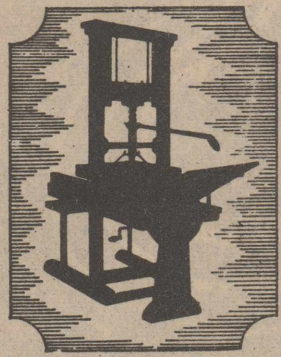

Roby School Board Approves Plans For \$665,000 New Gym & Band Hall

The members of the Roby Independent School District board of trustees voted to approve a \$665,028.00 project involving the construction of a new high school gymnasium and new band hall, according to Superintendent Jimmie Laurie.

The overall project is being co-ordinated by Don Hampton, Sweetwater, Texas architect and a construction management firm. "We are expecting the management firm to move on-site before the end of this week and the first work should actually begin when the dirt-movers move in at about the same time," said Laurie.

The total construction cost is \$665,028.00 and this includes a fee for the construction management firm. There are a total of 28 different contractors involved in the construction of the project. These include dirt work, pest control, concrete work, metal building, cement contractors, brick contractors, scoreboard installation, etc.

It is anticipated that the construction will take 8 months and could be finished around mid February.

Roby school officials, having established a building fund in anticipation of new construction, have already set-aside \$500,000.00 to pay on the total \$665,000.00 bill. "The board is going to build a first class facility", said Laurie. "We're going to have individual seating in the home side of the gymnasium, individual metal lockers (60 in each side) of the dressing rooms which should be enough for one for each student in high school.

"If we don't lose oil valuation, we'll be able to save some tax revenue and pay for the remainder on the new construction next year," said Laurie. If oil valuations drop, it may take as long as two years to pay off the remaining \$165,000 in construction costs, according to Laurie.

The new Rotan head football coach and athletic director was the top choice from a field of some 40 candidates and will be bringing a winning tradition in coaching to Rotan. Coach John E. Smith as head coach at Blooming Grove (20-2), Malakoff

(17-12-1) and Teague (21-9-1) has compiled a record of 58-23-2 since 1970. In the years since 1976, he has been the defensive coordinator at Mexia and associated with the varsity track program.

John E. Smith, age 46, was one of 5 coaches to appear before the Rotan School Board last Friday night. By midnight all 5 coaches had been interviewed but it was close to 2:00 a.m. before all the information was digested and the board hired Smith. He was extended a 1 year contract at \$5,000.00 above state base and will be working on an eleven month contract. THE TALL, heavy-set man with the mustache and glasses looks more like a lawyer than a police officer. Until he takes off his suit, the gun on his hip isn't visible. He can only remember putting the gun back on during his days as a city police patrolman working the streets. He is well-served and his manner is unassuming. His name is Kenneth L. Crow, and at 56, he is only 17 criminal investigations among some 400 in Texas which have been designated Professional Criminal Investigator by the Texas District and County Attorney's Association.



"Among those involved in the law-enforcement community, Kenneth L. Crow is well respected and appreciated. His honesty and integrity are above reproach. His knowledge of the criminal law and his keen investigative skills have on numerous occasions helped secure that criminal defendants were convicted and punished by justifiable sentences."

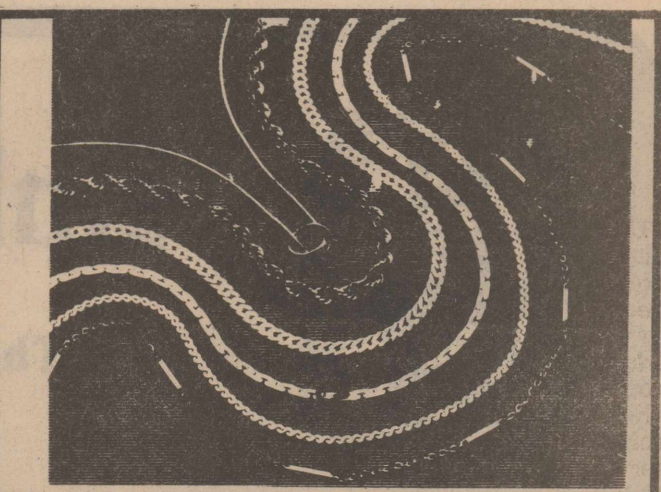

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Farmers Have Opportunity To Improve Land Under PIK Plan

Farmers have an unparalleled opportunity this year to improve their soil and water conservation systems, said Peter Myers, chief of the USDA's Soil Conservation Service.

