# **Crop Loss Heavy**

Storms early Friday morning about 2:00 or 2:30 wiped out thousands of acres of cropland in Knox and Haskell counties and damage has been estimated to be in the millions of dollars.

The Haskell and Knox County storms were separate but apparently out of the same storm system that moved in from the northwest pelting some areas with hail larger than golf balls and producing threats of flash flooding in the Haskell area.

Twenty-four counties in North Central Texas, including all of the Big Country area, were under a severe thunderstorm watch Thursday night until midnight.

The storm leveled about 2,800 acres of wheat west of Benjamin just ready to be harvested for Cactus Farms. However, Charles Durham, manager, reported that fortunately he had about 7,000 acres spared.

John Rector, Knox County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office manager, said Monday morning that his office was continuing to assemble information for a disaster assessment report in an effort to obtain some sort of emergency aid for the county. He said some 60,000 acres were affected one way or another by the storms, including 25,000 acres of cotton, 250 acres of corr, 500 acres of potatoes, 5,000 wheat, and 500 guar. Rector said the storm, which was estimated to be eight miles wide, contained hail, strong winds and rain that beat small crops into the ground. Young milo was stripped in areas and acre after acre west and east toward Munday looked like a barren desert where crops just planted had begun to come up. Damage was reported west of Knox City as far out as the Shaparral Liquour Store on State Highway 222. Clouds moved toward town and approximately three miles west of Knox City split or jumped over the town. More devastation began again east of Knox City and about the Brownie Tackitt farm west of

that they lost from 125,000 to flooding, and a house trailer 135,000 acres of cotton including those acres that farmers had not been able to plant because of the recent rains, 7,000 acres of corn and grain sorghum, 5,000 acres of hay, 4,000 acres of wheat and oats, and 5,000 acres of guar. Haskell County is reported to plant more cotton than any other county in the area.

**Both Rector and Bordovsky** said cotton producers were concerned on the lateness of their crop and whether to replant. Bordovsky said his producers will probably try to go with cotton until the first part of July. Others may go for late milo which has a shorter growing season. 'They really don't know what to do. It really just depends on when they will be able to get back in the fields."

Many older farmers say they cannot remember so much rain and wind during the month of June, and some say they cannot remember a situation quite like this year. With the low prices for last year's crops, some farmers are really depending on this year's harvests to stay in

**Hightower's Farm Bill** 

Congressman Hightower charged Friday that intense Administration opposition and last-minute defections from three key Republican supporters resulted in the failure of the House Agriculture Committee Thursday to pass the emergency Farm Crisis Bill. The bill was introduced in May by Hightower and several other farm-state congressmen in an attempt to provide help for farmers going out of business in record numbers. Yesterday, the Agriculture Committee deadlocked 21-21 and thereby failed to pass the Farm Crisis Act of 1982 on its first attempt and after extensive and speedy hearings.

"I am extremely disappointed that the Committee failed by one vote to move the bill out of committee," Hightower said. "There's no doubt that the Administration's opposition was the deciding factor." The Committee held two days of hearings on the bill with numerous farm group representatives Congressmen, including Hightower, speaking in support, and Agriculture Secretary Block and others speaking in opposition. In his testimony on June 9, Block urged the Committee to defeat the bill because he claimed it was unnecessary and that the farm situation would improve without congressional action.

'Although there were three Liberty, Texas 77575 sub- Democrats who voted no, I scribes to The Knox County was mainly surprised that three of the farm bill's main

changed their mind and voted no at the last minute," Hightower said. "Apparently they couldn't resist the Administration pressure. I think this clearly demonstrates that the Administration opposes giving farmers a greater say in their own production decisions. I guess that means they believe that our farmers should continue to be at the mercy of decisions made at the State Department and the President's Budget Office." Hightower was referring to the fact that farmers were hurt financially by the Carter Administration's grain embargo against the Soviet Union, and that the Administration has opposed any

reasons. "Even though the U.s.D.A. officials admitted our bill would both save taxpayers money and help raise farm income, they actively opposed our efforts all the way," Hightower said. "For a long time, farm legislation was largely bipartisan; however, this Administration has consciously played one agricultural faction off against another and has broken that bond among people who once worked together in the country's best agricultural interests. We've got to put that coalition back together.



