The Roby School Board members met in regular session last Monday night and approved the hiring of

the construction management firm of RP&H Construction of Sweetwater to manage construction on

the construction of a new gymnasium complex and band hall facility.

"We anticipate that bids on the construction project will be opened during a special meeting of the Roby School Board on Tuesday, May 31st", said Superintendent Jimmie Laurie.

Rotan Council Votes To Purchase Town Marker

The Rotan City Council voted to order a 27" x 42" roadside historical marker with an aluminum post to be installed on Snyder Avenue commemorating the 1906 town site beginning, according to Hooper Shelton of the Fisher County Historical Commission.

The Rotan town site marker is one of three signs already ordered for Fisher County, according to Shelton. The other two locations are: (1) Fisher County Courthouse lawn commemorating the organization of the county. This marker was paid for by private funds. (2) A sign at the Old Rock House

on the Freddy Stuart place in South Sylvester. This sign was paid for by the Turner-Stuart family.

The Rotan marker was approved by the Texas Historical Commission after 7 pages of documented research information was submitted to the Texas Historical Commission and it was reviewed by a 3 committee panel. Albert Maberry served as the chairman of the marker research committee.

Delivery of the Rotan marker is expected in late summer. There will be appropriate ceremonies when the marker is installed.

A note from the surgeon general and a very good one for all of us to think about.

Each year, as high school prom time approaches, my thoughts turn to the carnage that occurs on our highways when young people drink and drive. How many youngsters, I wonder, kids who even now are preparing eagerly for the festivities of the graduation season, will be cut down in smoking tangles of steel and shattered glass in the days and weeks ahead?

The imagery isn't pretty, but it's real. And no one can say, "It won't happen to my child." In fact, it does happen, with depressing regularity. It happens to some 10,000 young people between the ages of 15 and 24 each year. Alcohol-related traffic fatalities are far and away, the leading cause of death for this, otherwise, extraordinarily healthy age group.

Meant to be the happiest of evenings, prom nights too often turn into nightmares, for youngsters, their parents and the community.

When you start out on graduation night to have a time to remember, remember alcohol can dull your memory and sometimes cause fatal accidents. The "in" things these days is to be strong enough to say no and do what you want to do instead of what someone else makes you do.

two years before accepting the head coaching job at Rotan. Prior to that he was at Moore, Oklahoma for a year; at Colorado City for 5 years and at Rockport for two years.

Damron begins his association with NASCO, Inc., on May 29th, 1983. He will be attending a school in Nashville, Tennessee for a week then returns to the Rotan area to take over the West Texas area for the

Wayne Harris made a motion seconded by James Carter to sell a 1973, 48 passenger International Harvester school bus to Sam Rayburn ISD, Ivanhoe, Texas for \$800.00. Pete Fowler made a

motion seconded by Donald Gruben to accept the resignation of Robert Damron as teacher, head coach and athletic director with regrets.

James Carter made the motion seconded by Donald Gruben to employ Mrs. Virginia Forshee for the 1983-84 school year, subject to assignment at state base salary plus local salary supplement, plus \$45.00 a month for health insurance. Mrs. Forshee is currently serving as the home economics teacher at Ranger and has served in that capacity for the past 9 years.

"God's Prison Gang" Film Showing At Rotan Baptist

"God's Prison Gang," a newly released film featuring Al Capone's getaway driver, the last member of

Bonie and Clyde's gang and two other notorious criminals who have become Christians will be shown at First Baptist Church, 201 N. McKinley, Rotan, on Sunday, May 15. The showing is scheduled to begin at 7:00 p.m.

The film, shot behind the walls of New York's Attica prison, is hosted by Art Linkletter. It tells the story of how the work of International Prison Ministry is accomplishing what more guards, higher prison walls and greater financial expenditures have failed to do-keep released inmates from returning to lives of crime.

