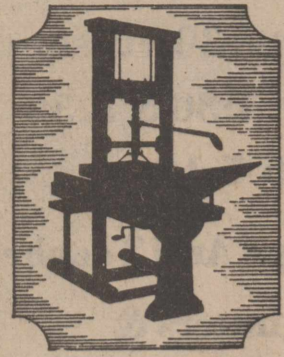
The Open Horse Show and Youth Show will begin promptly at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday August 27th.

Disagreed With City Policy

Police Chief Gene Pack Resigns

The resignation of Rotan Police Chief Gene Pack will be among items discussed by Rotan City Councilmen during a special called meeting August 26 at 7:00 p.m. Pack submitted his resignation recently.

"I was dissatisfied with the City Police Department," said Pack who came to Rotan in March of 1978.

He was hired as a patrolman that year and several months later was promoted to police chief. A law enforcement veteran of 27 years, Pack is undecided on what his future holds. He did say that it wouldn't involve law en-

forcement, "I think 27 years is enough."

The disagreement between the City of Rotan and Pack involved police department benefits, namely vacation time. "I had a great deal of vacation time coming and the City just wouldn't give me the time off," said Pack. Several times in the past the police department has been shorthanded, thus, Pack was forced to stay working at times that he was supposed to be on a vacation.

"I don't think I was treated fairly at all, the Police department is not being treated equally with the rest of the city employ-

ees", said Pack.

Rotan City Manager Kenneth Vann responded by saying that Pack couldn't have had a lot of vacation time because that time is not carried over from year to year, if you opt not to take it. He said city employees are given one week vacation the first year after they have completed one year of employment. After two years they are given two weeks vacation.

"The police department is not treated any different from the rest of the city employees, they are all handled on an equal basis," said Vann. He went on to say that it was not his

place to notify employees that it was time to take their vacation.

Other items on the city council agenda include: the second public hearing

on the Community Block Grant Application, the 1983 tax roll; First National Bank's request for a refund of 1983 taxes, and office building repair.

Appraisal District

Releases Tax Rolls

The 1983 Tax Appraisal rolls have been released by the Fisher County Appraisal District. The district handles a total of 16,115 parcels that have been separated into four categories.

These include Real Estate 7,353 parcels; personal property 280 parcels; autos 2,143; minerals and personal property 6,339.

Certified totals for Fisher County are: \$77,239,056, real estate \$2,982,58, personal property; \$6,780,944 autos; \$244,259,050 oil; for a grand total of \$331,261,618 in value.

Rotan accounted for \$10,442,369 in real estate; \$1,692,005 in personal property; \$1,992,582 autos; \$4,749,210 in oil; amounting to \$18,876,160.

The city of Roby, on the other hand, turned in a total of \$8,061,716. Individual breakdowns were oil, \$2,020,450; autos, \$706,029; personal property, \$555,201; and real estate \$4,780,036.

Chief Appraiser for the Fisher County Tax Appraisal District is Ginger Green.

Lions Tie Class 2A Hawley Test Robert Lee Friday

The Roby Lions turned in a strong performance last Friday against Class 2A opponent Hawley as the teams battled to a 2-2 tie in the first of two controlled scrimmages for Coach Howard McDaniel's squad. The team is looking to improve on 1982's mark of 4-6.

"I was pleased overall, we had some bright and dark moments," said the coach, "Right now the main area we need to concentrate on is polishing our execution and our consistency."

McDaniels has changed the Lions offensive and defensive scheme by switching to a split 6 defense and a Wing T offense. "The players adjusted to the change without major problems."

Two areas of weakness that the coach foresees is lack of size and depth. "We are going to be small, however, I think we will have some speed to compensate for the lack of size," said McDaniels. He went on to say that the Lions are hurting extremely in the depth department. Thirty-eight players reported to two-a-day

workouts and thirty-seven remain, he lost one player to a family move.

Further, the Roby mentor could not list any probable starters, "It's still too early. We had a lot of players that stepped in Friday and did a good job, it's really hard to tell right now."

