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Board Extends Dr. Carandang Contract

The members of the Fisher County Hospital Board, after meeting in closed session for over an hour and a half last Monday night, re-opened the meeting to the public and unanimously voted to extend a contract to Dr. Virgilio C. Carandang. Dr. Carandang was under

contract during 1982 on a "net after expenses guarantee" of \$5,000. The board offered Dr. Carandang a contract based on a gross cash guarantee of \$8,400.00 annually recently. This contract was revised and last Monday night was approved by the board to be offered to Dr.

Carandang in the amount of \$11,000 gross cash guaranteed monthly. Should the gross cash on a monthly basis to Dr. Carandang not amount to the sum of \$11,000 during a particular month, the Fisher County Hospital District will pay Dr. Carandang the difference

between the actual gross cash income and the guaranteed sum of \$11,000. The motion to extend the contract to Dr. Carandang was made by Dave Williams and seconded by Frank Mitchell. Voting in favor of the contract were: Williams, Mitchell, Glenn

Copeland and Raford Hargrove. In other action last Monday, Parker Wetsel, Manager of Midwest Electric Cooperative, appeared before the board offering assistance by giving specific ideas on reducing electric usage at the hospital. Wetsel specifi-

cally indicated that attention needed to be given to door seals, cracks that could be leaking, insulation in the roof, possibly putting the hospital wings on demand switches for heat and air, checking thermostats, regulating hot water heater temperature, heat pumps and asking for assistance from the original design engineers in reducing electric usage.

Electric bills have long plagued the hospital board members because all have felt that they were extremely high. It has not been abnormal to see electric bills running from \$6,863 to \$10,203 for a month in the last 6 months. Administration has addressed the problem and initiated cost saving measures but electric consumption is still running much higher than neighboring hospitals of comparable size. Several neighboring hospitals have bills between \$2,500 and \$3,500 per month.

Wetsel spent considerable time explaining the billing process, demand rate, kilowatt hour computation and offered his help and the assistance of Midwest Electric in working with the hospital to help reduce electric bills. The board is giving thought to securing a cost study engineer to evaluate the present heating and air conditioning system and has discussed the possibility of replacing the present system with individual heating and air conditioning units in each of the patient rooms.

One visitor was present at the meeting last Monday night. Emelio Martinez, a resident of the Hobbs Community, visited the 3 hour meeting and indicated that he was interested in the hospital, wanted to get the decisions made by the board straight and separate them from the numerous rumors that prevail following each meeting. In addition to Martinez and the board members, Dah Powers, President of YDP, Inc. of Lubbock was present along with Randy Abernathy of Knox City Administrator and local administrator Gary McGee.

Board members appointed the following election judges for the April 2nd election. Ima Berry, Rotan Box, Rose Hale, Roby Box, LaVerne Dooley, Hobbs Box, Mrs. Fred Kemp, McCauley, Glen Webb, Claytonville, Mrs. B. C. Killingsworth, Lon Worth,

Mike Herron, Sylvester and Mrs. Betty Rivers, Absentee Judge.

Board members voted to purchase a Toshiba BD4511 plain paper copier at a lease/purchase price of \$3,654.00.

The board, after previously discussing the possibility of re-imbursement board members for meetings, read a portion of the enabling act that stated "All Board members shall serve without compensation, but may be reimbursed for actual expenses incurred in the performance of their official

duties upon the approval of such expenses by the board of directors." All board members presently serve without compensation of any kind, with the exception of a meal once a month prior to the board meeting.

Administrator Gary McGee reviewed the financial statement and profit and loss statement with board members. For the month ending January 31, 1983 the hospital showed a loss from operations of \$6,047 which does not reflect an allowance for depreciation.

IRA 10% PENALTY
 (Not Always Bad)

You may be reluctant to set up an Individual Retirement Account (IRA) because of the 10% penalty that is assessed by the IRS if you withdraw any of the funds before you reach age 59 1/2.

An IRA is attractive for several reasons. You can make tax deductible contributions of \$2,000. A working spouse can contribute an additional \$250 for a non-working spouse. Money put into an IRA can be invested in any number of things and grows tax-free until retirement. However, you are penalized if you withdraw your money from your IRA before age 59 1/2. This 10% penalty upon early withdrawal may have kept you from seriously considering an IRA, but look at these figures. If a 50% bracket taxpayer puts \$2,000 into an IRA for 10 years in investments that yield 15%, his money will grow to \$40,600. If at the end of 10 years he withdraws his money and is under the age of 59 1/2, he will pay a 10% penalty of \$4,060 and, at the 50% bracket, \$20,300 in income tax. Subtracting this total tax and penalty of \$24,360 from the \$40,600, he will have \$16,240 left.

