

Clinic Doctors Resign, Closing Practice Soon

The members of the Fisher County Hospital Board met on Monday night, January 17th for their regular meeting and passed a motion to extend Dr. Virgilio Carandang and Dr. Vidal Simpao a contract for 1983 under a revised guarantee program.

On Monday, January 24th, the two doctors posted a notice on their office doors that they were terminating their practice

at the Fisher County Clinic effective the middle of February.

In an effort to "get to the root of the problem", concerning the resignation of the doctors, the board met in special session on Tuesday night, January 25th. Board members met in closed session with Dr. Carandang and Dr. Simpao and after the meeting issued a resolution of support. The two doctors indicated to the board that

the decision to close their practice had not been reached overnight and that reconsideration could not be reached overnight. They agreed to reconsider their resignations and would give a final answer on Monday, January 31st.

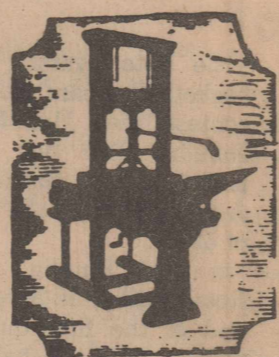

ASC Director Urges County Farmers To Sign-Up Now For New Programs

Fisher Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Executive Director Frank Mitchell indicated last Tuesday morning that "our sign-up for the new PIK (payment in kind) program and regular set-

aside program has been moderate to date." He reminded Fisher County farmers that the March 11th deadline is the last day to sign up for both programs.

"At the rate we are going now, we'll never make it", said Mitchell, referring to the number of farmers that are unsigned under either of the programs. He said the office personnel have been busy but unless "signups" increase very soon, personnel at the ASC office will be hard pressed to complete all necessary paperwork by deadline time.

Mitchell encouraged farmers to come by his office as soon as possible

in order that they can assist with sign-ups under either the new PIK program or regular set aside program to qualify for deficiency payments.

County Veteran Officer To Help With Loan Apps.

Mr. Garry Mauro, Chairman of the Texas Veterans Land Board, reports the Veterans Land Program is being upgraded and improved for better service for the veterans of our state. During his administration, he plans for the agency within the General Land Office to be administered efficiently for the prompt and timely processing of loan applications.

Several changes have already taken place. The waiting list, which stood at 12,000 veterans when he took office, has been reduced 50 percent and will be completely eliminated by March 1. Plans to have all application requests on a current basis after that date.

An Outreach program for veterans has been established to better inform the 1.6 million veterans of Texas. Five field representatives will be serving all areas of the state to help veterans, county service officers and local officials with any problems which may arise with this program. They will personally contact the veterans and their representative organizations to inform them of the benefits of this program.

Effective February 1, there will be a \$25 application fee to cover the costs of processing applications by the Veterans Land Board. All applications submitted after that date will have this new initial fee.

A bond sale will be in the near future. The \$250 million bond program authorized by the voters in 1981 will be sold in stages to meet the demands of the loan program. The current issue will be closed very shortly.

The interest rate on the loans to veterans will be determined by the rate on the applicable bond sale. When a completed application is submitted to the Board, the veteran will be advised at that time of the

exact rate of interest that will be charged for the loan.

Any Fisher County Veteran that needs help with his loan application should contact Fisher County Veterans Service Office, Ed Deaton, at the Post Office Building in Roby.

