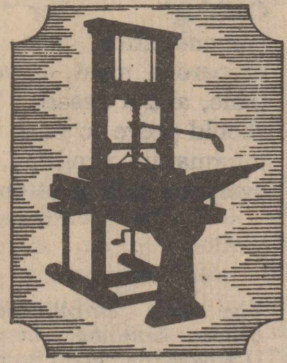

### 32 Coaches Apply For Rotan Job, New Man May Be Named On Friday

Rotan may have a new head coach and athletic director by Friday evening, according to superintendent Jerry Dickson. As of Tuesday, Dickson had received 32 applicants for the position. He is still in the interviewing process

with approximately nine remaining, and he commented that the "phone is still ringing." Anticipating a selection during Friday's special board meeting, Dickson will present the top 2-4 prospects for evaluation by

board members. Applications have been received from all over the state. The number of hopefuls surprised him somewhat, "I didn't think there would be so many this late."

In selecting a head coach/athletic director, a five-point criteria is used by Dickson. These characteristics include, one that will set a good example for young people, has experience with a winning program, possesses a number of years experience, a personality that will blend well with the community and someone who can teach as well

as coach.

The applicants as a whole have been very good. "I

am extremely pleased with those I have seen thus far," said Dickson.

### Rotan, Roby Pools Will Open Soon For 83 Season

The swimming pools at Rotan and Roby will be opening within the next week, according to reports from City Manager Jimmy Price at Roby and City Secretary Kenneth Vann at Rotan.

Roby, after a full remodeling and renovation of the pool area, will be opening the pool on Friday, June 3rd at 2:00 P.M. Melody Hataway will be serving at the lifeguard and will be co-managing the facility with Mrs. Waldon Dodds. Admission for adults is \$1.00 at Roby with children 12 and under paying a 75 cent charge. The pool will be closed each Monday but will open Tuesday through Sunday from 2 P.M. until 6 P.M. (open late on Thursday night).

Rotan will open their pool on Tuesday, June 7th at 2:00 P.M., under the direction of pool manager Ernest Armstrong, announced Kenneth Vann.

The pool will have the same daily charge for admission and maintain

the same operating hours as 1982. Pool hours are Tuesday through Sunday.

You've just been handed a prescription. You start to look forward to better health. But what do you know about that drug? Do you understand what it is meant to do? Do you know how to take it? Medicines can have some side effects, and they have to be taken correctly. So, be sure to read instructions carefully, and don't hesitate to ask your doctor about:

**WHEN TO TAKE THE MEDICINE.** Some drugs should be taken on full stomachs, some on empty stomachs, some in the morning, some before going to bed.

**HOW TO TAKE THE MEDICINE AND HOW MUCH.** with water, with milk or without anything? Should the dose be one or two spoonfuls or what?

**WHAT NOT TO TAKE WITH THE MEDICINE.** Some medicines don't mix with alcohol, others shouldn't be mixed with other drugs.

**WHAT SIDE EFFECTS THE DRUGS CAN CAUSE.** Medicines may produce a variety of other reactions. Not all people will have the same side effects but you should know what the possibilities are.

There are many sources of information about prescription drugs. Ask your doctor or pharmacist.

## Tejas Chapter of Colonial Daughters Meet

Members of Tejas Chapter of Colonial Daughters of the Seventeenth Century met recently at Big Spring Country Club for a luncheon and program. Hostesses for the meeting were Mmes. Helen Dawson Cobean and Margaret Barnett of that city.

In absence of the chapter president the first vice president, Mrs. Henry F. Clark of Snyder, presided. The pledge to the Flag of the United States of America and to the Colonial Daughters Flag was voiced in unison. Opening prayer and devo-

tional were led by Mrs. Al Harris of Kermit, chaplain.

Following the luncheon, Delila Baird of Rotan introduced the speaker, Mrs. Jack Lipscombe of Big Spring. Mrs. Lipscombe presented a program on "Funeral and Burial Customs in Seventeenth Century America".

The speaker noted that in the 1600's, New Englanders had no religious services at funerals. They carried their dead in solemn silence to the grave.

Where Scotch-Irish planters had settled, news of a death was a time for a holiday. A gathering was held the night before the funeral at which time there was feasting and drinking which resembled an Irish Wake. Much New England rum was consumed at the wake, before the procession to the grave; and again, after the burial, the party returned to the home of the deceased for more drinks. Often this was provided for in the will of the deceased. At times it took years for the family to pay for the rum that was provided for the occasion.

another common custom was firing guns at funerals. In 1655, the Virginia

Assembly passed an act forbidding the wasting of gun powder except at weddings and funerals. Mourning rings, gloves and love scarves were given to mourners at funerals.

In every settlement of the colonies two customs prevailed. One, the presentation of gifts to relatives and prominent citizens who were in the procession; and secondly, liberal servings of intoxicating beverages to mourners, visitors and all who had anything to do with the funeral.

Following the program, delegates reported on the General Assembly held in Washington in April. The President General's Award of Excellence and First Place Award from the Historian General for news coverage and Commemorative Seventeenth Century Program were displayed. Also shown were pictures of members and national officers attending the meeting.

