# County Hospital Board Approves Rate Hike, Also \$66,000 Salary

Fisher County Hospital Board members after spending an hour and five minutes in "executive session" (a session closed to the public) came out of the session and immediately

voted to increase room rates. After the room rate vote, they voted to approve a contract to employ the Pulmonary Diagnostic Lab in Haskell, Texas to provide all

respiratory therapy work and granted a blanket salary increase plan for all hospital personnel. In attempting to reconstruct their action, the board reviewed a room

rate survey prepared by Hospital Administrator Don Waddell and presented by Dan Powers of the YDP Corporation. Powers owns the firm that employs Waddell as the local

administrator. In making the initial presentation, Powers justified the need for a room rate increase by indicating that additional funds were needed in order to make pay rate

adjustments. He also said that two-thirds of patients at the Fisher County Hospital were medicare patients with charges paid by the medicare program. The maximum rate or charge for a room would not necessarily effect those 6 people in every 100 who were paid through the federally funded program by the government.

A survey of eight area hospitals was presented to board members. The charges for private rooms ranged from a high of \$165.00 a day at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene to a low of \$90.00 a day at the Stonewall and Fisher County Hospitals. Hospitals between the high and low included: Sweetwater \$127.50, Snyder \$115.00, Hamlin \$98, Haskell \$95, and Anson \$93 per day. Frank Mitchell made a motion seconded by Raford Hargrove and approved by board members Copeland and Williams to increase the Fisher County Hospital room charges for private facilities from the current \$90 to \$105 a day. In the motion they increased semi-private facilities from \$85 to \$100 a day and increased Intensive Care Units from \$160 to \$225 per day.

In making projections, based on the new rates, Waddell and Powers estimated that the \$15 hike in private and semi private facilities plus the \$65 hike in ICU facilities would generate an estimated \$93,000 in additional funds per year based on 6,200 patient bed days. They projected spending \$66,600 of the newly generated \$93,000 in room rate hikes for local salary increases.

In the salary increase motion made by Frank Mitchell and seconded by Glen Copeland and approved by Williams and Hargrove; they adopted a 12 page report entitled "Personnel Administration Program" as presented by Waddell and Powers. This report spells out policies concerning Personnel Review; New Employees; Wage and Salary Guidelines; and Changes in Employment Status. Basically, the new wage policy implements a basic pay for all personnel and makes provisions for "excess pay" based on results of an employee evaluation and annual review program.

Under the new plan all hospital employees fall into one of eight new basic pay categories. Within the category, a base pay is established plus a pay in 6 months, 12 months and a maximum pay for the group.

The eight new pay groups include: Group 1 Non Licensed, Medical Personnel, Nurses Aides. The beginning base pay will be \$3.45 per hour; 6 months \$3.50; 1 year \$3.55 and maximum \$4.55.

Group 2 Non Licensed, Medical Personnel, Clerical Aides, Ward Clerks beginning base pay \$3.35 per hour; Group 3 housekeepers, dishwashers, Yard help, laundry personnel beginning base pay \$3.35 per hour.

Group 4 Registered Nurses and Paramedics beginning base pay \$9 per hour. Group 5 Licensed vocational nurses \$5.25 per hour; Group 6 cooks beginning base pay \$4 per hour.

Group 7 Basic clerical personnel \$3.55 per hour and Group 8 specialist Clerical personnel \$3.85 per hour.

The Hobbs Gin went on record as ginning the first Fisher County bale of cotton of the 1982-83 season last week when it ginned a 467 pound bale for James Ratliff of the Rough Creek Community.

The bale was ginned late last week and was part of a 3 bale load. The 467 pound bale had 850 pounds of seed and was ginned at no cost by the Hobbs Gin, according to Manager Danny Helms.

Helms indicated that the gin ran fine and mentioned that the gin had installed new lint cleaners and a

new humidifier for the 82-83 season. Helms has been Hobbs Gin manager since February after serving as bookkeeper for 7 years. Esther Hayes replaced Helms as bookkeeper.

