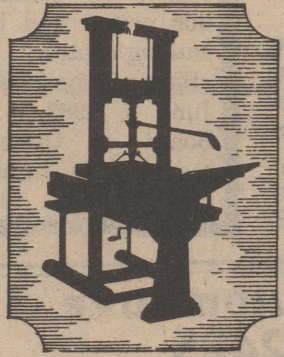
Hits and Misses

State Statistician Doug Murfield emphasized that information from the crop surveys will be used by county ASCS offices to set yields for the farm pro-

grams. "A good response on these surveys means that we can return more accurate acreage and yield figures back to the counties," Murfield said.

"This information is more important than ever in 1983, especially with the many production options available to farmers and ranchers," Murfield added.

The confidential interviews, conducted by mail or in person by field enumerators, can also help producers in planning their production and marketing programs for the coming year.

To reduce survey costs,

Murfield is urging farmers and ranchers to return the mailed questionnaires as soon as possible. The reported information will be combined for state and county estimates.

Annual county estimates are published for livestock, dairy, poultry, cotton, field crops, small grains, fruits and pecans, vegetables, and cash receipts from the sale of farm products.

Ma Bell Will Begin \$31.2 Million Refund Program

Beginning May 25, Southwestern Bell's customers should see credits on their bills reflecting about \$31.2 million in refunds.

The refunds are the difference between bonded rates implemented Nov. 9, 1982, and those approved by the Public Utility Commission's final order in the company's 1982 rate request. The order became effective Jan. 11, 1983, according to Jim West.

"The amount of refund varies among cities according to size, he said. But for most Texas the one-time refund should fall between \$5.20 and \$6.30 for a single-party residence line."

line."

West said amounts credited are refunds on local service, some number services such as Directory Assistance, business non-recurring charges and taxes. The credits include 13.7 percent simple annual interest on bonded revenues exceeding the PUC-approved amount. Interest totals about \$2 million statewide on the disallowed revenues held from Nov. 9 through May.

Southwestern Bell plans to complete the refund process by mid-June. Customers who have terminated service since Nov. 9 should receive checks for their refunds.

Cotton Insect

About Chickenpox...

Chickenpox is usually a mild infectious disease caused by a specific virus. The earliest symptom is usually a low-grade fever and a general feeling of discomfort, followed shortly by the characteristic generalized rash on the body, scalp, face, neck, and extremities. Itching is the most bothersome symptom of chickenpox, and your doctor may give you a prescription for medicine which will help relieve it.

All children, including infants, are susceptible to chickenpox. However, one attack almost always gives the child lasting immunity. Chickenpox can be spread by infected children to susceptible children from approximately one day before appearance of the rash until the rash has dried. Preventive measures, such as gamma globulin, are not usually recommended (your doctor will decide in very special circumstances). Your doctor will tell you about local health department regulations on isolation and quarantine.

When Your Child Has Chickenpox...

1. For fever, give medication as prescribed by your doctor. Do not give medicine or apply ointments, lotions, or salves unless you first ask your doctor.
2. In order to prevent infection of the rash, bath your child with soap and tepid water daily. Hot water aggravates the itching.
3. Fingernails should be kept short and clean to help prevent infections due to scratching. Baby socks can be put over the hands of infants to prevent scratching.
4. Your child needn't remain in bed, unless he feels ill, or has chills and fever, but he should remain at home until the rash has dried. Your child can follow his normal diet.
5. If the fever persists, or the rash shows signs of becoming infected, contact your doctor. Otherwise, follow the above instructions and let the disease run its course. Uncomplicated lesions clear up without scarring.

Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower announced today that registration for the 1983 Family Land Heritage Program will open June 1st and extend through August 6.

"Hard times have dogged the farmer constantly," said Hightower, "making it all the more commendable that some families have managed to keep the old home place in production for a century or more."

The Family Land Heritage Program was created by the Texas Department of Agriculture to honor families who own land which has been maintained in agricultural production for 100 years or more by the members of that family. Since 1974, when the program began, 1,558 properties in Texas have qualified for the Family Land Heritage Program.

Commissioner Hightower urges everyone in Fisher County whose land seems eligible, to participate in this program. Application forms may be obtained from Marshall Bennett, Fisher County Judge or Hooper Shelton, Chairman Fisher County Historical Commission.

