UIL Banquet Set For May 20

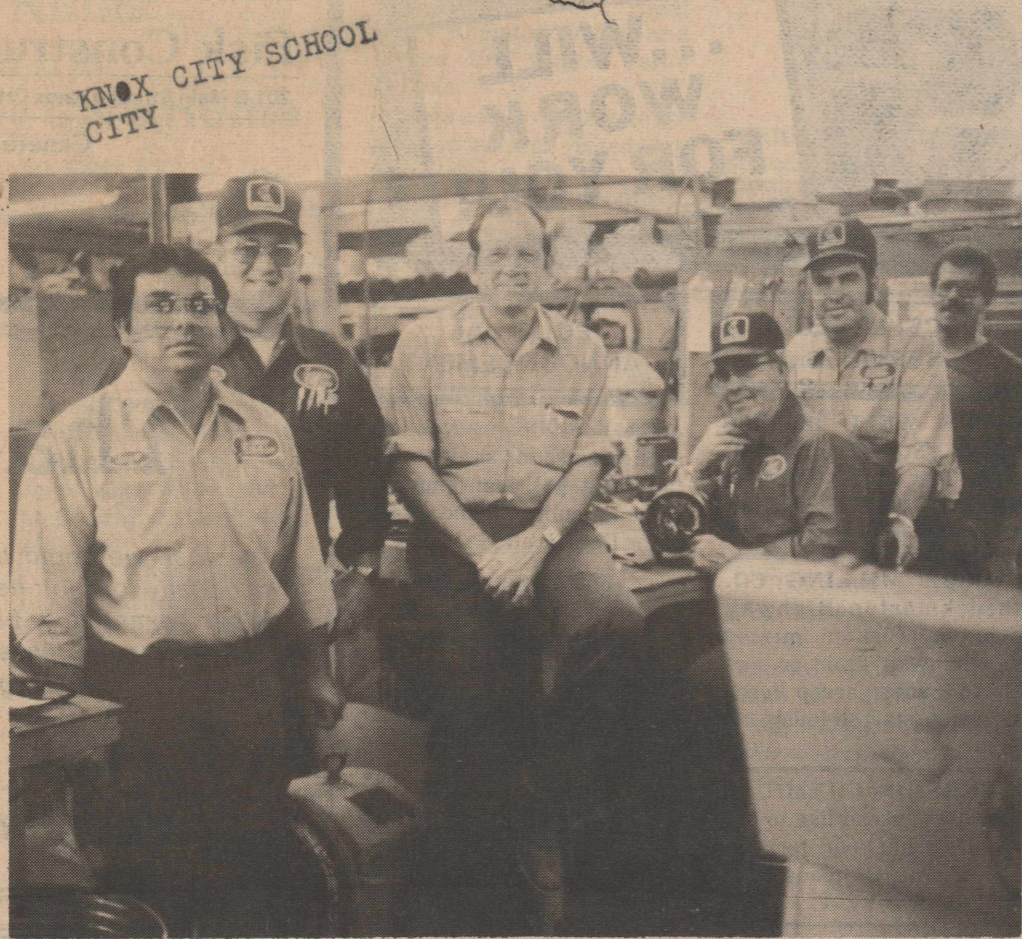
The annual UIL Banquet will be held Thursday, May 20, at 7:30 p.m. in the school cafeteria.

During Small Business Week

KC Firm Recognized

Knox City is among the towns in the nation who are observing National Small Business Week which began May 9 and continues through May 15.

Two years ago the Knox City Chamber of Commerce began a project to focus on one firm and this year Lynn Electric was chosen to be recognized during this special week.

The business is one that will be celebrating its 25th anniversary this year.

Jimmy Lynn, owner, began in Knox City as G & L Electric with Doyle Graham as an inactive partner. He had one employee at that time and now the business employs 15 persons. Lynn began his electrical experience while in high school working part time as an armature rewinder and later fulltime as rewinder and repairman in the motor department of United Electric in Wichita Falls. He gained another year's experience with American Electric before opening his Knox City business.

