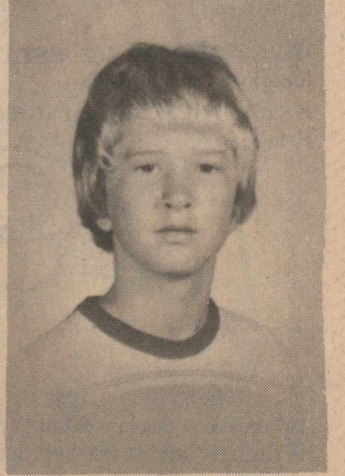
Graduation exercises for the mid-school students will be Friday, May 21, at 8:00 p.m. in the school auditorium on the Knox City campus.

## Gutierrez Second At State Tennis Meet

Ricky Gutierrez, son of Mr. and Mrs. Humberto Gutierrez of O'Brien, won second place at the state tennis meet in Austin, May 14 and 15. A remarkable achievement, that in itself does not tell the full story of his accomplishment. Ricky's semi-final match was the most excruciating one I've ever seen. Of the partisan observers present, Peggy (his sister) nearly had a coronary. Joe and Oscar (his twin brothers) developed twin ulcers, Dante (his cousin, at the state meet to run in the 1600 and 3200 meter races) nibbled his fingernails nearly down to the first knuckle, and I lost three pounds in perspiration and nearly two in sweat.

In his first match Friday morning, Ricky faced Bobby Cain from Thrall who had won second in singles last year, and who, incidentally,

had beaten Ricky in the first round in 1981. This time Ricky disposed of him 6-4, 6-2.

But the really tough match was to start at five o'clock Friday afternoon. There, Ricky faced Monty Johnson from Happy, a left-hander, making his third trip to the state tennis tournament. In a close first set, Ricky lost 7-5, then fell behind 5-1 in the second set. The loss of one more game would have eliminated him from the best two-of-three set contest, but Ricky stubbornly and valiantly fought back—5-2, 5-3, 5-4, 5-5. When they tied it at six-all, they had to play a tie-breaker (the first to win seven points and be two points ahead wins the game and the set), and Ricky, thank goodness, won