Special Hurdles for Parents and Grown Kids. At some point or another, it comes as a shock to parents to see that the child they brought up from diaper-hood through adolescence has broken out of the cocoon and turned into an adult. In many families there is an awkwardness at this stage. Although friendship would seem to be the logical development, it doesn't come naturally to parents and their grown children. They have to work to achieve it. The difficulty has to do partly with disparities of age and experience. Friends relate to each other on a basis of equality, but the parent-child relationship is founded on a biological inequality- the parents is permanent. Moreover the two generations are divided by cultural differences that are all the more extreme in today's fast changing world. One example is the movement toward sexual equality, which has brought with it a certain amount of role confusion. Many of today's fathers have no training in accepting their daughters as equals in the work place; today's mothers may feel frustration as they see their daughters having jobs and experiences that were denied them when they were young. Most difficult to deal with, perhaps, is the need that all parents have to try to "DO THE BEST" FOR THEIR CHILD. They feel responsible for what their children are, and this sense of responsibility is life long. As a result, they may persist in giving advice that their children don't ask for and can't apply to their own lives. Once some of these hurdles are

A special feature of this year's Roundup will be a 75th Anniversary celebration commemorating the beginning of the 4-H program in Texas. The 1,600 4-Hers attending will assemble on Kyle Field at Texas A&M to form a huge 4-H clover leaf.

Activities will get under way with the State 4-H Food Show on June 7 followed by 39 Roundup contests and the Project Show on June 8.

The opening assembly for Roundup will begin at 6:45 p.m. June 7 with the recognition of 72 outstanding 4-H members who will receive scholarships totaling more than \$332,000. Five long time supporters of the 4-H program also will be recognized with special awards from the Texas 4-H Foundation.

4-Hers competing in the State Food Show and Roundup contests must qualify by winning in county and district competition. The State Project Show is open to all 4-H

West Texas Utilities Take Tough Power Theft Stand

Electric Utilities in Texas, including West Texas Utilities Co., are taking a tougher stance these days on theft of electricity.

Reasons for the crack-down are a change in the State Penal Code making meter tampering a penitentiary offense and the fact that the cost of producing electric energy has gone up.

"We view any form of stealing electric power as a serious crime," said Don Welch of Abilene, WTU vice president and director of customer services, "because we feel a strong responsibility to protect the interest of our good paying customers."

"It costs money to produce electricity," Welch said. "If one customer manages to get some of it free, the other customers have to make up the difference."

The State Legislature amended the criminal mischief statute in 1981 to make diversion of any utility service a third degree felony with a possible punishment of a maximum fine of \$5,000 and from two to ten years in prison. The law also allows authorities to make the assumption that the person in whose name the service was last billed is the responsible party.

Convictions have been obtained in several Texas cities since the law was passed, and WTU recently filed charges which resulted in a felony indictment being issued against a customer.

Welch said that meter tampering not only is a serious crime which is becoming more easy to detect, but that it is extremely dangerous.

Governor White Proclaims Senior Texas Program Day

Governor Mark White will sign a special proclamation declaring Wednesday, June 1, as Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb-Senior Texans Employment Program Day in recognition of the hundreds of older workers enrolled in the two senior employment programs.

Texas Farmers Union (TFU) has sponsored the Green Thumb program in Texas since 1970. The largest and oldest federally-funded senior employment program, Green Thumb has more than 17,000 enrollees nationwide, including 1,059 in 111 Texas counties.

In 1973, the Texas Legislature adopted a TFU proposal to establish the Senior Texans Employment Program (STEP), which now receives both state and federal support through the Texas Department on Aging. STEP employs 830 workers in 122 counties.

"Both programs concentrate their resources in rural Texas," said TFU President Mike Moeller, "because the need, there for employment opportunities and for the services the workers provide is so great." The programs place workers with senior centers, schools, libraries, and municipalities to furnish services that would not otherwise be available.

"In signing the proclamation on June 1, the Governor will be saying 'Thank you' to these hundreds of workers for a

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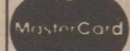
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Little League Rebels Maintain First Place After Yankee Loss

GYM: The new gym will be a pre-engineered metal building; approximately 9,000 square feet with 20'-0" eave height. Exterior walls will be masonry and 1-1/2" metal panels. Roof will be 1-1/2" metal panels. Interior side of metal panels will have 3/4" thick sprayed-on insulation. Finishes will be painting, wood gym floor. Equipment will include basketball backstop, individual seating on concrete bleachers and roll-out bleachers. Gym will be heated.

