

## Scientists inspect super collider site

WAXAHACHIE, Texas (AP) — More than 300 residents gathered in front of Ellis County's 93-year-old courthouse today to greet a team of scientists inspecting the possible site of the \$4.4-billion "super collider."

"Dr. Wilmut Hess, the scientist who heads this committee, is most impressed by you," Gov. Bill Clements told the crowd from the courthouse steps.

Clements, Sens. Phil Gramm and Lloyd Bentsen, Rep. Martin Frost, D-Dallas, and local officials welcomed the more than 20 scientists from the Department of Energy super collider site selection committee.

"The courthouse in its day was a technological marvel — people came from all over the world to Ellis County," said Rep. Joe Barton, R-Ennis. "We want people to come back in 1990 when we dedicate the SSC project in this area."

The Department of Energy Site Task Force has narrowed competition for the project to seven sites in Illinois, North Carolina, Arizona, Tennessee, Michigan, Colorado and Texas.

The DOE team was scheduled to get a tour of Texas' site later today.

## Oil prices fall...

# OPEC fails to agree

VIENNA, Austria (AP)

OPEC oil ministers have failed for the time being to agree on a 10 percent cut in oil production and oil markets reacted swiftly as prices fell today.

Saudi Arabia's oil minister said today the price of oil would be set by the OPEC talks, which were rescheduled for June 8.

"It's a very happy ending" in a week of intense bargaining, the minister, Ibrahim Nazif, told reporters as he left the final session early this morning.

His comment confirmed that Saudi Arabia has adopted a hardline stance against any production cuts that could give oil prices a boost. A chief beneficiary of higher prices

would be Iran, which relies on oil to finance its war with Iraq.

The Saudi government broke diplomatic relations with Iraq on Tuesday, accusing Tehran of terrorism and subversion.

The breakdown of negotiations caused a price rally in oil.

The price of Brent crude oil from the North Sea was quoted this afternoon in Tokyo at \$16.90 a barrel, down 45 cents from the close in Europe on Friday.

The London spot, or non-contract, market was closed for the May Day holiday, and trading elsewhere in Europe was extremely slow.

Several ministers expressed disappointment at the breakdown, which they viewed as

a chance to shore up oil prices and open a new avenue for cooperation with non-OPEC producers who had proposed the production cuts.

"I would be much happier if we could have agreed on this now," said Libyan oil minister Fawzi Shukhri.

The production cutting proposal was aimed at raising prices to OPEC's target of \$18 a barrel, from the current range of \$14 to \$16, by tightening supplies.

Saudi Arabia led a minority of hard-line members opposing the proposed production cut of 100,000 barrels a day, or about 2 percent of the group's total output.

# County chair notes decision making to replace Farabee

Scurry County's incoming Democratic Party Chairman Earl Hassler Sneed was one of 21 party chairs from the 30th Senatorial District voting Saturday to move ahead with a party nomination for the soon to be vacated senate seat now held by Ray Farabee (D-Wichita Falls).

Sneed predicted Monday that his fellow county chairmen, a total of 30 for the district, will

select one of the three announced candidates as the nominee for the November ballot.

This decision is expected May 14 at a second meeting of the party chairmen. As such, it will come prior to the Aug. 13 special election related to Farabee's senatorial seat.

The August ballot will be to choose a candidate to complete Farabee's unexpired term, which will run through Dec. 31. In November, voters will decide

who will serve in the position beginning Jan. 1, 1989.

The county chair's decision to move ahead with their nomination, however, means that the winner of the August special election will not necessarily be the party's nominee in November.

The time frame for replacing Farabee on the ballot was confirmed by Republican Gov. Bill Clements, who called an August special election rather than one.

# \$4.5 million highway project detailed

Scurry County commissioners Monday heard state highway department plans to renovate FM 1241, the Clairemont Hwy., and voted to table the matter for a week to consider whether or not to have the Ennis Creek curve straightened.

Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation engineer Ed Vernon of Snyder appeared to say that current plans are for work to start on the 14-mile road from

north of Snyder to the Scurry-Kent County line in May of 1989.

He said the highway will also be renovated over its 13 miles from the county line to Hwy. 380 in Kent County.

Vernon said the Ennis Creek curve is somewhat notorious, with one fatality that he knew of having occurred there, and County Judge Bobby Goodwin said he thought four fatalities have taken place there.

The engineer said that if it

county wishes to buy 7 1/2 acres of right-of-way to have the road straightened, the highway department will use the current bridge for a detour and then raise it after a new bridge is completed. He noted that the curve is "in pretty rough shape" and that the right-of-way purchase might be achieved relatively inexpensively.

Vernon said plans are for the revamped highway to have two 12-foot driving lanes with eight-foot shoulders like Hwy. 380.

He said the Scurry County segment of the project is expected to cost about \$4.5 million, with no cost to the county other than the possible right-of-way purchase.

He said there are 100 pipelines under the road in Scurry County but that none would have to be moved, adding that the contractor would have to put concrete pads over 14 of them.

Other Monday morning court business included certifying public accountant Lee McNair's quarterly report on the financial condition of Cuyahoga Memorial Hospital in which he said the hospital's net revenues were up

by \$1.1 million during the first quarter of this year over the same period last year.

The accountant said the increase might be attributable to an increase in rates and in the number of surgeries and in the ability to generate income in addition with St. Mary's of the Plains hospital in Lubbock early this year.

# Human Services aid for Scurry profiled

Health care accounted for most of the welfare benefits received by residents of Scurry County during the past year, according to the recently released annual report of the Texas Department of Human Services.

For the 12-month period ending Aug. 31, about 10,000 residents of the county received some \$1.5 million in medical assistance.

In addition, food stamps were

issued to a monthly average of 1,000 county residents. The value of these food stamps (valued like cash) by local growers was \$214,000 for the year.

## Baptists still immersed in controversy

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) — Conservative forces within the Southern Baptist denomination say an information drive aimed at 30,000 ministers is a deceptive effort to build support for moderate factions before next month's summer meeting.

Winfred Moore, pastor of Amarillo's First Baptist Church, has mailed a packet urging tolerance within the 14-million member denomination.

That privately funded effort includes a brochure linking two conservative leaders — Paul Pressler, a state criminal appeals judge in Houston and Paige

Patterson, president of the Criswell School of Biblical Studies in Dallas — to Coors Beer president Joseph Coors and to the Reconstructionist movement.

Reconstructionists favor making Old Testament rules the law of the land and would abolish government-run schools and institute the death penalty for a number of religious offenses, including adultery, blasphemy and youthful rebellion, the brochure says.

"Not one single one of those things would Judge Pressler or I endorse," Patterson said.

"In fact, we stand unalterably

opposed to every single one of them. The Reconstructionist movement is a movement of hyper-Calvinists, and I'm not even a Calvinist."

Moore said the mailing had no connection with the campaign of Richard Jackson, a moderate nominee for the group's presidency.

The mailing includes a 10-minute tape by Moore and a brochure, "Struggle for the Baptist Soul," prepared by "Baptists Committed to the Southern Baptist Convention," a moderate group within the Southern Baptist fold.

## Probe of IRA begun

NIEUWBERGEN, Netherlands (AP) — British and Dutch authorities today investigated two coordinated Irish Republican Army attacks that killed three British soldiers and injured three in the Netherlands.

Sunday's car bombing and ambush were the first IRA attacks here since the 1979 assassination of Britain's ambassador to the Netherlands.

As military and police officials from the two nations investigated the attacks, British military forces in West Germany were warned today to take extra precautions when traveling in or near the Netherlands.

The attacks Sunday on the six West Germany-based British soldiers were immediately condemned by the Irish, Dutch and British governments. The British government said the six airmen were off duty and unarmed when attacked.

