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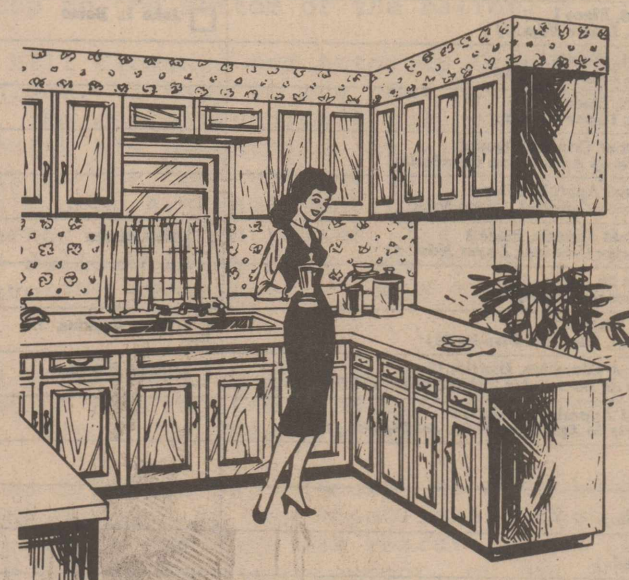

Hayes are retired farmers and members of Cross Roads Baptist Church near Rotan, Texas.

Ordinance No. 132
An ordinance fixing and determining the general service rate to be charged for sales of Natural gas to residential and commercial consumers in the city of Rotan, Fisher, County, Texas; providing for the manner in which such rate may be changed, adjusted, and amended, providing for surcharge: and providing for a schedule of service charges.

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Rotan, Texas:

Section 1. Effective with gas bills rendered on and after thirty (30) days from the final date of passage of this ordinance, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Rotan, Texas, by Lone Star Gas Company, a division of ENSERCH CORPORATION, A Texas Corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as set forth in Item A, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

Section 2. The residential and commercial rates set forth above shall be adjusted upward or downward from a base of \$3.1847 per Mcf by a Gas Cost Adjustment Factor expressed as an amount per thousand cubic feet (Mcf) of natural gas for changes in the intracompany city gate rate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to the Rotan distribution system, according to Item B, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

Section 3. Company shall also receive tax adjustments according to Item C, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

Section 4. The residential and commercial rates set forth above shall be adjusted upward and downward by a Cost of Service Adjustment Factor expressed as an amount per customer for changes in the cost of service over a twelve month period ending December 31, according to Item D, in the attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

Section 5. Rate case expense is not included in the calculation of proposed rates. If rate case expense is incurred in this current case, it is the intention of Lone Star Gas Company to recover the current and any prior rate case expense through a surcharge designed for a six-month nominal recovery period. The surcharge per Mcf would be calculated by dividing the rate case

expense to be recovered by one-half of the adjusted annual sales volume to residential and commercial customers. If there is no current rate case expense, the Company will forego recovery of any unamortized prior rate case expense. When a surcharge is applicable, monthly status reports will be provided to account for the collections.

Section 6. In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect. The service charges set forth in Item E, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein are approved. Services for which no charge is set out in Item E may be performed and charged for by Company at a level established by the normal forces of competition.

Section 7. The rates set forth in this ordinance may be changed and amended by either the City or Company in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

Section 8. It is hereby found and determined that the ordinance was passed was open to the public, as required by Texas law, and that advance public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given. Passed and approved on this the 14th day of October A.D. 1982.