Without the IRA, the same 50% bracket taxpayer would have had only \$1,000 after-tax dollars to invest and because the investment earnings would be taxed at the 50% bracket, his after-tax yield would be 7 1/2%. His \$1,000 annual investment would grow to \$14,140 in 10 years which is \$2,100 less than the \$16,240 he'd have with the IRA. If withdrawal before 59 1/2 is not necessary, an individual will be even further ahead with the IRS.

The number of years you have to stay in your IRA to be dollars ahead even with the 10% penalty depends on several factors. These facts do not necessarily make an IRA your best investment, but don't automatically reject the IRA based on the 10% early withdrawal penalty.



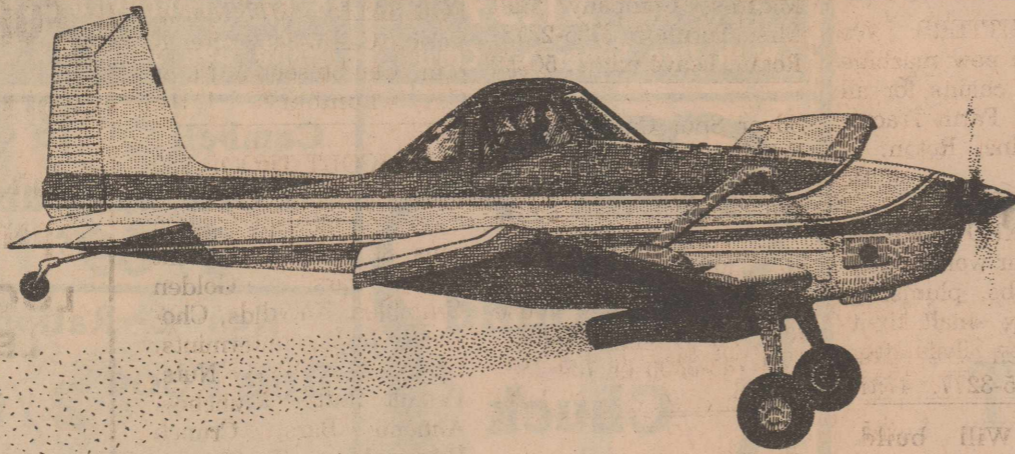

Divestiture, FCC actions to affect cost of local service

Concern is being expressed today in many places that changes taking place in the telecommunications industry are going to create a rapid increase in rates for local flat-rate service. Unfortunately, that's probably true. We've been saying for years that Long Distance revenues were subsidizing local rates. Because others were saying just the opposite, the public's confusion was understandable. Now that the Bell System is being broken up, the handwriting is on the wall. 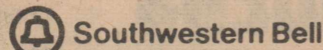

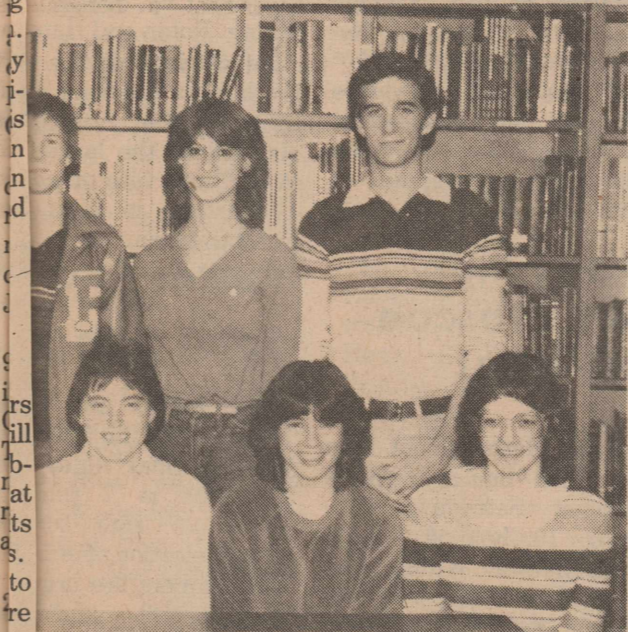

as much as you are comfortable with, and don't guess about facts that you are unsure of. Even a child as young as 2 can be told something about his stay. But when dealing with a child who is 4 or under, don't discuss the say too far in advance. Young children have distorted concepts of time and telling them too soon will only cause unhappy fantasizing. For little children (under 6 in particular) separation is the most terrifying aspect of a hospital stay. Reassure your child that you will be there as long as he needs you. Some hospitals now permit parents to accompany their children to the door of the operating room and to be in the recovery room after the operation. If yours does not, tell your child that you will be waiting for him in his room. Listen carefully to your child's fears and concerns, letting him know that if he feels he's going to cry, that's O.K.