Under the Payment-In-Kind (PIK) program and other acreage limitation programs, farmers in Texas are taking 9.3 million acres out of production. One-fifth of the nation's cropland is pledged to the program and now farmers can put a great deal of soil and water conservation on the ground.

Some of the erosive and

less productive acreage will be taken out of annual crop use and planted to grasses and legumes as cover crops. This has the potential for saving soil and water resources as well as building up natural fertility.

Myers said this is also a good time for planning ways to fit no-till or other conservation tillage methods into farm operation.

On more erosive acres, permanent conservation practices such as terraces, grassed waterways, windbreaks and other enduring practices can be installed without interrupting cash

crop production.

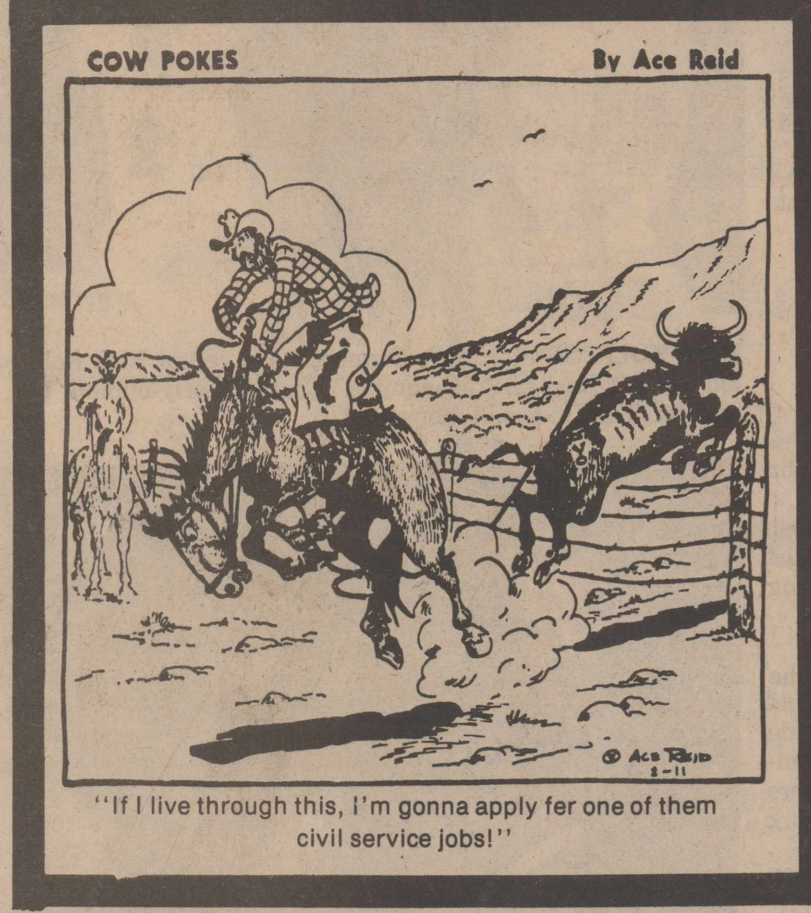
On the most erosive or other marginal land, farmers are encouraged to discontinue use of those acres for crop production. Those acres may be best suited for permanent grasses, trees, or wildlife habitat.

The 1983 programs offer farmers a rare opportunity to balance their short-term cash needs with their longer conservation and productivity goals said Myers.

