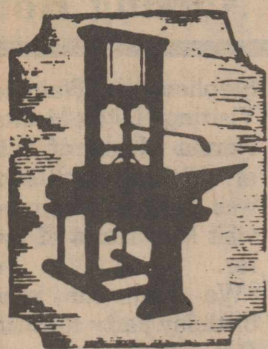

Gary McGee New Administrator

On September 27th the members of the Fisher County Hospital Board hired the management firm of YDP, Inc., of Lubbock and turned the responsibility of selecting a hospital administrator to replace Jerry Weatherly over to that corporation. YDP, Inc., selected

Fisher County native Don Waddell to serve as the administrator. Waddell was hired by YDP, Inc. and officially took over as local hospital administrator on October 1, 1982.

In a surprise move, YDP, Inc., replaced Waddell last Friday as administrator and named Gary McGee,

former administrator at the Muleshoe Hospital as the local interim administrator.

YDP, Inc., President Dan Powers, met with members of the Fisher County Hospital Board last Friday, October 29th at 9:30 a.m. in a special called meeting (closed to the

public) to discuss the replacement of Waddell and to recommend the hiring of McGee. After interviewing McGee the board voted to accept Powers' recommendation and hire the new administrator. The vote to hire McGee took place in open session.

Waddell, local administrator for less than 30 days, was employed by the National Rural Utilities Finance Corporation in Washington, D. C. prior to being named administrator. He was responsible for activities in a five state area with headquarters in Memphis, Tennessee.

Yellowhammers Met By Fiery Hamlin Team

The Rotan Yellowhammers met a fiery Hamlin Pied Piper squad last Friday night and fell to defeat by the score of 20-6, but the local squad was within striking distance of Hamlin until the closing minutes of the final quarter.

Rotan outrushed the Pied Pipers in the opening half of play 84 yards to 52 but only managed 1 first down to 7 for Hamlin. Second half statistics tipped the scales of balance in favor of Hamlin due to several long runs in the second half of the final quarter.

Eddie Bolden, the junior 150 pound running back, proved to be a thorn in the side of the stiff Rotan defense last Friday. He scored the first Hamlin touchdown with 5:03 left in

the first quarter on a sweep around right end that covered 45 yards. The missed extra point gave the "green machine" a 6-0 lead.

With 3:37 left in the first quarter Rotan successfully executed a deceptive play that covered 36 yards and set the squad up with a 1-10 from the 14 yard line. In re-capping the series, Scott Bryan returned Hamlin's kickoff after the touchdown to the 37 yard line. Charles Adkins and Dennis Warren provided key blocks for Warren as he charged to the 43 yard line, facing 3rd down and 1 yard, Hamlin's Shannon Mitchell broke through the Yellowhammer offensive wall and nailed Scott Bryan at the line of scrimmage. With 4th and 1, Randy Martinez pulled off the "play of the game" and darted up mid-field for a 36 yard gain - setting up Rotan at the 14 yard line.

The drive ended three plays later when a Tim Carrillo pass was intercepted with 1:47 in the first quarter.

Rotan ran three offensive series in the 2nd quarter, each time being forced to punt on 4th down.

Hamlin increased their lead to 12-0 as Quarterback Jeff Merket followed

Eddie Bolden into the end zone from 1 yard out. A pass to Bolden on the extra point try gave the Pied Pipers a 14-0 lead at halftime.

Rotan and Hamlin played a tough third quarter with no scoring taking place.

Rotan got on the scoreboard with 4:26 left in the game when Dennis Warren dove over the line from 2 yards out. Rotan's scoring drive was set up by runs credited to Scott Bryan, Dennis Warren and Tim Carrillo. Bryan attempted the extra point run that would have left the score 14-8, but the shifty halfback fell a foot shy of reaching the goal line.