## Rotan School Board Hires Adriana Cox

The members of the Rotan School Board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Carla Beames, early childhood instructor, at their last meeting recently and voted to replace her with Mrs. Stephanie Dickson until December 14th and hire Adriana Cox until the end of the school year.

The board installed Bobby Smith as a newly appointed board member to serve out the term of Allan Houston in April.

They accepted the audit of James Rodgers and voted to remove the outfield baseball fence in order that the area could be used for a junior high practice field and band practice area.

Board members discussed health insurance for teachers and heard a report by Superintendent Jerry Dickson concerning the recent accreditation visit by state education officials.

In final action the board reviewed the capital improvement program with the Superintendent. It is expected that the improvements will be placed in proper priority over a 5 year period and discussed further in November.

School Phobia: Why some Kids won't go. The idea of playing hooky conjures up the image of a kid sitting at the edge of a lake holding a fishing pole with the truant officer peeking from behind a tree. Many children, however, skip school not because they have something more enjoyable to do, but because they are afraid to go.

School phobia starts small. A child may complain of physical pain and be allowed, even encouraged, to remain at home. In time, insistence on staying home increases and mental anguish can lead to physical pain. Here are some guidelines for dealing with school avoidance, as agreed on by some phobia experts: Is your child faking illness in order to stay home? If your child persistently complains of feeling sick, consult your family doctor before concluding that you have a case of being afraid of going to school. If you realize that your child does suffer from a fear of school, you must encourage to return to school. When dealing with a young child who fears separation, phase yourself out of the school scene gradually. Be sure to tell the child "I'm coming back for you when school is over". Don't force your child back to school. This tactic will work only if school isn't as bad as expected. If its worse, the child will only be more frightened. Now the only thing to worry about, is have I sent him to school and he is really sick, then they will have to call and I will have to go after him, and then I will feel very guilty because I didn't believe him when he said that he felt bad. Cheer up, you parents of the very young child who hates school, eventually they will begin to like

## HONEST ANSWERS TO FAIR QUESTIONS

**Our Customers Are Concerned About The Cost of Quality Electric Service, and So Are We. Here's a Sample of the Questions They're Asking and the Answers We're Giving.**

### Q. Why is WTU asking for a rate increase?

A. There are three related reasons: inflation, the rising cost of capital, and WTU's massive construction program. Mainly, the request is based on capital expenditures during the past year.

### Q. When was the last time you raised retail electric rates?

A. WTU has had only three rate increases in its history, while it has lowered rates 14 times. The last increase was February, 1982, and it amounted to an average of just over 8 percent.

### Q. Why is WTU having to raise its rates again so soon?

A. The rate relief granted to us by the cities and the Public Utility Commission of Texas last time proved inadequate. It did not keep up with the cost of additional plant, inflation and high interest rates. Our revenues have not provided an adequate rate of return.

### Q. What are other utilities doing about rates?

A. Without exception, all electric utilities are having to increase their rates. Some have been filing rate cases every year. Bill comparisons reported by the Public Utility Commission of Texas show that WTU's rates are second lowest among investor-owned utilities in Texas.

### Q. Why are you building a big new plant? Isn't energy use declining?

A. Energy use in WTU service area is growing. This summer our peak demand reached 994 megawatts. Our current generating capacity is 1,054 megawatts. The summer peak left us with insufficient reserve margin. We will purchase power from neighboring utilities as a stop-gap measure, but the time has come when we must expand our own generating system, if we are to continue providing service our customers are used to.

### Q. What would happen if you could not get a rate increase?

A. The financial condition of our Company would deteriorate rapidly. Our credit rating would suffer. We would no longer be in position to attract capital at reasonable interest rates to finance necessary major construction. We would have to pay higher interest rates at the expense of our customers.



to Richard Mendoza and Rotan was clearly driving to another score. Mendoza's catch gave Rotan a 1st down at the 13 yard line.



Dan Powers indicated that he and Waddell were in the process of studying the existing heating and cooling system. Powers felt that the system was not at fault, thought the charges by Midwest Electric were in line but indicated the problem was in management of the system. He pointed out several areas that will be monitored to reduce the monthly bill (\$8,699.00 in September) and indicated he would report back to board members with recommendations for new management procedures at a later meeting.

