beat egg whites and cream of tartar until stiff peaks form; set aside. In large mixing bowl and using the same beater, beat egg yolks and sugar until mixture is thick. Beat in about 1/2 cup of flour mixture with 1/4 cup of the juice-oil mixture. Repeat, alternating flour mixture with liquid, beating well after each addition. Gently fold beaten egg whites into batter thoroughly. Pour batter into two 9 inch or three 8 inch greased and floured cake pans. Bake in pre-heated 350 degree oven for 25 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Let cake cool in pans for five minutes. Turn out onto wire racks and let cool thoroughly. When cool, frost with Cream Cheese Frosting.

### CREAM CHEESE FROSTING

2 (8oz) packages cream cheese  
1 cup powdered sugar  
2 tablespoons finely grated Texas Ruby Red grapefruit peel  
1/2 teaspoon vanilla  
1/2 cup freshly squeezed Texas Ruby Red grapefruit juice  
2 Ruby Red grapefruit, sectioned  
Sprigs of fresh mint

Allow cream cheese to soften. Cream the cheese and powdered sugar together. Add grapefruit peel and vanilla. Add grapefruit juice gradually, beating until mixture is fluffy. Frost the cake layers. Garnish cake with Ruby Red grapefruit sections and sprigs of mint. Refrigerate cake until ready to serve.

table was laden with various types of cookies, sandwiches, mints and nuts carried to Salado by the chapters members.

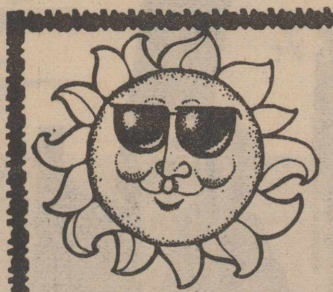

# County Sheriff Recommends New Drug Abuse Program

Quick, what do the following symptoms indicate: disinterest in the opposite sex, fluctuations in wideness of the pupils

of the eyes, not accounted for by changes in light intensity, a tendency to laugh excessively or to laugh at things no one else

thinks are funny, moodiness, sudden carelessness in appearance.

A stage your child is going through? Often, these and other widely-researched symptoms are indicators of a drug abuse problems.

The growing problem of drug abuse, and its acceptance by the younger members of today's society, is the focus of a program being initiated and endorsed by Fisher County's sheriff, Mickey Counts.

"I'm real interested in getting to the drug abuse problem," Counts said from his office today. "I think people will realize the need for it; they know that their kids are exposed to it."

The program begun by Counts is a drug abuse awareness program being carried out through his department by "L.A.W. Publications" - Let's All Work to fight drug abuse. Jackie Jones, a representative of L.A.W., has been in Fisher County and will be here through this week, soliciting sponsorship of the program from area merchants.

The money will be used for materials distributed through the sheriff's office, including well-researched publications, drug recognition charts and a big identification chart that will go from school to school.

Primarily, Counts said the program is aimed at adult education, so that parents might recognize a drug problem with their child before others do, and deal with it.

I plan to go to civic clubs, including the Lions and others to give talks on the problem, Counts said. He added that he had a slide presentation and cassette tape programs on the subject that are available to be shown to interested

area groups. Already, he said the Fisher County school districts have expressed a strong interest in the program.

Miss Jones said she would be glad to discuss the operation of the program and the materials with any potential sponsor or other interested persons through this week, and said she can be contacted through the sheriff's office at 776-2161.

inspect property values listed in the appraisal records to ensure equality and uniformity within and between all classes of property. Additionally, the ARB has the authority to review applications for exemptions and productivity valuation.

The land classes are soil land classes by Soil Conservation service soil survey. For agricultural or productivity value, the land must be devoted to agricultural use (cultivated or grazing), and must have been in agricultural use for at least five of the last seven years. You have to file application to qualify for agricultural use or productivity value use.

The account number on your Notice locates the real estate. Real estate that is not inside the city limits has an account number starting with "A" and the Abstract Number (example: A-0024-0001-00, Abstract number is 24).

