
Fisher County native Don Waddell to serve as the administrator. Waddell was hired by YDP, Inc. and officially took over as local hospital administrator on October 1, 1982.







County Agent Report

Getting your soil tested has always been important, but now this proven practice is more important than ever.

Fertilizer is getting more and more expensive, so it's crucial for producers to get the most from their fertilizer dollar. Getting a profitable return from fertilizer depends on the supply of available nutrients already in the soil. A soil test can provide an estimate of this supply.

A soil test will determine which nutrients are deficient in the soil for a particular crop so that a producer can fertilize to supplement the soil

supply. It's not profitable to supply nutrients already available in the soil in sufficient quantities for a particular crop or to supply added nutrients that the crop does not need or cannot use.

Fall is a good time for testing, since soil test results can be obtained more quickly this time of the year due to a smaller volume than in the spring. And, once producers have their test results, they can order the fertilizer they need for the coming season.

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

You, the Jury: What to do when the call comes.

The verdict rang out clearly: Not guilty by reason of insanity. John C. Hinckley, Jr., who on March 30, 1981 fired a volley of bullets at President Ronald Reagan, has been acquitted on 13 counts including attempted assassination. The verdict stunned the courtroom and soon reverberated across the nation. As cries of outrage came from many quarters, several of the jurors stated that they had wanted a guilty verdict but had given in to the majority-and now they felt anger and regret.

For those of us who have ever moaned about jury duty, the Hinckley verdict brings home the serious nature of performing this rite. What actually is the jury duty system all about? Jury duty in state courts starts with a notice that comes in the mail to the prospective juror. The names of the jurors are collected for the most part by a random selection of registered voters. Generally, those summoned for jury duty have to serve if they're at least 18 years old, literate and are U.S. citizens. There are exemptions; for example if your health is severely impaired, if you are the guardian of small children or if you are 65 or older. Exemptions vary from state to state and are listed on the notice you receive. Jurors receive from \$5 to \$30 per day depending on the state you live in. The length of service required can vary too, depending on your location from one day in Dallas, Detroit and Denver to 3 months in Utah, where you are on call. For many individuals, serving on a jury is an interesting and worthwhile experience. How you become an effective juror, one who, unlike some of the Hinckley jurors, doesn't have regrets later? Since its rare that a judge instructs the jury on anything but what kind of verdict they have to bring in, these guidlines could help: Prepare a list of issues in the case for discussion. Let each juror have his or her say, taking one issue at a time. Vote on each issue separately to narrow differences. Don't allow anyone to intimidate you by making personal criticisms. The next time you are summoned for jury duty, go willingly, and with an open mind.





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

At its meeting on November 1, 1982 the City Council of the City of Rotan adopted a Fair Housing Ordinance.

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

TRAVEL AND ENTERTAINMENT EXPENSES (Substantiation Requirement) by Gerald Rodgers CPA

Even though a taxpayer appears to meet every requirement of the Internal Revenue Code on travel and entertainment expenditures, he may still be disallowed a deduction for failure to meet the "substantiation" requiements. Ever since 1962, the IRS has had the authority to disallow deductions based on approximations. Your unsupported verbal testimony or plea for mercy will not constitute substantiation.

There are five basic elements to be proven with respect to "each" expenditure for entertainment. 1. AMOUNT-Each separate expenditure must be accounted for separately except incidental expenditures which may be lumped on a daily basis. 2. TIME- The date the entertainment took place. 3. PLACE- Include name, address and type of entertainment. 4. BUSINESS PURPOSE- State the nature of business discussion or activity. Unless the type of business is obvious, give enough details to establish the specific business activity.


5. BUSINESS RELATIONSHIP- Give the name, occupation or title of the person being entertained. Of the above elements only the first four apply to travel. Under the category TIME, give dates of departure and return for each trip and the number of those days spent on business.

As a general rule, if you keep a "timely kept" diary with the required elements of substantiation, you will be able to defend your deduction. A timely kept diary is one in which the entries are made at or near the time the expenditure was made. When the expenditure is \$25.00 or less, an actual paid receipt is not required as long as you have the information recorded. A cancelled check by itself will not necessarily support a deduction.

Taxpayers who have had their "T and E" deductions substantially slashed during examination will vouch for the Internal Revenue Services's strict application of these substantiation requirements.





West Texas Utilities Co. has entered a gas purchase agreement with Haskell Gathering Co. which could result in ower fuel costs at its Paint Creek Power Station.

WTU has begun taking a small volume of low BTU gas, and is expected to take more when the gathering firm's pipelines are extended to additional wells in Haskell and Throckmorton counties. The Paint Creek plant is on Lake Stamford in southeastern Haskell County.