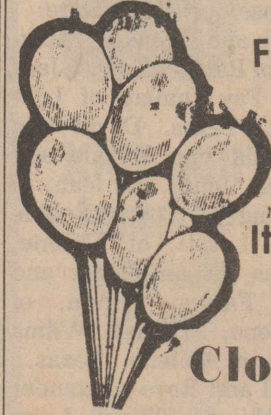

Looking at the farm to retail price spread, it's basically a case of "the poor getting poorer".

Farmers are continuing to get less of the dollars that consumers spend at supermarkets and restaurants. Last year only 28 cents of every dollar spent on food went back to the farmer, while 32 cents went for labor and the remaining 40 cents covered marketing costs.

This difference between what farmers receive and what consumers pay for food products is called the "farm to retail price spread" and represents food industry charges for handling, processing and retailing farm food commodities. That difference rose 5.1 percent for 1982 and is expected to grow even larger this year.

Why? Because, while the farm value of food is expected to rise only 1 to 4 percent. Thus the trend of marketing costs rising

faster than the farm value is expected to continue, it has for the past three years.

This means that the overall food price increases have been influenced less and less by changes in farm prices and

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

GENERAL SITUATIONS
Our rainy May weather has again helped secure our planting date. We have received over 5 inches in most areas in the

month of May. Participation with the planting date has been very high as most farmers began planting on or after May 23. It has been a cool spring and soil temperatures are just now warming up for optimum

cotton seed germination and growth.

BOLL WEEVILS

The boll weevil pheromone traps have been out since the first of May. Trap catches were not as high as last year for the first part of May. Our peak trap catches histor-

ically occur during the last week of May through the first week of June. This year our peak trap catches have increased dramatically and are higher than last years end of May peak.

PECAN NUT CASE-BEARER

The pecan nut casebearer is the major pest of pecans in the Rolling Plains. A small gray moth lays its eggs at night on the pecan nut clusters. The greenish-white egg, when layed, takes three to five days to change to pink or red before hatching. The small larvae then feeds on buds below the nutlets for 24 to 48 hours before burrowing into the nut. It is during this time that the larvae must be killed. Once they enter the nut, control with insecticides is almost impossible and entire nut clusters can be destroyed.

The spray date should be 5 to 6 days after eggs are found. I first found eggs on May 29 so the spray date will be June 3.

Recommended insecticides are Zolone, Sevin, Guthion, and Malathion at 1/4 tsp., 2 Tbsp., 1 1/2 Tbsp. and 5/6 Tbsp. of formulation per gallon of water respectively.

Apply zinc sulfate or NZN at the same time you do your casebearer spray. Pecan trees are zinc sulfate or NZN at the same time you do your casebearer spray. Pecan trees are zinc deficient due to the high soil pH. Zinc is an important element utilized by the pecan foliage to manufacture a growth hormone called indoleacetic acid. Without zinc and the formation of this hormone, pecan growth is greatly reduced. The leaves will be small and the shoots will be short and in clusters forming "zinc rosette".

Take care to keep zinc sulfate dried off of other types of plants because it

can burn the leaves and even kill many plants. Zinc sulfate 68% wettable

powder or NZN should be applied at a rate of 2 tsp. per gallon of water.

ESTATE AND GIFT TAX RULES

All estates in excess of \$175,000 of total value should be reviewed in light of the benefits available under the Tax Recovery Act of 1981.

The most significant change in estate law will be the exemption from estate taxes for property transferred to your spouse at your death. This is effective for decedents dying after 1981. If you leave all your property to your spouse, regardless of how high the value may be, there will be no federal estate taxes. Since the second spouse's estate could be subject to considerable taxes, proper planning is necessary.

A second major change under the new law is the exemption from taxation for property regardless to whom it is left. The dollar amount increases up through 1987 as follows: 1983 - \$275,000, 1984 - \$325,000, 1985 - \$400,000, 1986 - \$500,000, 1987 - \$600,000.

