keyboard attached to his wheelchair.

His fingers slowly punch a couple of keys, and the computer, in an eerie, mechanical voice, greets: "Good Afternoon. How are you?"

Mikeska's speech synthesizer is not unlike the thousands of others used by people suffering diseases that affect speech. But Mikeska's therapist, Steve Edwards, is confident the unit's potential soon will make it unique.

Edwards is programming the synthesizer to reflect Mikeska's personality through voice variations, a task he hopes to complete by early summer.

'We're trying to imitate or emulate the way Mike (short for Mikeska) uses language to reflect who he is as a person, as well as communicate simple language," Edwards said. 'It's the difference from somebody and hearing it face to face."

Mikeska, a 54-year-old Army veteran who lives at 400 Austin, has been using the synthesizer only about three months. Ten years ago he was diagnosed as having Amyotrophic lateral Sclerosis - a degenerative disease that affects the muscle nerve cells, eventually eroding all muscle control.

Edwards says Mikeska's battle withALS also known as Lo Gehrig's diseasehas been comparatively successful. The average victim dies within three to four years.

"Mike has been at this plateau longer than any case I've heard about," he said. "But there's no way to predict how long before it becomes active again.' Mikeska struggles with each word he says, but degree from Texas A & M Edwards encourges him to he worked in the oil exercise his voice. He wants his client to stall for as long as possible the inevitable dependence on the synthesizer. Mikeska has been coming to the medical center's speech pathology department for 21/2 years to strengthen his "articulation" and voice production." He vistis four days a week, spending two adapting to the computer. The Texas Instruments speech system costs about \$500 and consists of a keyboard console, a speech synthesizer, speakers and a power inverter connected to his electric wheelchair battery. The system is attached to a



If you expect to have a balance due of \$300 or more at the time you file your 1983 individual income tax return, you may be required to make quarterly tax estimates.

Quarterly tax estimates are filed four times a year: April 15th, June 15th, September 15th and the following January 15th. They are filed on IRS Form No. 1040-Es.

Most taxpayers whose earnings are primarily from wages will not have a requirement for making estimates. The first year you change to self-employment status or have an increase in income not subject to withholding, you could come under the requirement for filing quarterly estimates.

A short example: Mr. I.M. Payen estimates his 1983 tax liability for income tax and social security contributions to be \$10,000. If at least 80% of this is paid in quarterly installments, he will not be penalized. This would require payments of \$2,000 on each of the four dates listed above.

There are four exceptions which will keep you from being penalized. The easiest to rely on is the "100% of last year's tax liability" test. If Mr. I. M. Payen had only paid in \$7,000, he would be subject to penalities unless his 1982 liability was less than \$7,000. It's very simple to avoid penalties and easy to determine next year's tax estimates by using 100% of the tax liability on the return currently being filed.

The penalties for underpayment vary as the IRS interest rate varies. The rate was 20% of the underpayment for the period February 1, 1982, to December 31, 1982, and it is 16 percent of the underpayment for the period January 1, 1983, to June 30, 1983. The rate will be changed each July and January 1st in accordance with Fluctuation in the prime rate charged by lending institutions.



Prove Your Own **Yields For Federal** Crop Insurance

COTTON

You may prove your actual 10 year average yield, add up to 10 per cent for participation in PIK, and insure 65 per cent or 75 per cent of that amount at 60 cents per pound.

In proving your cotton yields the ASCS may insert an adjusted yield for certain years in which you had low production. This is based on how your "good" years compare with the county average for those same years, and may be used in place of up to six consecutive "bad" years. Proving your own yield does not raise your premium, only the guarantee. Premuim is based on the usually lower yields which have been assigned each farm by FCIC.

Today, as young families move frequently and older couples often retire to better climates, snapshots, phone calls and occasional visits have replaced the frequent visitation that used to foster close emotional links between grandparents and their grandchildren. To counteract this isolation, Kornhaber suggests more communication through the regular exchange of letters or tape cassettes; having children send homemade presents to grandparents and the latter send family heirlooms to youngsters. "Vital connections, moreover, need not be limited to kin" he says. A few determined children go out and find surrogate grandparents. Almost any older person can find surrogate grandchildren. Undivided attention given by an older person can foster a close and enduring attachment with any child. In fact, older people who are not related to the child can often serve the same important function as real grandparents. Some of us are so lucky that we have all of our grandchildren near to us, not far across the country, but for those of you who arn't that lucky, don't forget to write or call them at every Joy Walker, Correspondent opportunity.