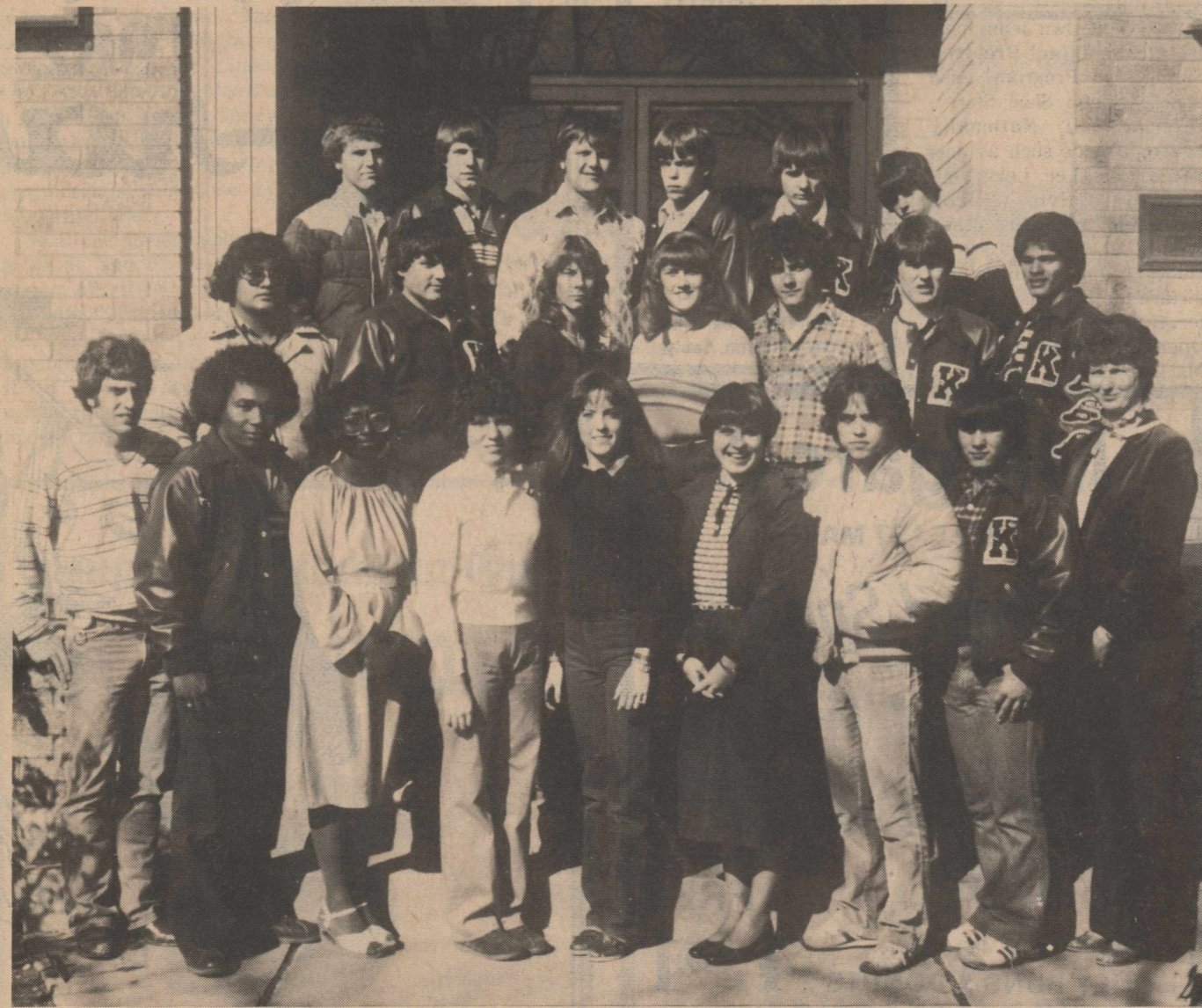

### City Sales Tax Rebates Are Up Again

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent checks totaling \$96.5 million to 966 Texas cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for May.

Knox City's net payment for this period was \$11,216.32 as compared to \$7,958.08 for the comparable period last year. 1982 payments to date are \$34,122.95, reflecting a 25.77 percent increase above

1981's \$27,131.97.

For this period, Munday received \$6,406.98 as compared to last year's \$5,968.06. Payments to date for 1982 are \$20,019.36, reflecting a 2.23 percent decrease from the 1981 total of \$20,476.76.

Benjamin received \$746.58 for this period as compared to last year's \$442.59. 1982 payments to date have been \$1,465.30, noting an increase of a huge 68.18 percent above 1981 payments to date of \$871.25.

Goree received \$1,301.67 for this period as compared to \$391.90 for the same period

last year. To date in 1982, payments are \$2,392.24, indicating a big 84.59 percent over 1981's \$1,295.98.

Net payments for this period for other area towns include Crowell \$3,676.59, Haskell \$24,086.10, O'Brien \$303.97, Rochester \$903.35, Rule \$3,587.34, Seymour \$23,313.91, Stamford \$26,424.88, and Weinert \$559.59.