Telling their stories in the 44-minute film are George Meyer, Al Capone's favorite driver; Floyd Hamilton

(Public Enemy No.1) the last of the Bonnie and Clyde Gang; Jerry Graham the "robber king" of California; and Ted Jefferson, convicted of crimes from drugs and robbery to murder.

Also featured is "Chaplain Ray," whose Dallas-based International Prison Ministry has changed the lives of thousands of inmates over the past 18 years.

Shelly Hayes Participates In State Track Meet

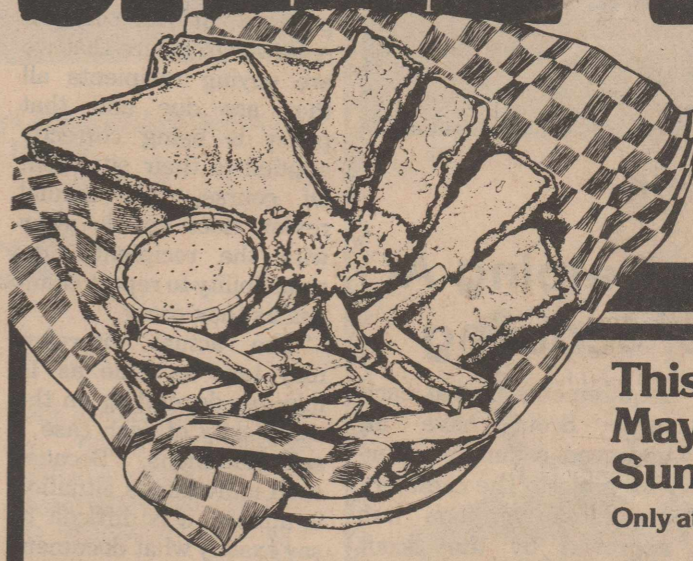

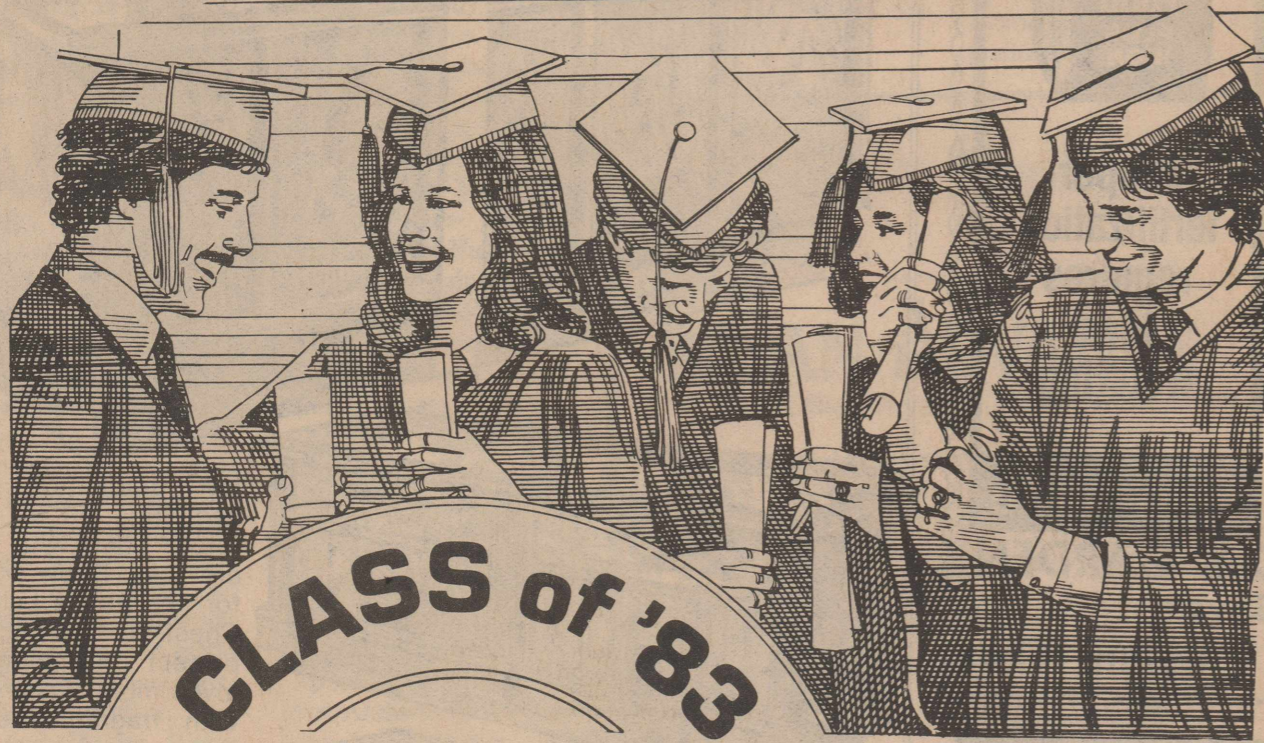

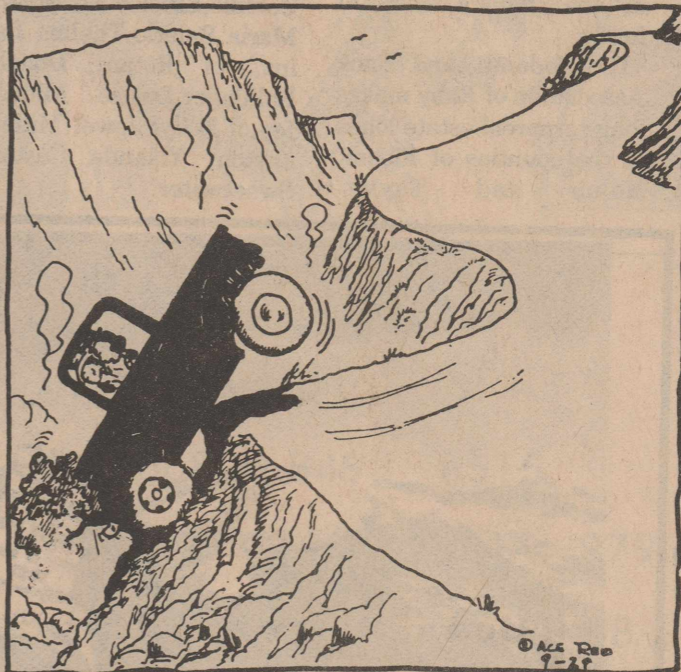

U.S.D.A. Still Fighting Screwworm Battle

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Screwworm Laboratory at Mission is still open, staffed with people, and engaged in a "behind the lines" fight against reinfestation of screwworms in the United States.

The screwworm eradication program has been and continues to be highly successful in Mexico. Extra effort on the part of producers and owners of

household pets could insure that any incoming case is detected early before an outbreak occurs and a sustaining population could become established.

In the event that screwworms should re-enter the United States, they probably will come in on an imported animal—a dog, cat or some form of livestock. It would likely be an isolated case,

making it difficult to detect.

For this reason, veterinary practitioners and livestock owners who might come in contact with such a case of worm infestation should be extra vigilant in examining wounds and submitting larval samples between now and the onset of hot weather.

