Meeting was dismissed with The Lord's Prayer.

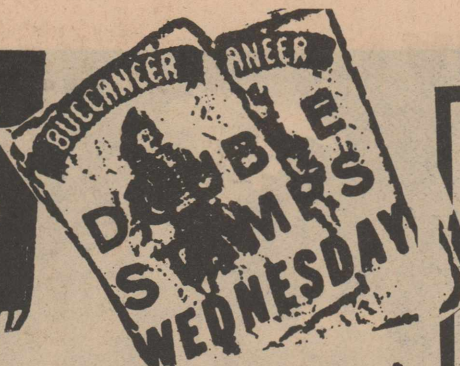
