

Round-Up Chairmen Are Named

J.C. (Togo) Moorhouse and Tom Moorhouse of Benjamin and Lee Smith of Knox City have been appointed Knox County chairmen along with J.J. Gibson of Guthrie as King County chairman for Cattleman's Round-Up for Crippled Children, according to Jim Alexander, general Round-Up chairman. The Cattleman's Round-Up for Crippled Children benefits the West Texas Rehabilitation Center with campuses in Abilene, San Angelo, and Snyder, stated Shelley V. Smith, WTRC's Executive Director.

"Livestock donated by ranchmen are collected at a designated point in each community and transported free to the auction site," Alexander explained. "The county chairman's role is to make a personal pledge, then ask friends and neighbors to join them in the annual CRCC drive."

Sales of livestock are converted to dollars and the amount provides care for about 10,000 handicapped persons throughout the Southwest at Rehab campuses.

Scheduled sales include Abilene Auction, September 27; Abilene horse sale, October 2; Junction sheep and goat sale, October 4; Coleman sale, October 6, and Brownwood sale, November 3.

Jim Franklin of San Angelo is CRCC co-chairman in the Southwest region. Midwest Feedyards in San Angelo serves as the regional collection point.

CRCC is now 22 years old. The idea began in Bronte on the late Conda Wylie's Fort Chadbourne Ranch. He came to Smith with the suggestion that 20 top steers be cut from his herd and sold to help defray operational expenses of WTRC.

The results speak for themselves. Today WTRC reaches out to all handicapped in the Southwest. With a goal for treating the whole patient rather than just the handicap, services offered include physical therapy, social services, psychology, orthotics, diagnostic services, educational, adaptive equipment shops, audiology, medical clinics, genetic counseling and transportation.

Mistakes Down KC

The Knox City Greyhounds did a lot of things right in the second half of their game Friday night with the Albany Lions in Greyhound Stadium. Unfortunately, the game was decided in the first half.

With the aid of a break and some heads up playing the Hounds made a game of it before falling 27-18 to the Lions.

Some mixups in coverage by the secondary and excellent passing by the Lion quarterback led to the first score on their second possession.

Following a fumble recovery, the Lions set up on the Hounds 34 yard line. Five plays later, three of their passes led to an eight yard pass for a Lion touchdown. The kick was good to make the score 0-7 with 2:36 left in the first quarter.

The Hounds started moving the ball on their next possession until a pass was intercepted by the Albany team and returned to the Hound 46. Three plays later, the Lion QB kept the ball around the right side of an 18 yard touchdown run. The try for the extra point was wide so the score remained 0-13 with only 35 seconds gone in the second quarter.

On the kickoff by Albany, Wayne Hutchinson gathered in the ball on his own five yard line. Fifteen seconds later behind some excellent blocks, he was into the Lion end zone for a touchdown. The pass attempt for the extra point was no good. Score 6-13.

The Hound defense then stopped Albany the next time they had the ball. Following the punt by the Lions, the

Hounds fumbled the ball.

On the fourth play by the Lions, Kevin Eaton knocked the ball loose from the quarterback. An alert Chad Whitley caught the ball before it touched the ground and ran 55 yards for the Hounds second touchdown. Again the try for the extra point failed. Score 12-13 with 6:47 left in the first half.

A good run back by the Lions and two penalties by the Hounds set the stage for the Lion halfback to run 26 yards for a touchdown with 5:17 left in the half.

The Hounds then went on a ten play drive with Ricky Gutierrez and James Earl Stafford combining for 66 yards, Gutierrez carrying the last 11 for a touchdown. Again a pass attempt failed. Score 18-20 with 1:10 left in the half.

The next series of downs by the Lions was something of horror for the Hounds as a 51 yard pass play was completed along with a 29 yard pass for a touchdown for the Lions with only five seconds on the clock.