Blowflies, in general, occur in cycles and

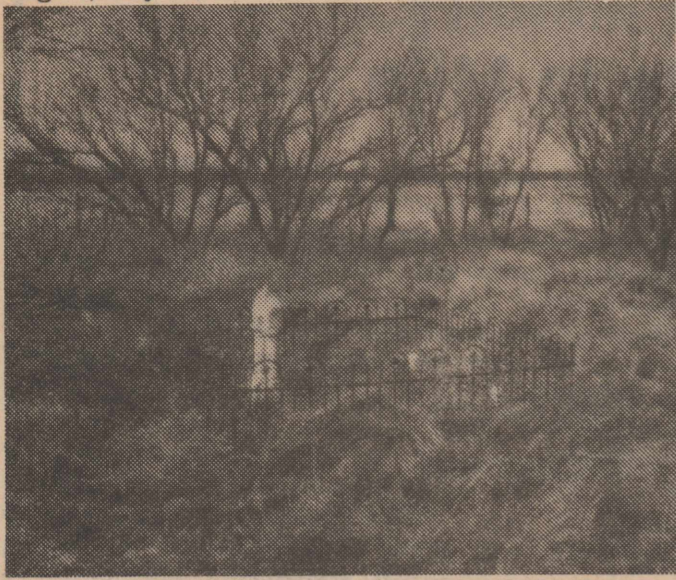
screwworms fit into this cycle pattern. To anticipate the probability of screwworm buildup, the Screwworm Laboratory at Mission needs larvae of all kinds to give an indication about when screwworms might occur. This situation depends on availability of wounds, the time of year, soil moisture, temperature and humidity.

When a large buildup of macellaria is identified, conditions are good for screwworm buildup. Many other forms of blowflies occur during periods when conditions are not as favorable for screwworms, so the collection and examination of all larvae samples—whether they appear to be screwworms or not—is extremely vital to the Screwworm Laboratory's surveillance program during late winter and early spring.

Only the screwworm pro-

duction plant has moved to Mexico. At Mission, staff members are still trapping flies, making rancher surveys, and distributing collection kits. Livestock in spectors from Mission continue to attend live-

stock sales and shows and solicit cooperation from ranchers. They also provide information and sample mailers. Early detection of screwworms is still the goal and key to a successful program.

Social Security Begins Review Of All Cases

"We are now starting our annual review of each SSI recipient's case," said Glyn Hammons, manager of the Abilene Social Security Office. "This annual review is required and is nothing that should alarm recipients when they receive a questionnaire in the mail. The purpose of the annual review is to insure that we are paying recipients all they are due and that policy is being correctly applied to their situation. Of course, this annual review does not do away with the recipient's responsibility to report changes as they occur."

"The actual interview may take as little as 15 minutes depending on the complexity of each case," said Hammons. "Because each individual's situation is unique, it is difficult to say exactly what documentation or proofs we will need, but generally we will ask for checking and savings account statements for each month since

the last review, such as unemployment, rental income, lease income, wages, self-employment, and profit of any transfer of property by sale or gift. We also may need to see some life insurance policies each year. If an individual (or couple) lives with people other than a spouse and minor children, we may ask for an itemized list of household expenses for food and shelter, and the amount of

the recipient's contributions toward those expenses.

When SSI recipients receive a call or a notice to come in, they should check with the Social Security office if they have questions about what to bring with them for the interview. This will allow the necessary papers to be completed. Our office is open from 9:00 to 4:30 and the telephone number for SSI is 695-1240.

Federal Land Bank Interest Rates Reduced

Interest rates on Land Bank variable rate loans will be reduced to 11.00 percent on farm loans and to 11.50 percent on rural residence and farm-related business loans effective May 1, 1983, said E.J. Richardson, Jr. president of the Federal Land Bank Association of Roby.

In addition, the Land Bank has reduced its Bank closed loan fees to 1 percent on farm loans and to 2 percent on rural residence and farm related business loans, according to Thomas H. Benson, president of the Federal Land Bank of Texas. These reduced fees are effective April 25, 1983.

"The adjustments follow reductions made earlier this year," Benson said. On January 1, 1983, the Bank's interest rate on farm loans was lowered to 11.25 percent. The interest rate for rural residence and farm-related business loans was lowered to 11.75 percent. Bank closed loan fees subsequently were reduced in February from 4 to 2 percent on farm loans and from 7 to 4 percent on rural residence and farm-related business loans. The fee reduction was made possible, Ben-

son said, by the decrease in the Bank's cost of funds.

The Federal Land Bank Association of Roby makes long-term real estate loans in the counties of Fisher, Nolan and Taylor.