Overall, McDaniels is optimistic about the coming year. "The players

performed well in the scrimmage and the prospects look encouraging for a good year."

The teams will be back in action this Friday against Robert Lee with both varsity and junior varsity teams taking part in the final scrimmage before opening the regular season Sept. 2 against Aspermont.

Appraisal District Proposes Lower Budget

The Fisher County Appraisal Districts 1984 proposed budget, which will be up for approval during a public hearing September 12, calls for a decrease in expenditures of some \$16,850 from last year's total of \$125,500.

Some of the reasons for the decrease include a trimming in full-time employees of the district from 3 to 2. Salary expenditures for the three clerks

totalled \$30,000 in 1983, the proposed budget calls for \$20,000 in clerks salaries for the two full time employees.

A total of \$19,200 was reduced from last year. Items covered in the salary portion of the budget include: salaries for the Chief Appraiser, clerks, part-time employees, health insurance for these employees, pension and

unemployment.

Only a few of the expenses call for an increase in 1984. These being travel, training and tuitions, postage and freight, printing and advertising, and the largest increase, insurance bonds, workers compensation and liability insurance, calling for \$3,100 to cover them. Last year the district spent only \$900 for these items. The reason

for the large increase in this area, according to Chief Appraiser Ginger Green, is the district is trying to obtain liability insurance for board members and office workers, something they haven't had in the past.

The total budget calls for \$108,650, directors will meet in the Fisher County Courthouse to discuss its adoption.

Film Explores Pseudo Miracle Performers

Hosted by world-class magician, Danny Korem, "THE FAKERS PART 1" is the first film produced by a Christian for Christians that exposes the works of pseudo-miracle performers. Set on a university campus, THE FAKERS PART 1 follows the same path of the book "The Fakers" ... expose the works of darkness as admonished by the Apostle Paul in Ephesians 5:11 and then point people to the heart of the Gospel, Jesus Christ.

Opening in a neighborhood bookstore, Korem points out that the occult and psychic section is often the largest section. Why is there so much interest? Historically it is a fact that when countries are threatened with the

prospects of war or there is an explosion of technology, the expectation of mystical and transcendental experiences goes on the rise. What follows are two examples from the film.

In primitive societies this experience is sometimes sought through firewalking. Coupled with rare film footage, Korem explains how one can walk on a bed of coals heated to 2500 F. We learn that firewalking

can be accomplished by anyone without supernatural powers. The reason firewalking is Satanic is that people think that they have powers that they really don't have and instead of turning to the Lord who controls their lives, they turn to themselves.

In America, the Ouija board is an example of a harmful practice which our society has turned to. Korem graphically illustrates how the Ouija board actually works and its inherent dangers. In one story we learn how a young girl shot and killed her father with a shot-gun after the mother received a message from the Ouija board that her daughter could kill her husband and she would collect on an insurance policy undetected. While this is an extreme case, Korem points out that we are to have no association with these pseudo-occultic practices covered in the film are the psychic pen-

dulum, feats of alleged psychics, and stories and commentaries on why we are deceived.

Electronic hearing tests will be given at the Senior Citizens Center on Wednesday, Sept 7 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