### **Commission Offers Much Assistance**

Commission is the state's principal authority on matters relating to the vocational rehabilitation of the handicapped (except for the visually impaired). TRC is one of the largest agencies in Texas state government and one of the youngest (it became independent from the Texas Education Agency in

The Commission's main mission is to assist vocationally handicapped people to enter or return to the work force to become productive, taxpaying citizens. In addition, the Commission administers the federally funded social security benefits programs.

Most people, whether they realize it or not, are disabled in some way. Some have relatively minor disabilities, such as nearsightedness or a speech impediment. Others have , more severe disabilities, such as paralysis, an amputated limb or deafness.

People with relatively minor disabilities, such as nearsightedness, can generally find a simple solution to overcome the disability. such eyeglasses. Some people have disabilities that interfere with their lives to a greater extent. For instance, some disabled people find it difficult to maintain employment because of their disabilities. These people are known as vocationally handicapped. They are the people the Vocational Rehabilitation Division ser-

person meet two requirements to be eligible for Vocational Rehabilitation Division services: (1) he or she must have a physical or mental disability which results in a substantial handicap to employment, and (2) there must be a reasonable rehabilitation services will result in gainful employment. Not all disabled people are candidates for vocational rehabilitation services. For instance, a lawyer who becomes a paraplegic can probably continue in a legal

Without employers who are willing to hire disabled workers, all of the training and preparation might be wasted. Fortunately, many Texas employers do hire disabled workers. Most employers find that their disabled employees are as good or better than other workers. According to a U.S. Labor Department study, the average handicapped employee produces more than his able-bodied counterpart, takes less time off and has one-fifth as many accidents. Vocational rehabilitation

benefits the taxpayer, too. Prior to receiving vocational rehabilitation services, many disabled people must rely on public assistance to meet their financial needs. Once a disabled person enters the work force, he or she becomes a taxpayer, instead of a tax-user. National studies indicate that for every dollar spent on vocational rehabilitation, nine dollars are returned to the economy in taxes. Vocational rehabilitation is not a handout program. It is one of the few government programs actually returning money to the public coffers through its successfully rehabilitated clients.

The real value of the vocational rehabilitation program cannot be counted in dollars and cents. Selfesteem cannot be bought at any price. Most disabled people, when they enter or return to the work force, gain a feeling of self-respect, achievement and pride.

Vocational Rehabilitation Division has been serving disabled Texans since 1929. Then a part of the State Department of Education, the division's primary purpose was to serve disabled veterans returning home from World War I. Through the years, the division has expanded to meet the needs of an ever increasing number of disabled







Students To **Lose Some** SS Benefits

Recent legilation made a number of changes in Social Security benefits. One change affects college and other postsecondary students between the ages of 18 and 22 who are receiving benefits on the record of a retired, deceased or disabled parent. A postsecondary school is a college, university, or approved vocational school.

Under the old law, these students could receive Social Security benefits as long as they were full-time students. unmarried, and under age 22. The new law is gradually phasing out these benefits. By April, 1985, the only students eligible for benefits will be those under age 19 in high school, junior high sch. or elementary. Children under age 18 will continue to receive benefits regardless of their student status.

Those student beneficiaries who were entitled to a check for August, 1981, and who were in full-time attendance before May, 1982, in a postsecondary school will continue to receive benefits until they marry, reach 22 or are no longer in full-time attendance. However, beginning in 1982, no benefits will be paid for May, June, July or August and these students will not receive any cost-of-living increase. In addition, these students' benefits will be reduced by 25 percent each September when the checks

A student 18 or over who did not receive a Social Security check for August, 1981, or who was not in full-time attendance at a college or other post-secondary school before May, 1982, will not be entitled to student benefits after July, 1982, unless that student is under age 19 and in full-time attendance at a high school, junior high or elementary school. These students will be paid under the old law through July, 1982.