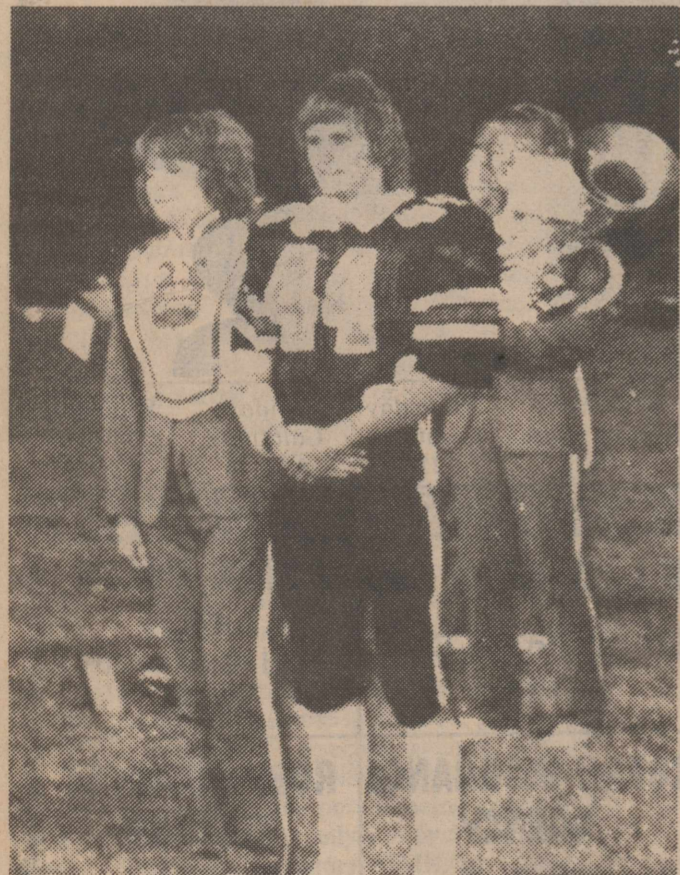
Trailing by 8 points (a TD and 2 point conversion) Rotan got the ball back with 1:39 left in the game and began marching. Their drive ended when Eddie Bolden intercepted a pass with 57 seconds in the game.

Hamlin went on to score another touchdown in the final 2 seconds of the game that increased their 14 to 20-6.

The Yellowhammers host district leading Haskell on Friday night in the final game of the season. Rotan stands 3-6 for the year and 1-3 in district play.

In the second half the Stingers had the ball three times. They were stopped on their first possession when the Cubs intercepted a Stinger pass.

