
Small Taxpayers Can Take The IRS To Court

Inanks to a little-publicized law (effective since 1971) small taxpayers can contest what sometimes appear to be final and arbitrary Internal Revenue Service decisions in disputes involving less than \$5000.

The number of taxpayers using their rights to this prolcess—a streamlined way to be heard—is increasing every year. Settlements in taxpayer's favor already run into the millions. In many instances, the services of an attorney are not needed.

Preparing and submitting an appeal is described in a booklet based on U.S. Tax Court instructions; it includes printed samples of the two essential petition forms plus a list of more than 100 cities where a case can be heard.

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


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
