

Local Rancher Is **Growing Kleingrass**

Blue Goose Ranch near Truscott, has established 300 acres of selection 75

Selection 75 kleingrass was certified and released by the Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station. The grass was proven and put into use by the SCS Plant Material Center in

Day entered into a Great **Plains Conservation contract** with the Soil Conservation Service in May, 1978, to do this and other work on the ranch The area treated was

heavily infested with mesquite and root plowing or treedozing was needed. Since very few of the better range grasses were present, Day decided to rootplow for better control of mesquite and to aid in soil disturbance. After rootplowing, the area was raked to provide further soil disturbance. According to Day, this also had a smoothing effect on the area as a side benefit.

Two pounds of pure live seed was seeded in March of 1980. The area was deferred for the growing season and grazed as winter forage. Being a first year stand, spring grazing was limited to allow grass to recover from

Bobby Day, owner of the the hot summer of 1980 and winter grazing.

> According to Pete Elliston of the local Soil Conservation Service office, deferred grazing is a must on any rangeland, but is especially important on first and second year stands to allow the young grass to establish a good deep root system.

> Day and rancher manager, Roy Daniel, are well pleased with the results of this seeding. Day and Daniel are especially pleased with forage production and potential carrying capacity.

According to Pete Elliston of the local SCS office, kleingrass is adapted on a wide variety of soils in Knox County. Elliston provided some results of forage analysis made during the developement of the grass. Samples of the young grass tested as high as 13.15 percent digestible protein. Samples taken in November from grass that had not been cut or grazed during the entire growing season ran 5.6 percent digestible protein.

Foster Parents Needed In Area

The Texas Department of **Human Resources currently** has openings for additional foster families in this area according to Debra Vaughn, Foster Home Worker for the agency. Foster Parents are needed to provide temporary care for children of all ages, and especially for sibling groups of three or four children. Many of these children have been abused or neglected by their own parents. Through the love and care of Foster Families the emotional as well as physical needs of these children can be met while permanent plans are made for the children. Sometimes a child can return to his own home after rehabilitative work with the natural parents. In more serious cases the natural parents often have their parental rights terminated by the Court and the child is then placed in an adoptive home.

Vaughn says that Foster Parenting is perhaps the most important and vital role a person can play in strengthening and preserving our society. Foster parenting is a rewarding job with meaning, purpose and direction, but Vaughn says that it takes special people to be foster parents. They must not only be able to handle the daily adjustments and problems of an additional child in the family, but must also be emotionally mature and experienced enough to cope with the problems of abused children. Then, after coming to love and care for the children, they must be prepared for the trauma of seeing them leave their door step just as suddenly as they came. The reward for the Foster parents is the knowledge that the love and guidance they have shown the child will someday be reflected in that child's life-perhaps in a small way or perhaps in a very significant

closely with the child's caseworker in a teamwork approach. There is always someone to help if problems arise. Foster parents receive special Foster Care rates to cover the child's expenses including all medical expenses. Foster parents receive ongoing training with leading psychologists and consultanta. Foster parents choose the age and number of children with whom they will work. They may have a child in their home for a few days or several months. The basic requirements are a family with love, compassion, flexibility and a desire to learn more about the special problems of abused and neglected children.

Foster parents have the special benefit of a Foster Parent Association which allows them to share experiences and ideas with other Foster parents. Workshops, seminars and individual training programs are presented throughout the year for Foster parents and their families.

Foster Care is not something most families can do, but for a few very special families it can be a very rewarding experience. Raise the shades during the early morning, evenings and nights -- to allow cooler air inside and reduce the need for air conditioning.

For big energy savings during the winter, keep shades down during the coldest hours of the day -early morning, evenings and nights -- to keep indoor heat locked inside the home. Raise the shades during the warmest parts of the day and let the sun's heat help warm the