The IRA claim of responsibility in Belfast, Northern Ireland.

The first attack occurred early Sunday morning in the southern city of Roermond when three Royal Air Force enlisted men were fired on from point blank range after getting into their car parked outside a local cafe, district prosecutor Rolph Gonsalves told reporters.

Senior Aircraftman Ian Shiner, 20, died instantly, while a fellow airman was listed in serious condition at a local hospital and a third was treated for minor shoulder injuries. The injured men were not identified.

### Mobil workers schedule vote

BEAUMONT, Texas (AP) — A vote is set Tuesday on a contract that could end a walkout at a Mobil Corp. refinery that has lasted almost three months.

More than 1,300 striking members of the Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers International Union local 4-243 will vote on the proposal, which was presented to them by Mobil after 20 hours of negotiations Friday and Saturday.

Officials would not reveal how Mobil's offer addresses the key issue of staffing of the refinery's new centralized control center.

## Asleep at the switch

By James Jacoby

I don't sympathize with East's failure to open the bidding. Although much of his strength is in overvalued queens and jacks, and the value of the Q-J doubleton is questionable, he still has 12 high-card points and a six-card suit. I would bid in first position.

South is probably right to bid only three spades after partner's takeout double, and North is wise not to barge into game, but the play for 10 tricks in spades is not that bad. All that is needed is a reasonable diamond division and the club queen with West. In today's deal, correct defense should defeat even three spades, but West foolishly ignored his partner's signal.

After leading his singleton diamond, West was pleased to see East get in with his spade ace and return the diamond three. West ruffed and without a thought banged down ace and a heart. After all, East might have only one heart. Declarer took the king of hearts and shed a club. He ruffed a heart, drew trumps ending in his hand and played a club. When West played low, he rose with the king and lost only one club trick. How did South know to go up with the club king? Since East had passed in first seat and had already shown the ace of spades, Q-J of hearts and Q-J of diamonds, it was impossible for him to hold the club ace and not have opened the bidding. But if West follows his partner's suit-preference signal of the diamond three and plays a club before cashing the heart ace, declarer will have to lose five tricks and his contract.

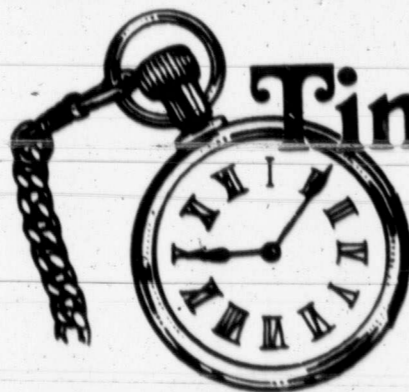
The former stripper for Jack Ruby's Carousel nightclub was ordained during a Sunday night service before the red-carpeted altar of the sprawling charismatic church.

# Western Texas finishes 2nd but still qualifies for CNFR

STEPHENVILLE — Western Texas College came up short in its bid for a Southwest Region rodeo crown Sunday, but will qualify for the College National Finals Rodeo.

"We had a good rodeo, but it was disappointing because we got so close to winning the region," said Coach Bob Doty, whose WTC team finished 16 points behind Odessa in the race for the championship. "You keep thinking 'what if' all the time. But two months ago we didn't look anywhere near this good."

Two months ago Western was in fifth place in the regional standings. They climbed to third after six rodeos, moved into second after that, and went into last week's Tarleton State University NIRA Rodeo trailing Odessa by 10 points. There were 10 rodeos in the season, and schools had to count their best seven. When the dust cleared, Odessa had 1,936 points. Western had 1,920. Both advanced to nationals. Third was Sul Ross State University with 1,427 points.

Western Texas finished fifth in the women's division and did not qualify for nationals. Tarleton won with 1,136 points. Texas Tech and Eastern New Mexico tied for second with 876.67 points each.

"Our girls finished fifth, but they beat all the other junior colleges in their division," noted Doty. "Most of the other top teams had girls who had competed for junior colleges and transferred to major colleges."