NEW BANDHALL: The new bandhall will be a pre-engineered metal building; approximately 3,000 square feet with a 14'-0" eave height. Exterior walls and roof will be 1-1/2" thick metal panel. Interior side of metal panels will have 3/4" thick sprayed-on insulation. Partitions will be metal studs with gypsum drywall. Finishes include painting, resilient floor, carpet and acoustical ceilings. Equipment shall include chalkboards, tackboards, toilet accessories. The entire area will be heated and air conditioned.

DRESSING ROOM: The dressing room will be approximately 5433 square feet, one story, with concrete floors, load bearing exterior masonry walls. Roof structure will be open web steel joist, metal deck, and built-up roof. Partitions will be masonry. Equipment shall include chalkboards, tackboards, toilet partitions, and shower stalls. Entire area will be heated. Finishes will include painting, resilient floors, and acoustical ceiling.

This is a Construction Management Project. Separate bids will be taken on foundation work, concrete work, masonry, steel erection, carpentry, built-up roofing, hollow metal work, wood doors and cabinets, hardware, glass and glazing, resilient flooring, carpeting, toilet partitions, lockers, chalkboards and tackboards, gym equipment, HVAC, plumbing, electrical, and metal building manufacturer and erectin.

Proposals received after that time will not be accepted. All interested parties are invited to attend. Proposals will be opened and read aloud.

Bona Fide bidders may secure copies of the proposed Contract Documents from the Architect on the following basis:

(1) Bidders will be issued one complete set of plans and specifications upon receipt of a deposit check in the amount of \$150.00 made payable to the Architect. Unsuccessful bidders shall be refunded their deposit check if the plans and specifications are returned to the Architect's office in good condition within 10 days after receipt of bids.

(2) Bidders who do not submit a bid or fail to return their plans within seven (7) days prior to the bid opening date will be refunded their deposit less the cost of plans and specifications reproduction.

(3) Bidders and other interested parties requesting additional sets of plans and specifications may receive such documents for the cost of the reproduction and handling expenses.

(4) All plans, specifications and contract documents furnished on a deposit basis or purchase basis shall remain the property of, and shall be returned to the Architect in good condition within 10 days after bid opening.

Tax Planning

The Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 1982 makes several significant changes affecting retirement plans. Differences between corporate pension and profit sharing plans and those of self-employed individuals are, in general, eliminated.

Rules have been made more liberal for Keogh (HR-10) plans and more restrictive for corporate plans. Annual contributions to corporate "defined contributions plans" have been reduced from \$45,475 to \$30,000. Benefits that can be provided from corporate "defined benefit plans" have been decreased from the current annual \$136,425 to \$90,000.

On the other hand, the allowable contributions to Keogh plans are increased from a current maximum of 15 per cent of earned income or \$15,000 to 20 percent of earned income or \$30,000 for 1984.

The increase allowed Keogh Plans applies also to Sub-chapter S plans and Simplified Employee Pension plans.

Another significant change is the reduction of the previous "unlimited exclusion" from your gross estate of retirement benefits under qualified plans to an exclusion of only \$100,000 of such benefits. If you have more than \$100,000 in one of these plans, your "will" and your estate plan should be reviewed.

Loans from retirement plans are subject to stricter rules. A participant is permitted to borrow up to one-half of his vested benefits, not to exceed \$50,000. He can borrow up to \$10,000 without regard to his vested level. Loans outside these limits are considered distributions and taxable as income.

Loans in excess of five years will be treated as taxable distribution regardless of size. There are exceptions for certain mortgage loans and residential purchases. Check with you accountant or pension plan administrator if you borrow money from your retirement plan.

