### Film To Be Shown At First Baptist

"Jesus Is Victor" gives the viewer an opportunity to meet Corrie face-to-face - to travel with her through 35 years of ministry in some 65 countries around the world to discover the qualities of faith and courage that have made her a respected and beloved servant of God.

ten Boom's final appearance before a camera-just prior to her severe illness. Executive Producer, William F. Brown, describes Corrie ten Boom as a beautiful example of how God's love can give us the courage to face even life's most difficult situations, and come out victorious.

The film features Jeannette Clift, who starred as Corrie in "The Hiding Place". Cliff Barrows of the Billy Graham Crusade Team who has been a personal friend of Corrie's for several years also appears in the film.

### Arnett Appointed New DA

Former Knox City resident and school band director Norman Arnett was sworn in as district attorney for the 32nd judicial district Monday morning in Sweetwater by the 32nd District Judge Weldon Kirk.

The 32nd Judicial District includes Nolan, Mitchell, and Fisher counties. Arnett was appointed as district attorney by Governor Mark White to fill the unexpired term of Rusty Carroll, who resigned in January.

Carroll will assume the job of assistant district attorney in Bell County.

Arnett, a longtime resident of Fisher County, practiced law in Rotan and Hamlin before his appointment.

The newly appointed district attorney has filed as a candidate for district attorney in this year's election being opposed by Dan Barber of Mitchell County.

### Runway, Aspen To Be Paved

## City Progressing

Taking another in a series of progressive steps for Knox City, the City Council voted at last Tuesday night's meeting to award the bid on airport runway resurfacing and relighting to the firm of West Texas Consultants, Inc. of Midland-Odessa. Present for the regular monthly meeting were Mayor Buddy Angle, Councilmen Elmer Wall, Greg Kuehler, Larry Staggs, Councilwoman Elaine Lewis, and City Secretary Teri Anderson.

After recently receiving a \$50,000.00 funds grant from the Texas Aeronautical Commission for the proposed airport runway seal coating and the installation of a new medium intensity runway lighting system, the City Council advertised and agreed that the street would be paved this summer by utilizing the same contractor that will be resurfacing the airport runway. By using the contractor while he is in this

Engineering Inc. of Wellington; and West Texas Consultants Inc. of Midland-Odessa. With the bid being awarded to the firm that the council felt was best qualified, the next step before work begins is for West Texas Consultants Inc. to submit their proposals to the Texas Aeronautical Commission for final approval. Once that is accomplished, the firm will let out bids for a contractor to do the work. The final approval on the actual contractor will be up to the City Council once the recommendation is submitted by West Texas Consultants, Inc.

In related action, the City Council took a very positive step towards the long overdue paving of Aspen Street. The council discussed and agreed that the street would be paved this summer by utilizing the same contractor that will be resurfacing the airport runway. By using the contractor while he is in this

area on the other project, the council has hopes that the Aspen Street paving project can be completed at a reduced cost since the contractor will have all of his equipment already in Knox City.

The members of the City Council were very pleased to hear a report by City Secretary Teri Anderson that two bank notes have been paid off and the city is now in a solid financial position with a substantial amount of savings. This financial report was good news and well-received by the council since the council members have worked very hard and taken many actions to insure the financial success of the city government. Money saving measures that have been taken by the council include a reduction in the city's labor force to substantially reduce payroll expenses, a reduction in the health care insurance benefits for city employees to reduce the insurance cost to the city, returning to a one-man Police Department to reduce costs, and working with West Texas Utilities to change out most of the lighting of city streets with newer, brighter lights that are not as expensive to operate.

In other actions to reduce the expenditure of city funds, the many different insurance contracts held by the city on buildings and property are now being awarded on a bid basis with the policies going to the lowest bidder. This has resulted in an additional savings to the city. Also, a numbered purchase order system has been established to insure that city employees only make purchases after the purchase has been approved by the city secretary or the council and a purchase order number assigned to the specific request. This action was taken to eliminate the possibility of city funds being spent unless there is an approval from City Hall for the requested item.

Sensitive to comments and suggestions from the residents of Knox City, the council members have continued the practice of having a fulltime night watchman in the downtown business area, stressed more traffic enforcement from the Police Department, and have turned out the lights in the City Hall at night to reduce the city's own electric bill.

As stated in a public notice in this week's Knox County News, the council is set to hold a public hearing on another grant application, this one being to study the water, sewer and street systems of Knox City in order to possibly obtain future federal or state funding grants to overhaul the respective systems.

