Tech Coach Is Guest Speaker

Jerry Moore, head football coach at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, will address the team and guests at the football banquet here Saturday night, February 18, honoring the State Champion Knox City Greyhounds.

The special event, to be held in the High School Gymnasium beginning at 7:30 p.m., will feature a number of sports personalities.

David Bacon, sports director of KTAB-TV in Abilene will serve as master of ceremonies and recognize special guests following the welcome by Supt. W.R. Baker. A great program is in store for banquet guests and the team, and it is an occasion that will long be remembered. Only a very few tickets were still available at press time and if readers have not made plans to attend, hopefully they can still get tickets at the school office.

A 1957 graduate of Bonham High School, Jerry Moore earned 14 varsity letters in four sports. He was first-team All-State at end and a member of the North team in the 1957 Coaches All-Star Football Game.

He went on to a successful

playing career at Baylor, where he captained the 1960 Gator Bowl team and was the seventh-leading pass receiver in the nation his

senior year. After earning a Bachelor's degree as a finance and economics major, Jerry's first coaching stop was a four-year stay at Corsicana High School as an assistant. He helped author a 39-7-1 record, including a 14-0 state championship team.

Moore moved to SMU in 1965 for an eight-year stay with Hayden Fry. He coached linebackers and defensive ends through the 1966 season, the year SMU went to the Cotton Bowl. He coached receivers after that, including the nationally-ranked

passing offensive team of 1968 that beat Oklahoma in the Bluebonnet Bowl. While at SMU, Moore opened compared notes with fellow assistant Bum Phillips.

After the '72 season, Moore joined Tom Osborne's staff at Nebraska in time for their Orange Bowl victory over Notre Dame on the first day of 1973. Coincidentally, Moore's last game with the Huskers was the 1979 Orange Bowl. In between, he took over the offensive coordinating duties and helped Nebraska to a six-year record of 56-16-2, including a 5-2 bowl mark.

A head coaching opportunity at North Texas State lured him in 1979, and he showed he was an up-and-comer when he coached the team to a two-year record of 11-11, setting numerous school offensive records along the way.

After two years at NTSU, he was hired by Tech, where he says he plans to stay and raise his family. "The thing that has hurt Tech in the past has been the constant rumor that the coach would stay only a few years. There was very little feeling of continuity. I have not only made a commitment to Texas Tech, but to myself and to the staff to build a totally solid program. I love Lubbock. There is no place I would rather be." And the feeling seems to be mutual, as his experience with football and people is vast.

Coach Moore and his wife Margaret have two sons, Chris and Scott, and a daughter, Elizabeth.

Some Customers Will Receive Refunds

West Texas Utilities customers who paid interim rates the latter part of 1983 will begin receiving refunds this month.

However, all refunds will be small, and some customers won't get them at all, company officials said.

They'll be small because the higher rates were charged for only a short time. Some customers won't be affected, because their rates were not changed during the period.

WTU started charging interim rates on October 22 when it became evident that a requested rate increase filed June 10, 1983, would be delayed indefinitely by the

Public Utility Commission of Texas. Interim rates were allowed by state law, subject to refund, if after three months the PUC had not ruled on the company's request.

WTU has asked for an increase of \$26 million annually and the PUC staff recommended \$10 million. The Commission eventually approved \$12 million, with the new rates effective Jan. 6, 1984.

WTU now will pay customers the difference between the interim rates and the new rates, plus 12.83 per cent interest. Refunds are being credited to customer bills, while checks are being mailed to those who have disconnected from the WTU system.

Amounts to residential customers are averaging less than \$5, including interest.

Customers in the following towns, which had denied the rate request and appealed to the Commission, are not affected: Hawley, Tuscola, Lawn, Merkel, Putnam, Clyde, Cross Plains, Santa Anna, Lueders, Aspermont, Jayton, Marfa, Valentine, Presidio, Alpine, Balmorhea, Rankin, Iraan, Estelline, Quitaque, Turkey, Memphis, Dodson, Shamrock, Sonora, Sterling City, Bronte, Menard, Junction and Miles.

Races Developing, Several Sign Up

With the filing deadlines only a few weeks away for the three different elections, several local residents have already submitted their names as candidates for either election or re-election to positions on the City Council, School Board, and Knox County Hospital Board.

With the combined election to be held on Saturday, April 7, there are two different

filing dates for candidates to observe. The filing deadline for the City Council and the Knox City-O'Brien Independent School District Elections is midnight on Wednesday, March 7, and the deadline for the Knox County Hospital Board election is Monday, March 13.