Here Sunday, Odessa won the men's division of the rodeo with 345 points. Western had 295 for second and Sul Ross tallied 199 for third. ENMU won the women's division with 196 points.

Western got 145 of its men's points in the bull riding where Adam Brewster won the average with a 142 and the short-go with a 73 score. His 70 in the long-go tied for fourth. Teammate Michael Gaffney won the long-go with a 74 but took a no-time in the finals. Gaffney still earned average points, when only Brewster and Sul Ross' Todd Watkins managed to stay aboard Sunday.

Brewster and Gaffney finished 1-2 in the Southwest Region final standings of the bull riding event, earning champion and runner-up status.

Another 80 points came in the saddle bronc for Western. Wesley Henderson was second in the average with a 142 score, second in the short-go with a 73 and third

in the long-go with a 69. Henderson was the region's runner-up champion for the year in the saddle bronc behind Odessa's Ty Murray, who was the region's all-around champion.

Three other WTC students, not designated team members, reached Sunday's finals of the saddle bronc. Jim Blaine Kenney took third in the average with a 136 on two-head and tied for fourth in the average with a 69. He was also fourth in the long-go with a 67. Shawn Goemmer placed fourth in the average with a 134 and was third in the short-go with a 73. Steve Roberts reached the finals with a 69 but his 68 on

Sunday did not place. Ray Brown slipped into third place in the short-go of the calf roping with an 11.6 clocking. His 21.7 on two-head tied for third in the average.

WTC's other points came in the bareback where Denny McLanahan was fourth in the average with a 136 score. His 68 in the long-go tied for third. Brewster added 10 points when he finished fourth in the short-go of the event. His 134 on two-head did not place in the average.

In other events involving WTC students, Melanie Graf was second in the long-go of the barrels with a 17.99; Cody Cooper took a

no-score in the finals bull riding; and Henderson and Shawn Goemmer had a no-time in the team roping.

Brown, Shawn Goemmer and McLanahan placed in the top five in events for the season. Brown was runner-up to Odessa's Guy Yarbrough in the steer wrestling. Shawn Goemmer was fourth in the saddle bronc and Denny McLanahan was fifth in the bareback. Former WTC students Mike Carrillo and Don Eddleman won the bareback and calf roping, respectively.

Western's Tana Mahoney finished fourth in the breakaway roping for the season.

# Jordan scores 55 despite 'weak knee'

The second game of the Cleveland-Chicago playoff series was supposed to determine the health of Michael Jordan's twisted knee and Ron Harper's sore ankle. Jordan's knee was a big winner.

Jordan, who twisted his right knee in the Bulls' first game victory over the Cavaliers, followed his 50-point performance in the opener with 55 more Sunday, leading Chicago to a 106-101 win and a 2-0 lead in the best-of-5 series.

"It's still stiff and it felt a little weak in the first half, but I tried not to think about it," said Jordan, the first player to score 50 or more points in consecutive playoff games. "After the first half, I think I succeeded. I don't feel any pain."

Harper, who missed the first game with a sprained ankle, scored 10 points Sunday and was 4-for-15 from the field, including a crucial miss in the final minute after a jumper by Jordan put Chicago ahead 102-101.

"I missed too many shots and in the end, when we had a chance, I just didn't get the job done," Harper said. "Michael Jordan had nothing to do with it."

In other games Sunday, Boston beat New York 128-102, Seattle crushed Denver 111-91, Atlanta defeated Milwaukee 104-87, and the Los Angeles Lakers bombed San Antonio 130-112. The Celtics, Hawks and Lakers lead 2-0, while the SuperSonics and Nuggets are tied 1-1.

# Bush referred to as 'blank slate'

Democratic front-runner Michael Dukakis described George Bush as a "blank slate" and urged his likely Republican opponent to speak out on breaches of law and ethics in the Reagan administration. Democrat Jesse Jackson, in turn, made fun of Dukakis' cautious style, saying: "The kitchen is clean and cool — ain't nothin' cooking!"