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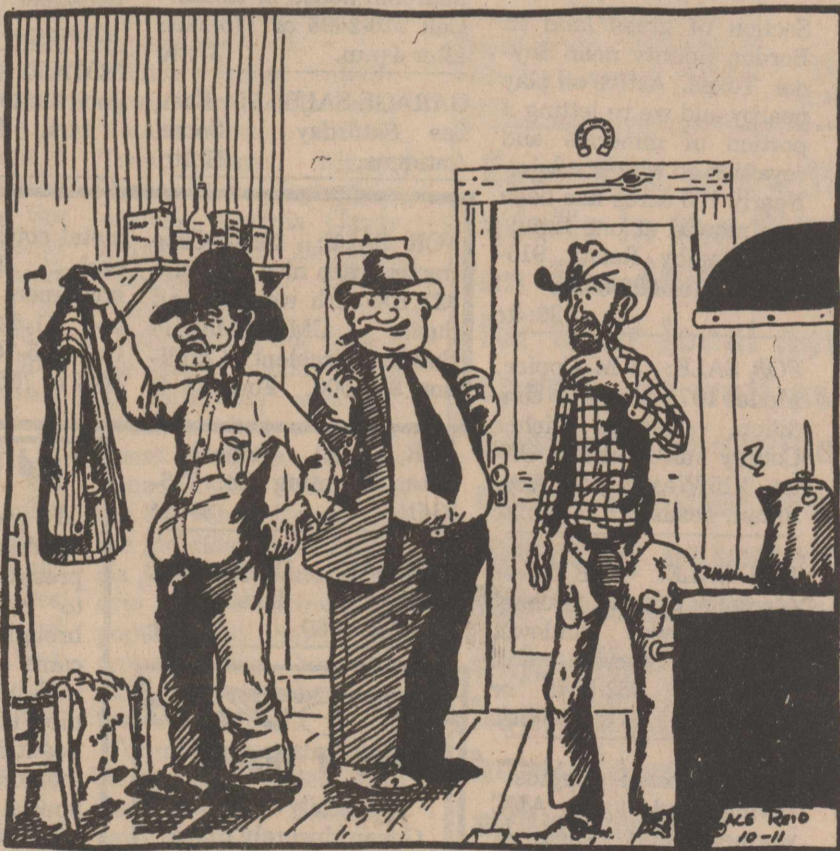

Lynda Henderson Named Rider

Three alternate White Horse riders have been chosen for the 1982-83 school year, according to Dr. William O. (Bill) Beazley, assistant to the president and coordinator of the White Horses and their riders.

Picked by the judges in close competition as one of the riders is Lynda Henderson, Junior from Rotan.

They join the six other White Horse riders who will represent HSU at various parades and special events. In many cases, they and the famous HSU Cowboy Band team up at parades, rodeos, and other special events. Occasionally, they appear as separate units.

White Horse riders picked previously are: Natalie Morton, Abilene; Terri Grimes, Mineral Wells; Beth Longbotham, Abilene; Rhonda Clardy, Irving; Cody Beckwith, Progresso, and Sharon Gray, Haskell.

They started out back in the 1930's, nobody seems to remember exactly when, as just a promotional gimmick for the famed Cowboy Band. But the Six White Horses and the girl riders bearing the six flags that have flown over Texas proved so popular that they're still around. In fact, they make more appearances now than ever before.

For many years their only chore was to appear with the Cowboy Band in parades. With the band, they've performed in 40 of the 50 states over the last quarter of a century marching down such famous streets as New York's Broadway, Washington's Pennsylvania Avenue, New Orleans' Canal Street, San Francisco's Market Street, and Chicago's Michigan Avenue. Among their most notable appearances in recent years were the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in 1970, the inauguration of President Nixon in 1969, the inauguration of Gov. Dolph Briscoe in 1973, the Lions International Convention in Montreal in 1978, and the Hollywood Christmas Parade in 1981.

But the Six Whites have also become an attraction on their own. Under the direction of Dr. Beazley, the Six White Horses and their coed riders have perfected intricate drills which have won applause in many arenas throughout the Southwest. They're so much in demand that Dr. Beazley has to watch the booking with care in order not to jeopardize the scholastic work of the riders.

Actually there are eight white horses, right now, including one spare and one retired. The riders, all HSU coeds in good academic standing, are chosen of the basis of appearance, horsemanship, and general enthusiasm.

The Rotan Yellowhammers, after jumping out to a quick 8-0 lead on the opening drive of the game last Friday night against

Paducah, had to settle for their second district loss as the fiery dragons amassed 29 points to Rotan's 14. Coach Robert Damron,

looking ahead to this Friday nights contest with Hamlin said "We're in as good a shape (physically) as we've been all year."