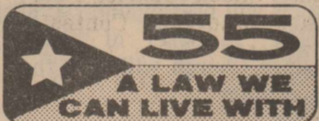

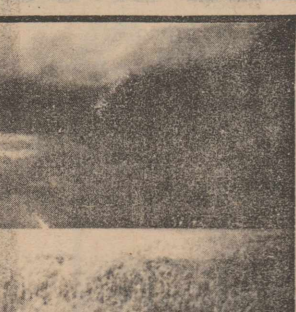

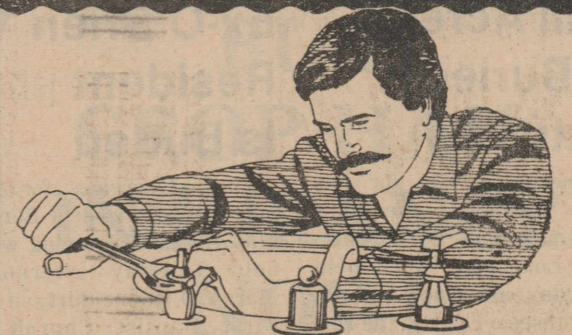
Many different demonstrations are planned throughout the day. Among them will be square dancing on the tennis courts next to the park.

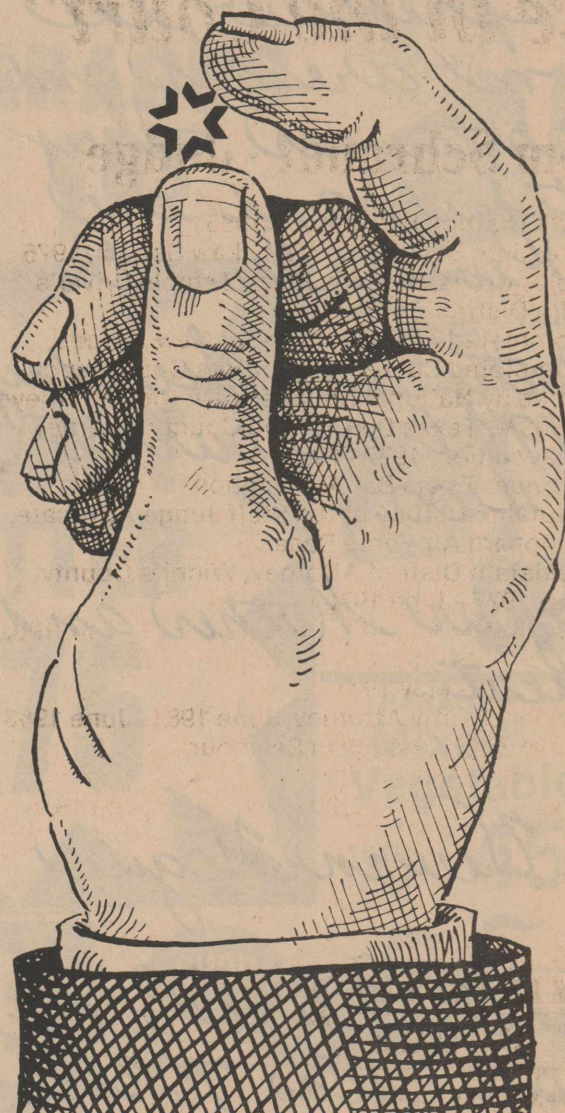

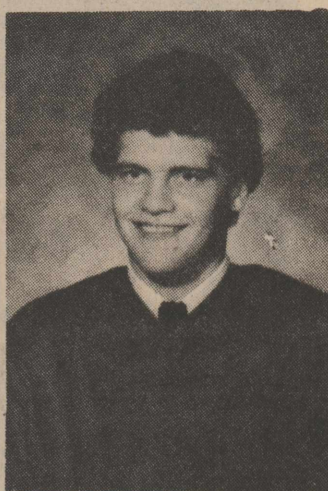

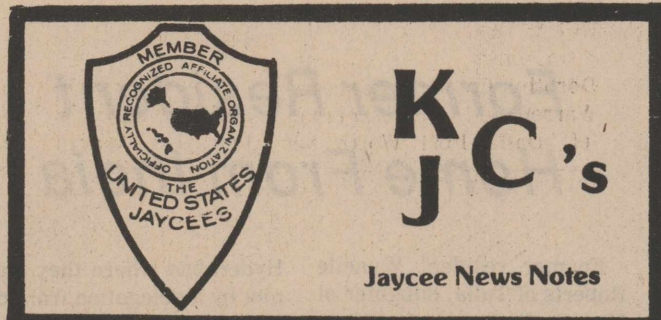
Eighteen years ago, on October 15, 1965, Steve Rutherford was born unto his parents, J.B. and Sharon Rutherford, in Seymour.