The two Democratic rivals and Bush, the guaranteed Republican nominee, were campaigning today in Ohio on the eve of the state's primary. The District of Columbia and Indiana have primaries the same day, but Ohio offers the biggest delegate prize.

Jackson, who preached a pair of Sunday sermons in Cleveland, vowed to "turn up the heat" on rival Dukakis. And he brushed aside surveys suggesting the Massachusetts governor holds a nearly 3-1 lead in Ohio, where 179 Democratic delegates are at stake Tuesday.

A poll published Sunday in the Akron Beacon Journal suggested Dukakis had the support of 62 percent of registered Democrats, while Jackson had 22 percent and 16 percent were undecided or supported other candidates.

Another survey, for the Columbus Dispatch, had similar results — 64 percent for Dukakis to Jackson's 24 percent, with 14 percent for others. Dukakis also picked up the support of the Cleveland Plain Dealer, Ohio's largest newspaper.

The current Associated Press delegate count puts Dukakis at 1,276 and Jackson at 852. But Jackson professed optimism.

"Our campaign of hope con-

tinues," Jackson told backers. "Our support base gets broader and bigger every day."

Jackson was airing ads in Ohio portraying himself as a candidate of change, in contrast to Bush and Dukakis. He implied that Dukakis' cautious style amounted to a lack of leadership. "The kitchen is clean and cool," he said. "Ain't nothin' cooking!"

Dukakis spent Sunday sounding law and order themes, visiting a police station in Akron and stopping at Toledo's county jail. And he hammered away at the Reagan administration, saying that under it, "rule of law and respect for the Constitution have not been the order of the day."

In calling for tougher anti-drug efforts, Dukakis cited the administration's history of dealings with Panamanian strongman Manuel Antonio Noriega.

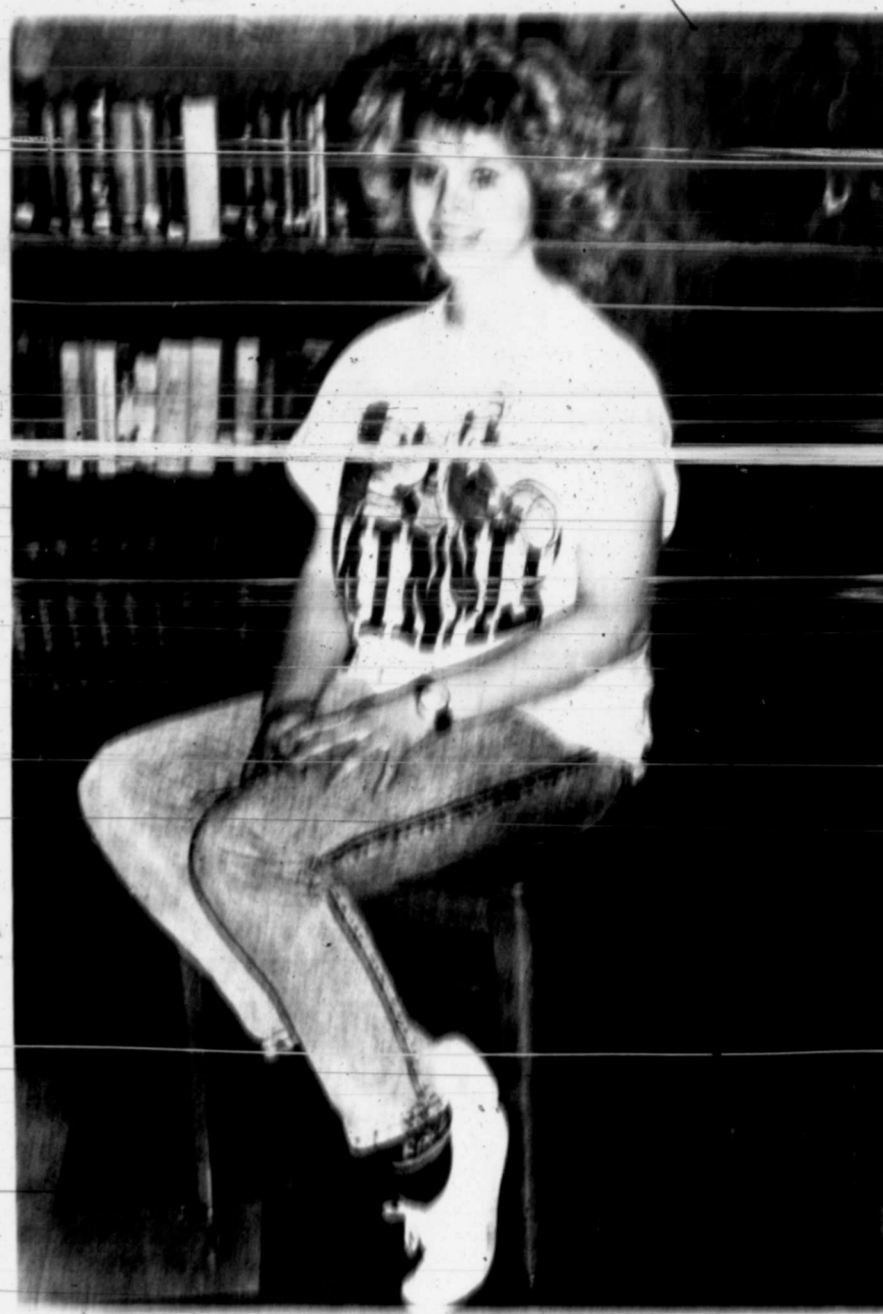
"How can we tell our kids to say no to drugs when we have an administration that can't say no to drugs and drug dealers?" he said.

