Fraud probe updated

WASHINGTON (AP) - At torney General Edwin Meese III anticipates indictments within 90 days in the massive Pentagon bribery probe focusing on alleged sale of secret information to defense contractors through their paid consultants.

An unusually detailed search warrant, made public Thursday, says much of the confidential information was improperly funneled to McDonnell Bouglas Corp. The warrant was one of 38 served this week on 15 defense contractors, half a dozen Pentagon personnel and consultants.

According to the warrant, information was passed along by said was, "Hello. How are you?" former Pentagon official Melvyn Paisley, assistant secretary of the Navy for research, engineering and systems from 1981 to April 1987. Paisley is now a Washington consultant to numerous defense contractors.

McDonnell Douglas did \$7.7 billion worth of Pentagon business in fiscal 1987, making it the nation's largest defense contractor. The warrant says McDonnell Douglas received confidential information on several Pentagon programs including the \$35 billion Advanced Tactical Aircraft manufacturing competition won by the St. Louis company.

Paisley's consulting office was bugged and his phone there was tapped by federal investigators conducting the corruption probe, Abby? according to government sources speaking on condition of anonymity.

Sources said Paisley is a consultant for United Technologies, whose Washington offices also were searched Tuesday by FBI documents in United Technologies's files relating to Paisley, said the sources.

The agents also took documents relating to the 404 and T-406 engines made by Pratt & Whitney, a United Technologies' subsidiary. Paisley began working as a United Technologies consultant within a week after he left his Pentagon job last year, according to the sources.

The Los Angeles Times reported today that Rep. Bill Chappell Jr., D-Fla., who oversees the Pentagon budget as chairman of the House Appropriations subcommittee on defense, was identified by sources as one of those under

Chappell told the Times that he and other committee members receive no information that would benefit military contrac-

"These are public (budget) figures we're dealing with anyway Information on the fact that bids are going out does not come to Congress, as far as I know," Chappell said.

-NBC News reported Thursday that the courtauthorized wiretaps lasted 290 days and overheard nearly 4,800 conversations, of which 671 were considered incriminating.

Treating eczema with cortisone

By Peter H. Gott, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My son, 7, has severe eczema which the doctor ascribes to allergies to just about everything. He's taken cortisone for six months, which has helped a little, but I'm concerned about the long-term effects. Will he grow out of this?

DEAR READER: Children often

outgrow severe eczema at about the time of puberty. The reasons for this are unknown. Cortisone creams will often diminish the acute skin inflammation, peeling and cracking of eczema.

However, I share your concerns about cortisone pills or the long-term use of the creams. Cortisone and other steroid drugs are powerful neutralizers of the body's immune system and can cause devastating side effects in children, including change in appearance, altered development and susentibility to infection If your con's eczema is related to allergies, he might be better served by being under the care of a specialist. For example, he could be helped by desensitization injections that are compounded and administered by an allergist. Ask your doctor about this possibility.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm female and 55. One minute I feel fine, and the next I feel as if my tongue is 10 times too big and I'm going to choke, although I produce enough saliva. I take

Dyazide every other day. Could this be the culprit?

DEAR READER: Any medicine has the potential to cause allergic reactions. Tongue swelling is sometimes a manifestation of such reactions. Therefore, Dyazide combination of two diuretics for hypertension and fluid elimination could be the culprit. Since you require

a very small dose (one capsule every two days), I wonder if the medicine could not be changed - or stopped. Explain your symptoms to your doctor and see if he or she would be willing to make an adjustment. DEAR DR. GOTT: I developed tem-

poral arteritis from a Transderm-Scop patch. My eye doctor was on a cruise and the ship's doctor said he's seen many people develop problems like mine from the patches. Is this a listed side effect?

DEAR READER: Temporal arteritis is inflammation of the temporal artery, a major blood vessel beneath the skin of the temple. The ailment is thought to be due to an allergic reaction during which the nationt hecomes sensitive to his or her own arterial tissue. This causes headache and a painful, swollen temporal artery

Temporal arteritis is not a reported consequence of Transderm-Scop, a dermal delivery system for motion sickness. The drug commonly causes drowsiness, blurred vision and dryness of the mouth; headache is not usual. I do not believe that Transderm-Scop and temporal arteritis are

Cox Jr. on Thursday agreed to plead guilty to a federal bank fraud charge and resigned as chairman of the powerful Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission, which he served on under two governors.

He is charged with defrauding InterFirst Bank, Dallas in connection with \$80 million in loans he received while he was the bank's director from 1984 to 1986. He repaid the money owed in Oc-

There is no adequate explanation for today's auction. Perhaps South feared that his takeout double might elicit a five-diamond jump-bid from partner when four spades would be the best contract. Certainly a takeout double with South's cards is the right call; and North might even bid six hearts and make it. But our story is about the play in four spades.