In 1960 Lynn purchased Graham's share of the business and the name was changed to Lynn Electric Motor Company. In 1967 Lynn built his own modern building in its present location on the Munday highway.

Lynn's wife, the former Georgie Henderson, continues to be his number one bookkeeper and the office added a computer two years ago for billing and payables. She is assisted in the office by Zoanne Felts and Tobie Whisenhunt.

In the shop, Johnny Helms, who has been with Lynn for almost 20 years, is motor rewinder and repairman. Three electricians include Richard Averitt, Carol Felts, and Randy Hollinsworth. Other personnel includes Tom Whitford, repairman; Mike Marshall, repairman;

Appraisal Review Board Is Appointed

The Board of Directors for the Knox County Appraisal District has appointed five men as the Knox County Appraisal Review Board. Named to serve are James Smith, Garon Tidwell, V.F. Thomas, L.D. Welch and Herbert Bellinghausen. The review board will take the place of the former Board of Equalization. According to officials, there will be only one board for all taxing units.

The board will have the job of equalizing all the properties within the Knox County Appraisal District. Board proceedings will be somewhat more formal than were those of the old equalization board. To appear before the Board, a taxpayer must first sign a notice of protest. Forms for notice of protest will be available at the appraisal district office. The taxpayer will then be given an appointment to ap-

pear and present his or her case. Before the board of review convenes to hear taxpayer protest, a notice of reappraisal will be mailed by the appraisal district. After receiving the notice of reappraisal, if the taxpayer wishes to discuss his or her value with Chief Appraiser Oscar Mangis, he said he would be glad to discuss the matter with them.

The appraisal district has received an attorney general's opinion on the farm machinery exemption, and it is limited to \$30,000 for a married person and \$15,000 for a single person, Mangis said.

Order Fish By May 19 Deadline

The Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District has set May 19 as the last day to take orders for their fish pond stocking program. The District has been taking orders the last few weeks and has now set the deadline to wind up the program for this spring.

Readers interested in ordering catfish, bass, or bluegill fingerlings or fathead minnows should contact the Soil Conservation Office in Knox City by May 19.

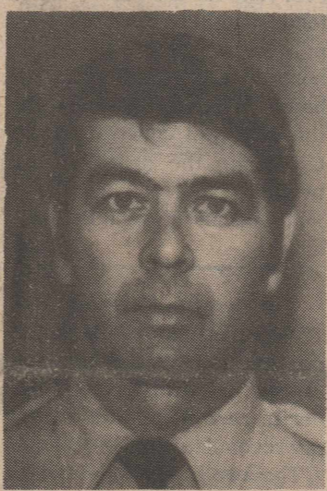

He is currently a patient in Hendrick Medical Center's trauma unit in Abilene.

Knox City High School will have two athletes representing Knox City and O'Brien at the state meet in Austin this weekend.

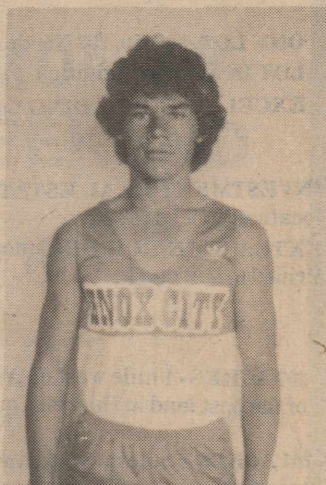

May 17 Is Final Day To Certify

Monday, May 17, is the final date to certify wheat, oats, barley and rye. Failure to certify will result in loss of all program benefits if one is participating in the program and loss of crop credit if one is not in the program.

Officials say to be sure to certify even if one does not wish to participate in the program. If one has wheat or small grain base and does not have any planted, he should certify "O" to protect his base.

Conservation use acreage (set-aside) with small grain cover on it must be reported by May 17 in all cases even if it is being used for cotton or feed grain.

