WTU Enters Gas Purchase Agreement

West Texas Utilities Co. has entered a gas purchase agreement with Haskell Gathering Co. which could result in lower fuel costs at its Paint Creek Power Station.

WTU has begun taking a small volume of low BTU gas, and is expected to take more when the gathering firm's pipelines are extended to additional wells in Haskell and Throckmorton counties. The Paint Creek plant is on Lake Stamford in southeastern Haskell County.

The gas is cheaper than WTU's main supply, but is of lower quality, according to Walter Meller, WTU's manager of system production.

"Because it is a lower BTU gas, it must be blended with other gas before it can be burned in our boilers," Meller said. "But we are doing everything we can to buy gas where there is a price advantage."

He said WTU is in the process of negotiating for lot BTU gas at some of its other power plants. The company's contract with its principle supplier, which was renegotiated this past year, permits WTU to purchase gas from other sources, and WTU does so when it is available. The Company has eight major power plants, all of which burn natural gas as the primary fuel.



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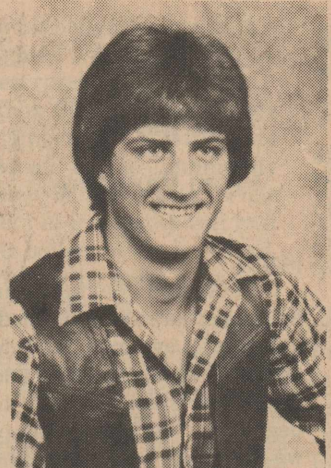

Greg Thorn Receives Scholarship

Sales Tax Rebates Up 11 Percent

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent \$35.6 million to 967 Texas cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for October.

The 1982 statewide total so far this year is up 11 percent over the 1981 total up through the same date of last year. This payment reflects taxable sales made in August and reported to the state by the end of September.

Knox City's net payment for this period was \$3,468.49 as compared to \$2,742.99 for the same period last year. Payments to date in 1982 are \$55,961.79 reflecting a 9.49% increase over 1981's payments to date of \$51,110.21.

Munday's net payment was \$2,098.76 as compared to last year's \$2,932.63. Payments to date in 1982 are \$37,683.45, a 1.59% decrease over 1981's \$38,293.19.

No monthly totals were given for Knox County's two other towns but payments to date in 1982 were \$2,089.53 for Benjamin, reflecting a 11.36% decrease over 1981's \$2,357.44. Goree's payments to date this year have been \$3,317.24, noting a 36.77% increase above 1981's \$2,425.39.

Other area towns' payments for this period include Crowell \$591.51, Haskell \$6,480.38, Rochester \$1,280.72, Rule \$822.37, Stamford \$5,808.10, and Seymour \$4,537.40.

Totals for the year to date for O'Brien and Weinert were, respectively, \$979.88 and \$1,370.38.

proved. These job descriptions are to remain in effect for an indefinite period or until amended. Motion carried by unanimous vote.

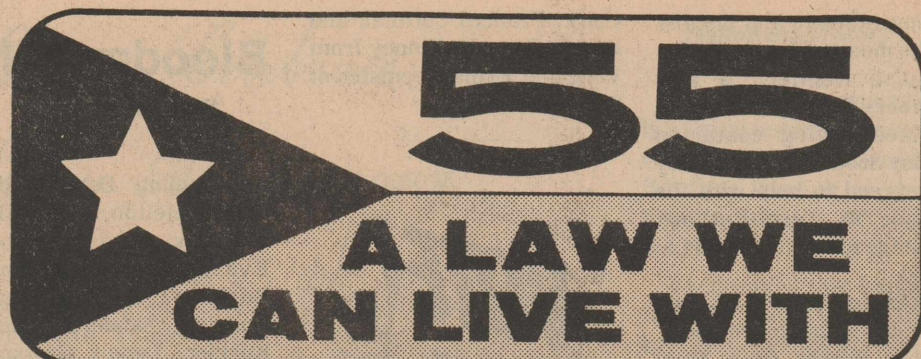
It was noted that there was no public comment presented concerning the 1982-83 budget and tax rate.