When West led a diamond, declarer

did not need X-ray vision to know that East must hold a nine-card club suit, leaving room for only four cards in the other suits. So declarer won the king of diamonds, played A-K of spades and then continued diamonds. When East failed to ruff the second diamond, his entire distribution was obvious: nine clubs, two spades, and a singleton heart and diamond. Accordingly two more rounds of diamonds were now played, and declarer let go his singleton club. He then played a heart back to his king and led the jack of hearts. When West played low, declarer finessed. One more heart now gave declarer nine tricks. Since he needed only one more trick to make his contract, he played a club from dummy and discarded the fourth heart from his hand. Poor West, down to Q-J-9-8 of spades, had to ruff and play from the Q-J-9 into the declarer's 10-5-4. And to think that West thought he might take four tricks with that Q-J-9-8-6-3 of trumps!










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

including Electronic Data Systems, have asked the General Services Administration to void a no-bid contract between the U.S. Postal Service and a new firm headed by Dallas businessman H. Ross Perot, former owner of EDS.

The protests filed by EDS and Planning Research Corp. of McLean, Va., with the GSA Board of Contract Appeals allege that the Postal Service violated standard federal contract bidding procedures when it awarded the \$500,000, 90-day contract to Perot Systems Corp. earlier this month, the Dallas Morning News reported today.

Perot and officials of Planning Research Corp. could not be reached for comment Thursday. the newspaper reported. A spokesman for the Postal Service said officials had not seen the complaint and declined to com-

The complaints were filed under the Brooks Act, which is more than 20 years old. The act gives the GSA review authority over federal data-processing contracts. The GSA board, which has 45 working days to issue a ruling, has the power to revise, revoke or suspend the contract. Its ruling

can be appealed to federal court.

The EDS complaint alleges that the Postal Service failed to open the contract to review and bidding and included several unusual provisions in the con-Systems. The complaint claims the contract does not include a

Perot announced June 2 that he had formed Perot Systems, a Washington-based computer services company with several former EDS midlevel executives.

Perot and Postmaster General Anthony M. Frank jointly announced in early June that the new company had received a \$500,000 contract to review Postal Service cost-cutting procedures and recommend new ones.

The contract calls for Perot Systems to conduct a study of the Postal Services' performance of transportation, telecommunications, delivery services, revenue protection and transportation equipment duties. The Postal Service would pay Perot Systems

the \$500,000 for a 90-day study. The contract allows for Perot to share in any savings derived from the company's recommendations, but the payments would not be made until December 1989, when a non-compete agreement involving General Motors Corp., EDS and Perot expires.

Plan to acquire gear for small planes scaled back

WASHINGTON (AP) — After a storm of protests from private pilots and some members of Congress, the government has scaled back its proposed requirement for small planes to be equipped with altitude-tracking equipment.

The Federal Aviation Administration said Thursday it planes to have altitude-encoding transponders if they fly near 138 airports and in some cases as far as 30 miles from the runway. The devices provide air traffic controllers with altitude information about a specific plane on their radar screen.

Only four months ago, the FAA said it was considering regulations that would ban small planes from all airspace within 40 miles of 254 airports and above 6,000 feet when not flying near an air-

Thursday requires the devices on and urged private plane owners small planes within 30 miles of 27 across the country to "join ... in of the nation's busiest airports after July 1989 and within currently restricted airspace - less than 10 miles in some many cases surrounding 109 other airports

Under the rule, small planes would be allowed to fly up to 10,000 feet without the equipment, instead of the 6,000 feet suggested earlier. Currently the altitude-encoding transponders are required above 12,500 feet.

The final rule falls short of what the airlines and commerwould require small private cial pilots had wanted but was seen as a significant victory for private pilots and their powerful lobbying group, the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association.

The February proposal had unleashed a firestorm among the nation's private pilots, who flooded the FAA and congressional offices with more than 80,000 complaint letters. Several congressmen had threatened legislation forcing the FAA to back off.

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U.S. Army hired Nazi war criminals after World War II

U.S. Army hired high-ranking Nazi secret police officers, stormtroopers, propagandists and collaborators after World War II and protected them behind an official cloak of secrecy, according to a harshly critical Justice Department report.

The report says U.S. military intelligence employed the Nazis to provide information and monitor Soviet activity in occupied nations after the war, protecting them from prosecution for war crimes including torturing and murdering civilians.

The report focuses at length on the U.S. Army's Counter-Intelligence Corps' hiring of convicted Nazi war criminal Robert Jan Verbelen, and its continued employment of him even after he admitted having been a member of a Nazi security unit that was declared a criminal organization.

The Justice Department listed 13 individuals, in addition to Verbelen, but did not identify any of the others by name. The infor-mation was based on official documents and interviews with former CIC agents, but the department said the information remains classified under U.S. policies to protect the identity of intelligence operatives.

