

Five County Horse Show Here Saturday

The Knox City Arena will be the scene of the Five-County Horse Show Saturday, May 16, at 10:00 a.m.

The show which is limited to residents of Knox, Foard, Haskell, King, and Baylor Counties will be judged by Jimmy Poole of Stephenville.

The show will feature novice classes for beginning horsemen. Officials hope that youth in the five county area who are not experienced showmen will take advantage of these classes to get started showing in the judged events and/or running in the timed events. The age division in the novice classes will be the same as in the regular classes, which are 13 and under and 14 through 18.

Open classes are available for adults and any youth wishing to enter them. Points earned will count only in the division in which they are earned.

A walk/trot class for youth six and under will also be featured. Leadline will be optional.

A contestant may enter as many horses as he likes, but must declare his point horse when entering.

There will also be halter classes for stallions, mares and geldings. Stallion handler must be at least 19 years old.

Performance classes will include showmanship, western pleasure, trail, barrel racing, reining, snail, barrels, flags and poles. No stallions allowed in youth performance classes.

Local Pastor At Wayland Inauguration

The Reverend and Mrs. John Gillispie were in Plainview, Friday, May 1, for the inauguration of Dr. David L. Jester as the ninth president of Wayland Baptist College and the first president of Wayland Baptist University. By action of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, The Board of Trustees and the Texas Secretary of State, the charter of Wayland Baptist College will be changed to Wayland Baptist University June 1, 1981.

Dr. Jester, 51, was officially elected to replace Dr. Roy C. McClung by formal vote of Wayland's 39-member Board of Trustees upon recommendation of the Board's Presidential Search Committee. He was chosen from a field of more than 60 applicants, and his selection ended a diligent search that spanned an eight-month period.

Rev. Gillispie is a member of the Board of Trustees and is a 1960 graduate of Wayland Baptist College.

The inaugural services were held in Harral Memorial Auditorium on the campus of Wayland Baptist College.

Graduation exercises for the mid-school students will be Friday, May 22, in the sanctuary of the O'Brien Baptist Church beginning at eight o'clock.

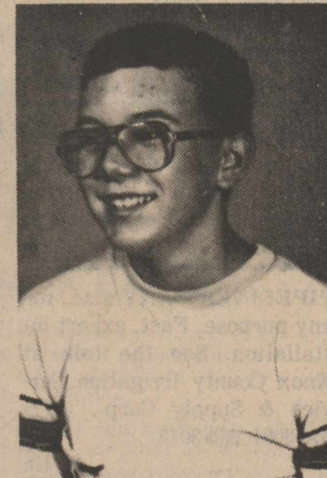

Daniel also expressed appreciation for all the hard

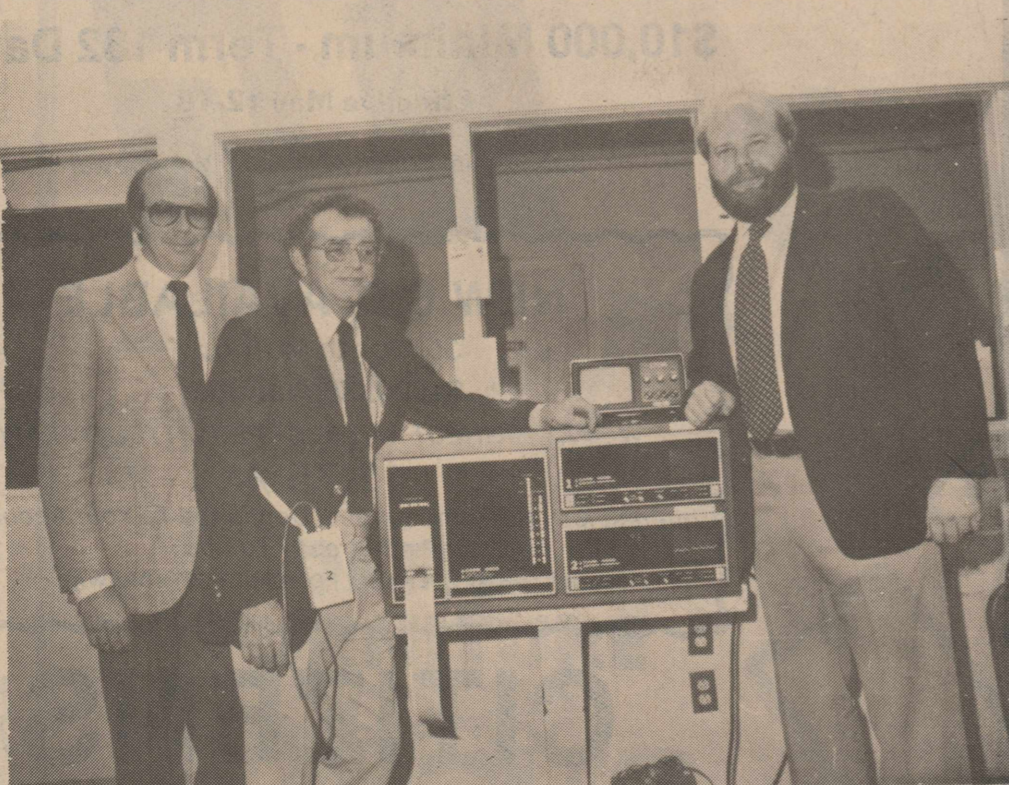

Application Filed For WTU Coal-Fired Plant

An application has been filed with the Texas Public Utility Commission for a certificate of convenience and necessity for a coal-fired generating plant to be built in North Texas by West Texas Utilities Company and two other operating companies in the Central and South West Corporation.

The certificate is required before actual construction can start on the plant, which will be built on a 1,937-acre tract which WTU purchased from the fabled Waggoner Ranch eight miles southeast

of Vernon and three miles southwest of Oklahoma. The application is for Oklahoma Power Station Unit No. 1, which will have a net capacity of 640 megawatts. Ultimately, three units with a total capacity of 1,920 megawatts are planned. Cooling water will come from Lake Diversion, 20 miles south of the site. WTU purchased water rights in 1977 from Wichita County Water Improvement District No. 2 and the City of Wichita Falls. Boiler fuel will be low sulphur western coal.

Oklahoma will be the first power plant to be jointly owned by CSW operating companies. WTU, the managing partner, will own 350 megawatts, Central Power and Light Company of Corpus Christi 115 megawatts, and Public Service Company of Oklahoma 175 megawatts. The other CSW operating company, Southwestern Electric Power Company of Shreveport, will not participate. PSO's participation hinges on a favorable ruling by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission regarding an agreement between the CSW System and members of the intrastate Texas Interconnected System to install direct current interconnections across state lines.

The application states that the plant is needed to satisfy load growth of the companies and to reduce dependence on natural gas as a boiler fuel. Unit One is scheduled for commercial operation by December, 1986. Total cost is estimated at \$675,104,000.

- 2 containers (8 oz. each) vanilla yogurt
- 1 container (8 oz.) Cool Whip non-dairy whipped topping, thawed

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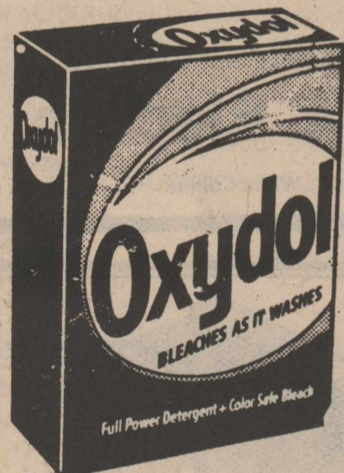


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