Small grain cover on conservation use acreage must be destroyed by grazing, shredding, baling, or plowing by May 15. Readers do not have to pull the cattle off of wheat, oats or barley on conservation use acreage as long as there is anything left to graze.

Sudan, haygrazer, cane, etc. planted on conservation use acreage may not be grazed until after September 15.

Changes Noted In Crop Loss Reports

"The dramatic increase in participation in All-Risk or Multi-Peril Crop Insurance mandates a change in notice of damage procedure," according to F.W. Crouch, Jr., Field Operations Director of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. "New regulations in effect in 1982 will give rapid, responsive, accurate service to the producer, and increase the efficiency of the loss adjustment process," Crouch added.

Current requirements for prompt written notice of damage during the growing

season will remain in effect. In addition, the producer is asked to provide written notice of probable damage at least 15 days prior to the beginning of harvest. If damage is not discovered until harvest, the grower is required to file a notice of damage report immediately, and to reserve a representative sample of the unharvested crop at least 10 feet wide and extending the full length of the field. The crop residue must be left undisturbed for 15 days from the date of the notice, or until written authority is given by the Corporation to do otherwise.

Notices of damage are to include policy and unit number, estimated yield per acre, and estimated amount of indemnity.

"The increased volume of business and farmer reliance upon the All-Risk Crop Insurance program make it imperative that loss adjustment procedures reflect the realities of the added work load," Crouch stated.

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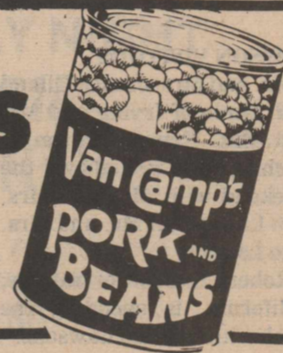


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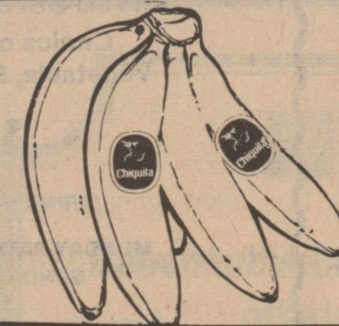
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News Notes from the Brazos Valley Care Home

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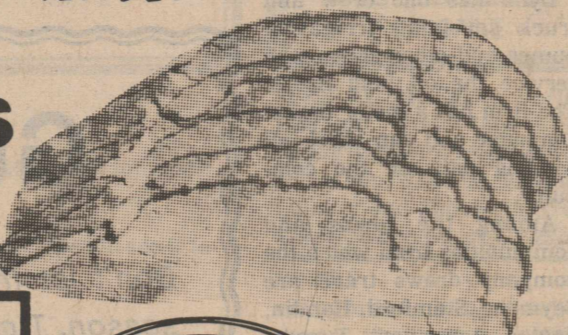

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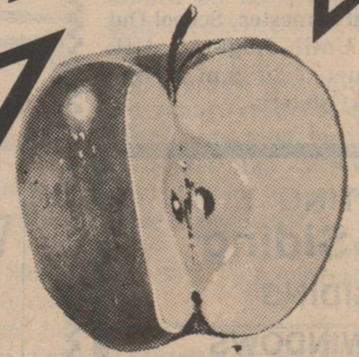

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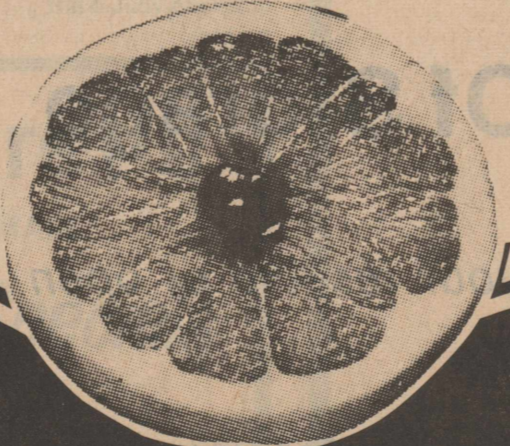


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