Prepared by the Criminal Division's Office of Special-Investigations, the 92-page report said Verbelen was paid by CIC for 10 years, from 1946 to 1957, for intelligence work in Austria even though he was convicted in absentia and sentenced to death declined to say how long the CIA

The report said Verbelen, now 77 and living in Austria, "manipulated the CIC into protecting him from being brought to justice for his crimes.

He was able to accomplish this ... as a direct result of the CIC's reliance upon former Nazi and Nazi collaborators in its immediate postwar European operations," the report said.

It said the CIC initially relied on the information Verbelen gave about himself, including the name he gave, Peter Mayer. But in 1950, he informed the agency his name was really Herbert Schwab, describing himself as a devoted Nazi Party member since the mid-1930s and a member of a Nazi security unit that had been declared a criminal organization, the report

"Despite this change in identity and life history, the (CIC) made no attempt to verify the information Verbelen supplied about himself, and it continued to employ him," the report said.

Neal Sher, special investiga-tions director who conducted the study at the request of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, said the report already has been given to the Belgian and Austrian governments.

The report said the Army intelligence group discovered Verbelen's true identity when the CIA asked for information about him in 1956.

Sher, at a news conference,

for the murders of 101 people in had known Verbelen's true identity or to give any other information about CIA involvement with Verbelen.

> Sher said Justice Department investigators interviewed Verbelen himself in the summer of 1985 and found him unrepentant, "He thinks he has nothing to be ashamed of," Sher said.

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Cleanup deemed flawed

DALLAS (AP) - The U.S. government's plan for cleaning up soil tainted with pesticides and arsenic at a South Texas airport is one example of the "largely ineffective and inefficient" Superfund program, a congressional study says.

The proposed \$1.6 million cleanup of the abandoned Crystal City municiapl airport in Zavala County was one of 10 cases examined in the report by the congressional Office of Technology Assessment, The Dallas Morning News reported today.

The Crystal City airfield once was home to several crop-dusting planes whose toxic cargo was mixed and loaded there.

The study, to be released next week, labels the so-called Supefund program established in 1980 to clean up the nation's worst chemical wastes as flawed despite the expenditure of more than \$5 billion in federal tax dollars.

The 10 cases are representative of hundreds of Superfund cleanups around the country, the study said.

However, David Cohen, chief spokesman for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in Washington, disputed the study's findings. "Second-guessing of Superfund and EPA bashing have become a national pastime," he said.

"The report's tone does a disservice to all the thousands of people in the agency who have worked extremely hard to make the program a success.

According to the report, the plan for the Zavala airport soil is to bulldoze it into a pit and cover it with waterproof material.

"I know the people down there feel its a second-class remedy, but it really isn't," said Carl Edlund, chief of the Superfund branch for the EPA's regional office in Dallas.

He said more costly cleanup strategies would have provided little or no added protection.

But the study says that pro-posal provides little assurance that ground water will be protected or that the hazards posed by the toxics will be permanently abated.

French woman was wrong; grandson is not mute-boy

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — After a French lead fizzled out, authorities again are attempting to ascertain the identity of a

wandering last year in Mexico. A French woman who saw pictures of the unidentified boy, nicknamed Sabat; mistook him for her grandson.

The woman, Camille Muller of Le Bourg a Thibouville, France, said she had not heard from her 45-year-old son in months - and that his 13-year-old son strongly resembled pictures of Sabat she saw in a French magazine.

But the FBI tracked down the father and son — both named Philippe Muller — Thursday morning The elder Muller is a cook at a French restaurant in El Paso; his son just completed sixth grade. .

FBI spokesman Terry Kincaid said Thursday that the elder Muller probably learned an important lesson.

"I think he'll stay in a little closer contact with his mother,' Kincaid said, chuckling.

After finding the father at about 11 a.m., FBI agents visited the son.

"He seemed to be taking it all in stride," Kincaid said. "I showed him a photograph (of Sabat) and asked him if he resembled it, and he said, 'No, not really.' But there are some similarities.'

Kincaid had earlier expressed doubt that the younger Philippe Muller was Sabat, because Sabat is estimated to be 7 or 8 years old. The boy, who is deaf in the right ear and has 25 percent hearing in the left, was found near downtown Juarez last November. Since then, he has stayed at a child welfare center in Ciudad Juarez, across the Rio Grande from El Paso.

Sabat communicates mainly through drawings and gestures. Some of his pictures have led authorities to believe he survived a small-plane crash that killed his parents and sister.

That belief, coupled with the fact that she hadn't heard from her son or grandson in months, probably prompted Camille Muller to notify the U.S. Embassy in Paris that the younger Philippe Muller was her grandson, said the boy's mother, Margie Muller.

The biology teacher at El Paso's Ysleta High School said she wasn't surprised Camille Muller made the error.

"I saw the news last night, and they were talking about it and my daughter Pearl and I were laughing and saying it sounds like something Mamie (Camille


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