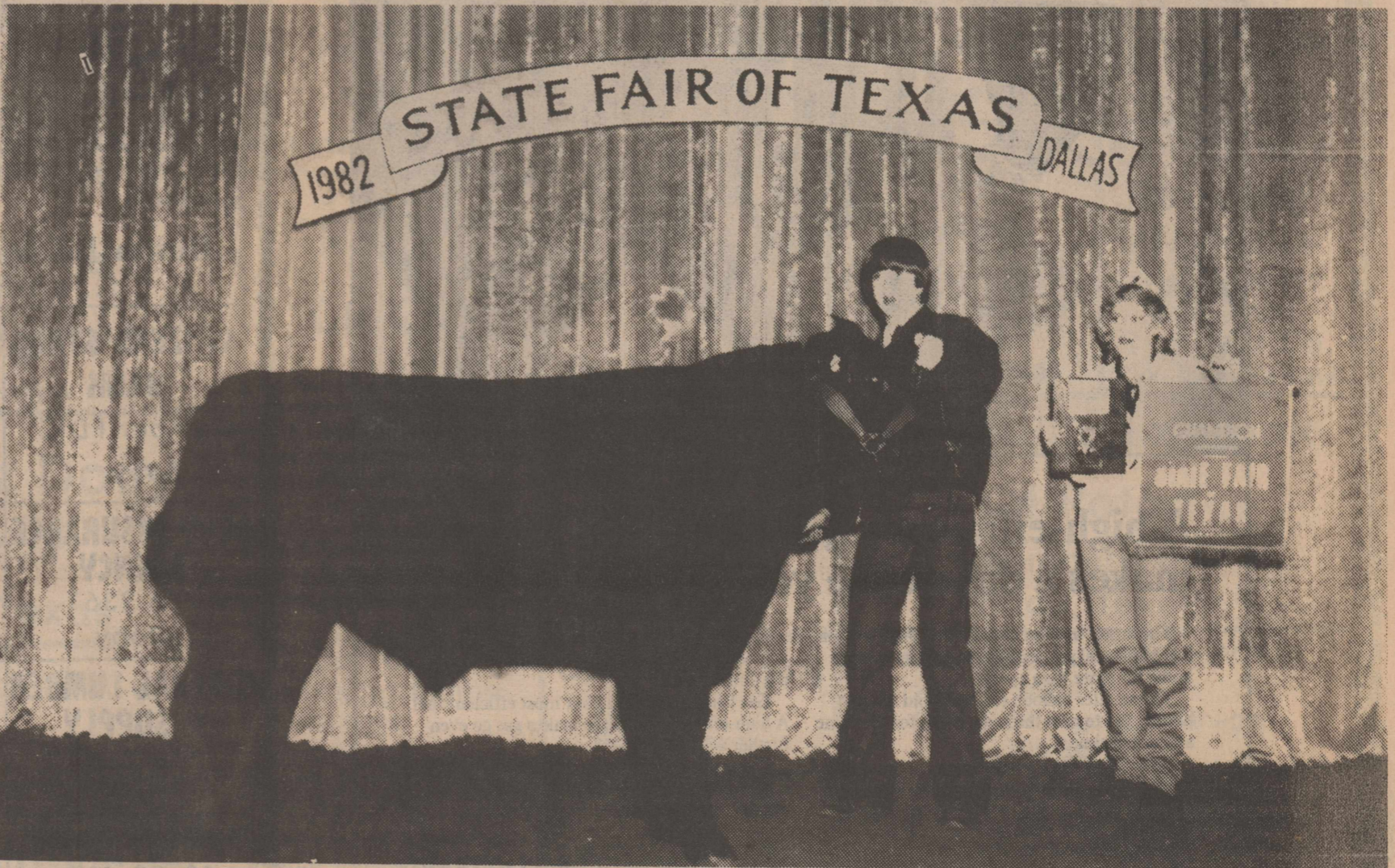
On their second possession they scored, the third quarter ended in their third possession.

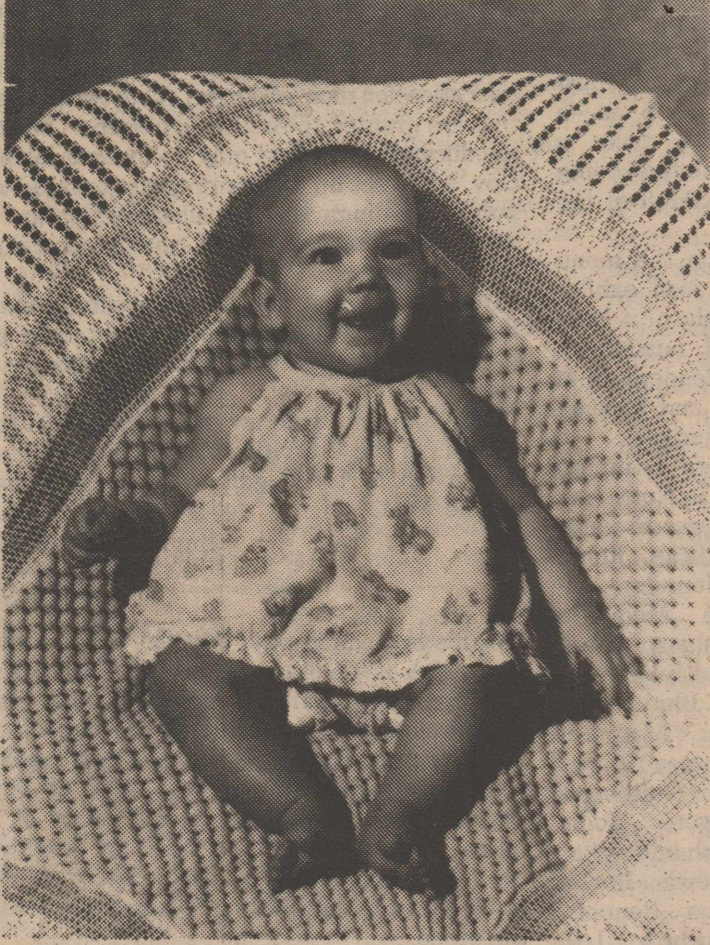


CHAMPION ANGUS STEER: Ricky Spencer son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Spencer of Roby is shown with his

