Enrollment Totals Are Announced

First day enrollment totals for the Knox City-O'Brien Consolidated Independent School District have been released by school officials.

The overall total of elementary, mid-school, and high school classes is 385 as compared to 391 students last year, However, for 1979 the total number was also 385 and in 1978 was 395.

In the elementary grades, 25 students registered for kindergarten, 38 for first grade, 26 for second, 23 in third grade, and 38 in fourth, totalling 149 for elementary as compared to 154 last year.

Mid-school had 32 register for fifth grade, 26 for sixth grade, 28 for seventh, and 39 for eighth grade for a total of 129 as compared to last year's 117 mid-school.

Twenty-six freshmen registered, 33 sophomores, 31 juniors, and 21 seniors for a total 111 in high school. Last year 120 students registered.

early childhood program registered 48 for this year as compared to 30 children last year.

According to school officials, the totals always fluctuate after registration.

Earnings Estimate May Need Revised

The year is half over! A lot social security beneficiaries furnished estimates of 1981 earnings early in the year; and by now, perhaps some of those estimates need to be revised. An increase in wage rate, extra hours worked, a better than expected farm crop, are* some of the reasons a person may want to change an estimate of earnings in order to avoid a large overpayment.

There are two different earnings limits, depending upon a person's age. Beneficiaries who are age 65 or over anytime this year can earn \$5,500.00; and, for those under age 65, the limit is \$4,080.00. If earning exceed the limit, \$1.00 of social security benefits is normally forfeited for every \$2.00 above the limit. There is no earnings limit beginning with the month a beneficiary is ago 72. There are different rules regarding disability beneficiaries.

Anyone receiving social security retirement or survivor benefits who want to revise an earnings estimate should phone or visit the social security office.


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Tips On Your Teeth

Each year, hundreds of people contact The Dental Society of the State of New York to find out what kind of dental specialist they should go to for care.

According to Dr. Edward Whalen, Dental Society president, there are eight areas of dental specialization besides the general practi-tioner. He offers the follow-ing "dictionary of dental specialties"

Orthodontics is the science of tooth and oral structure development. The orthodontist treats problems related to irregular dental development, missing teeth, and other abnormalities in order to establish normal functioning and appearance. Oral surgery includes a

broad scope of diagnostic, operative and related services dealing with diseases, injuries and defects in the jaws and associated

Oral pathology is concerned with the nature of

diseases of the mouth, a study of their causes, processes and effects. The oral pathologist may not necessarily treat the diseases directly but may provide counsel and guidance to the other specialists who do

provide treatment. Endodontics deals with the causes, diagnoses, prevention and treatment of diseases of the pulp and other dental tissues which affect the vitality of teeth.

Pedodontics is limited to the treatment of children, adolescents and young adults whose dental development is not complete. Periodontics is the sci-

ence of diseases which affect the oral mucous membranes, as well as other structures which surround and support the teeth.