This means that a 1983 estate with a total value of \$275,000 or less will not be subject to federal estate taxes even if the assets are left to someone other than your spouse. Likewise, a \$600,000 estate will escape taxation in 1987. There are excellent planning techniques centered around these various estate exemption levels.

The 1981 law also provides better opportunities for making gifts while you're alive. Prior to January 1, 1982, the law permitted you to give \$3,000 per year per donee, without creating a gift tax. The Tax Recovery Act of 1981 increased that level to \$10,000. This means that a single parent could transfer \$10,000 per year to each of his or her children. A married couple could transfer \$20,000 to a child and if that child is married, they could double that gift for a total of \$40,000 per year.

Sizeable transfers of family assets should be made as part of an overall financial plan with the assistance of professionals.

Clark Buys Orrell Accounting Business

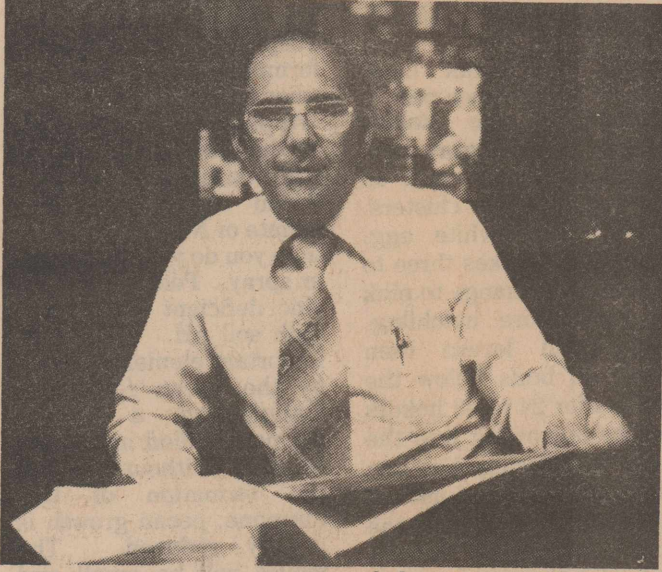
Billy E. Clark, a certified public accountant, has purchased the public accounting business owned by Vernon Orrell in Roby, it was announced this week.