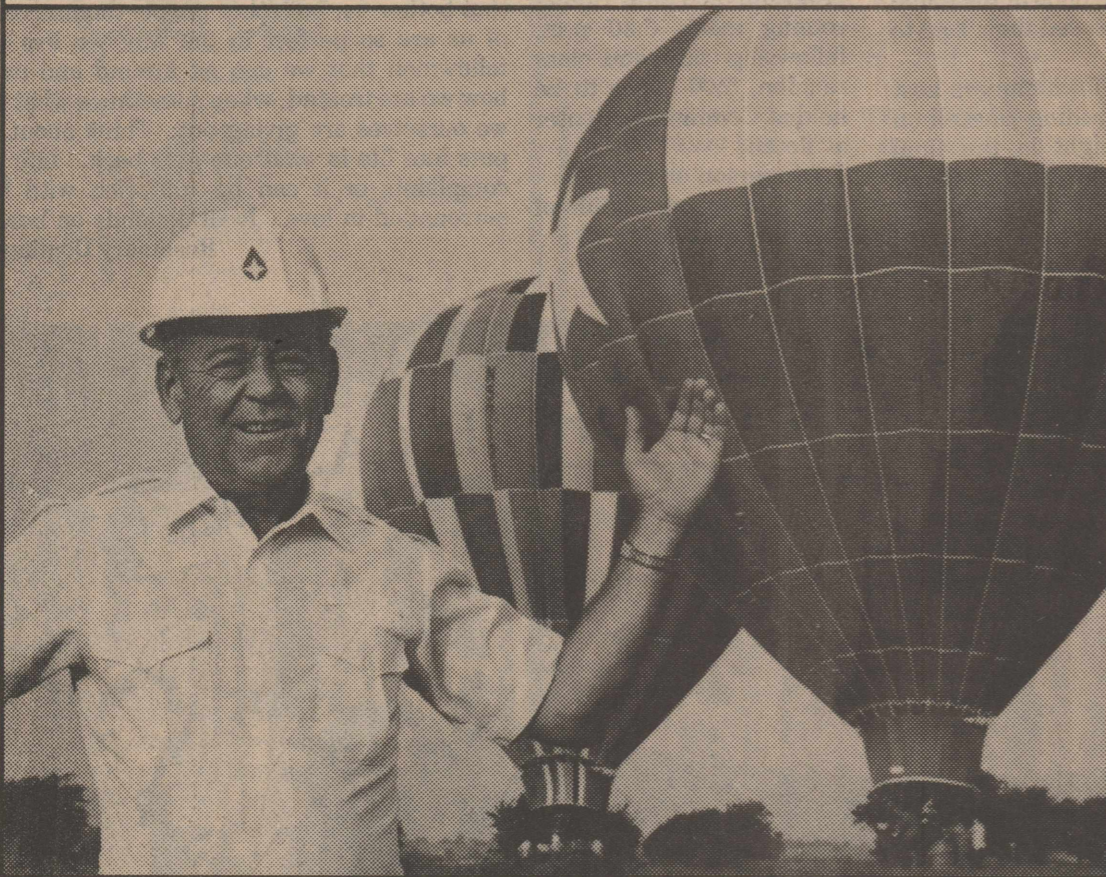
meeting.