The city sales taxes are

collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

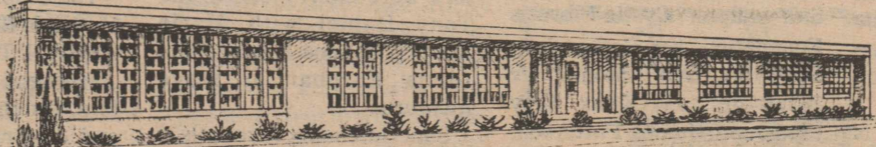

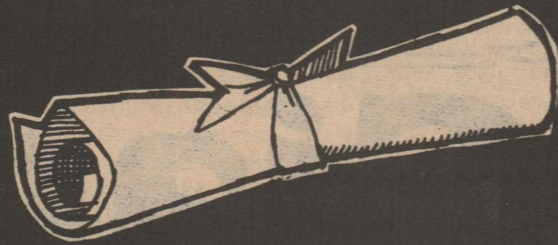

## CF Bike-A-Thon Is Slated For June 19

Each year more people are finding they can bike their way to a healthier life for themselves. Here in Knox City bikers also can bike their way to help others by doing this special thing to support a healthier life for the 30,000 Americans who suffer from cystic fibrosis (CF), the number one genetic killer of young people in the United States. Cystic fibrosis is an incurable lung-damaging and digestive disease, according to the Lone Star Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, sponsor of the CF Bike-a-Thon on June 19 here.

Geneticists estimate that one in every 20 Americans is an unknown and symptomless carrier of the gene which can cause CF in a child. If a child receives a gene from each of two unsuspecting carriers, the child has a 25 percent chance of being born with CF. Because carriers do not show any signs of CF, and because a reliable carrier test is not yet available, a person's carrier status isn't recognized until he or she becomes the parent of a child with CF.

The Foundation is funding research to find an effective carrier test and to find a cure for Cystic Fibrosis. Although there is yet no cure, earlier diagnosis and more effective treatment now means that about half of the children born today with CF can be expected to live past the age of 20—where once such children died early in life.

Accurate early diagnosis is

sometime difficult; CF symptoms mimic other lung and digestive disorders such as chronic bronchitis, allergy and asthma; because of this, the Foundation estimates that only one of every two or three individuals with CF is accurately diagnosed in any given year. The signs of CF include a salty taste of the skin, recurrent wheezing, persistent coughing with excessive mucus, pneumonia more than once, excessive appetite with poor weight gain, and enlargement of the fingertips. A child with such signs should see a family physician or go to a Cystic Fibrosis Center. 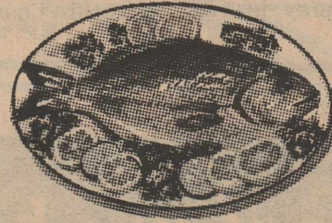