Former resident Wynelle Roberts of Tulia, daughter of Mrs. Ozelle Stephens of Knox City, has returned from what she describes as "the most fascinating trip of my life."

Mrs. Roberts, along with the Rev. James Sain and Norman Singer, joined sixty-seven International Crusaders for a Crusade to India, leaving on January 24 and returning February 22.

The group left New York after boarding a 747 PanAm to Delhi, India, with a stop in Frankfurt, Germany. After arriving in Delhi, they boarded buses that took them to their hotel. Enroute they saw

people living in huts, tents and along the road. There were also beautiful rice and mustard fields. Mrs. Roberts said the grounds at the hotel were very beautiful with all kinds of pot plants, shrubs and rose gardens.

From Delhi they flew to

Hyderabad where they were met by a delegation from different churches. They also attended a rally at Secunderabad and the two cities, divided only by a lake, have ten million people. Hyderabad is ruled by the Hindu while Secunderabad is under British rule.

The group held church services every night and during the day, witnessed on the streets, in schools and in homes. They visited one leper colony. She said those who were the unbelievers (not saved) would gather in homes and on the streets to hear more about Jesus. They were very eager to hear more and ask the group to pray for them, she said. She explained that their team from Tulia witnessed to about 5800 people, visited in 85 homes, and 192 persons were saved. Final results of all the teams showed almost 6,000 confessions of faith, which they termed a very successful crusade.

## Jane's News Notes

By Jane Locknane

Have you ever given any thought as to the sugar content in breakfast cereals? We often do not even realize that they contain sugar. Some of them do indeed contain so much sugar that they might better be called "breakfast candies", rather than cereals. But there are other brands that are quite low in sugar and can provide a nutritious beginning for your children's day...as long as you don't let them add heaping spoons of sugar themselves. Below is a listing comparing the percentage of sugar in 30 major brands, for your information.

Shredded Wheat-1%, Raisin Brans-29%; Puffed Rice-2%, Trix-36%; Cheerios-3%, Alphabits-40%; Wheat Chex-3%, Lucky Charms-41%; Post Toasties-4%, Sugar Frosted Flakes-41%; Corn Chex-4%, Cocoa Puffs-43%; Corn Flakes-5%, Count Chocula-44%; Special K-5%, Capt'n Crunch-45%; Grape Nuts-7%, Sugar Corn Pops-46%; Wheaties-8%; Fruit Loops-48%; Total-8%, Honey Combs-51%; Product 19-10%, Cocoa Pebbles-54%; Rice Crispies-10%; Apple Jacks-54%; Life-17%; Fruity Pebbles-56%; All-Bran-19%, Sugar Snacks-61%.

By the way: adding a level teaspoon of sugar to a one-ounce serving of Cheerios would raise the content to about 15%; two teaspoons would raise it to about 25%.

As it is, much of the sugar we consume is "hidden". To be a good sugar detective, you must read the ingredients label carefully: Ingredients are listed in order of weight, with the greatest first. If sugar is listed first (or honey, molasses, corn syrup, corn sweeteners, or any word ending in "ose"), then that food is high in sugar...and bad for your teeth.

I also want to pass along to you a few other items besides cereal that contain great amounts of sugar. Did you realize that a 32 oz. soft drink has 26 teaspoons of sugar in it? Others are:

Apple Pie (1/6 pie)-12 teaspoons; Fruit Yogurt (8 oz.)-8 teaspoons; Catsup (1 Tablespoon)-1 teaspoon; Two Glazed Donuts-12 teaspoons; Jello (8 oz.)-9 teaspoons; Ice Cream (8 oz.)-12 teaspoons.

We consume a lot of "hidden" sugar and I hope you will start being on the lookout for it. Studies have found that in the adolescent years 4 out of 10 boys and 6 out of 10 girls consume 520 cans of pop and 150 lbs. of sugar each in a year. I seriously doubt many adults are far from these

same figures. Wow that's a lot of sugar!

## Veterans' Training Act Is Explained

Employers may receive up to \$10,000 if they train and hire an eligible veteran through the provisions of the Emergency Veterans Job Training Act of 1983.

The reimbursement will be 50 percent of the starting wage up to a maximum of \$10,000 per veteran. Payments will be made at the end of each three-month period of training or can be monthly in the case of employers with less than 75 employees.

While some particulars are involved, employees must design a program and apply to the Veterans Administration for certification to train an eligible veteran. The training should be approved for six months, but cannot exceed 15 months. Also the Employers' program should be in one or more of a growth industry, an occupation requiring technical skills, or an occupation where demands exceed the supply of workers.