Attending the chapter meeting in Big Spring were Mmes. Henry F. Clark and Bernard Longbotham, Snyder; L.T. Nelson, Sweetwater; Al Harris, Kermit; Randy Hurt, Ft. Stockton; Ernest Thomas, Odessa; Jack Lipscombe, Helen Dawson Cobean, Margaret Barnett, Big Spring; Connie Tutt, Vera Morrow, and the Misses Josie Baird and Delila Baird, Rotan.

The National Society Colonial Daughters of the Seventeenth Century was organized in New York in 1896. Eligibility for membership is based on proof of descent from an ancestor residing in one of the American colonies between 1607 and 1699 with qualifying service in developing the beginnings of our nation. The work of the Society carries out the

patriotic, philanthropic, educational and historical purposes for which it was organized.

Tejas Chapter, organized in 1977 in Washington, D.C., Delila Baird of Rotan as organizing president, now has members located in many areas of Texas with four out of state members. Membership is by invitation.

Born Dec. 9, 1897, in Eastland County, he moved to the Roby area in a covered wagon with his parents when he was 7. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. Robert Charlie Hayes. He married Ella Mae Davis May 15, 1935, in Roby. They moved to Hamlin in 1954. He was a member of the Primitive Baptist Church.

Two sisters and four brothers preceded him in death.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Whynama Rosenquist of Stamford; a son, Joe of Monahans; a brother, Odell of Hamlin; three sisters, Lora Stephens of Roby, Eunice Saddler of Laguna Niguel, Calif., and Betty Perdue of Rotan; and

four grandsons. Nephews were pallbearers.

## County Agent Report

The U. S. Department of Agriculture's Screwworm Laboratory at Mission is still open, staffed with people, and engaged in a "behind the lines" fight against re-infestation of screwworms in the United States. The screwworm eradication program has been and continues to be highly successful in Mexico. Extra effort on the part of producers and owners of household pets could insure that any incoming case is detected early before an outbreak occurs and a sustaining population could become established.

In the event that screwworms should re-enter the United States, they probably will come in on an imported animal—a dog, cat or some form of livestock. It would likely be an isolated case, making it difficult to detect.

For this reason, veterinary practitioners and livestock owners who might come in contact with such a case of worm infestation should be extra vigilant in examining wounds and submitting larval samples between now and the onset of hot weather.

Blow flies, in general, occur in cycles and screwworms fit into this cycle pattern. To anticipate the probability of

screwworm buildup, the Screwworm Laboratory at Mission needs larvae of all kinds to give an indication about when screwworms might occur. This situation depends on availability of wounds, the time of year, soil moisture, temperature and humidity.

When a large buildup of macellaria is identified, conditions are good for screwworm buildup.

Many other forms of blowflies occur during periods when conditions are not as favorable for screwworms, so the collection and examination of all larvae samples—whether they appear to be screwworms or not—is extremely vital to the Screwworm Laboratory's surveillance program during late winter and early spring.

Only the screwworm production plant has moved to Mexico. At Mission, staff members are still trapping flies, making rancher surveys, and distributing collection kits. Livestock inspectors from Mission continue to attend livestock sales and sows and solicit cooperation from ranchers. They also provide information and sample mailers. Early detection of screwworms is still the goal and key to a successful program.

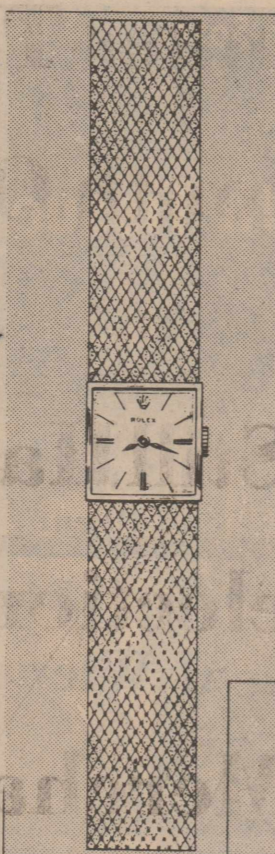

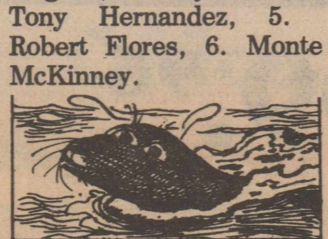

## Tax Planning by Gerald Rodgers, CPA



You probably take charitable deductions for cash contributions to your church, however, you may be overlooking other valid charitable deductions. your family's church activities probably involve more than attendance at services. These additional church related activities can generate other charitable deductions. Let's look at what expenses are deductible.

No deduction is allowed for the value of services donated, but you can deduct out-of-pocket expenses incurred while performing volunteer services. Transportation is one of the expenses and includes the cost of gas and oil (but no depreciation). If you do not want to keep detailed records of your out-of-pocket expenses, you can take an automatic deduction of 9 cents a mile for donated transportation and not be questioned as to amount of expense. All you have to prove is the purpose of your travel and the mileage.

As a result of other charitable activities, you may have contributed property such as clothing, food, etc. An individual who contributes property must keep a receipt from the charity and a reliable written record containing specified information about the property.

Charitable expenses can be valuable deductions when income tax time rolls around. Start now keeping the necessary records to substantiate these expenses.