The Massachusetts governor also suggested the administration could not effectively fight drugs with its top law enforcement official — Attorney General Edwin Meese III — embroiled in his own legal problems. The attorney general is the subject of a nearly yearlong criminal investigation.

"It's got to begin at the top, with a Department of Justice that knows what justice and rule of law is all about," Dukakis said in Akron. "We've got an attorney general that should have left the office a long time ago — and you know that and I know that."

## U.S. go it alone policy draws criticism

WASHINGTON (AP) — Treasury Secretary James A. Baker says there are no plans to lift the ban on U.S. payments to the Noriega government in Panama even though individuals were exempted from the sanc-

tions over the weekend. Baker said Sunday that talks with Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega aimed at seeking his removal from power continued during the weekend, but he declined to be specific beyond

saying "progress is being made." Interviewed on NBC-TV's "Meet the Press," Baker said he could not discuss whether Noriega would be allowed to remain in Panama, saying the talks were "sensitive" and were going on "as we talk."

Panama's commerce minister said Sunday that drug trafficking charges must be dropped against Noriega before serious negotiations can take place.

The U.S. approach in the Noriega negotiations also was criticized Sunday by Sen. Richard Lugar, a top Republican foreign policy expert in the Senate, and by Panama's anti-Noriega ambassador to the United States, Juan Sosa.

Baker said he expected the U.S. goal of removing Noriega to be met but declined to predict when or under what circumstances.

"I don't think it would be helpful for me to get into hypothetical questions about leaving power, staying in Panama or leaving power and getting out of Panama," he said.

He said the announcement Saturday that the 40,000 Americans living in Panama could pay utility, garbage and other bills to the Noriega-controlled government so services could be resumed was not a lifting of sanctions. He said such exemptions were contemplated in the original orders cutting off public and private payments to Panama.

Administration officials said Friday that Noriega had agreed during private talks with a Reagan administration envoy to step down but not leave the country. However, the deal was denied by officials in Panama City and Panama Commerce Minister Mario Rognoni on Sunday called the Miami indictment against Noriega on drug trafficking charges a "political ploy."