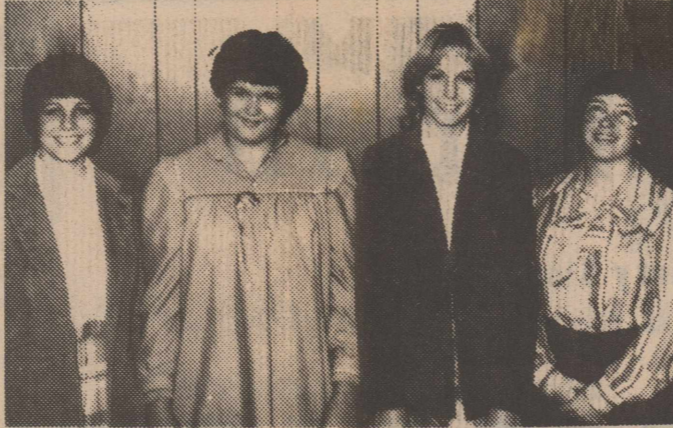
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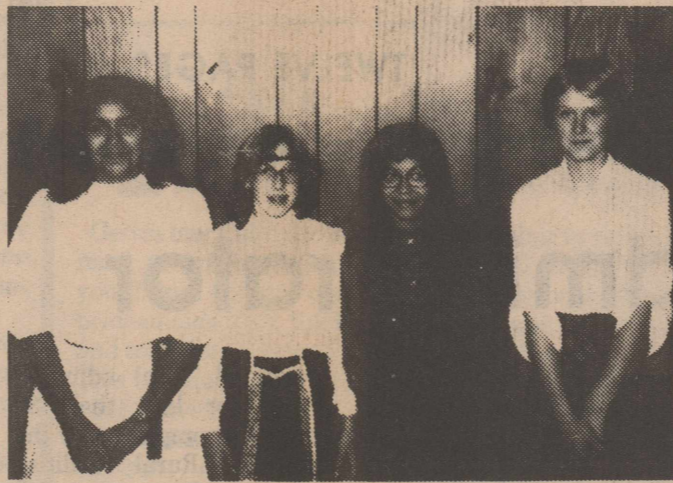

County Agent Report

Getting your soil tested has always been important, but now this proven practice is more important than ever.

Fertilizer is getting more and more expensive, so it's crucial for producers to get the most from their fertilizer dollar. Getting a profitable return from fertilizer depends on the supply of available nutrients already in the soil. A soil test can provide an estimate of this supply.

A soil test will determine which nutrients are deficient in the soil for a particular crop so that a producer can fertilize to supplement the soil

supply. It's not profitable to supply nutrients already available in the soil in sufficient quantities for a particular crop or to supply added nutrients that the crop does not need or cannot use.

Fall is a good time for testing, since soil test results can be obtained more quickly this time of the year due to a smaller volume than in the spring. And, once producers have their test results, they can order the fertilizer they need for the coming season.

So, to plan the best fertilizer program, get your soil tested now.

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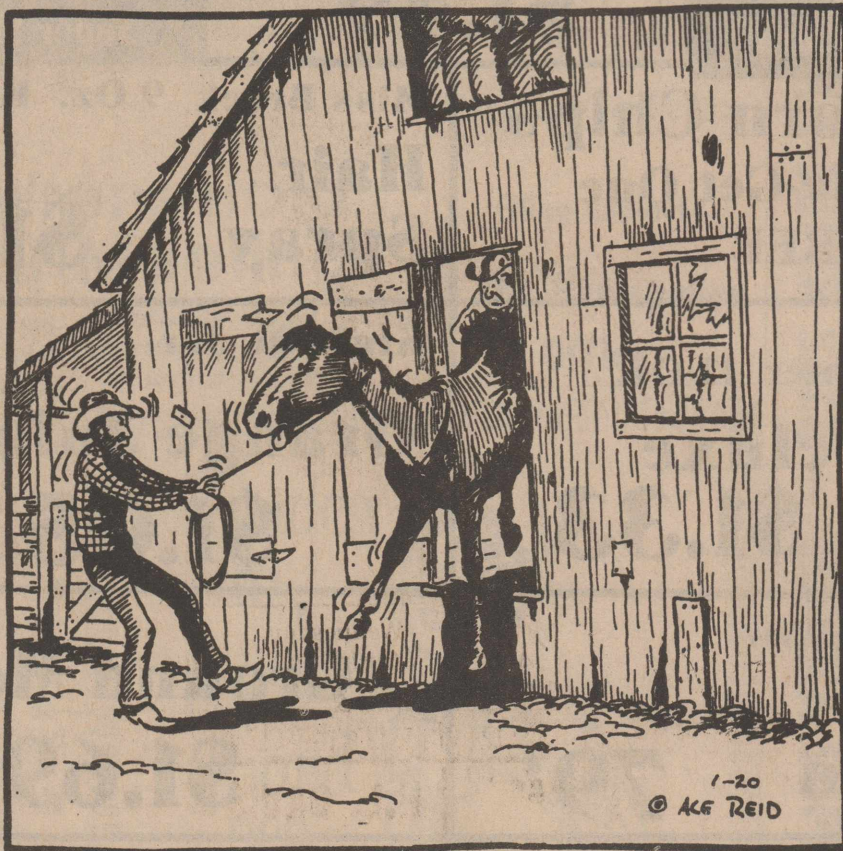

