# TY OF HASKELL

A tax rate of \$.56238 per \$100 valuation has been proposed for adoption by the governing body of City of Haskell. This rate exceeds the lower of the effective or rollback tax rate, and state law requires that two public hearings be held by the governing body before adopting the proposed tax rate. The governing body of City of Haskell proposes to use revenue attributable to the tax rate increase for the purpose of performing the duties required by the Texas Constitution, Statues and the citizens of Haskell.