"What we see is the United States acting as kind of a terrorist group now, where they are trying to hold hostage General Noriega by discrediting him, by making a political indictment, and then trying to release the hostage by getting some changes to your benefit," said Rognoni in an interview on ABC-TV's "This Week with David Brinkley."

Also appearing in separate interviews on the ABC program were Lugar, R-Ind.; Rep. Lee Hamilton, D-Ind.; and Sosa.

Lugar, a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said the United States should keep open the "military option" for changing Panama's government but should not use force or make a deal with Noriega without support from Panamanians and other Latin American countries.

Hamilton also pushed for more regional involvement in U.S. efforts against Noriega and said it would be "a very severe mistake" to use military force in Panama.

### Heart problem may be serious

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** My 7-year-old grandson has supraventricular tachycardia. One time he woke up in the middle of the night. After his heart pounded for an hour, his father took him to the emergency room. There, they packed his face in ice, gave him a cold drink, and told him to lie quietly and not to worry. His doctor doesn't seem very concerned, either. Isn't there something someone can do?

**DEAR READER:** Yes. Your grandson needs a diagnosis. Supraventricular tachycardia (SVT) means that the heart is being overly stimulated by natural electrical pulsations arising in the walls of the low-pressure atria, the heart chambers above the muscular ventricles. The resulting rapid heartbeat is inappropriate and out of proportion to external stimulation, such as exercise, fright or fever.

SVT has traditionally been viewed as an occasional and entirely benign inconvenience in healthy people. In particular, episodes of SVT in children have been disregarded. However, several years ago, a medical report concluded that in some children, SVT was associated with heart enlargement and diminished cardiac function. The abnormalities disappeared when the SVT was treated, indicating that—in some children, at least—the rapid heart rate could cause temporary heart damage. Therefore, opinion is divided today as to whether SVT in children should be aggressively investigated.

In your grandson's case, a prudent doctor probably would (1) treat the SVT with drugs, in preference to ice and reassurance, to restore the normal heart rate, and (2) make arrangements for the child to be examined by

a qualified pediatric cardiologist. I am concerned about the unusual but possible existence of a number of cardiac conditions associated with SVT. These include electrical abnormalities, such as the Wolff-Parkinson-White syndrome, as well as viral infections of the heart muscle, valvular disease and hyperthyroidism. Ask your grandson's doctor to refer him for a second opinion.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** Sixteen months after meeting my husband, I was diagnosed with herpes. Four years after meeting him, genital warts showed up on me. My husband says he's been faithful and denies seeing evidence of either disease on himself. Considering

the incubation period of each disease, is it possible that I might have contracted either disease without having any symptoms prior to meeting my husband? Or is he not as exclusive as he would have me believe?

**DEAR READER:** It's tempting to point a finger at your husband and conclude that he has been dividing his affections. However, in fairness and for marital harmony, I suggest that you take him at his word. You could conceivably have been exposed to herpes and venereal warts before you met your husband and later developed symptoms after a long latent period. Admittedly, this is a long shot.

Because of the serious implications of your sexually transmitted diseases, I urge you to involve your doctor in sorting out the pieces to this puzzle. You need to be checked for other venereal diseases. In addition, your husband needs to be examined, too—if for no other reason than he was exposed to herpes and warts from conjugal contact with you.

## Guns are supplied in state

DALLAS (AP) — Anyone with a Texas driver's license or other proof of residency can purchase firearms in Texas.

As a result, black marketeers are stockpiling carloads of guns purchased in Dallas and selling them at handsome profits in other states and countries with stricter standards, the Dallas Times Herald reported Sunday.

Texas, with its lax gun control laws, has become one of the major suppliers of weapons used by violent drug gangs, the newspaper quoted law enforcement officials as saying.

Federal agents say several hundred weapons, from cheap handguns to expensive semiautomatics bought in Dallas, have shown up in the last two years in New York; Washington, D.C.; Kingston, Jamaica; the Philippines and other places, the Times Herald reported.

