In State Qualifiers Meet

Hounds Surprise AAAA Cougars

It's getting closer to that all-important State track meet set for this coming Saturday, May 10, at Memorial Stadium in Austin and Knox City state qualifiers made quite impressive performances in their respective divisions at the All-Comers meet last Saturday at Abilene Christian University.

According to Coach Jimmy Rogers, running events at the Austin event will begin at 1:00 p.m. with the 400 meter relay team of Scott Lynn, Rickey Gonzales, Dwayne Johnson, and Tim Roberson lining up first on the track. Knox City trimmed its time down from a previous best of 43.28 to 42.83 surprising the Class AAAA Abilene Cooper Cougars in the process.

Rogers commented that the sprint relay has been steadily whittling down on its time and Saturday was just the culmination of all the work.

Two members of the sprint relay squad will also be competing "on their own" in other running events.

Following the 880 dash, Johnson will participate in the 110 meter hurdles while Gonzales will run the 100 meter dash after Johnson's contest.

At last Saturday's Abilene meet, Johnson raced to a 14.74 first place win in the 110 meter high hurdles ahead of competitors from Coahoma, Brady, Mason, and Ira making a tremendous showing prior to his Austin run.

In the 100 meter dash, Gonzales came in fifth with a 11.1 while teammate Lynn, who did not qualify for the State finals, finished second in the same contest with a time of 10.88.

As an entire team effort on the 400 meter dash, Rogers continued by saying that local tracksters thought their time (42.83) was "pretty good" until they heard that a team they will be competing against in Austin ran a 42.6. Coach Rogers thinks the time his team posted Saturday at Abilene will be good enough to place in the top three, and that's the first time that's set.

This is the second year the four have been running on the relay and Roberson and Gonzales have been running on it since they were freshmen. Rogers thinks that has been to his team's advantage.

He also noted that he thought experience was the team's biggest asset, more than speed or handoffs or anything else...we'll know for sure Saturday!

Voter Turnout 'Disappointing'

Voter turnout in the May 3 primaries was 'disappointing' according to officials who had hoped for greater participation, but attributed the low turnout to the fact that no county races drew opposition. Votes in the Democratic Primary totalled 773 while the Republican Primary accounted for 57 votes.

In the Democratic Primary on the Presidential Straw Vote, Carter received 578, Kennedy 47, Brown 9, and uncommitted 138.

Leaverton urges Democrats to be on hand for the meeting where a delegate will be elected to attend the state meeting in San Antonio.

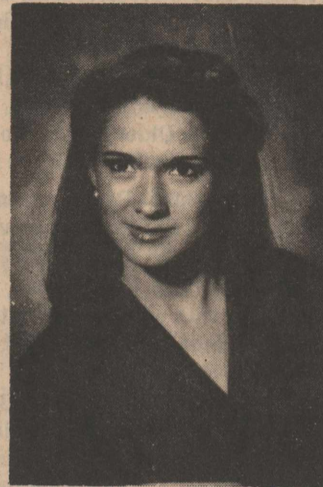

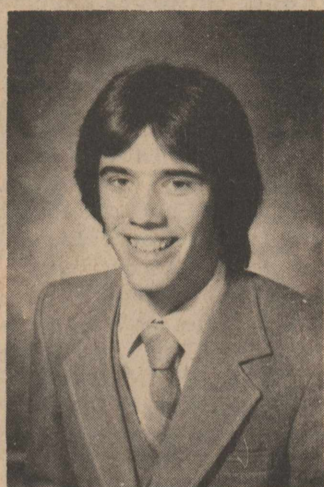

• Less than 10% of the animals turned over to animals shelters for adoption in the U.S. will find a home - the rest must be euthanized because there are not enough homes to go around. If you let your pet breed, YOU are causing this problem. Even if you find homes for your puppies of kittens (and it is hard to find GOOD homes), others will have to be destroyed instead. McGaughey Working On Energy Study

WTSU-David McGaughey, a West Texas State University graduate student from Knox City, is working for the WTSU Alternative Energy Institute.

He recently helped complete a feasibility study for the City of Canyon on "Wind Energy for Municipal Water Systems," and is now involved in a wind mapping project.