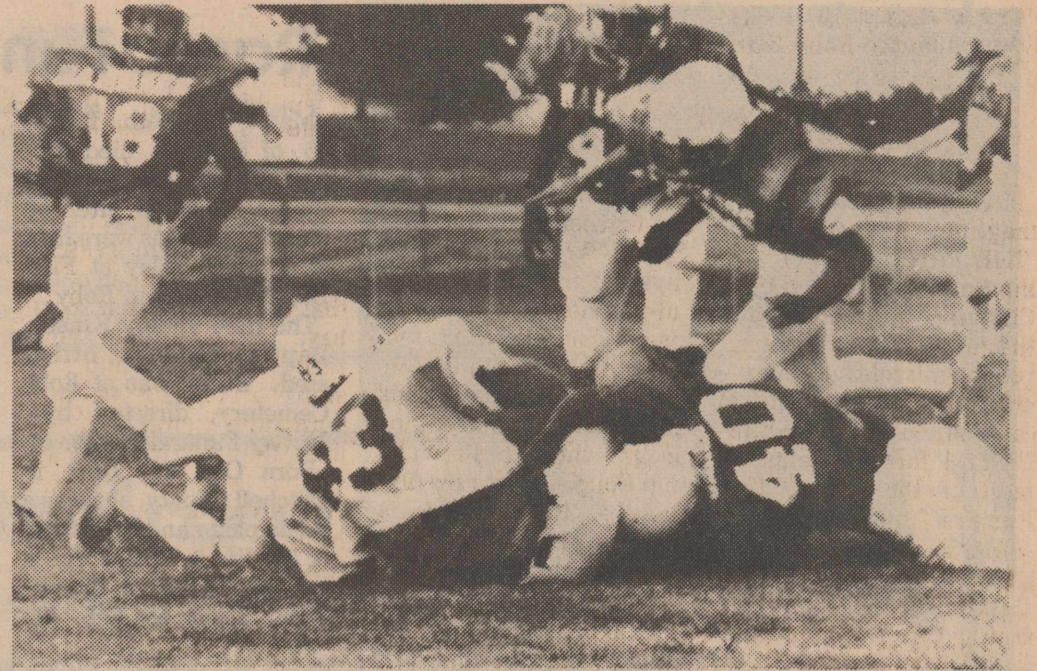
A factory trained, Hearing Aid Specialist, will be at the Senior Citizen's Building to perform the tests.



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

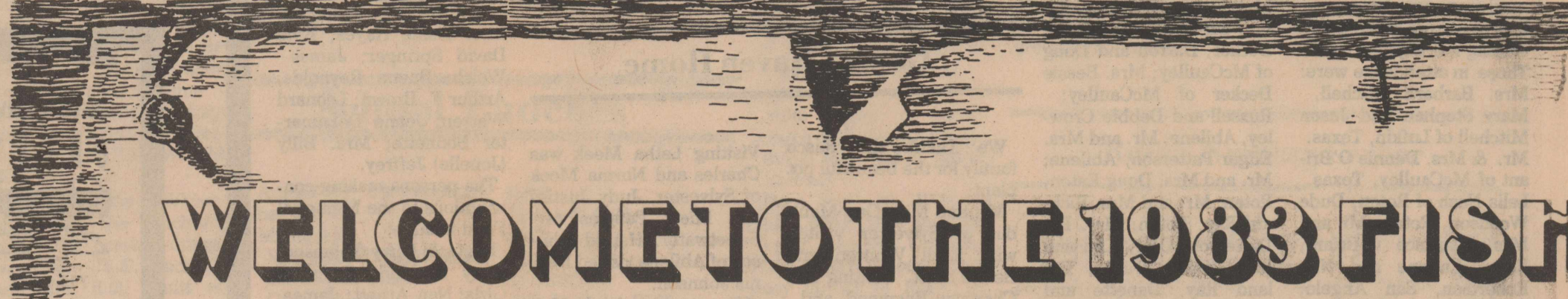

VHAP To Assist Veterans

Texas Veterans will now have the opportunity to purchase a home through the Veterans Housing Assistance Program if it is approved by voters as a constitutional amendment in November. The measure will provide a loan of up to \$20,000 for eligible Texas Veterans to purchase a house.

The proposed constitutional amendment will allow for the sale of \$500 million in bonds for the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program and \$300 million for continuation of the Veterans Land Program. The election is set for November 8, 1983. The program passed in the Senate unanimously and overwhelmingly in the House of Representatives.

The program will be financed through the sale of general obligation bonds with the veterans themselves covering the costs through their payments. Taxpayers will not have to provide any tax money for the housing or the land program. Over 80,000 Texas Veterans have participated in the Veterans Land Program since 1949. Private businesses and the entire state economy will benefit from the establishment of the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program. Existing lending institutions will administer the housing program so no other state agency will have to be created. The program should stimulate

construction of 25,000 new homes and provide another 45,000 jobs for people in Texas. The Housing Assistance Program has the support of our state leaders, veterans organizations, lending institutions and

Texas Farmers Union Lashes Out Against Agriculture Secretary John Block

The Texas Farmers Union Executive Board meeting in Corpus Christi lashed out against Secretary of Agriculture John Block's announcement that he was considering cutting the Commodity Credit Corporation loan rates by 10 percent.