"As the narcotics business continues to get more violent the need for firearms will increase," said James Wooten, an agent in the Dallas Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms office. "Now Dallas has been identified as a supplier."

Because of the growing gun market, 48 agents were added to the ATF office in Dallas over the last two years. The office investigated 15 weapons cases last year, including one that resulted in a 30-count indictment charging three men with illegal purchase of 126—mostly powerful, auto-loading handguns.

### Huge pole, flag raising ruckus

WASHINGTON-ON-THE-BRAZOS, Texas (AP) — Controversy is raging over a proposal to hoist a flagpole 13 stories high at the place where the state's forefathers declared independence from Mexico in 1836.

The 325-foot flagpole would fly a Texas flag one-eighth the size of a football field over a local park. The flagpole, which purportedly would be the world's largest flagpole, would be about 245 feet shorter than the San Jacinto Monument near Houston. The Dallas Morning News reported.

Edward Smith, a banker from

nearby Brenham, wants to donate the flag and pole. "Anyone that finds the Texas flag crass and tasteless sure isn't much of a Texan," Smith said at last week's public hearing on the flagpole proposal.

Historical purists say the pole and flag would destroy the dignity of "the Philadelphia of Texas" and create a carnival atmosphere at the park.

"Somehow the giant pole strikes me as more appropriate for Six Flags or AstroWorld," Texas A&M University professor Don Ivey

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — The head of the local and statewide Mothers Against Drunk Driving organization has been ousted after sexual harassment complaints were lodged against him, a spokesman for MADD's national executive committee says.

Robert E. Luxen of Dallas said Sunday Bill Mixon was ousted after complaints, including sexual harassment, were made against Mixon.

Mixon was president of the Bexar County MADD chapter and chairman of the organization's Texas State Coordinating

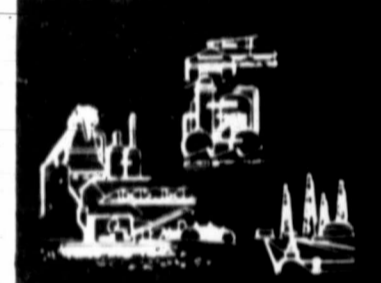
Committee. Luxen said his law firm represents MADD's national executive committee, headquartered in the Dallas suburb of Hurst.

Mixon could not be reached Sunday for comment, the San Antonio Light reported.

Luxen said the national organization's executive committee voted to oust Mixon during an April 25 meeting in Dallas.

## Police arrest Bandido gang members

DALLAS (AP) — Federal authorities say 13 members of the Bandidos motorcycle gang were arrested and eight others were being sought on federal explosives and conspiracy charges stemming from two 1983 bombings.

Included among those arrested Saturday in Corpus Christi, Longview and Lubbock were

some top leaders of the national Bandidos gang, who are accused of staging the bombings in the Dallas area in retaliation for an earlier 1983 clash with the rival Bandido gang, authorities said.

The bikers were named in a 23-count sealed indictment returned March 31 by a Dallas grand jury, authorities said.

Richard Garner, special agent in charge of the Dallas Division of the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms said two other Bandidos members named in the indictment were already in

custody in a federal prison.

A bomb placed near the gas meter of a home in Lancaster, a south Dallas suburb, exploded the morning of July 5, 1983. Later that day in Dallas, a man and his 1-year-old daughter received minor injuries when a bomb exploded inside the van they were in.

Garner said the blasts were believed intended for members of the Banches.

"Earlier in the year, in the spring of 1983, the Banches and the

Bandidos got into an altercation in Porter, Texas, that resulted in one Bandido member being killed and several members of each club being wounded," Garner said.

"As a result, we developed evidence that these two bombings were retaliatory acts perpetrated by members of the Bandidos against certain members of the Banche motorcycle club," he said.

Porter is about 25 miles north of Houston.