Positions on the ballot for the Knox City election are for mayor and three council

seats. Charles Auburg was the first to turn in his paperwork to the City Hall as he seeks election to the position of mayor. Mr. Auburg is a former mayor of Knox City. The mayor's position is currently held by Buddy Angle, who has also filed for election to the position that he has held by appointment since the resignation of former Mayor Craig Williams. Council members up for re-election are Greg Kuehler, Elaine Lewis, and Larry Staggs. To date, only Councilwoman Elaine Lewis has filed the paperwork necessary to have her name on the ballot for re-election. Holdover councilmen this year are Carol Felts and Elmer Wall.

In the Knox City-O'Brien Independent School District election, positions on the board currently held by J.M. Emerson, John Gillispie, and Allen McGaughey will be placed on the ballot. As of press time, the only person who has announced for the School Board election is David Albus, a Knox City farmer and current president of the Knox City Chamber of Commerce.

The Knox County Hospital Board has two positions to place on the April ballots. Both Vernal Zeissel and Richie Smith of Munday are up for re-election. As of press time, the Hospital had no news of anyone submitting paperwork to have their name placed on the ballots. Holdover elective position on the board is held by David Neil Perdue. Buster Lowrey and Ray Lynn Hardin are appointive board members. Former board member Stanton Brown recently resigned his position.

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Sales Tax Decreases Slightly

State Comptroller Bob Bullock last week sent checks totaling \$105.4 million in local sales tax payments to the 980 cities that levy the one percent sales tax.

Statewide, 1984 payments are running 2.57 percent ahead of last year. However, because of changes in reporting requirements that converted 15,000 small and medium sized taxpayers from quarterly to monthly payment schedules, it is difficult to compare raw payment figures for 1984 with the same period last year, since what were quarterly payments last year are now spread over three months.

February's checks reflect sales made during the final, Christmas quarter of 1983 and reported to the Comptroller's office by January 20.

Knox City's payments for 1984 reflected a -5.35 percent while Munday showed a -13.07 percent. Benjamin had a -7.77, and the other Knox County town of Goree showed a 75.52 increase.

Amounts for other area towns are shown in the sales tax report.

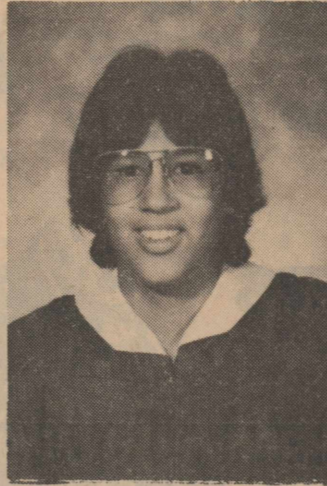


CINDY HERNANDEZ

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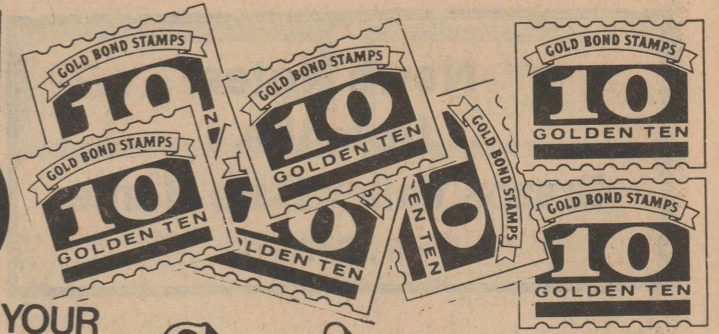
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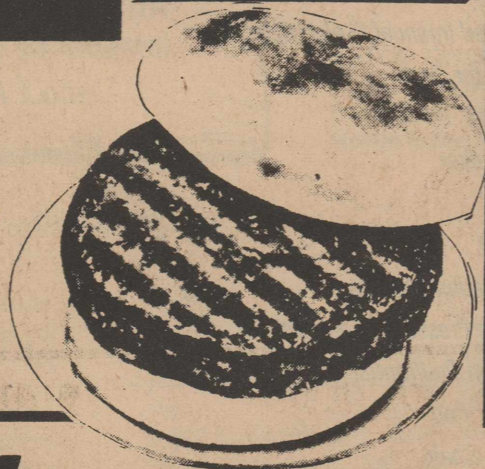
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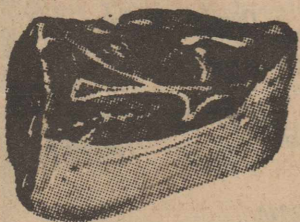


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