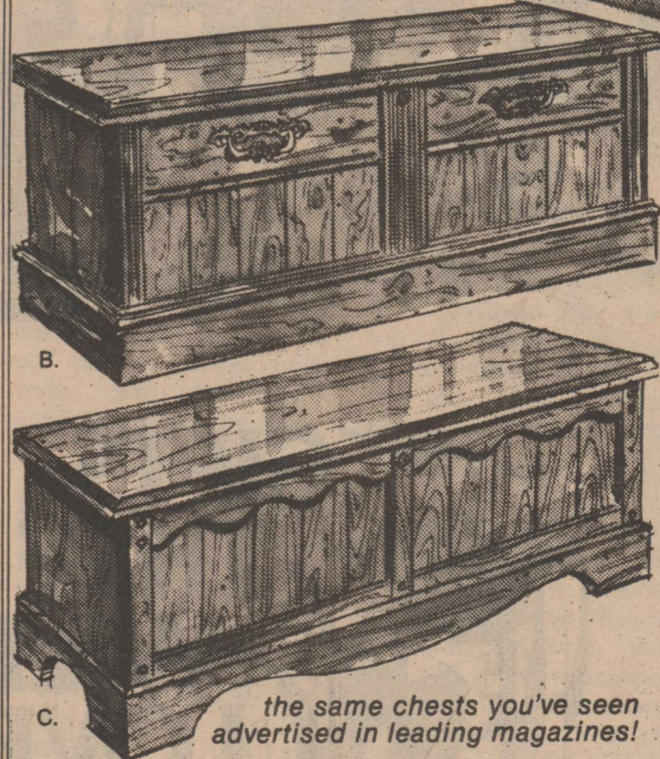

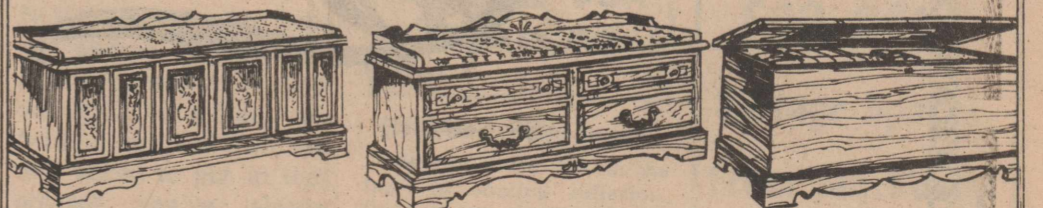

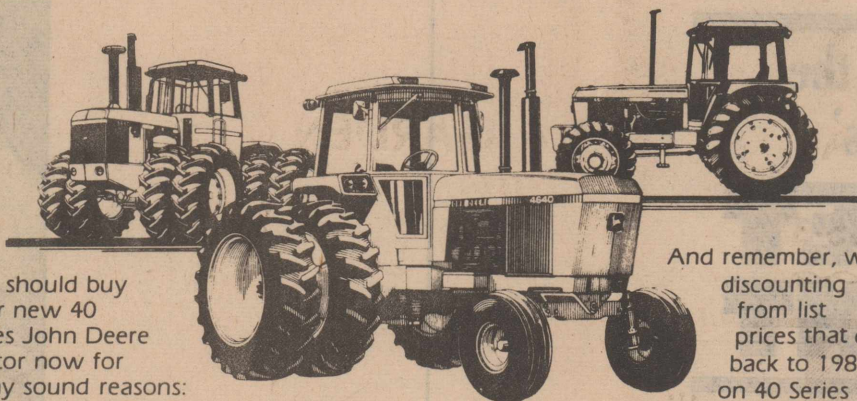

Social Security Needs Original Documentation

Are you planning to obtain your first Social Security Card, replace the one that you've lost, or change your name on your card? If so, you will need to provide evidence of age or identity or both. The documents you submit as evidence must be the original document or a certified copy. We cannot accept uncertified or not-ordered photocopies as evidence. If you have never had a Social Security number before, you can obtain the application at your local Social Security Office. In addition, you will need to submit evidence of both age and identity. Acceptable evidence of age is a public or hospital birth certificate or a religious record of birth or baptism. For proof of identity, acceptable evidence included a drivers license, school ID card, marriage and divorce record, or any other document providing identifying data. Proof of age such as a birth certificate cannot be accepted as proof of identity. You may apply for the Social Security number by mailing in the application and proofs to any Social Security Office or by bringing them in person. However, if you are 18 or over and have never had a Social Security number before or you are not a United States citizen,

you must apply in person. If you are not a United States citizen, you should bring in your foreign birth certificate if it is available and either your Alien Registration Card or your U.S. Immigration card. If you are authorized to work by the Immigration and Naturalization Service, we can assign you a Social Security number to use for work. If you are a lawfully admitted alien but are not permitted to work, you can be issued a Social Security number but it cannot be used to work.

can be issued. Again, you can obtain the application at any Social Security office: The only evidence you will need to submit is evidence of identity. If your name has changed due to marriage, you can also apply to have a new card with your corrected name. In order for us to change your name, you must submit documents showing both your old and new names. If your name is being changed due to marriage, normally the marriage license will be sufficient as it will show both names.

If you have already been issued a Social Security number and have lost the card, a replacement card

IRS GETS INTEREST

The Internal Revenue Service has always charged interest on underpayment of tax. The IRS must also pay interest to taxpayers on overpayments.

