

## It's Time **To Spray Pecan Trees**

The time to spray pecan trees in Knox County for control of the pecan nut casebearer is May 26 to June 1, according to Jim Mazurkiewicz, County Extension Agent.

It is during this time that the larvae will be exposed and can be controlled with an insecticidal application. Timing of control measures is critical because the insecticide must be applied before the small larvae tunnel into the nutlets. After hatching, the larvae are exposed and can be controlled for one to two days.

To determine when a tree should be sprayed at least100 nutlet clusters should be inspected each day from May 26 to June 1 to determine when eggs are hatching and when the first nutlet entry occurs. The insecticide application should be made when the first nutlet entry is observed. A second application will be

needed when the new eggs are deposited on the tips of nutlets three days following the first insecticidal application. The second application should be made five



## **4-H Aimed At Education**

4-H, the youth development program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, is aimed at educating young people.

4-H can help youth between the ages 9 and 19 develop intelligent behavior by providing them information or knowledge, a postive selfconcept and an awareness of their social setting.

Without information or knowledge, a young person has no basis on which to act. But just learning a list of rules and facts will not satisfy personal or social needs. Instead, an effective youth program focuses on relevant knowledge and the development of a knowledge-getting process. When a 4-H'er identifies what 4-H project he wants to do and how he wants to do it, he is learning how to learn.

Along with information and knowledge-getting process, a young person must feel that he or she is capable of solving a problem. When he does feel able and capable, he has developed a positive selfconcept. In contrast, when a youth has a negative selfconcept, or feels inadequate, he will not act even if he has the necessary knowledge to solve the problem confronting him.

In any youth program, the interaction of a young person with an adult leader and other youth allows opportunities for praise, encouragement and rewards. And this kind of feedback can strongly influence the way a youth thinks about himself.

Living in a social setting also leads to the development of intelligent behavior.

The first generation pecan nut casebearer larvae are most damaging and a single larva can destroy all the nutlets in a cluster. When casebearer populations are heavy, a control application for the second generation will be needed about forty-two days after the first casebearer application.

Malathion, Sevin R or Zolone R are effective for control of the pecan nut casebearer. These materials can be mixed with fungicides for control of scab and zinc sulfate or NZN R.

Persons shoule read and follow label instructions when using any pesticide.