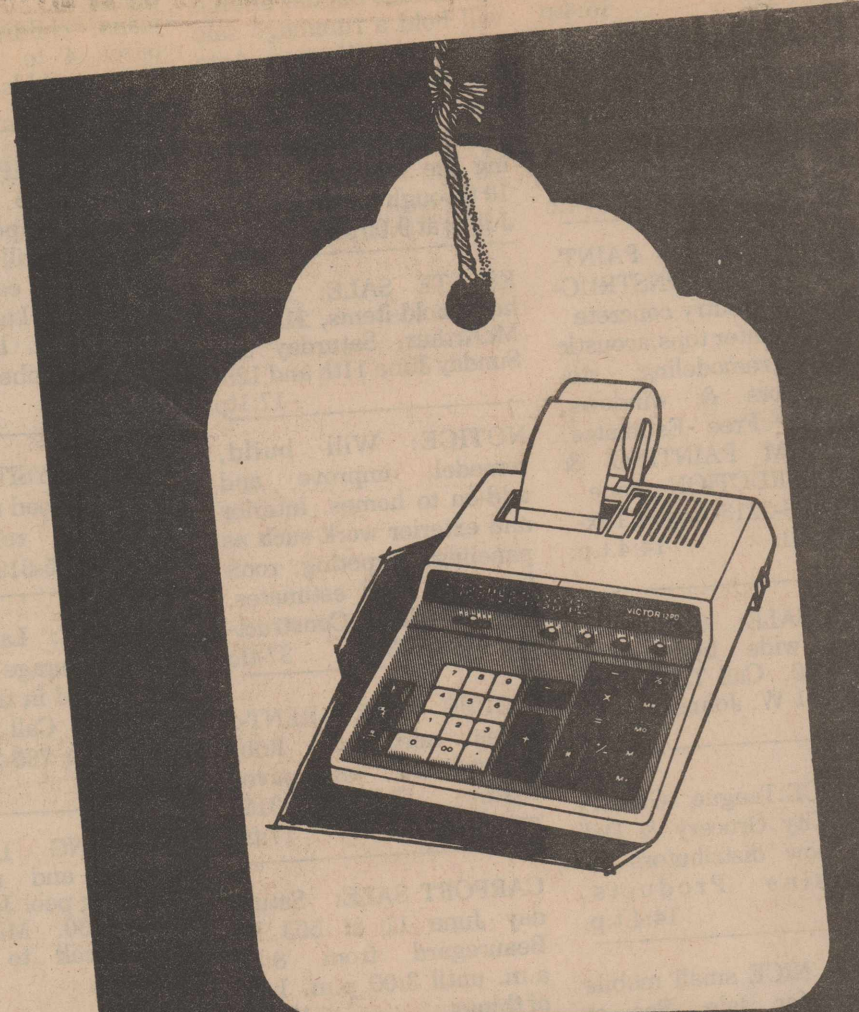

State Archeologist Scheduled To Speak At Monthly County Historical Meeting

Regular monthly meeting of Fisher County Historical Commission will be held at Sylvester Community Center at 2:00 p.m. Sunday, June 12.

Location of this meeting is because of the Link

Adair Folsom campsite and Woods Chapel cemetery nearby. This was the first cemetery in Fisher County.

Speaker for the meeting will be Robert J. Mallouf,

State Archeologist from Austin. He will explain artifacts and information discovered during excavations at the Adair site. The local Commission feels Fisher County should feel honored in having an executive from a State Commission to visit the group.

Everyone interested in history of Fisher County is invited to attend and make the tour to the Folsom site and Woods Chapel cemetery.

Mr. Mallouf's information will be extremely interesting as nothing is visible at the site but aluminum tube markers

bearing warning of molesting or trespassing the site as it is State of Texas property. Mr. Mallouf and his crews of workers have carefully excavated a portion of the site, prepared information and diagrams of findings and replaced soil to make the site an ordinary looking pasture.

The site is credited with being a Folsom campsite inhabited by Paleo-Indians during the years 9,000 to 8,000 B.C., a site that occupied 10 acres of Adair's 208 acre spread.

The campsite is one of only 10 known, documented sites in the United States, according to Mallouf, Adair, for discovering preserving and aiding digs at the site, was presented a Texas Award for Historical Preservation by the Texas Historical Commission.

"It's an extremely important archeological site," Mallouf reports explaining that Indians who camped there were nomadic big-game hunters who tracked herds of giant bison, a species that became extinct about 6,500 B. C.

Mallouf states the first major excavation was conducted in 1970 at the site, about a mile from Adair's home just west of

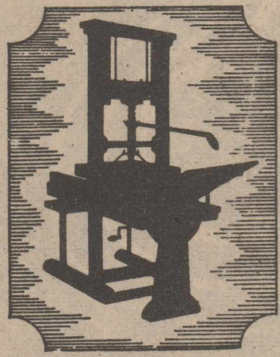

County Extension Agent Home Economics

The United States Department of Agriculture released new processing recommendations for tomatoes and tomato juice, applesauce, fruit purees and pumpkin.

To prevent food borne illness and the loss of valuable home canned foods, specialists with the

Texas Agricultural Extension Service are urging home canners to follow the new USDA guidelines.

The USDA now recommends the following: The one-step, cold pack method for canning tomatoes should no longer be used.

The hot pack processing

time for canning tomatoes should be increased to 35 minutes for pint jars and No. 2 cans, and to 45 minutes for quart jars and No. 2 1/2 cans.