"...And before long my closest friend was Joseph Wood Krutch, hereinafter to be known as Joe.

Many times since then I have tried to date the moment when I knew this to be true. I think it was one evening when the two of us stood in the vestibule of subway train bound for Times Square, to a restaurant, a theater, or both. The train was noisy so that we had to shout, but the circumstance seemed unimportant. The important thing was that we had a great deal to say to each other, and that each was really interested in what the other said; also, that each was eager to speak when it came his turn, and was confident that what he said would be worth hearing. We like those who inspire us to talk well, to talk indeed our best, which in their presence becomes something better than it ever was before, so that it surprises and delights us too. We like least those persons in whose presence we are dull. For we can be either, and company brings it out; that is what company is for. Joe Krutch from this moment was famous company for me, and the conversation begun then has never stopped. It has ranged without apology from the grandest to the meanest subjects; it has a natural facility in rising or in sinking; but the point is, we have never run out of things to say."

Don't we all need someone like this? Your close friend can be anyone. Your partner in business, your husband or wife, your next door neighbor. The point is a close friend is someone much like yourself. Someone who brings out the best and keeps it there. Someone with whom you truly "never run out of things to say."

You, the Jury: What to do when the call comes.

The verdict rang out clearly: Not guilty by reason of insanity. John C. Hinckley, Jr., who on March 30, 1981 fired a volley of bullets at President Ronald Reagan, has been acquitted on 13 counts including attempted assassination. The verdict stunned the courtroom and soon reverberated across the nation. As cries of outrage came from many quarters, several of the jurors stated that they had wanted a guilty verdict but had given in to the majority and now they felt anger and regret.

For those of us who have ever moaned about jury duty, the Hinckley verdict brings home the serious nature of performing this rite. What actually is the jury duty system all about? Jury duty in state courts starts with a notice that comes in the mail to the prospective juror. The names of the jurors are collected for the most part by a random selection of registered voters. Generally, those summoned for jury duty have to serve if they're at least 18 years old, literate and are U. S. citizens. There are exemptions; for example if your health is severely impaired, if you are the guardian of small children or if you are 65 or older. Exemptions vary from state to state and are listed on the notice you receive. Jurors receive from \$5 to \$30 per day depending on the state you live in.

The length of service required can vary too, depending on your location from one day in Dallas, Detroit and Denver to 3 months in Utah, where you are on call. For many individuals, serving on a jury is an interesting and worthwhile experience. How you become an effective juror, one who, unlike some of the Hinckley jurors, doesn't have regrets later? Since its rare that a judge instructs the jury on anything but what kind of verdict they have to bring in, these guidelines could help: Prepare a list of issues in the case for discussion. Let each juror have his or her say, taking one issue at a time. Vote on each issue separately to narrow differences. Don't allow anyone to intimidate you by making personal criticisms. The next time you are summoned for jury duty, go willingly, and with an open mind.

The game ended with a score of 44-15 Forsan.

