Appraisal Board Appoints Members To Review Board, Board Sets Date

The members of the Fisher County Appraisal Board met on Thursday, March 17th for their regular monthly meeting and at that meeting approved the appointment of Roy Noles of Roby to fill the unexpired term of L.W. Knox on the Fisher County Appraisal Review Board. Knox recently resigned his position. Others re-named to the board include Harvie Davis and L. B. Perry. They will serve with Joe Dale Burk and Julius Decker.

Chief Appraiser Ginger Green, in her report to the board, indicated that office personnel at the Appraisal District were still accepting renditions and exemptions and will continue to do so until May 2nd. After

May 2nd tentative rolls will be sent out to taxing entities for their approval. Corrections on the roll can be made until June 1st.

Board members discussed personnel policies at the Thursday meeting, however, no action was taken and the subject is

expected to be brought up at the April meeting.

The Appraisal Review Board is scheduled to meet at 10:00 a.m., July 20th for

the purpose of reviewing oil and gas and will meet at 2:00 p.m. for real estate, personal property and automobiles.

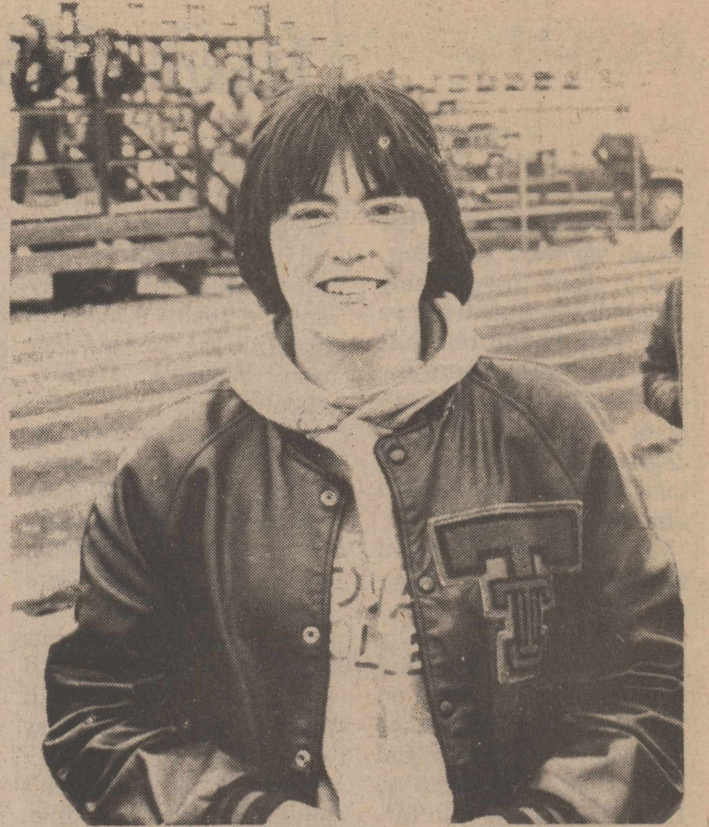
Rev. Mike O'Neill, Cross Roads Baptist Church pastor, will be delivering the Sunday morning message. Other pastors will be participating in the service.

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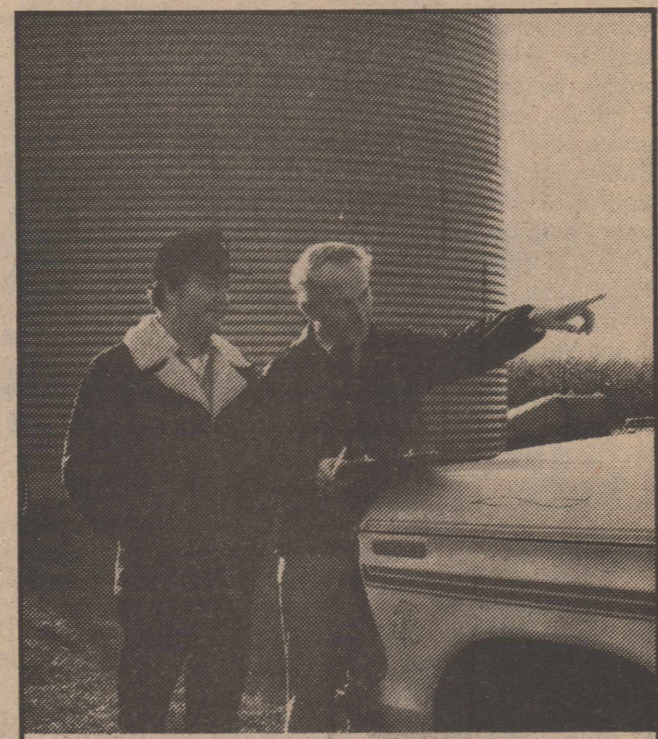