The IRS currently charges and pays 16 percent interest. Under the 1982 Tax Act, the Internal Revenue Service is required to change their rate each January 1 and July 1. The rate effective July 1, 1983, will be based on the average adjusted prime rate charged by commercial banks during the six month period ending March 31, 1983. The average for that six month period was 11.4 percent and the Tax Act requires that figure to be rounded to the nearest full percentage figure. Therefore, the effective rate for July 1, 1983, to December 31, 1983, will be 11 percent. This is the rate the Internal Revenue Service has to charge for delinquent payments and the rate they have to pay on overpayments by taxpayers. The IRS does not pay interest on overpayments for current year tax refunds. If you have a refund on your 1982 tax return and the IRS issues a check within 45 days after April 15, you are not entitled to interest. If you file later than April 15, the IRS has 45 days to issue your refund without interest. Overpayments which result from certain adjustments to prior year returns will bear interest.

Good cash management indicates that there are times when it is appropriate to use the Internal Revenue Service as a banker. Consult with your tax advisor to determine whether the 11 percent interest rate and other filing considerations make it worthwhile to owe money to the Internal Revenue Service as opposed to borrowing from your banker or disturbing your higher yielding investments.

Six Flags Installs 4.2 Million Dollar Raft Ride

The biggest ride in the history of Six Flags Over Texas, the Roaring Rapids river adventure, opened Friday, April 1, at the Arlington theme park. The \$4.2 million dollar attraction simulates the excitement of rafting down a wilderness river com-

plete with white-capped rapids, rippling lagoons, threatening boulders and waterfalls which tower above the banks.

Circular fiberglass rafts, encircled by huge flotation tubes, carry twelve passengers each along the thundering waterway.

Six Flags General Manager Ray Williams said the concept for the ride came from a Six Flags executive who was intrigued by the man-made river which was used for kayaking competition in the 1972 Munich Olympics.

He said Six Flags asked Intamin, AG, of Zurich, Switzerland, to create a similar river which would be totally safe for the average person to ride. Roaring Rapids is the result.

Intamin is the same firm which designed such thrill rides as the Shock Wave double loop roller coaster and the Texas Cliffhanger freefall ride.

Williams commented, "Roaring Rapids is as close as the average person is going to come to the thrill of a ride down a stretch of rapids. Up until now," he said, "the experience has been limited to those folks who could travel to wilderness areas and join in guided rafting trips."

