Doctor Reinstated

Meeting last week, members of the Knox County Hospital Board of Directors, who were present for the special called meeting, voted unanimously in favor of reinstatement of full medical privileges to the Knox County Hospital for Knox City physician, Dr. W.F. Thompson. Those present for the meeting were Hospital Administrator Brenda Muncrief,

Board Members Maurine Reeder, Buster Lowrey, Ray Lynn Hardin, Bernard Brown, David Neil Perdue, and Board President Vernal Zeissel. The one absent board member was Benny Grill of Benjamin. Others present at the meeting were Randy Abernathy, Ann Tibbets and members of the Knox County News staff.

Acting on the first item of business on the agenda, the members voted unanimously

in favor of the reinstatement after Hospital Administrator Brenda Muncrief advised the board that Dr. Thompson had all medical records completed and signed. The vote by the board was effective as of the meeting, meaning that Dr. Thompson will be able to resume use of the hospital right away.

Since the annual re-appointment of Dr. Thompson to the medical staff as required by Medicare had passed by while his suspension was in effect, the second item on the agenda for the special meeting was that same re-appointment. After a discussion by the board, all voted in favor of a 90 day time period wherein all parties could try and work out any remaining areas of concern. The board members said that they felt it was imperative to have communication and harmony among the medical staff members and hoped that everything would work itself out in the near future.

It wasn't long until a nucleus of people was formed and the Foursquare Church of Knox City began.

Breck Woman Dies After 1-Car Wreck

A 20-year-old woman from Breckenridge died at Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene Sunday morning at 8:40, four days after she was injured in a one-car roll-over 12 miles west of Benjamin on U.S. Highway 82.

Marina Elaine Cofresi was a passenger in the car driven by Bonnie Ruth Lehrer, 19, of Roanoke.

The women were injured when their eastbound Datsun went off the road, struck a bridge embankment and began rolling, according to Department of Public Safety Trooper D.W. Wainscott.

Wainscott said he did not know how many times the car rolled.

Both women were brought to Knox County Hospital here by the Knox City Emergency Medical Service Ambulance after the accident which occurred about 3:00 p.m. Wednesday of last week. Ms. Cofresi was then transferred to Hendrick, and Ms. Lehrer was transferred to a Dallas hospital.

Wainscott said the woman appeared to have suffered severe head and internal injuries.

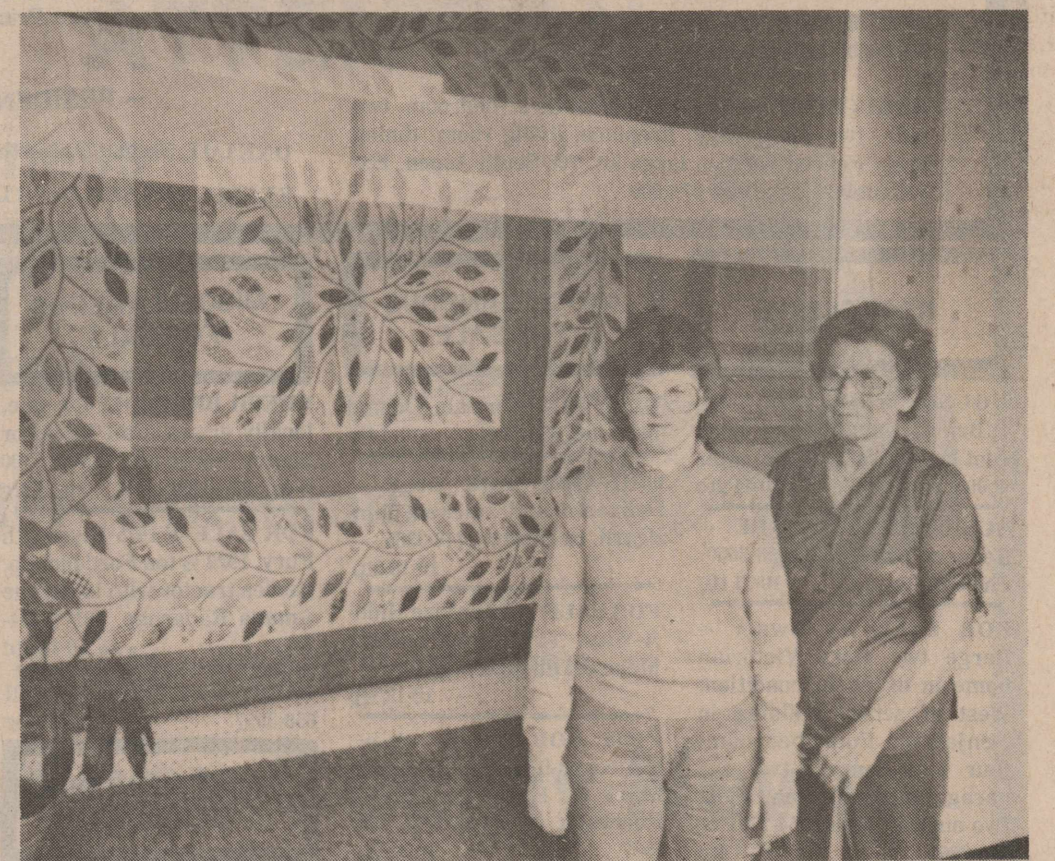

Jane's News Notes

Do all convenience food products cost more than what it costs to make the same thing from scratch at home? No, though many do and some don't. The types that often cost more include frozen entrees, plate dinners, seasoned vegetables, and ready-to-eat bakery products. Convenience foods that often cost about the same as, or less than, their fresh or homemade versions include canned vegetables, frozen orange juice concentrate, main dishes, and baked goods made from mixes. Wise shoppers make sure they don't pay more for convenience.

A recent study conducted at Pace University's school of nursing found that the top five stressors in people over age 65 relate to the immediate family. The death of a grandchild was ranked as the most stressful, while death of a spouse ranked number six. The researchers are finding that many of the common stereotypes of stressors attributed to older people may no longer prove to be true for older adults in the 1980's.

LARGER ISN'T ALWAYS BETTER

Items sold in bulk quantities tend to be cheaper than those sold in smaller packages. Large package size—often called "economy," "giant," "bargain," or "thrifty"—may mean extra savings. However, if a smaller size happens to be on sale, the unit price of the product may actually be lower in that smaller size package. In this case, the rule "largest is cheapest," does not apply. Use unit pricing as a guideline. But also buy only those sizes which your family can store and use within a reasonable time.

White To Form Health Committee

Over the past several months, Governor Mark White has placed increasing emphasis on health concerns and health planning in Texas.

Governor White has now requested the assistance of the twenty-four Regional Councils of Government located across the state in gathering health data at the regional level. This data will be used by the Texas Department of Health in preparation of the annual State Health Plan.

In order to accomplish this data collection, the Governor has asked each of the Councils of Government to appoint a Regional Health Planning Advisory Committee by December 1, 1984.

The West Central Texas Council of Governments has begun seeking nominations to this committee in accordance with the Governor's directive. Letters have been sent throughout the nineteen-county WCTCOG region, asking that proposed nominations in line with Governor White's instructions on Committee formation be returned by October 31, 1984.

During its first year of existence, the Governor has outlined the initial activities of the Committee as including review of the 1984-85 State Health Plan; identification of further regional health

needs; development of a close working relationship

with the Statewide Health Coordinating Council; and assistance in the design of a state health planning system in Texas. In subsequent years the Committee's role will change as needed.