The board discussed the \$6,000.00 "lost linen bill" from Abilene Linen Supply West Texas Linen Service. Powers met with representatives of the linen firm saying they reached an agreement to settle the \$6,311.00 bill for \$3,155.00.

Board members passed a motion by Glen Copeland seconded by Frank Mitchell and approved by Hargrove and Williams approving the hospital to enter into a revised contract with Allied on the operation of the in-hospital pharmacy. Under the new plan, Allied (Formerly Formance) will fully operate the pharmacy and pay the local hospital a monthly gross percent figure. The hospital anticipates a \$10,000 a year increase in collections plus a one time inventory purchase by Allied for drug inventories of approximately \$33,000.00.

Dan Powers presented a plan to the board concerning a "Self Funded Insurance" program with Tryco, Incorporated of Bellaire, Texas to replace the Blue Cross/Blue Shield program currently in use by hospital employees. During the program presentation, Ra-ford Hargrove discovered an error in the "projected savings" under the new plan as presented by Powers. Board members seemed reluctant to approve the new plan.

described by Powers as a planned group pool with the 5 other hospitals he works with and as a display of their reluctance failed to give a second to a motion by Dave Williams that the board enter into the plan. After Williams' motion died, Hargrove and Copeland made a motion to table action on the new plan. That motion received a 3-1 vote with Hargrove, Copeland and Mitchell voting "for" and Williams voting "against". Administrator Don Waddell is to research cost figures, loss payments, etc and report back to the board at a future meeting.

The board authorized Don Waddell to sign checks up to \$2,000.00; reviewed the financial report; approved the payment of bills and heard a report from Waddell concerning numerous items in his "Administrators Report".

In Waddell's report he discussed meetings he had with personnel of the community and in the hospital, announced the establishment of a monthly department head meeting and reported a plan to save approximately \$330.00 a year in gasoline purchases for the Fisher County Ambulance. Waddell indicated that gas for the ambulance was currently being purchased from two Rotan service stations at an average cost of \$1.27 per gallon.

Waddell said he discussed a plan with John Gray of Gray Fuel and Chemical whereby gas could be purchased for \$1.11 a gallon. The administrator indicated that Gray had agreed to set a 500 gallon tank and provide a pump at no cost to the hospital. Board members are to discuss the gas plan further in November.

In final action Waddell reported that monthly bond payments of \$3,188 were going to be subtracted from a reserve fund and that no monthly payments would be made locally until March of 1983. The reserve fund built-up to \$56,000 from the required \$36,000.

The next regular meeting of the board will be on November 15th.

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

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## Rotan Extension Club Has Meeting With Oma Long





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### CORPORATE MYTHS

There are many reasons why people feel they should incorporate their businesses. Very often these reasons are based on misinformation about the advantages of being a corporation.

There are a number of things that being a corporation will not do for you. It will not automatically make you more profitable. It will not necessarily limit your liability on all transactions. It will not necessarily reduce your overall tax bill, it may, in fact, increase it.

If you incorporate an existing business, you may find that your long established suppliers now require new financial statement information. They may also request that you sign personally as a guarantor of the corporation's line of credit with their company. Most closely held corporations are required to have the personal guarantee of the major shareholders in securing a line of bank credit for corporation purposes. This guarantee has the effect of not limiting your liability in reference to those bank loans.

In an attempt to reduce business income taxes, you may find that the incorporation of your business has not only increased the actual income tax bill, but also increased payroll taxes because the previous proprietor is now an employee of the corporation.

There is an income tax election that allows certain qualifying corporations to be taxed somewhat as a partnership. This election is referred to as Subchapter "S" election. The Sub-S corporate tax election allows most corporate gains and losses and tax credits to pass directly to the shareholders. Therefore, the corporation functions in the same legal capacity as any other corporation, yet has the increased tax consequences passed to the shareholders, pro rata.

Because of the increased costs of operating as a corporation, and because of the many legal and tax considerations, I suggest that anyone considering incorporating discuss the matter with both their accountant and attorney.
