

Hospital Board Members Contemplating Reducing Tax Rate, \$1.6 Million Budget

Fisher County Hospital Board members were presented the original draft of the 1984 Fisher County Hospital budget last Monday night by Administrator Gery McGee.

Although greeted with mixed emotions on the part of some hospital board members, the 1984

budget contained some good news and some bad news. The good news is a planned reduction in the tax rate. McGee has indicated that he will recommend reducing the ad valorem tax rate from .18 1/2 cents to .17 cents to meet the 1984 budget based on projections of income and preliminary

reports from the Central Appraisal District that reflect a 6 million dollar loss in total valuation. The bad news concerning the budget is that it is up \$377,746.00 over the actual expenses for the year ending 12-31-82. The actual expenses for the year ending 1982 were \$1,322,342.00 the pro-

jected proposed expenses reflecting an increase in for 1983 are \$1,595,486.00 expenses of \$273,144.00

for this year. Next years budget, if passed without changes next month as presented by Gary McGee, will be \$1,690,088.00 or a figure that is \$94,602.00 higher than the estimated ending 1983 projected expenditures.

Dan Powers, President of YDP, Inc., the management group responsible for employing the local administrator, was present for the meeting last Monday night and explained the increase in projected expenses as follows.

Powers said that over \$200,000.00 of the \$273,144.00 in projected expenses for 1983 over the 1982 budget were classified in 5 different categories. He said \$23,000.00 was attributable to the pharmacy (a revenue maker for the hospital); \$56,000.00 was in respiratory therapy (another money maker); \$30,000.00 was salary for lab and x-ray technician (a person not on the staff at the start of 1983); \$67,000.00 was in salary increases given employees during 1983 over 1982 and \$30,000.00 was another registered nurse on the staff. Powers indicated that these areas accounted for \$206,000.00 of the \$273,144.00 increase in projected 1983 expenses over 1982 actual expenses.

The difference, said Powers, is \$67,000.00 or approximately 5% and that's acceptable when talking about inflation. The projected year ending 1983 total hospital operating costs are expected to be \$1,595,486.00.

The proposed 1984 budget is \$94,602.00 higher. This is primarily because McGee increased all figures 8% in computing the 1984 budget over the 1983 estimated ending figures.

Kirmet Terry said he felt the hospital might be carrying a little too much surplus. Through the first 6 months of 1983, the hospital is showing a \$103,626.00 profit from operations (before depreciation), taking into account the non-operating revenue (tax money) of \$593,620.00 the bottom line (gain) amounts to \$554,014.00.

Terry contended last Monday that this was too great a surplus, McGee and Powers said that \$554,000 figure would be more like \$100,000 or \$150,000 at year end because of a multitude of factors. Slow summer months, a \$70,000 bond payment, etc.

Terry said he was in favor of lowering the tax rate further than just to the proposed .17 cent mark as proposed. "I think our farmers are in a mess financially and we need to lower the rate further", said Terry.

Terry also indicated that he wasn't in favor of granting any raises in the near future. Dan Powers said he would be recommending some "heavy increases in salaries" in the fall or spring.

In other action last Monday night, the board reviewed bids on furnishing televisions. No action was taken. Board members received three bids and are expected to discuss the television proposal further in August.

Board members agreed to work with Fisher County Commissioners in the paving of the parking lot at the clinic and physician area at the Fisher County Hospital. The hospital will be purchasing the cold mix and the commissioners will be doing the construction work. Board members agreed

to take bids on the sale of the old Cadillac ambulance. They will be advertising for bids in the near future and awarding the bid at the August meeting.

The board went into executive session (closed to the public) at approximately 9:50 P.M. for the purpose of discussing an issue involving personnel. They stayed behind closed doors for approximately 5 minutes and when the meeting was opened to the public Board President

Glenn Copeland announced that no action was taken in closed session.

Gary McGee gave his administrators report covering the reception area, utility costs, overtime hours and the report by Dr. V. Carandang. In that report the hospital district issued a check for \$2,605.02 to make up the difference between the guarantee and the \$8,094.98 that was collected by Dr. Carandang from June charges of \$17,774.50.

Richard Spencer Named To Receive Service Award

Richard A. Spencer of Roby, Fisher County Extension agent for the past 16 years, has been named to receive the Distinguished Service Award, the highest recognition given by the National Association of County Agricultural Agents (NACAA).