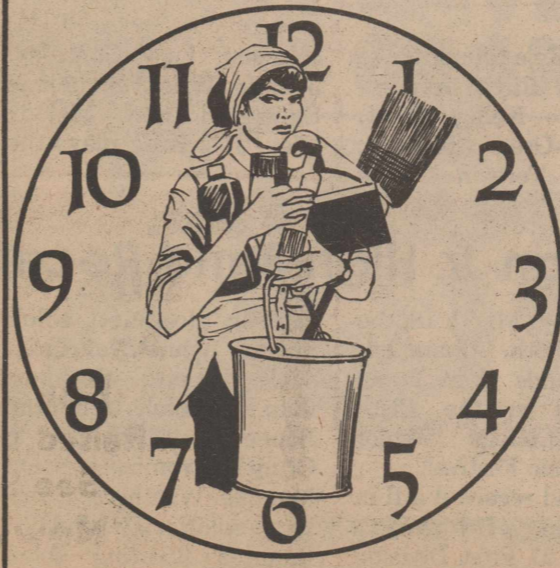
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THE CLOCK IS TICKING

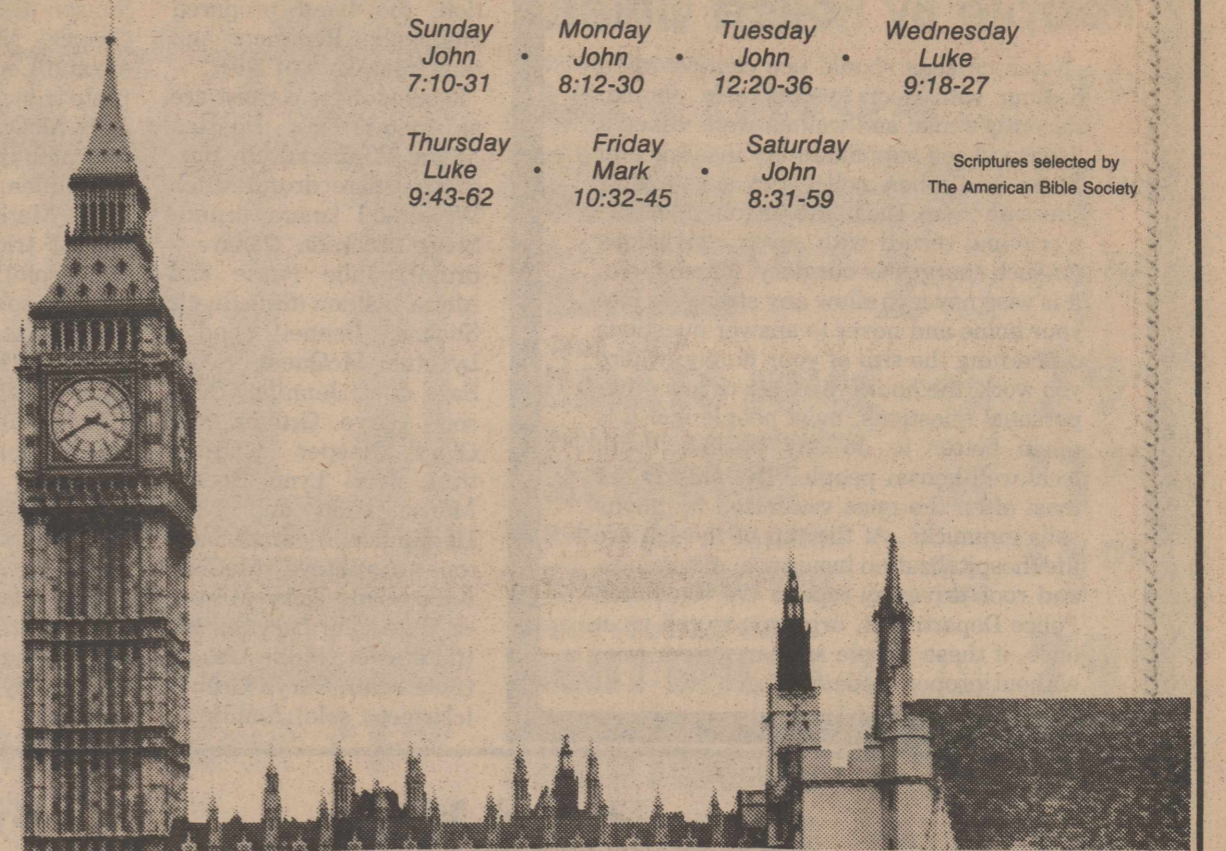

People like you and I, littered the Texas roadsides more than ever last year and it cost more than 17 million of our tax dollars to hire people to "pick-up after us", according to the State Department of Highways and

Public Transportation.

