

Haskell Man Is Honor Recipient

Norman Sanders, a member of the first graduating class of Texas Tech. College and the first former student of the institution to receive a Ph. D. degree, was awarded a new honor last week with his election to membership in the Yale University chapter of Sigma Xi, national honorary research society.

The honor is one which goes only to men of the highest scholastic attainments and who have published results of some original scientific research. Sanders' election to the society was in recognition of his graduate studies at Yale and publication of the February issue of the Journal of Industrial and Chemical Engineering of an article based upon a thesis he had written for his Ph. D. degree.

The article, entitled "Catalytic Phase Hydration of Ethylene" deals with the production of ethyl grain alcohol by combination of water with waste gases obtained from the cracking of crude oil. Scientists of the motor industry say the process gives promise of considerable future industrial importance, especially in Texas. The method, if found to be practicable for industrial production, would produce greater efficiency in the use of crude petroleum as a source of alcohol.

Sanders had been accorded previous recognition by being elected to Phi Chi Sigma, national professional chemical fraternity, and by being admitted to membership in the American Chemical Society.

Commercial Chemist Now

Now a commercial research chemist at Bound Brook, N. J., Sanders was at Haskell when he entered Texas Tech in 1925 with its first human class. He was graduated with a B. S. degree and high honors in chemical engineering in 1929, during his senior year as assistant in analytical chemistry. His doctor's degree was awarded at Yale last year when he was 30.

In 1930 he was married to Miss Greathouse, also a Texas graduate of 1929. A brother, Wallace Sanders, now is a junior in business administration department of the arts and sciences division of the college.

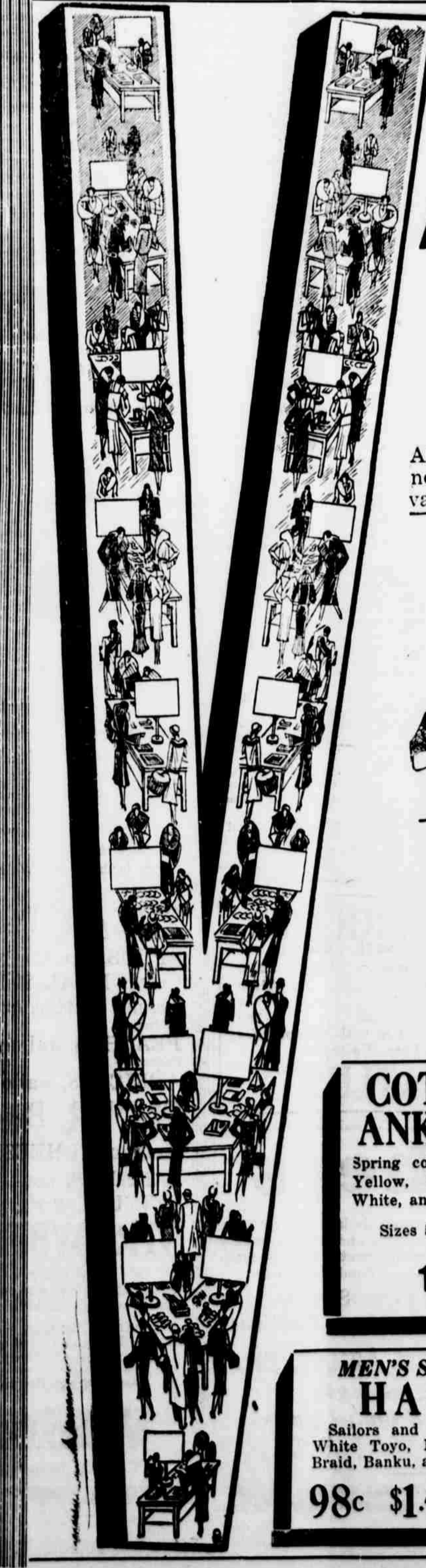