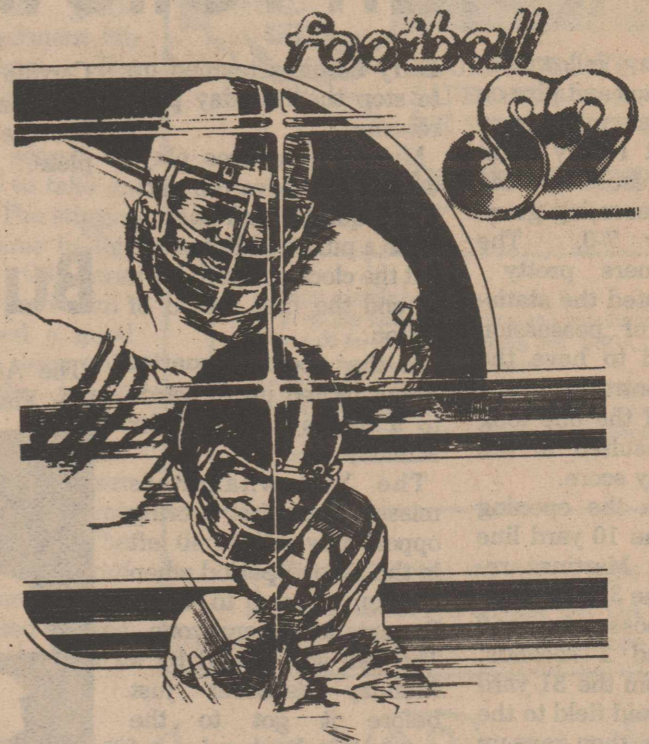

On the day Gretchen Radke graduated from the University of Southern California, Magna cum laude in English, she had an "empty feeling". Although she had been accepted into a Ph. D program at the University of Virginia, Radke was enrolling in Business school at Boston University. Business was a more practical thing for her to take. Unfortunately what is practical for Radke and thousands of students like her, may be disastrous for higher education. Some of the brightest undergraduates are not considering academic careers. As a result, scholars worry, universities will face a shortage of new teaching talent perhaps as soon as the next decade.

For several years now, college graduates have been abandoning the classroom for more lucrative careers in the boardroom, the courtroom and the operating room. The reason is simple: the colleges became clogged with youthful faculty members in the 1960s and the demand for new ones has fallen to a whisper. The job market is practically non-existent. But there will be a turnabout in the late 1990s when the college-age population will increase and a large number of the faculty they have now, will approach retirement. We cannot afford a situation in which people stay away from graduate school, cautions Princeton University president, William Bowen.

According to Harvard, the number of Summa cum laude seniors who went on to graduate school, dropped from 77 percent in 1964 to 31 percent last year. Good students are not even giving teaching a second thought.

IRS Audits (Don't Lose Sleep) by Gerald Rodgers, CPA

The IRS has three levels of examination (audits) of income tax returns. All are intended to review the facts and see that your return is properly filed. The agent is not to harass or belittle you. If you have filed your return with the correct numbers, don't lose sleep over an upcoming audit.

The simplest of the audits is a "direct correspondence." You may be asked to send photo copies of a few specific checks or documents.

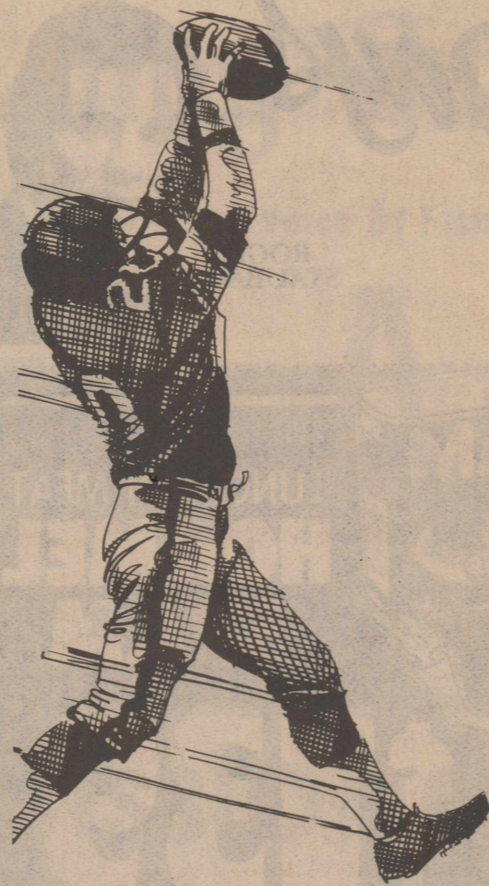
An "office audit" will often be more detailed and may require you to take certain records to your nearest IRS office. A call to the examining officer for more information on what to bring could save you an extra trip.

The "field audit" is held at your home or place of business. It usually involves a full review of all major income and expense items. If you have income from a partnership or small corporation, they may also be brought into the audit.

The IRS has had excellent results by letting their computer select which returns are to be audited and most likely to produce added revenue for the government. The computer checks for certain "norms" in your return depending on the nature of your business, income level, etc. If you have abnormal figures such as excessive interest expense, high medical bills, etc., you should attach a photocopy of the document supporting the deductions. Such documentation may keep the IRS from contacting you.

If you receive correspondence from the taxing authorities, respond timely. Ignoring their first few notices will not gain you favor when you finally meet, and you will.