I didn't think those candy wrappers and gum packages I've been chunking (when no one was looking) could ever amount to that much-I was wrong.

Engineer-Director Mark Goode said, "The dollars spent to pick up litter, 35 percent more than a year earlier, come from the same budget that must also be used to repair potholes, mend guard rails and other necessary maintenance activities."

Statistics compiled by DHT's Safety and Maintenance Operations Division show that Houston far outpaced other metropolitan areas in trash pick-up costs. Compared to the \$6.9 million spent by the department's Houston district, \$1.9 million was spent in the Dallas district while San Antonio and Fort Worth districts used \$1.2 and \$1.1 millions respectively.

The 1981-82 trash pick-up total is two-thirds more than was spent in 1979-80 when the statewide cost reached \$10 million for the first time. During 1980-81, DHT spent \$12.2 million.

The department's entire maintenance budget for 1981-82 was \$308,098,210.

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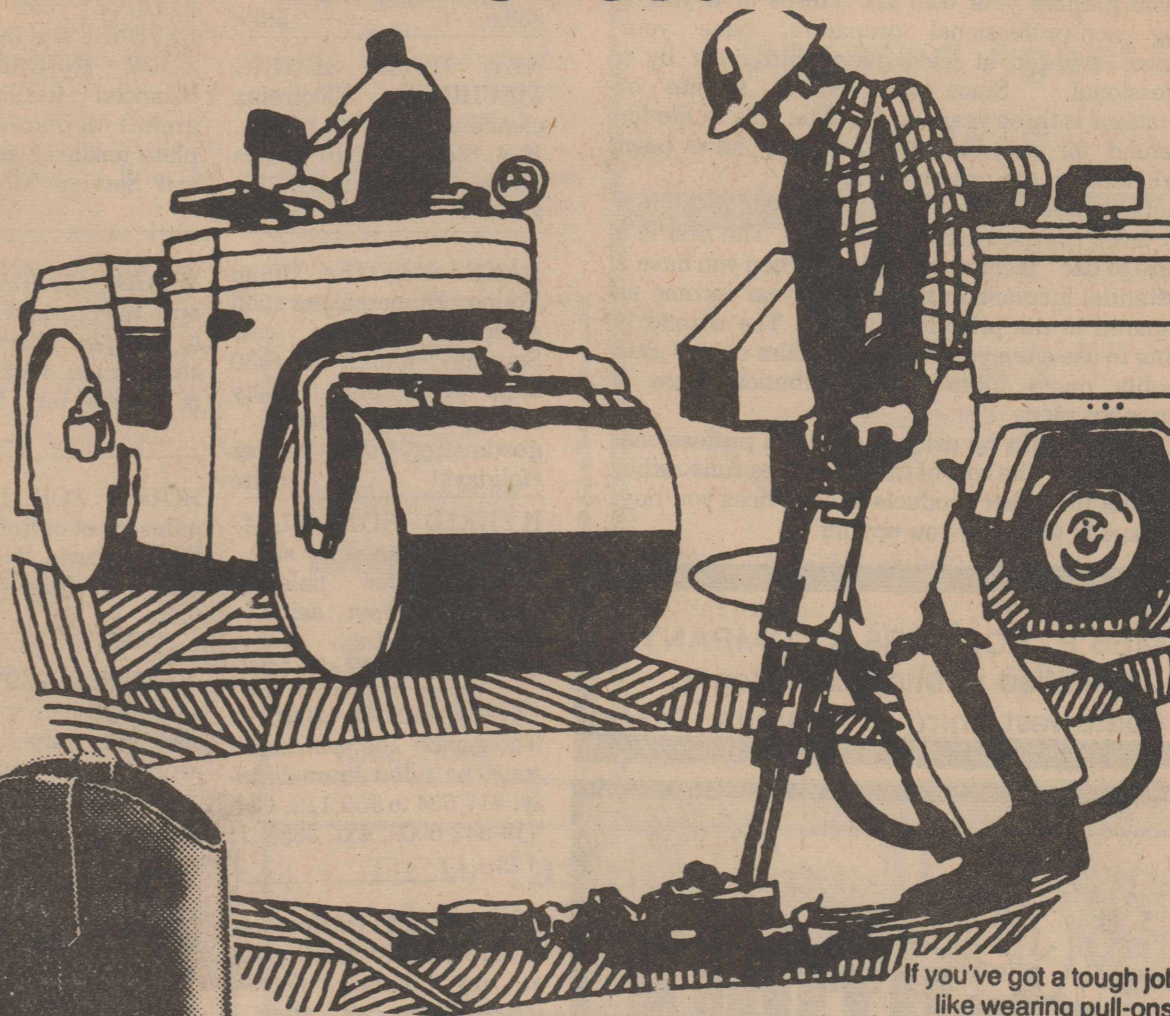