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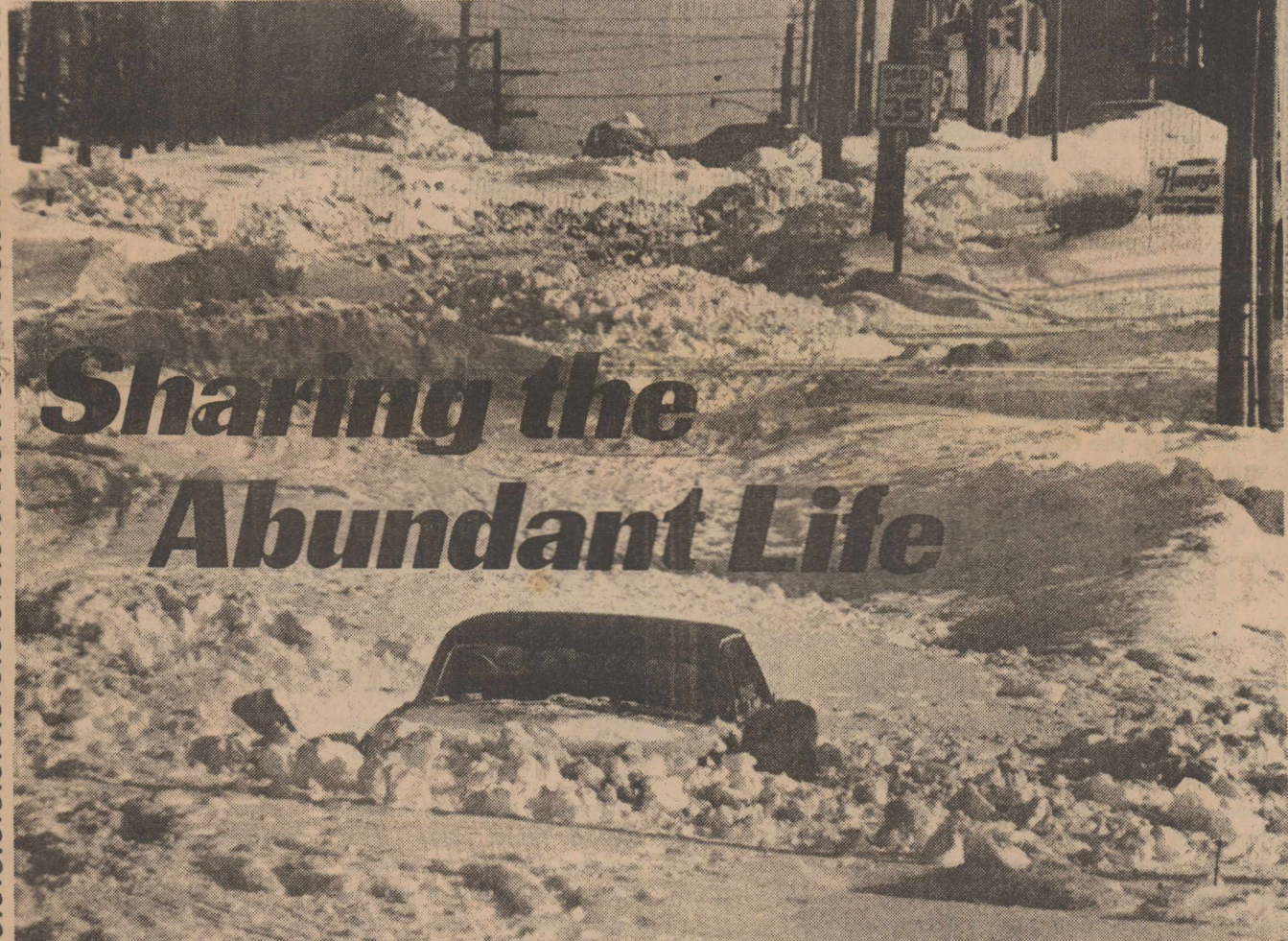

fields, but from our point of view the farmer must have some practical cooperation in his marketing of products, to stay in business.

An English speaker-Sir Henry Plumb said at a recent Farm Bureau Federation convention in Dallas that the "agricultural superpowers", Europe and the U. S. argue about disposing surpluses while many in the world go hungry. He proposed that an international agricultural agency be established to devise and implement an "effective and coherent food strategy".

The American farmer can probably produce enough food for most of the world; but he cannot continue this production without a fair return for his operation.

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
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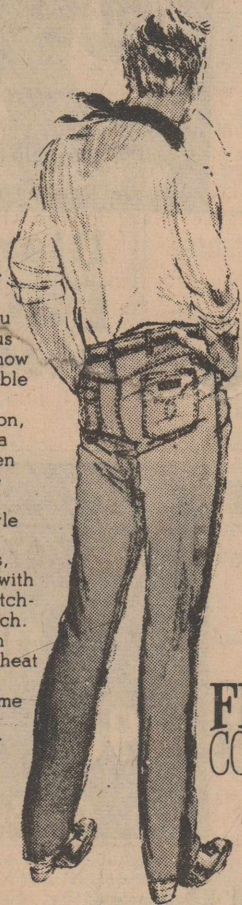