He cautioned that, "like the real thing, people can just about count on getting very, very wet."

"As each raft plunges down the final set of rapids, a wave about three feet high breaks over the leading edge of the raft. At that point, it really gets wet," he explained.

Williams said Roaring Rapids holds nearly two million gallons of water in a "riverbed" formed by 11,100 tons of concrete. The river is more than a quarter of a mile long.

There are four sets of rapids on the ride, connected by four lakes, two of which are equipped with wave machines. In addition, two of the lakes feature waterfalls, the largest of which towers 36 feet above the river. It produces some 10,000 gallons of water per minute.

Roaring Rapids can carry up to 2,000 riders per hour, making it the largest capacity ride in the Six Flags lineup.

Veterans Land Board Sets Interest Rate

Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro today announced the Veterans Land Board has voted to set an 8.5 percent interest rate for Texas veterans applying for loans from the Veterans Land Program. Mauro, who serves as

Chairman of the Veterans Land Board, said, "Because of the strength and stability of this program, we are again able to offer some of the best financing for veterans to purchase land."

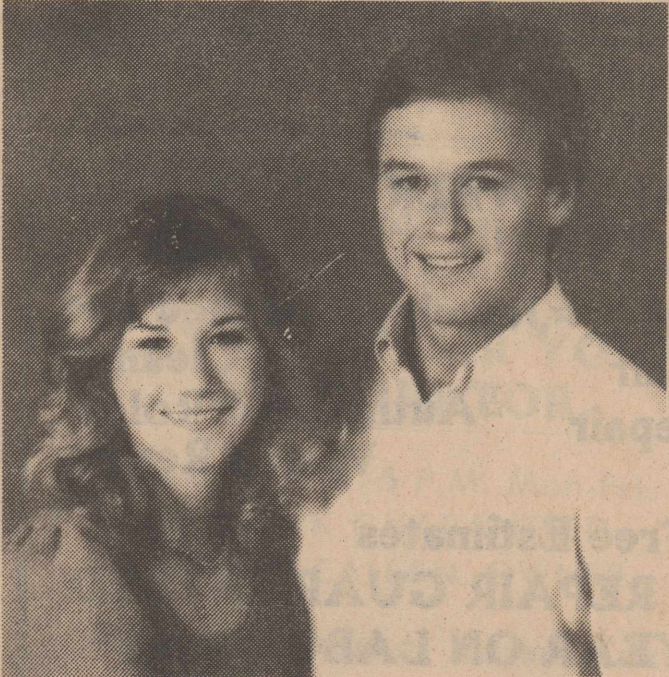
Eligible Texas veterans are able to borrow up to \$20,000 over a 40 year term to purchase a minimum of ten acres of land. Since the Veterans Land Program began in 1949, over 80,000 Texas veterans have participated

"In addition to these very competitive interest rates, I am also pleased to report we no longer have a waiting list for loans for veterans," Mauro said. "Veterans who apply can also expect their loans to be processed within 90 to 120 days with a completed application packet."

Mauro noted the situation for veterans applying for loans has changed dramatically since January 3. "When I first took office, we had over 14,000 veterans on the waiting list for loan applications. It was not uncommon for some loans to take longer than a year to close. We plan to operate the Veterans Land Board on a business like basis now and in the future providing our veterans with the best service possible," Mauro

stated. The Veterans Land Board sold \$50 million worth of bonds at a March 21 sale. This is the first sale of the \$250 million in bonds authorized by Texas voters in 1981. The 8.5 percent interest rate is effective March 21.

"The Veterans Land Program has provided thousands of Texas veterans the opportunity to purchase land. Since the loan program is supported by bonds, the entire program is operated at no cost to the taxpayer. With the next 5,000 loans approved by the Veterans Land Board, another \$100 million will be generated to the Texas economy," Mauro stated. "I encourage all eligible Texas veterans to participate in this excellent program."