The award is presented annually to county agents throughout the nation who have made outstanding contributions to agriculture and improved living, says Wood County Extension Agent Johnny Cates, president of the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association (TCAAA).

Texas award winners will be recognized at the TCAAA annual meeting Aug. 7-10 at Wichita Falls.

Actual presentation of awards will be at the NACAA meeting Oct. 8-13 at Wichita, Kan.

Spencer began his Extension career as assistant county agent in Terry County in 1964. He transferred to his present position in 1967.

He initiated a soil fertility program in Fisher County that boosted cotton yields by 100 pounds per acre

with 40 additional pounds of nitrogen. He also worked with cotton farmers in a pest management program that resulted in establishing a delayed uniform planting date to help reduce boll weevil problems in cotton.

Spencer has worked closely with a strong program building committee to plan and conduct educational programs for the people of Fisher County. He conducts an annual county farm and ranch tour featuring a host of result demonstrations.

Among major demonstrations in beef cattle have been the use of ear tags of control ticks and flies and the use of growth implants.

Spencer has also initiated an intensive brush control program on about 300 acres of rangeland to control mesquite and prickly pear.

The county agent has given leadership to boosting both 4-H sheep and beef programs. The county 4-H program now boasts some 130 4-H calves on feed compared to about 30 in earlier years.

Fisher County 4-H'ers have had the champion Angus heifer at every major livestock show in Texas and have exhibited a breed champion steer at each of the state's major shows they also have had the overall reserve champion steer at the Dallas and San Antonio shows.

He holds a B.S. degree in agricultural education from Texas Tech University and an M.Ed. degree in education from Abilene Christian University.

Rotan 1% Tax Payments Up 15%, Roby Payments Show 5% Decline

State Comptroller Bob Bullock last week sent checks totaling \$1,723.11 to Rotan and Roby as payment for the one-percent city sales tax. In addition, he sent 35.1 million additional dollars to 972 other cities that levy the tax.

Rotan received \$1,196.30 compared with \$781.93 for the same period a year ago. Total 1983 payments to date received by Rotan have amounted to \$32,905.93 while Roby's year-to-date share has been \$8,036.84.

In 1982, Rotan had payments of \$781.93 to Roby's \$1,115.41 for the comparable period. 1982 year to date figures were Rotan- \$31,166.10 and Roby- \$9,521.37. Roby's payments year-to-date reflected a loss (1983 over 1982) of 15.59% while Rotan showed a 5.58% gain.

Some area town payments to date from the comptroller's office gave a better understanding of the business climate in West Texas and the Big Country. Roby has received \$8,036.84 to date in 1983 which is down 15.59% over 1982 figures. Rotan has received \$32,905.93 which is up 5.58% over 1982. Other area towns, Anson \$38,982 down 1.2%; Hamlin \$53,741 down 12.4%; Hawley \$7,612 up 5.2%; Roscoe \$16,808 down 10.0%; Snyder \$435,814 down 16.0%; Aspermont \$30,311 down 10.2%; Sweetwater \$335,016 up 0.7%; Haskell \$88,279 up 9.3%; Abilene \$4,030,091 down 8.4% and Trent \$1,520 down 13.9% "Our total payments to cities so far this year are still running about one percent behind last year," Bullock said in sending the July checks to the cities. "Texas was slow to enter the national recession and we are still lagging behind in the recovery. Most major Texas cities are beginning to show higher receipts than last year, but the border and oil and gas producing areas are still substantially behind."

Houston received the largest check--\$6.8 million bringing this year's

total to \$75.8 million, down 9 percent from 1982. Dallas' payment totaled

\$4.2 million for a total of \$45.9 million, up 8 percent from last year.

The City sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

The July checks were for taxes collected on sales in May and reported to the Comptroller by the end of June.