Secretary Block, along with OMB Director David Stockman and President Reagan, were also criticized for urging Congress to freeze the current farm program target prices.

"The real irony in the Block proposal," said Mike Moeller, Texas Farmers Union President from Hays County, "is that for the last 2½ years, the Reagan Administration has been assuring us that their programs will raise market prices for farmer's products so high that the government won't need to spend a dime on price support programs."

"Remember," Moeller continued, "that the loan and target prices are

merely 'safety nets' that insure a farmer will recoup some of his losses during periods of low market prices. When prices in the marketplace exceed these low safety net levels, the farmer receives no government support and the American taxpayer saves money. The fact that the Administration is concerned about these safety net devices proves that their farm programs have, by their own admission, been miserable failures.

"Now is the time for farm programs to be improved, not weakened as Secretary Block has recommended," Moeller added. "If the Reagan Administration wins out on this one, thousands of family farmers will be driven from their land. The damaging repercussions will be felt throughout the whole economy." The TFU Executive Board contended that reducing price supports would "only compound the present

problems in agriculture and the business commu-

Texas crude oil production totaled 72,307,166 barrels in May, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace.

This figure compares with reported April production totaling, 71,105,079 barrels and May 1982 production of 74,392,114 barrels.

Texas oil production averaged 2,332,490 barrels daily in May, down from 2,370,169 barrels in April and down from 2,399,746 barrels daily in May 1982.

The May production allowable totaled 95,172,141 barrels.

The preliminary May summary indicated Texas oil production was 24.2 percent under the allowable for the month.

The state's top producing counties in May were Pecos, 4,269,084 barrels; Yoakum, 3,778,652 barrels; Ector, 3,741,803 barrels; Gaines, 3,733,751 barrels; Gregg, 3,247,020 barrels; Andrews, 3,214,718 barrels; Hockley, 3,186,071 barrels; Scurry, 2,568,795 barrels; Crane, 2,187,956 barrels; and Refugio, 1,913,528 barrels.

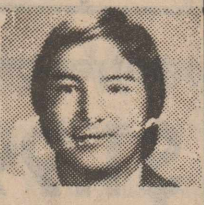

Tax Planning by Gerald Rodgers, CPA



ALTERNATIVE MINIMUM TAX COMPLICATED-DON'T GET TRAPPED

Good tax planning usually involves sheltering some of your income via long-term capital gains, accelerated depreciation, investing in all-savers certificates, etc. Such items are given favorable tax treatment and are therefore called "tax preference items."

Taxpayers with large amounts of "tax preference items" may find themselves subject to the expanded alternative minimum tax (AMT) and find that the favorable tax treatment they so aggressively sought is diminished considerably.

Generally, here's how the new AMT is calculated. You begin with adjusted gross income and add to it the so-called tax preference items: your capital gain deduction (the 60% you exclude from regular tax), interest from all-savers certificates, the \$100/\$200 dividend exclusion, the bargain element of incentive stock options, certain accelerated depreciation, percentage depletion, intangible drilling costs, and others.

From this total, you subtract an exemption, \$30,000 if you're single, \$40,000 if you're married filing a joint return, plus your charitable contributions, your home mortgage interest, casualty losses, medical expenses exceeding 10% of adjusted income, other interest to the extent of total net investment income and a few other miscellaneous deductions.

The balance is your "alternative minimum taxable income" subject to a 20% tax rate. If the tax so calculated is larger than your regular income tax, you are required to pay the higher amount. Very few credits can be used to offset the AMT, so don't count on sizeable investment credits, targeted jobs credit or other such credits to eliminate this tax.

The AMT is one of the most complicated provisions in the tax law. If you think you may be faced with it, you should definitely review your situation with your accountant.
