No deduction is allowed for the value of services donated, but you can deduct out-of-pocke expenses incurred while performing volunteer services. Transportation is one of the expenses and includes the cost of gas and oil (but no
depreciation). If you do not want to keep detailed records of your out-of-pocket expenses, you can take an automatic deduction of 9 cents a mile for donated transportation and not be questioned as to amount of expense. All you have to prove is the purpose of your travel and the mileage.
As a result of other charitable activities, you may etc. An individual who contributes proprty must keep a receipt from the charity and a reliable written record containing specified information about the property.