The Rotan Coach was alluding to the nagging injuries that have plagued key players all season. We still have a few players that will be questionable or playing with injuries, said Damron. He indicated that Randy Martinez has an injured knee, said Dion Sepeda is expected to be back against Hamlin; commented that Steve Witt will be playing with a broken thumb and that Scott Bryan will see action after having two fingers dislocated against Paducah last week.

"We're going to be making some minor personnel changes against Hamlin, nothing major, and don't plan any big changes in either offense or defense. We're just going to be trying to continue doing the things we've done well this season", said Damron. The Rotan-Hamlin game is very important to Rotan since they are currently

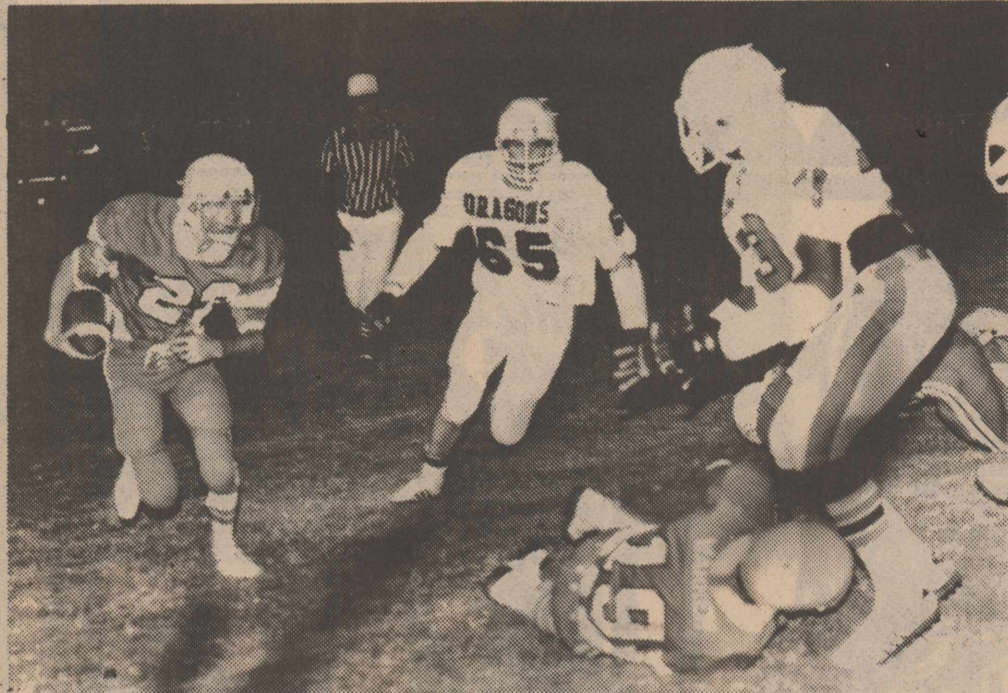
Rotan's defense also tightened up on their second series. Richard Mendoza got credit for an unassisted tackle; on the second play Darrin Lever-