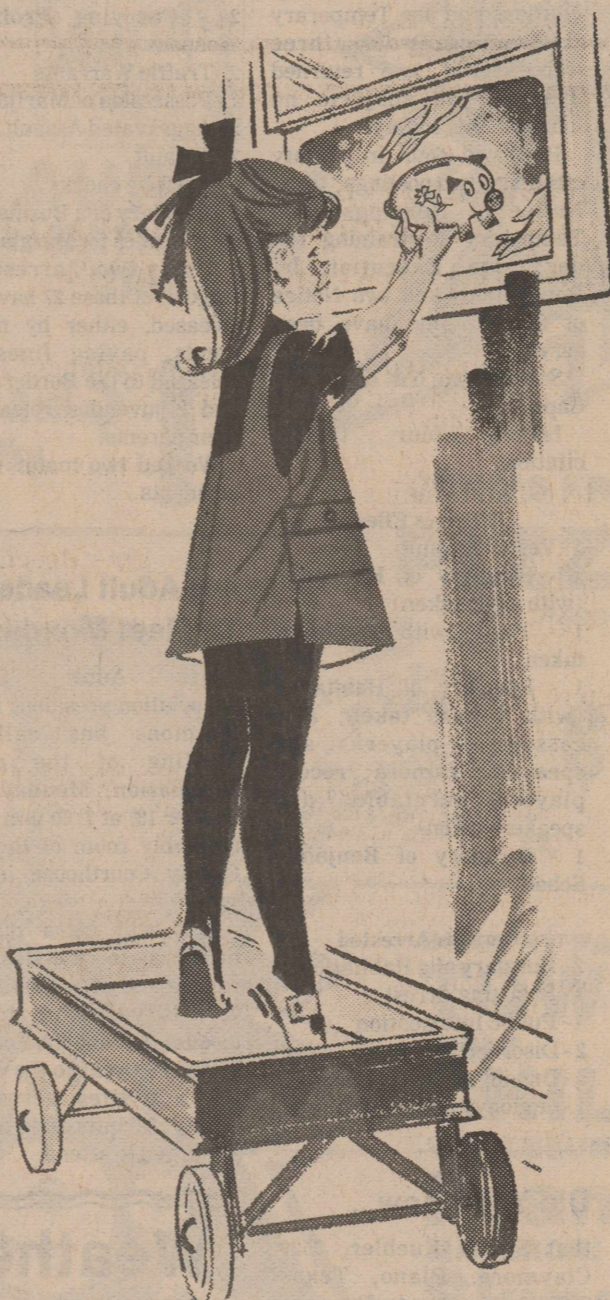

Deadline For All-Risk Wheat Insurance Near

September 15 is the last date on which applications will be accepted for All-Risk insurance policies on 1983-crop wheat. All-Risk Crop Insurance Field Operations Director F.W. "Ted" Crouch, Jr. says that a list of local agents who offer the insurance can be obtained by contacting the county ASCS office.

Crouch says that the number of applications received to date and the interest expressed by wheat growers suggests that the amount of insurance in force will be a record high. "One major reason," Crouch notes, "is the continuing increase in crop production costs. Many wheat growers simply do not have the necessary cash reserves or additional borrowing capability to take a chance on losing the money that they will have invested in their crops."

"Another reason," the insurance official contends, "is the reduced cost of purchasing insurance." The federal government, in an effort to encourage participation in the program, pays up to 30% of the cost of the protection. Anticipated

sign-up also is expected to be higher because a growing number of lenders are requiring or suggesting that borrowers carry at least enough coverage to provide for repayment of production loans.

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Some Eligible For Cooling Payments

Austin -- Some low-income Texans may be eligible for help with their summer cooling bills, if they haven't already received a Home Energy Assistance payment, a state official said.

"We need to hear from those low-income households which haven't filled out the Home Energy Assistance program questionnaire we mailed to them," said commissioner Marlin W. Johnston of the Texas Department of Human Resources.