The Alternative Energy Institute was established at West Texas State University in 1977 to study and develop alternative energy systems for rural operations such as irrigation, heating and cooling, and electrical production.

Since that time, the institute has received federal, state and local funding of more than \$100,000 for wind energy research efforts, and has issued numerous reports concerning research results and general information about wind energy.

Director of the institute is Dr. Vaughn Nelson, WTSU professor of physics, who is a member of the board of the American Wind Energy Association.

The WTSU student has worked at the institute for two years, and helps with setting up wind stations, developing computer programs and evaluating data. He also teaches physics labs and beginning math classes at WTSU.

McGaughey is the son of former Knox City residents Mr. and Mrs. John McGaughey of Stamford and the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. F.A. (Ted) Johnson of Knox City.

Uniform Planting Controls Weevils

Mild conditions prevailed this past winter favoring the overwintering of boll weevils, but in most of the area boll weevil numbers will be light. Boll weevil populations last fall were light because of the uniform planting of cotton last spring which was delayed in many cases into June by wet, cool weather conditions. Boll weevils were not found in most fields until September. Then, dry weather conditions in September and October resulted in rapid maturity of the cotton and left the boll weevil short on squares and small bolls in which they feed and reproduce.

The Knox County Cotton Committee set May 15, as the uniform planting date. This date will prevent boll weevils from depositing eggs in one-third grown squares until the first or second week in July. The cotton plant produces the first one-third grown squares 40 to 45 days after plant emergence. Boll weevils cannot deposit eggs in squares that will survive until the squares are 1/2 grown.

Research has shown that boll weevils can live 10 to 22 days after emergence from overwintering habitat. Most of the boll weevils emerge in late May and early June, and these boll weevils die before one-third grown squares are present. Only those boll weevils that emerge later, after June 21, are able to survive long enough to deposit eggs in one-third grown squares.

Only a very small percent

of the overwintered boll weevils survive until mid July and most fields that begin to produce one-third grown squares then, will not need early season boll weevil control.

A uniform planting date is an important part of an effective boll weevil management program in the Rolling Plains of Texas. This cultural boll weevil control practice can reduce damage significantly during the entire growing season and result in an average county wide increase of fifteen pounds of lint per acre due to a reduction in boll weevil damage.

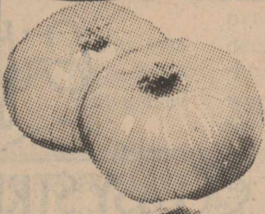

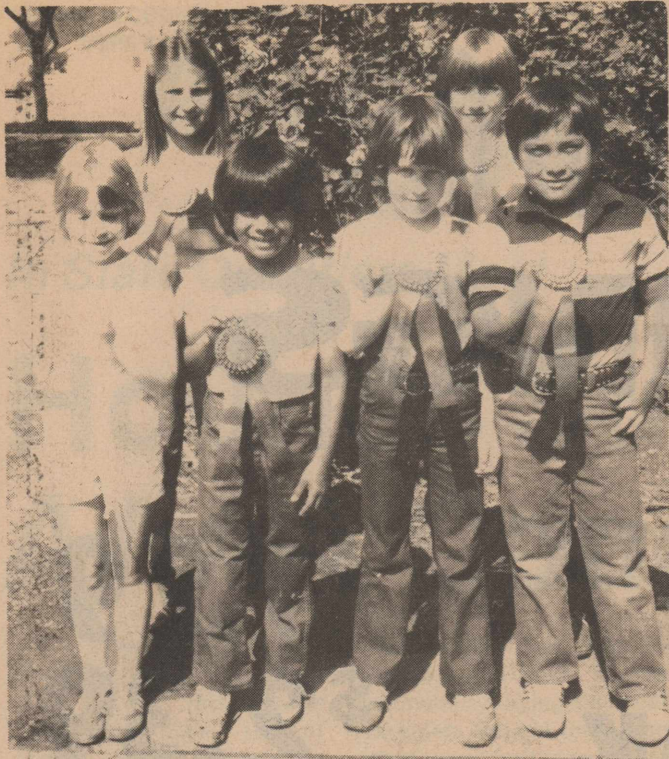