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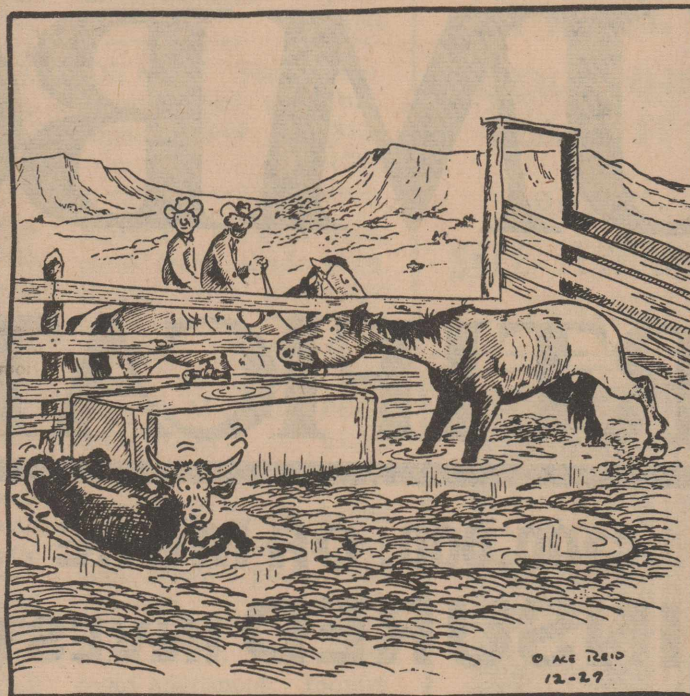

County Farmers, Ranchers Can Get FmHA Emergency Loans

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers, or aquaculture operators are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), John B. Smith, FmHA county supervisor, said today.

Mr. Smith asked that those who need farm credit as a result of the Windstorm, Hail and Excessive Rain (from May 10, 1982 thru June 25, 1982) disaster make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at 111 B North Garfield.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until October 20, 1983 for physical and production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, or buildings, (including homes) lost through this disaster.


Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Mr. Smith said.

Applicants that certify that other credit is not available may receive loans covering actual losses at an interest rate of eight percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the anli-

cant's ability to pay. Applicants who certify that other credit is available may also receive these loans at a higher interest

rate. To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster.

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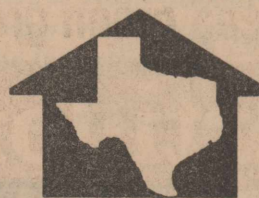

Tax Planning

1983 TAX TIDBITS

Nothing is forever. This includes how the IRS wants you to handle various transactions and filings from year to year.

The following unrelated topics should be of interest to a great number of taxpayers.

1. The new Tax Act provides for daily compounding of interest charged on past-due taxes. The new rate is 16% compounded daily effective January 1, 1983. The old rate was 20% annual interest.

2. The Act increases the maximum criminal fine for tax evasion by individuals from \$10,000 to \$100,000 (\$500,000 for corporations).

3. The penalty for filing a frivolous return is now \$500. A frivolous return is one that does not contain enough information to determine the correctness of the tax shown on it or one that clearly shows an incorrect tax.

4. A promoter of abusive tax shelters faces a penalty of 10% of the income he earns on a given tax shelter scheme of \$1,000, whichever is more.

5. The Treasury estimates that in 1982 almost seven billion dollars in tax revenues were lost by taxpayers failing to report all their interest and dividend income. They intend to improve on this by requiring banks and other payors of interest and dividends to withhold a part of the interest and dividends. This is not a new tax, you claim the amount withheld at the time you file your form 1040.

6. The penalties are increased for failure to file necessary 1099's. If you paid out more than \$600 to any person for rents, royalties, prizes, commissions, or contract labor, you will want to review your need to provide 1099's to the recipients.

Contact your tax advisor for the new provisions that might affect your particular business.

