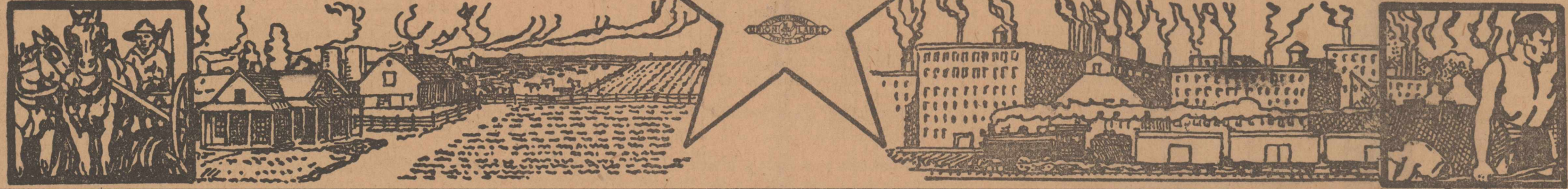

Opening of the Ferguson Campaign Is Scheduled at Sulphur Springs May 22

Austin, Tex., May 12.—Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson will formally open her campaign for re-election at Sulphur Springs, Hopkins county, on Saturday, May 22.

Announcement to that effect has been made by the Governor who said that "the exercises will be opened at 2 p. m., at which time the governor will deliver an address dealing with the achievements of her administration," and that "former Gov. James E. Ferguson will assist the Governor in the opening ceremonies and in all probability will make a speech."

The Governor said decision to open her campaign at Sulphur Springs is "in response to a most cordial invitation extended some weeks ago by the people of Sulphur Springs and Hopkins county. Those in charge at Sulphur Springs assure the Governor that a large crowd will be present for the occasion."

Gov. Ferguson called attention to the fact that "Gov. Ross opened his campaign at Sulphur Springs forty years ago."

Ellis County Friends of Gov. Ferguson Organize to Promote Her Re-election

Waxahachie, Texas, May 12.—The Miriam A. Ferguson for Governor Club of Ellis county, was organized here May 6 with an original enrollment of forty-three members. These loyal supporters of Gov. Ferguson met in the law office of Hon. Louis D. Johnson in the Hancock building, where the organization was effected.

Col. T. B. Jackson, Confederate veteran and one of the largest landowners in Ellis county, who always has been a loyal supporter of the Fergusons, was unanimously elected president.

J. M. Martin, also of Waxahachie was elected vice president and a group of other vice presidents is to be named by the advisory committee.

George Griffin was elected secretary, Henry C. Stone, treasurer and Pick Roebuck, assistant treasurer.

Thirty-five men were named on an advisory executive committee, and names of several women voters will be added to the list, it was agreed at the meeting.

Vaccination of All Dogs Against Rabies Is New State Order

Austin, Texas, May 11.—For protection of live stock in Texas, Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson Tuesday at the instance of the State Live Stock Sanitary Commission issued a proclamation, effective May 15, providing for vaccination of all dogs against rabies.

Leo Callan, San Antonio, chairman of the commission who was here in conference with the governor, said that rabies among dogs was more prevalent than ever known in Texas and as result live stock is constantly in danger. Rules and regulations adopted by the commission at Fort Worth, May 10, and signed by all three members of the commission are set forth in the Governor's proclamation.

All cities of the state are asked to adopt ordinances requiring the vaccination of all dogs within the respective city limits, the Live Stock Sanitary Commission to cooperate with the cities and furnish any advice or assistance, including the sending of veterinarians whenever requested to do so for the purpose of making investigation with reference to rabies. The ordinances adopted are to be enforced by penalties for their enforcement. Any owner or caretaker of any dog or dogs who refuses to vaccinate his dog will be served with a quarantine notice by the Live Stock Sanitary Commission establishing a quarantine on such dog or dogs, and after receipt of such notice the owner or caretaker shall not permit his dog or dogs to leave the premises until vaccination has been done.

Owners of dogs not located in cities are required to vaccinate their dogs under the provision of a veterinarian recognized by the Live Stock Sanitary Commission whenever owner are notified by the commission in writing that the dogs are believed by the commission to have been exposed or to be quarantined and their owners required to keep them on the premises on which they are quarantined.

This is the first time in the history of Texas that such a proclamation was ever issued.

Mount Clemens, Mich., May 8.—Five persons were killed instantly late today when their automobile was struck, head-on by a limited interurban car, two miles north of here. The dead are: Mrs. Charles Rank, August Rank, two children of Mr. and Mrs. Rank, and a Mrs. Rank, mother of August Rank.

50,000 Cattle From Once Tick-Infested Area Shipped Out

Fort Worth, Tex., May 12.—Fifty thousand cattle were shipped out of the tick-infested area of Texas as clean during the month of May, says Dr. H. L. Darby, chief inspector for Texas of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry. The fact that the cattle were classed as clean instead of "Southern," increased their value several dollars a head.