Rotan has received \$32,000.00 through 1983 while Roby receives \$8,000.00

County Combined Bank Deposits Hit 39 Million

The two Fisher County banks, First National Bank at Rotan and Citizen's State Bank at Roby reflected total combined deposits of \$39,422,000 for the period ending June 30, 1983. This shows an increase of \$3,944,000 in deposits over 1982's figures. The First National Bank of Rotan account-

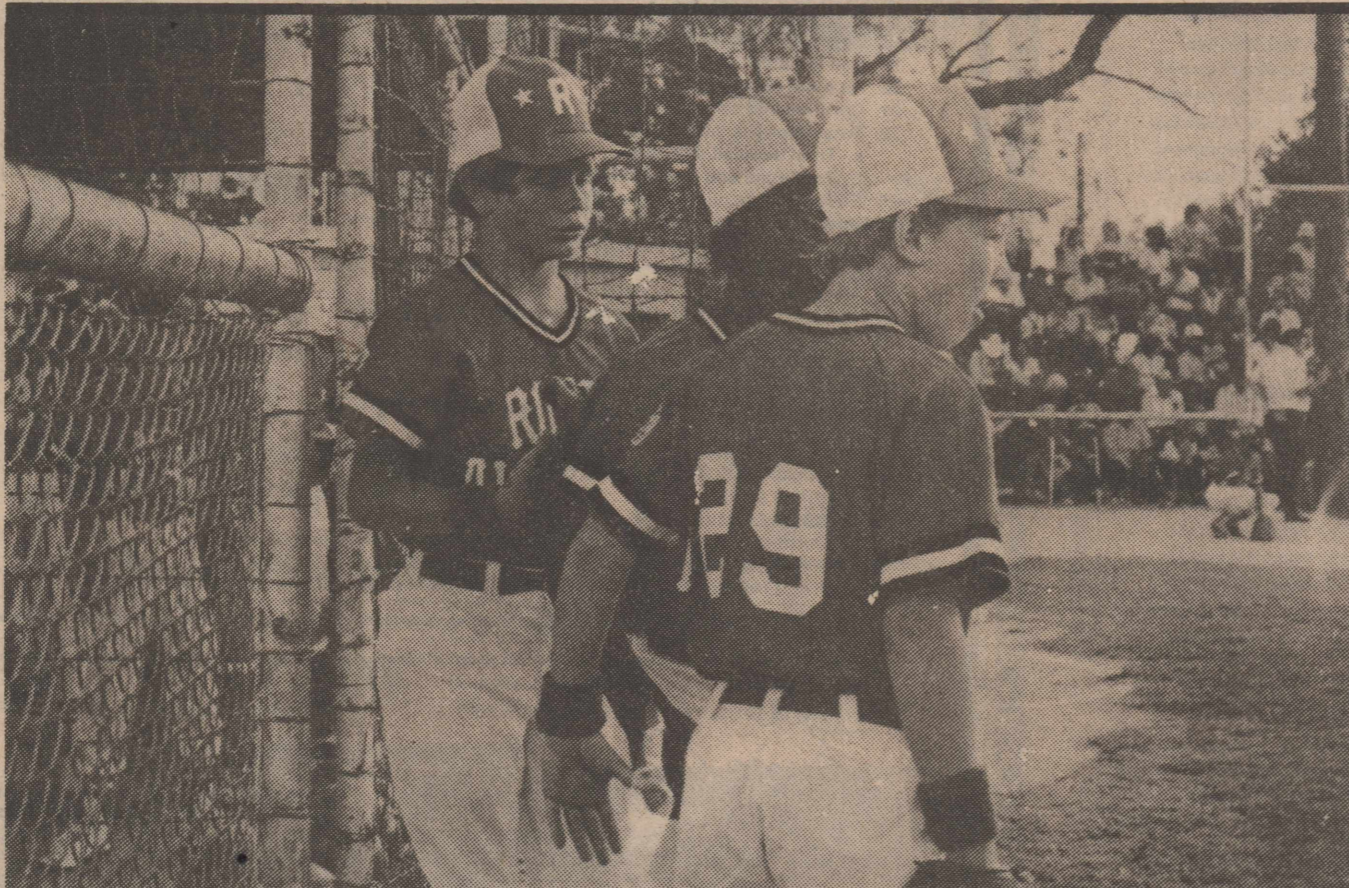
ed for \$2,037,000 of the increase in combined deposits, while the Citizens State Bank had deposit gains of \$1,907,000 for the period June 1983 measured against June 1982. Rotan's bank deposits went from \$24,802,000 in 1982 to \$26,839,000 for the period ending June 1983.

Roby's bank deposits went from \$10,676,000 in 1982 to \$12,583,000 ending June 1983.

While deposits at the two county banks reflected increases over business transacted, year to date, loans also increased for the same period.