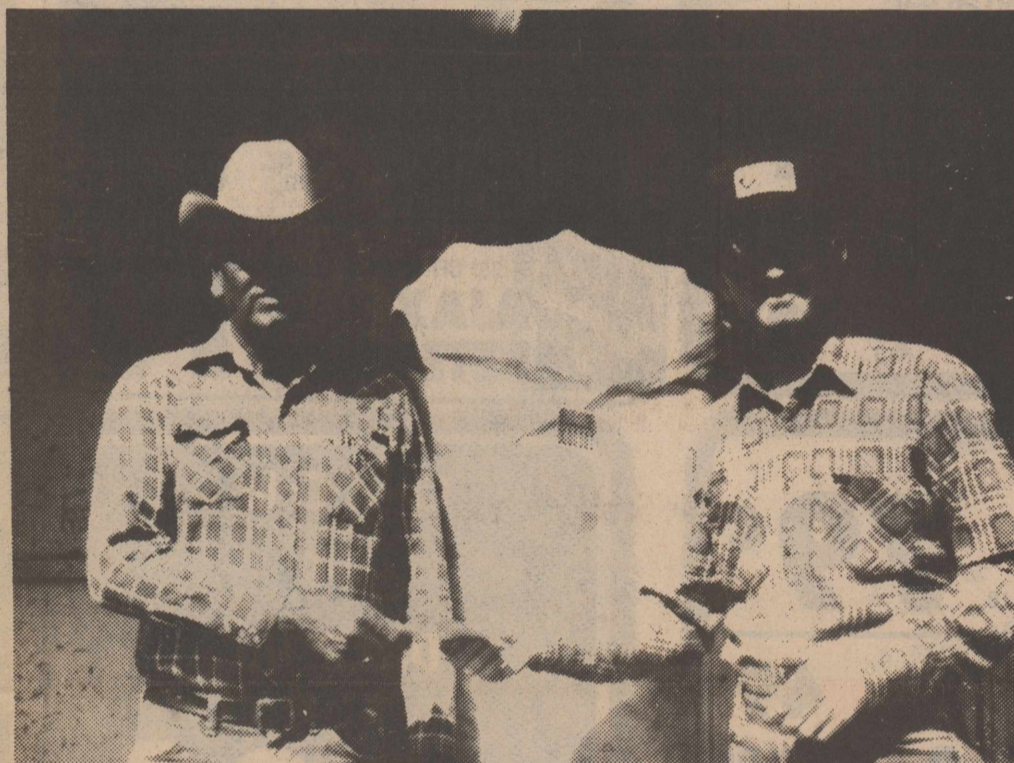
Paducah scored the go ahead touchdown in the opening minutes of the second half.

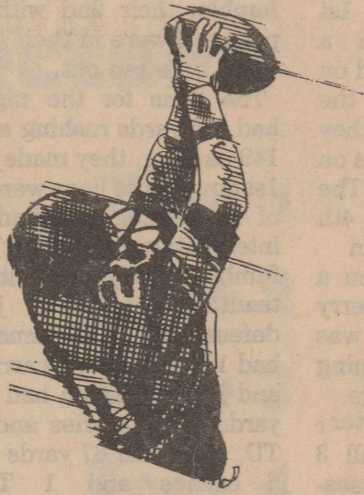

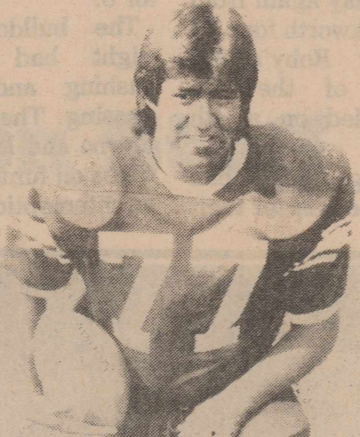

TAX PLANNING

INTEREST RATES CHANGE

Interest rates charged by the IRS used to be considerably below market rates. A favorite "tax strategy" was to use the government as your banker, delaying tax payments since IRS interest was 12% simple interest compared with the bank's 16% to 20%. It was often wiser to leave your money in the bank earning a compounded higher rate and delay paying taxes.

The 1981 Tax Act provided that IRS interest rates would be adjusted annually to equal commercial rates rather than every two years under prior law. As of February 1, 1982, the IRS interest rate was 20%.

The 1982 Tax Act made two more significant changes. The interest rate is now to be adjusted semiannually as of each January 1st and July 1st beginning January 1, 1983. The rate will be based on the average prime during the prior six month period ending September 30th and March 31st.

Based on the new rule, the IRS interest rate will fall from the current 20% to 16% on January 1, 1983.

The second significant change made by the 1982 Act is that IRS interest will be compounded daily. The change affects all "taxes owed" by the taxpayer or "refunds" due the taxpayer after December 31, 1982.

The effect of compounding can be seen in a simple example. If a taxpayer had a tax deficiency of \$1,000 that went unpaid for three years, he'd owe \$600 interest at the 20% simple interest rate.

The same tax liability with a 20% interest charge compounded daily would result in \$822 interest over a three year period. If the liability involved a tax dispute that dragged on for two more years, the compounding would result in an additional \$896 of interest rather than \$400 at the "simple rate."

The government hopes these changes will discourage taxpayers from using the IRS as a banker.
