Care Home Sells To Wichita Falls Firm

The Texas Health Facilities Commission in Austin on Friday decided not to stand in the way of a Wichita Falls firm that plans to buy the Brazos Valley Care Home in

Knox City in August. The commission said Cotru, Inc., is not required to demonstrate a need for operating the nursing home before it can purchase Brazos

Valley Care Home on August 1, 1982, from Brazos Valley Care Home, Inc.

Cotru officials said they plan to lease the 70-bed nursing home to their operating agent, Truco Properties, Inc., also of Wichita Falls.

The commission also ruled that Truco officials are not required to receive a certificate or need before leasing the facility.

Truco, under a contract with Cotru, will lease the nursing home.

The nursing facility was built in Knox City by its present owners, Joe Averitt, Sammie Carpenter, Bud Carver, Otis Harbert, the late Charles Reese, and L.M. Williams.

The News will have a more detailed story on the sale after the effective date.

Knox County commissioners court met at 10:00 a.m. on Monday, June 14, in regular session. Members present were H.T. Melton, county judge; Billy G. Johnston, precinct one; Bobby J. Roberson, precinct two; and Philip F. Homer, precinct three. Lee G. Patterson, commissioner of precinct four, was absent.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The court received the county treasurer's monthly financial report.

Following a study of the proposed budget for the next fiscal year by the court, Monday, July 12, 1982 was set for a public hearing on the budget.

Motion was made by Roberson and seconded by Johnston that Knox County consider changing the county's group insurance to Texas Association of Counties Trust Fund and pay employees premiums on medical plan #1. All voted approval.

The commissioners court met with members of Texas Department of Human Resources to consider appointing a county child welfare board and the approval of a contract with the Texas Department of Human Resources.

A motion was made by Johnston and seconded by Roberson to accept the bid of Jerry's Plumbing of Knox City for a four ton heating and cooling unit to be installed in the county jail living quarters at the cost of \$3695.00. All voted yes.

Johnston made a motion, with Homer seconding, to appoint Melvin Lowry of Knox City, resident of precinct one, to replace Terry L. Keener, whose resignation as a member of the Knox County Hospital Board was accepted by the court. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Johnston, seconded by Homer and carried to set the salary of Knox County Sheriff's Department's county jailer at \$10,920.00 per year, under the terms of an agreement between the commissioners court and Knox County Sheriff Gene Nix, effective July 1, 1982.

Homer made a motion, Roberson seconded, with it carrying, to request the county tax collector to place a notice in the newspapers in Knox County to notify Knox County citizens that it would be to the advantage of those who purchase and own vehicles to register them in Knox County.

Motion was made by Homer and seconded by Johnston to pay local fire departments of incorporated cities in Knox County a fee of \$50.00 per rural fire call within Knox County. All requests for payment will be examined for payment.

With no other business, motion was made by Roberson and seconded by Homer for meeting to adjourn.

McGees Return From Historic Vacation

Mr. and Mrs. J.C. McGee along with 37 others from various parts of the country recently participated in a Dan Dipert motor tour on a historic vacation. The group left Fort Worth at 6:00 a.m. on June 11 and traveled through Texas and Arkansas spending the night in Memphis. They spent their second night in Chattanooga, Tennessee, and had dinner on the Chattanooga Choo-Choo, an old train depot restored in the early 1900s.

On Sunday, the group had its devotional and singing on the bus driving through the Smokey Mountains stopping at Sweetwater, Tennessee, where they visited the Lost Sea. Rainbow trout was viewed from a glass-bottom boat while sailing the Lost Sea, the world's largest underground lake. The Lost Sea Cavern and Lake is located deep inside a mountain in east Tennessee. The lake is 60 feet deep, dark and cold and the lake is stocked with trout. Mrs. McGee reported that this was a fantastic journey.

In Gatlinburg, there is much to see, Mrs. McGee said. They enjoyed riding the trolley car as long and as far as they wanted for a dime. Gatlinburg is called the "Gateway to the Smokies".

On the fourth day before arriving in Winston-Salem, they stopped in Asherville, North Carolina, for a tour in the Biltmore House, a sumptuous of 250 room chateau built in 1895 by George Vanderbilt. In this estate, the United States government has 3,000 acres, one-half of this is in order to keep it up. There were beautiful gardens and one could never see it all, she said. On the fifth day, the tourists went through the R.J. Reynolds Tobacco factory in Winston-Salem, the world's largest cigarette plant with some 300 smaller industries.

Day six they were in Colonial Williamsburg where they first saw the film, "The Story of a Patriot" which prepared them to understand what they fought for in the

early days. In Williamsburg and Jamestown, the group visited the restored buildings of the 18th Century. The capitol of Virginia today is in this unique setting. Costumed hosts and craftsmen recall the importance of this historic city known to George Washington, Thomas Jefferson and other greats. The seventh day, they went to the Old Blandford Church, built in 1735. 

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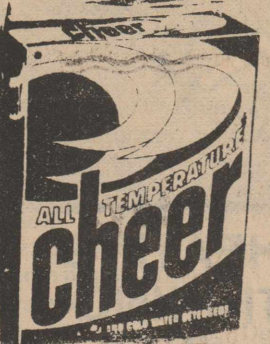

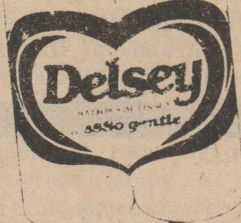