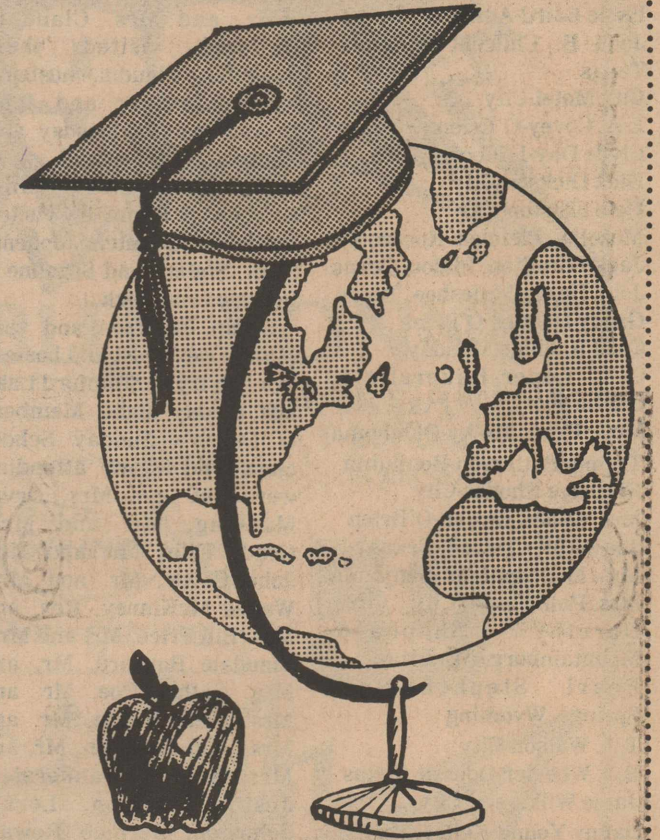

## Leah Boone Wins At WF Show

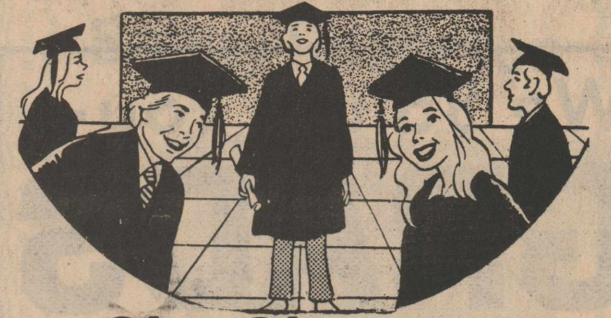

The next morning, in a match that was almost anticlimactic even though he was playing for first place, Ricky faced Stuart Burleson from Midland Greenwood, a fine all-around athlete who jumped seven feet to win the high-jump contest, who placed second in the broad-jump, and who was making his second or third trip to state in tennis.

Burleson won 6-1, 6-3, somewhat disappointing to Ricky and to us (the gallery of Knox City-O'Brien watchers had just about doubled by this time), but then second place at state ain't bad. If I'm not mistaken, that's the farthest anyone from Knox City-O'Brien has ever gone in tennis. And, as they say, maybe next year.

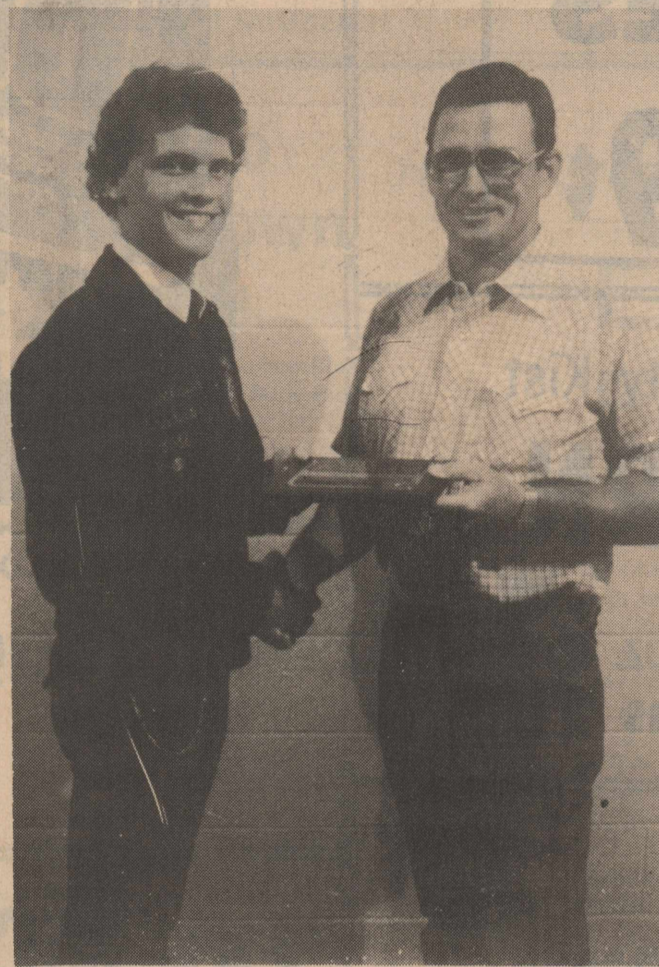

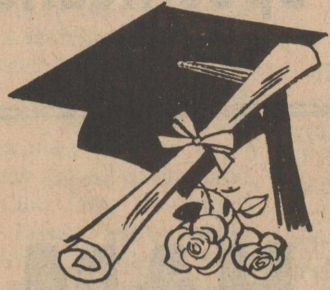