Veterans must also be certified eligible by the V.A. before they enter into training. To be eligible, he or she must be a Korean or Vietnam-Era Veteran and must have been unemployed for at least 15 out of the past 20 weeks immediately preceding his or her application.

According to Ronnie L. Wiggins, Job Service representative with the Texas Employment Commission, the program is temporary. Employers must obtain certification and begin training an eligible veteran no later than December 31, 1984. Also, funds for the program are on a first-come, first-serve basis. That means that Knox County employers and veterans are in com-

petition for the funds with employers and veterans nationwide. Therefore, application must be made as soon as possible.

Wiggins also stated that T.E.C. is serving in an assisting capacity to the V.A. by providing personnel to aid employers in designing and applying for training approval. T.E.C. is also assisting veterans in applying for eligibility. "There is really little paperwork involved in this program," Wiggins said.

For more information, employers and veterans should contact the nearest office of the Texas Employment Commission.

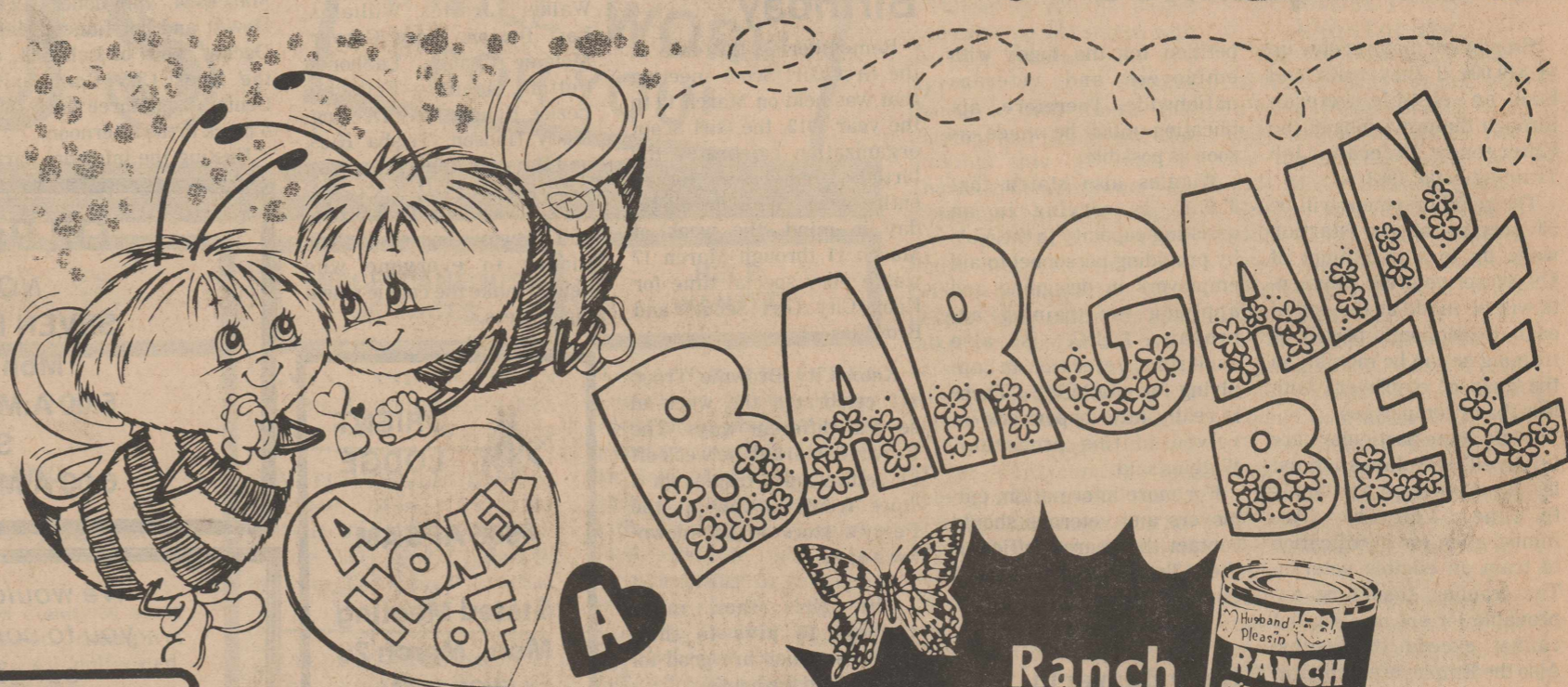