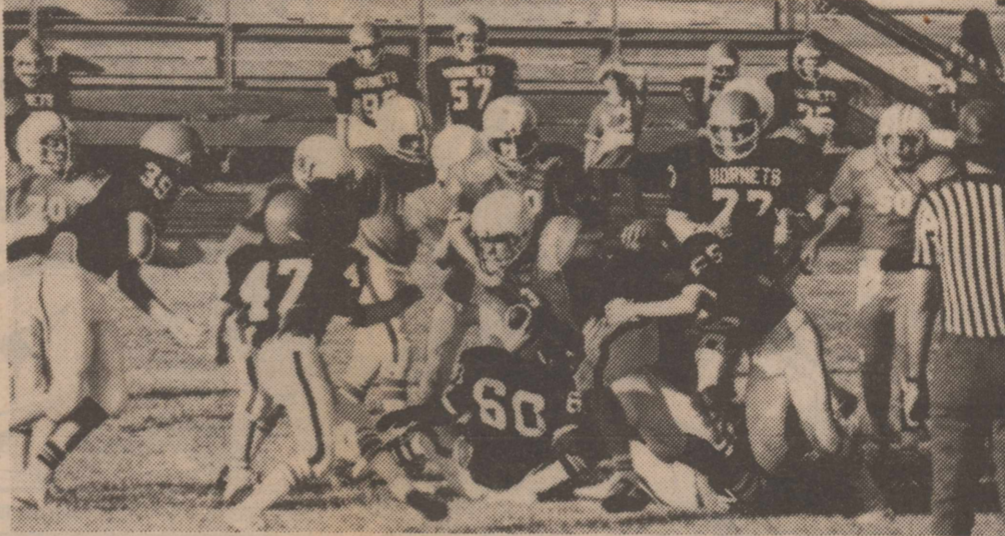
For the night the Lions had 14 first downs, 186 yards rushing and 185 passing. Forsan had 20 first downs, 308 yards rushing and 65 yards pass.

courthouse annex. All interested homemakers are invited to attend.



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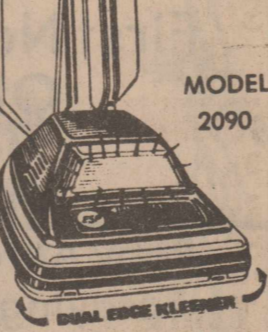
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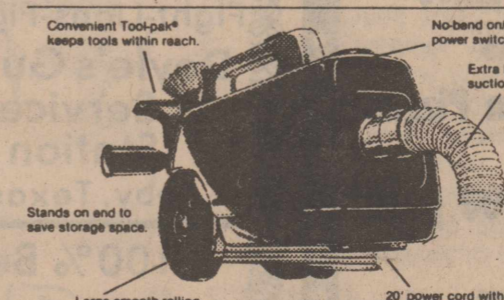

TRAVEL AND ENTERTAINMENT EXPENSES (Substantiation Requirement)
by Gerald Rodgers CPA

Even though a taxpayer appears to meet every requirement of the Internal Revenue Code on travel and entertainment expenditures, he may still be disallowed a deduction for failure to meet the "substantiation" requirements. Ever since 1962, the IRS has had the authority to disallow deductions based on approximations. Your unsupported verbal testimony or plea for mercy will not constitute substantiation.

There are five basic elements to be proven with respect to "each" expenditure for entertainment.

1. AMOUNT-Each separate expenditure must be accounted for separately except incidental expenditures which may be lumped on a daily basis.
2. TIME-The date the entertainment took place.
3. PLACE-Include name, address and type of entertainment.
4. BUSINESS PURPOSE-State the nature of business discussion or activity. Unless the type of business is obvious, give enough details to establish the specific business activity.
5. BUSINESS RELATIONSHIP-Give the name, occupation or title of the person being entertained.

Of the above elements only the first four apply to travel. Under the category TIME, give dates of departure and return for each trip and the number of those days spent on business.

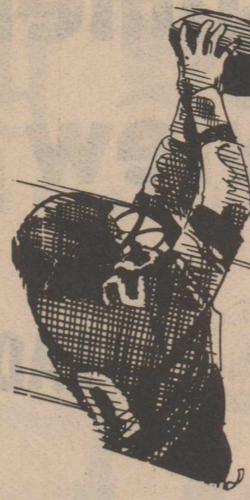
As a general rule, if you keep a "timely kept" diary with the required elements of substantiation, you will be able to defend your deduction. A timely kept diary is one in which the entries are made at or near the time the expenditure was made. When the expenditure is \$25.00 or less, an actual paid receipt is not required as long as you have the information recorded. A cancelled check by itself will not necessarily support a deduction.