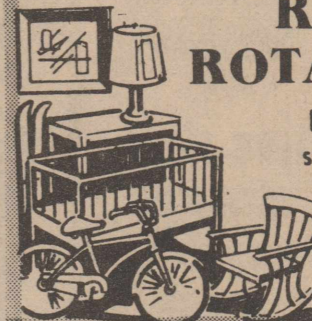

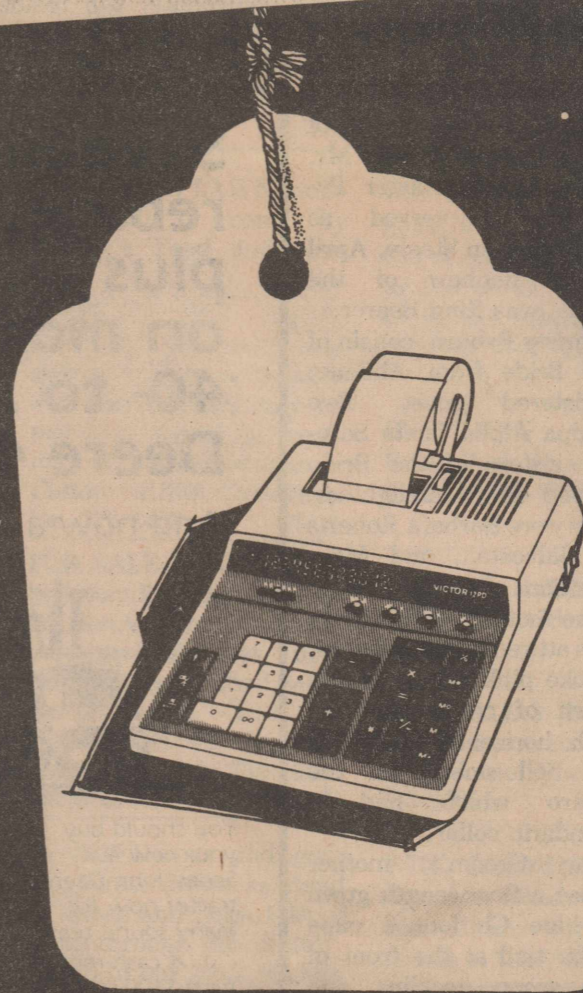

Social Security Provides More Than Retirement

The most common protection being monthly payments to widows and children and may be quite substantial. Medicare-provides both hospital insurance and medical insurance that can help pay medical costs after a worker becomes 65. It also provides health coverage if a worker becomes entitled to dis-

ability benefits for 24 consecutive months.

The protection outlined above shows how Social Security has evolved into the nation's primary income maintenance pro-

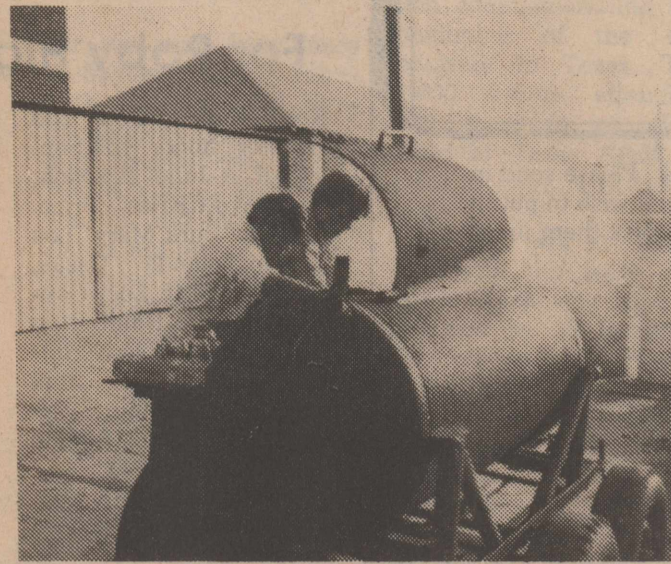
gram that is both flexible and responsive to the needs of the American family.

Program financing has frequently been in the news recently. The entire

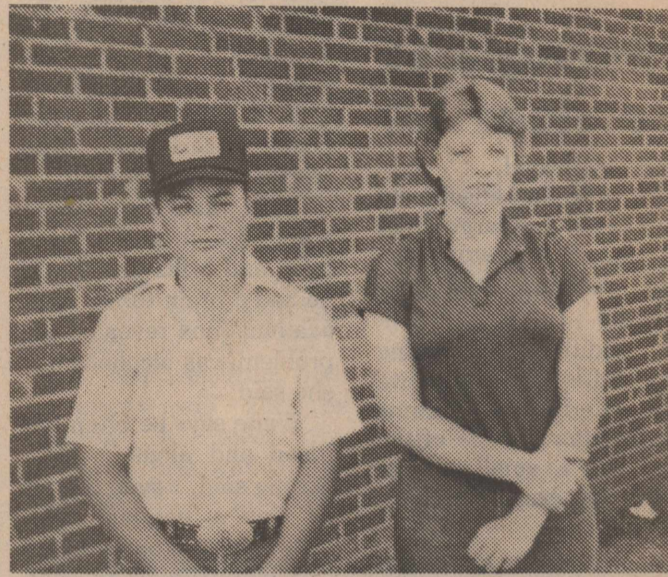