Boll weevils increased to damaging numbers during August 1982 in Fisher County. Damage was heaviest in early planted fields that were near favorable overwintering habitat such as shelterbelts, shinnery or other broad-leaved trees. Damage was by no means limited to these early planted fields, the boll weevils moved to the later planted fields in mid August. The late emergence of boll weevils was apparently due to the cool

temperatures in May and June. Rain during June delayed cotton planting and the cool temperatures also slowed development of the seedling cotton. Boll weevils continued to emerge and infest cotton during early to mid July. Where there were no early planted fields, some late emerging weevils were able to survive and deposit eggs. Large numbers of weevils were produced late in the fall of 1982. Generally, the winter has been mild and

survival has been aided by these conditions. It appears that there will be plenty of overwintered boll weevils to infest cotton planted in 1983. Fields with a history of early weevil infestations might be included in the PIK program. The overwintered weevils that would have infested these fields will then have to search for cotton. Generally populations will be filtered but weevils can be expected to colonize near-

by early planted fields. Boll weevils live about 10 to 22 days after they emerge from overwintering habitat. The longer it takes the weevils to locate cotton the smaller will be the number that are able to survive and deposit their eggs in cotton squares. Putting fields that are usually heavily infested

with overwintered boll weevils into the PIK program and using a uniform planting date of May 23 or later in the remaining fields can reduce boll weevil damage during the 1983 cotton production season. Fields in or near weevil hot spot areas should be inspected, especially those fields that are planted first. Boll

weevil pheromone traps have proven to be effective for overwintered weevil detection. Inspection efforts for overwintered weevils are most critical from 25 days after plant emergence until there are 2 squares 1/3 grown or larger on most plants or about 50 days after emergence.

INCORRECT TAX RETURNS

(How To Fix 'Em)

What does one do with a tax return he feels is incorrect? How and when can one change it?

The federal government has a three year statute of limitations on changing a tax return. This means that you have three years from the normal due date of your tax return to make any changes you feel are appropriate. Check with your accountant as to the statute of limitations in the various states in which you may be required to file.

If your 1982 return has been prepared but not yet filed and you feel it may be incorrect, you may do one of two things. You can file the return with the idea of amending it after the appropriate information is gathered or you can request an automatic extension to August 15th. If you have reasonable cause, you may also secure a second extension after August 15th.

If you prepare your own tax returns or if you're using non-professional preparers, have your returns reviewed at least every third year by a professional. Since the federal statute of limitations is three years, you will be able to file for a refund for any benefits that may have been overlooked on the original filing.

There are two common errors which can result in a very large overpayment of your tax. The first is a failure to use "income averaging" when you have a substantial increase in the current year income as compared to the prior four years. The second is failing to use a ten year spread or claim capital gain benefits on a lump-sum distribution from a retirement plan.

You will benefit by using a qualified professional tax preparer. The cost of these services runs rather high, but like other products and services you buy, you usually get what you pay for.

The 1600 meter team finished 5th - That team is composed of Vickki Wright, Yolanda Acorn, Lousinda Ramirez and Janell Vaughn.



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
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
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

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Proving your own yield does not raise your premium, only the guarantee. Premium is based on the usually lower yields which have been assigned each farm by FCIC.

GRAIN SORGHUM

Grain sorghum insurance is also available. Although most farms have no proven grain sorghum history, the FCIC has assigned each farm a yield upon which both insurance premium and guarantees are based.

Sales closing dates for cotton and grain sorghum are April 15. If interested in cotton insurance, you should allow time for obtaining your 10 year average from the ASCS office.