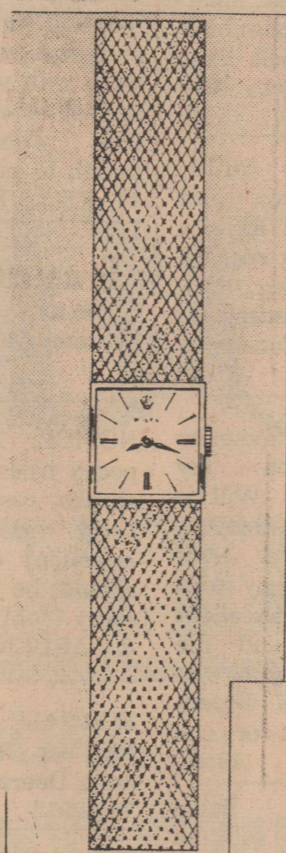

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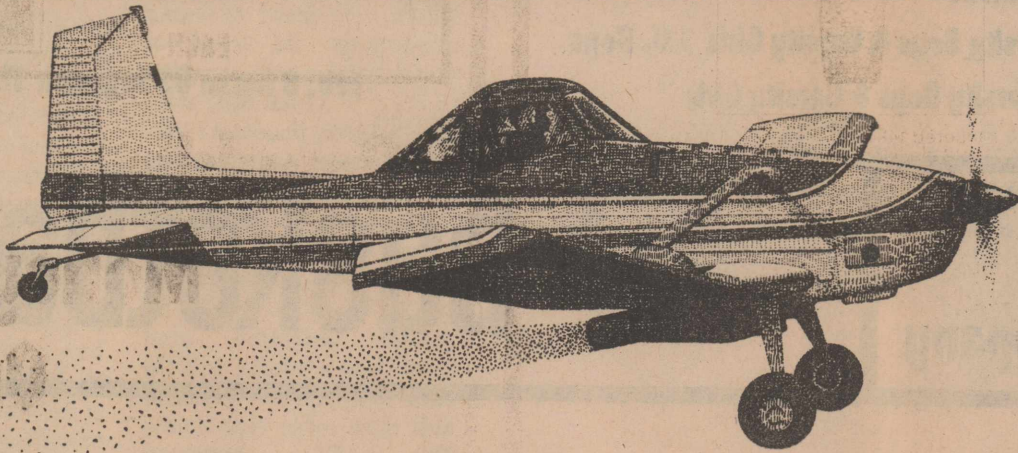
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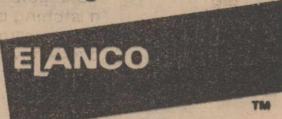


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Rotan Varsity Boys Win Over Haskell Indians

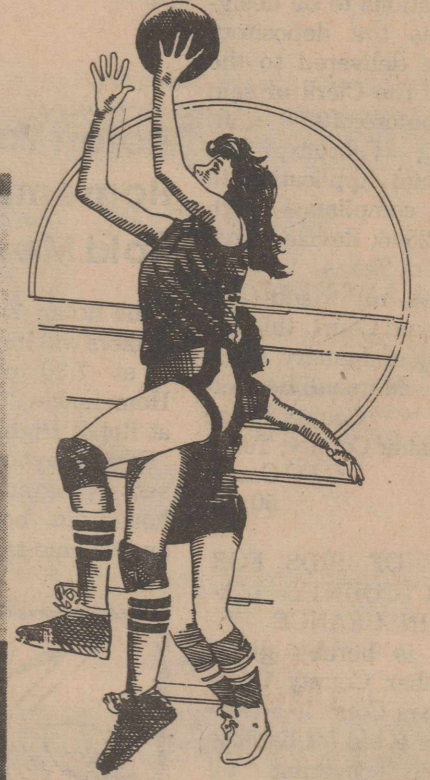
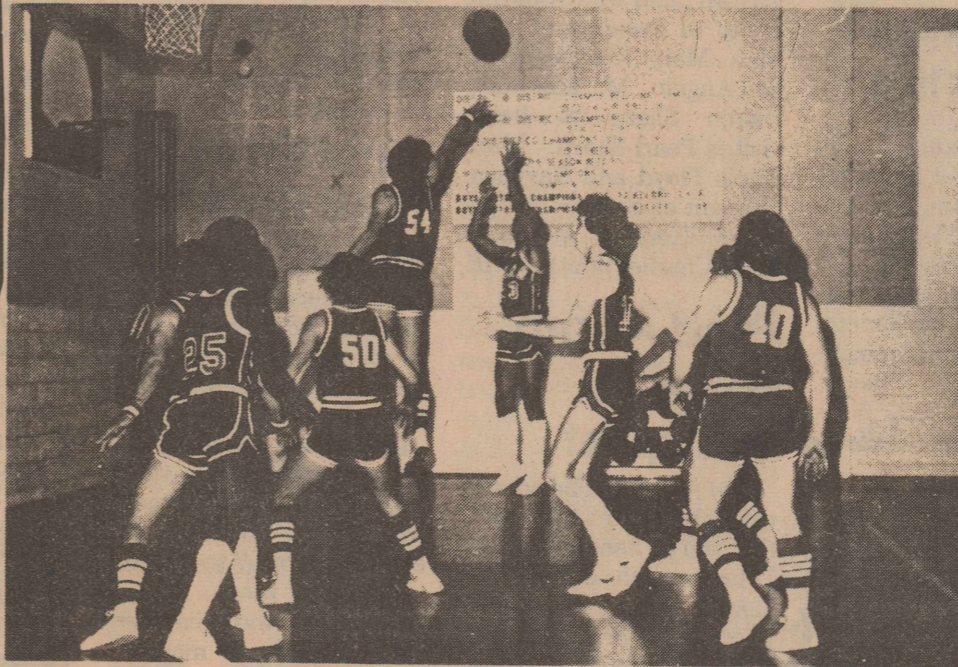
