## Carriker Answers Questions

Steven A. Carriker, the 31 year old farmer from Roby, and candidate for the newly created 78th district legislative seat, answered the following questions for the readers of *The Knox County News*.

Q. Why are you running for the 78th district seat in the Texas House of Representatives?

Carriker: "I feel very strongly that every district in the State of Texas should be represented by someone who knows and cares about the problems of his district and has a direct stake in the future of the part of the state that he is to represent. Many people expressed to me their dissatisfaction with the performance of the man who moved into our district to run, and they shared the common feeling that small town and rural representation would suffer if someone with genuine roots in the district didn't get into the race. So here I am."

Q. What qualifications do you feel you have to fill this office?

Carriker: "First, and most important, I believe in small town and rural Texas. I believe in its farmers and ranchers, its small businessmen, its young people, and its pioneer senior citizens."

"As far as education and experience, I'm a graduate of the University of Texas with a degree in government. As a college student, I worked as a Sergeant-at-Arms in the Texas House, and also worked for the Texas Department of Agriculture. I've served on the county board for the Farmers Home Administration and I've served on the board of directors of the Senior Texans Employment Program and on

the advisory committee for Green Thumb.

"My experience in business (outside of my farming operation) includes service on the boards of three cooperatives, two of them regionals.

"Politically, I've served as a precinct Democratic Chairman and election judge, am a sustaining member of the Texas Democratic Party, and have testified before both the Texas Legislature and the U.S. Congress on matters ranging from land ownership to credit and interest rates.