Taxpayers who have had their "T and E" deductions substantially slashed during examination will vouch for the Internal Revenue Services' strict application of these substantiation requirements.

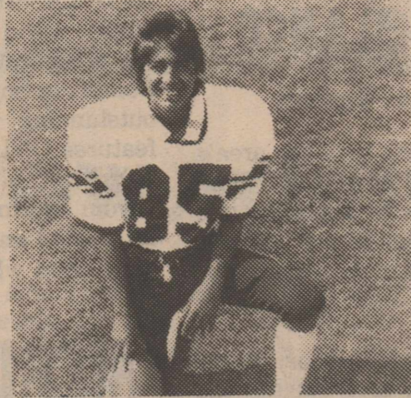

WTU Enters

Gas Purchase

West Texas Utilities Co. has entered a gas purchase agreement with Haskell Gathering Co. which could result in lower fuel costs at its Paint Creek Power Station.

WTU has begun taking a small volume of low BTU gas, and is expected to take more when the gathering firm's pipelines are extended to additional wells in Haskell and Throckmorton counties.

The Paint Creek plant is on Lake Stamford in southeastern Haskell County. The gas is cheaper than "Because it is a lower of lower quality, according to Walter Meller, WTU's manager of system production."

"Because it is a lower BTU gas, it must be blended with other gas before it can be burned in our boilers," Meller said. "But we are doing everything we can to buy gas where there is a price advantage."

He said WTU is in the process of negotiating for low BTU gas at some of its other power plants. The company's contract with its principle supplier, which was renegotiated this past year, permits WTU to purchase gas from other sources, and WTU does so when it is available. The Company has eight major power plants, all of which burn natural gas as the primary fuel.

history. Perhaps this is because (if one is lucky) hair keeps on growing, and something must be done with it.

Hair styling by professional establishments are nothing new. It is known that commercial styling of hair existed among the early Greeks. Along with shaving, the craft was developed in Rome before 400 B.C. The early professionals were most often engaged in styling with a male clientele. Styling and care of women's hair was usually the individual's task or that of a capable servant.

In 1624 Louis XIII of France began wearing a wig because of noticeable balding. Frenchmen, always fashion-conscious, adopted the style of their king. To keep up with the French, Englishmen took up the fad. The style then jumped the Atlantic and became popular in many American colonies. They were styled according to the individual's station in life.

The speaker described the various popular styles--the "bag wig" with long hair at the back tied inside a small silk bag, the "cadogan" which marked the dandy, and the "square" which distinguished judges and nobility.

Ordinary citizens usually chose the more conservative "major bob" or Apprentices and other poorer people who did wear wigs chose the "minor bob". The latter was a wide bushy hair piece parted down the center. The cost, of course, depended on the quality of material and the workmanship. A fine human hair wig could cost as much as three pounds.

An economy wig fashioned of the hair of cow, goat or horse could be purchased for less than ten shillings. The actual preparation of a wig was a time consuming art. Women usually resorted to exaggerated hair styles rather

than wigs. The British men who came as colonists were quick to adopt the fashions of the homeland. After the American Revolution the patriots soon dropped the extreme styles and took on more democratic modes.

Hair styles continue as unremitting fads and changes. Women have displayed the diversity of elaborate swirls and curls, stern plainness, the "boy look" of the flapper days, the movie scene's sex symbol styles, to the present when "anything goes". Men (whether they like to admit it or not) change their hair fashions at about the same rate (remembering the beards and mustaches). Only one thing remains constant regarding hair styles. There is the inevitable explosion of controversy which accompanies any change.

Mrs. Bernie C. McCrea, chapter president, opened the meeting with the new chapter's gavel which was a gift of Mrs. Ulmont Allison, a member at San Benito. During the brief business meeting Delila Baird discussed the Rare Book Fund at the College of William and Mary in Virginia.