It was said, Cattle certified to as clean may be shipped anywhere for any purpose, while Southern cattle may be shipped interstate only for immediate slaughter, and then only after being dipped once.

Of the 50,000 cattle shipped out as clean, 37,658 came from the systematic eradication area and 12,332 from dipping stations in the inactive eradication area. Although all of the cattle from the inactive area were dipped at least twice as were most of those from the systematic eradication area, many from the systematic area came from premises certified to as clean and passed out under federal inspection without being dipped, Dr. Darby said.

Federal dipping stations in the inactive area, established at the request of Leo Callan, chairman of the Live Stock Sanitary Commission of Texas, are maintained at the following points: Alvin, Brazoria county; Callahan, Webb county; Christie, Atascosa county; Flake, Galveston county; White's Ranch, Chambers county; Whitsett, Live Oak county, and Catarina, Dimmit county.

Actress in Role of Eve Called to Tell Details of Costume

New York, May 11.—Berryl Halley actress, was ordered to explain in court today her role of Eve at a show attended by Mrs. Alfred E. Smith, wife of the governor.

Sergeant George (Hard Bolled) Smith and two patrolmen arrested Miss Halley last night in a garden of Eden scene in "Bunk of 1926." She had danced under a canvas tree while summer Eve danced through the aisles and dropped apples in the laps of men who seemed to want them. Sergeant Smith said Miss Halley was not wearing tights.

Violation of Pledge Is Long Step Toward Party's Instability

The following communication from a veteran newspaper man and old time Texas democrat is published in the Dallas Morning News:

In an unanswerable article in the News of May 2 in which he claimed that discipline is necessary to party organization, R. L. Stennis said that "most men who have made any study of governmental matters believe in party organization and party action as the best means of securing good government."

Largely in consequence of this the financial condition of France is deplorable. Investors like Fredrick T. Palmer tell us that nearly all the gold in the Republic is hidden. Just such a condition as this will ultimately obtain in the United States if party loyalty becomes obsolete.

At the close of his article Mr. Stennis propounds a question to which I have never seen a logical answer, and I never expect to:

If a democratic primary pledge is not to be binding on anyone, then why should a democrat enter a so-called democratic primary?

My personal attitude is as follows: I am not compelled to vote in the primary. If a candidate known to be a crook is likely to be nominated I either will not vote in the primary or I will carry out my obligation and vote for him in the general election.

Health Congress to Devise Ways to Cut High Nursing Costs

Austin, Texas, May 12.—Plans to lower the present high cost of nursing will be discussed at the biennial convention of the National Nursing Organizations and the American Health Congress at Atlantic City, May 17 to 22.

Group nursing is so called because one graduate nurse is engaged to take care of several patients at one time in a hospital, certain sections of the hospital being reserved for group patients.

Young Texan Given Important Office in Revenue Bureau

Washington, May 12.—Alex W. Gregg of Palestine, Texas, has been nominated by President Coolidge to be general counsel of the Bureau of Internal Revenue, a position created by the last revenue act, and paying \$10,000 a year.

Mr. Gregg is 26 years old and the youngest man to be appointed to such a responsible position in the Government's service. He is regarded as one of the best authorities in the United States on tax questions and has been Secretary of the Treasury Department with the committees of Congress in the formulation of the tax bills for the last several years, and is declared to have worked out the technical features of the income tax laws.

He has been connected with the bureau for six years in various capacities and a year ago he was appointed solicitor which position is now abolished. Prior to that time he visited England under a commission from Secretary of the Treasury Mellon to make a study of the English methods of solving tax problems.

Voting Strength of Texas Is 1,310,110 Which Shows Drop From Roster of 1924

Roll tax receipts issued in Texas for the period ended Jan. 31, 1926, as certificates of registration for the current election year, totaled 1,139,226, according to a compilation completed by The Dallas Morning News.

Roll tax receipts issued this year were 56,913 below the total number issued for 1924, a decrease of 4.7 per cent. This decrease probably is due to the exceptionally heavy registration for 1924, which was a presidential election year, and, in addition, was a year of heightened interest in state and local political campaigns.

The total possible voting strength of Texas is a matter of speculation. The census of 1920 showed that there were 2,430,715 persons in Texas 21 years of age and over. According to the Census Bureau's estimates of the growth of the total population of Texas since 1920, this state should now have 2,680,000 persons 21 years of age and over, slightly more than twice the number accounted for by this year's poll tax receipt plus exemptions.

The table below gives poll tax receipts issued in Texas counties in 1924 and 1925, to which 15 per cent must be added in each instance to allow for exemptions. Harris county led the state with 55,676 and Dallas county ranked second with 55,436.