Loans at the First National Bank of Rotan

went from \$11,050,000 in 1982 to \$11,583,000 in 1983 reflecting an increase of \$533,000. Loans at the Citizens State Bank went from \$3,463,000 to \$4,971,000 accounting for an increase of \$1,508,000. Total loans at both banks went from \$14,513,000 to \$16,554,000 for the reporting period.

The \$87.36 figure represents a charge of .04c per person times the number of Rotan residents (2,184).

Rotan City Secretary Kenneth Vann said "Their attorneys (Texas Municipal Leagues) will intervene for us in the rate dispute".

In other action Vann reported to members of the Rotan Council that water samples were good for June and that the water loss percentage was only 12.68. Vann said that he felt any loss under 15% was within bounds for a system our size.

Council members voted to allow the Fisher County Appraisal District to make the tax receipts and tax statements as was done last year.

In final action, Rotan Council members passed a

motion to pay a \$657.40 deficit for the Rotan

Community Center for the month of June.

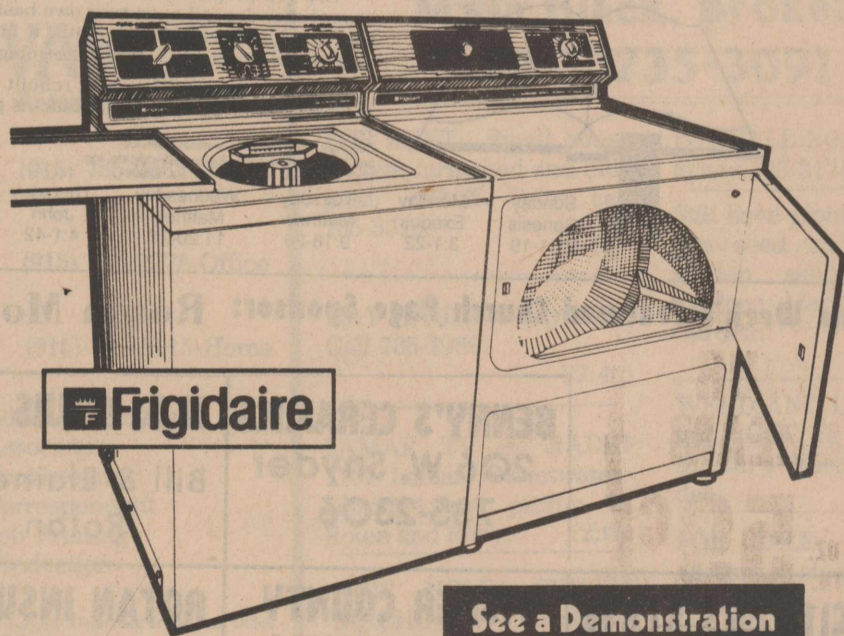

Most people who have operated a small business have gone through periods of extreme cash shortages and have gone full-cycle searching for long-term funding.

There is no easy solution to small business funding problems. It may be of small comfort to know that all small businesses share this common problem.

Bankers do not want to liquidate your assets in satisfaction of their loan.

There are "money brokers" who advertise in various newspapers and business publications. Many of these brokers want to be paid in advance to locate possible lenders for you. Be very cautious of any such broker and reviewed by both your attorney and accountant before you sign anything.

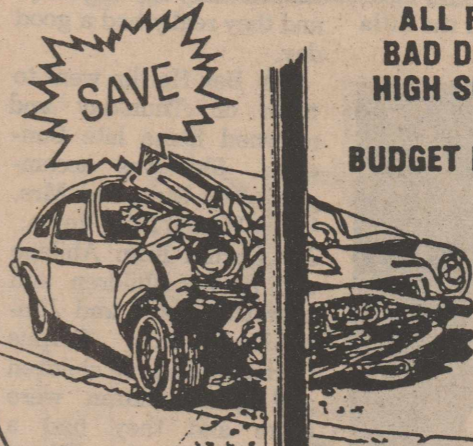

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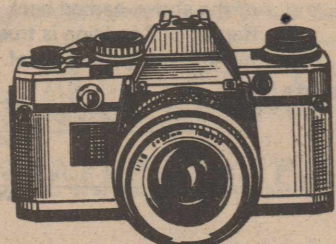
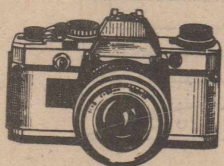