The hot-pack processing time for canning tomato juice should be increased to 35 minutes for pint and quart jars, and for No. 2 and 2 1/2 cans.

Strained (pureed) pumpkin and winter squash should not be canned at home. Instead, cubed pumpkin and squash may be canned using a processing time of 55 minutes for pint jars and 90

minutes for quart jars. The processing times of applesauce and fruit puree should be increased to 20 minutes for pints, quarts, No. 2 and 2 1/2 cans.

The changes in canning recommendations are based on research conducted at land-grant universities and the Eastern Regional Center of the USDA. The recommendation to more than triple hot-pack processing times for tomatoes was based on research which indicated that shorter times could be insufficient under certain conditions. Insufficient processing could allow botulism organisms to survive the heat treatment, grow and produce harmful toxins. We consider this especially important since tomatoes are the most popular type of produce for home grown by Texas gardeners. Poor heat penetration through

dense foods and the high heat resistance of a particular mold led the USDA to recommend increased processing times for applesauce and fruit purees. They also recommend that strained (pureed) pumpkin and winter squash no longer be canned at home for the same reason. Those wishing to have strained (pureed) pumpkin or winter squash ready for making pies or casseroles should consider freezing the puree instead. Now is the time to correct Extension bulletin, B-194, "Home Canning...Fruits and Vegetables," or other instructions before the canning season begins.

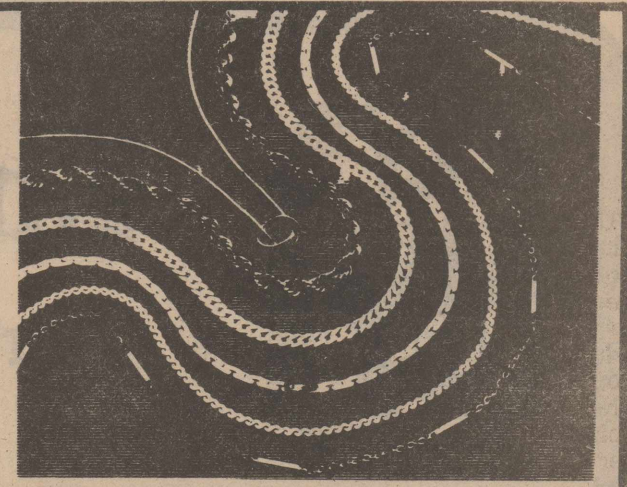

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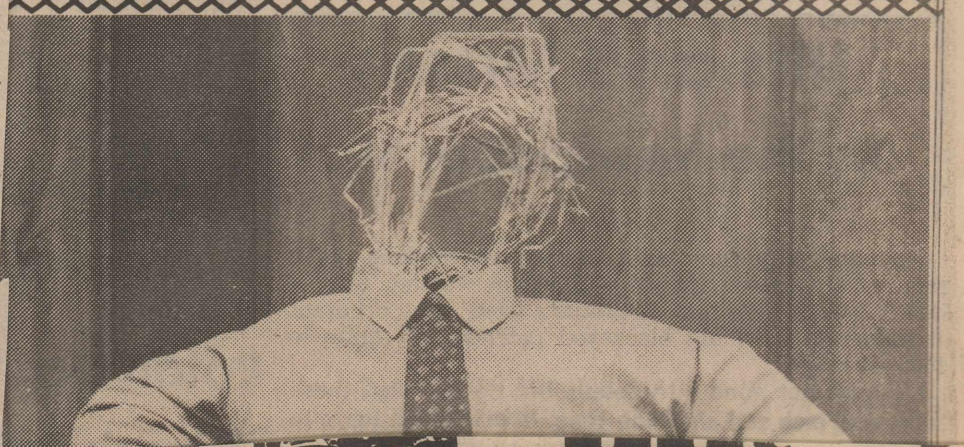