Those eligible for the cooling payments include households which received June benefits for Aid to Families with Dependent Children, food stamps, or Supplemental Security Income.

Certain Veterans Administration beneficiaries also may be eligible if they are "needs tested" and if their gross incomes don't exceed 75 percent of the poverty level as defined by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. Potentially eligible veterans are those who receive VA payments under 415,521,541, or 542 of Title 38 of the U.S. code or under Section 306 of the Veterans and Survivors Pension Improvement Act of 1978.

To qualify for energy assistance a household's gross income limit cannot exceed \$305.49 per month for one person; \$499.49 a month for two persons; \$684.49 monthly for a three-member

household; \$845.49 monthly for six people.

Eligible households must be subject to home energy cost increases--because of higher bills or rent due to rising utility costs. Households are eligible if they live in privately owned or rented housing even if the cost of utilities is included in the rent payment, or if the household pays only a portion of its home energy costs.

DHR already is processing cooling bill payments that average \$39 each for 266,000 households under the \$12million program to relieve the impact of summer cooling bills on needy Texans.

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1983 Wheat Program Signup Rescheduled

KNOXVILLE, IL. - Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block today said that because of legislation proposed by Congress in the Omnibus Reconciliation Act, he has rescheduled the signup period for the 1983 wheat program to begin Oct. 1 instead of Sept. 7. It will continue through March 31.

Spring and winter wheat producers must comply with the program provisions to be eligible for the wheat reserve program, loans, and purchases and payments for the 1983 wheat crop. The 1983 wheat loan rate will be \$3.65 per bushel. The target price will be \$4.30 per bushel.

Instead of the 20 percent acreage reduction program announced by the USDA on July 14, the reconciliation legislation provides for a combination 15 percent acreage reduction and five percent paid land diversion. The land diversion payment is based on \$2.70 per bushel times the farm yield times the acres diverted. Producers must limit the wheat acreage planted for harvest to no more than 80 percent of the farm's wheat base. They must also devote to conservation uses and acreage equal to both the acreage reduction and land diversion requirements.

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Block noted that any changes in the program are contingent on President Reagan signing the reconciliation legislation.

Producers, at the time they sign up for the program, may request an advance of 50 percent of the diversion payment and of any projected deficiency payment. The projected deficiency payment rate will be announced before signup begins.

A producer accepting an advance payment, but who later does not comply with program provisions, must refund the amount of the advance payment with interest. Interest charged will be the rate in effect for commodity loans on the date of the advance payment, plus five percentage points.

The Omnibus Reconciliation Act requires the 1983 wheat acreage base to remain the same as the base established for the 1982 wheat crop.

Land designated for conservation use must have been devoted to row crops or small grains in two of the last three years. Land use for conservation use acreage in 1982 will be regarded as having been cropped in meeting this requirement.

There are two exceptions. The first is for a summer fallow farm for which the cropping requirement is for only one of the previous two years. The other exception is for crop land which met 1982 eligibility requirements for conservation use and was devoted to a permanent conservation practice. If the

permanent conservation practice is maintained, such acreage will be eligible as conservation use acreage through the 1985 crop year. These conservation practices may be eligible for cost-share payment under the Agricultural Conservation Program.

Neither cross compliance nor offsetting compliance will apply to the 1983 wheat program.

Block also said he will announce the 1983 feed grains program in Sept. with signup starting Oct. 1. Signup for 1983 upland cotton and rice programs will be announced later.

The 1983 wheat and feed grains crops will again be eligible for the farmer-owned grain reserve program. However, new rotation provisions will be effective with grain reserve agreements on the 1983 crop. The rotation provisions will only be available to replace, within 15 days, reserve grain that is going out of condition.

The replacement grain may be: (1) grain the producer has on hand, (2) grain which is purchased by the producer, or (3) grain which is from the producer's new crop.

Deficiency payments or 1982-crop wheat will be made to eligible producers as soon as practical after Oct. 1.

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
