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TDC-officials say **\$11.6 million more** bonds are needed

AUSTIN (AP) - State prison officials project they will need about \$11.6 million more in bonds than planned for four 1,000-bed regional prisons because the bid for the first such unit came in higher than expected.

The state Bond Review Board on Wednesday approved \$83.37 million in prison bonds. The issue was delayed two weeks because a construction bid for the planned Snyder prison was 27 percent higher than estimated.

The bonds are for 1,000-bed, medium-security prisons at Marlin and Woodville, and a 2,250-bed maximum-security prison in Amarille Bonde for the Snyder and Dayton units were approved earlier this year, officials said.

The Marlin and Woodville prisons, along with one in Dayton, are like the Snyder unit. Prison officials had asked for the delay See BONDS, page 9



The widening of 37th St. west from College Ave. to Crockett Ave .-- making it a four-lane rather than two-lane traffic route--has been agreed to by state highway officials pending action by the City of Snyder.

On the city's part, this would include securing right of way from property owners along the

The project has been approved as a state-funded "urban program" project for cities within the Abilene district of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The local state highway office proposed the plan on behalf of the city, and it has now been approved by the State Highway Commission.

With state approval granted, the widening plans must now go back to the city council.

The city would be responsible for providing 100 percent of right of way required to widen the street. Other city-required items will include any costs related to moving utility lines as well as expenses for curb and gutter and any adjustments to driveways and sidewalks.

After constuction is completed, the city would be required to maintain the roadway also.

In all, the project involves a distance of .6 of-a-mile

And that's just for starters. Reading their platforms might lead some to believe the two parties had at least a few thoughts in common as their state conven-



Towering fire engulfs oil platform in North Sea area

ABERDEEN, Scotland (AP) -A towering fire engulfed a North Sea oil platform after a series of blasts broke it apart. Authorities said more than 160 people were missing today and feared dead in one of the worst oil rig disasters ever.

Sleeping workers died when flames raced through the rig's living quarters. Others leaped 200 feet into chilly waters from the mammoth structure, which was still burning as an armada of rescue ships and helicopters scoured the sea for survivors.

The giant platform, the Piper Alpha, was rocked by explosions late Wednesday night and then burst into flames.

Aberdeen police estimated up to 171 people were missing. Other sources indicated 164 were missing.

The U.S.-based Occidental Petroleum initially said 232 workers were on the rig. They later put the figure at 227. The Aberdeen Royal Infirmary said 63 workers aboard were confirmed rescued.

Aberdeen coast guard officials said the missing included three rescuers who disappeared into flames when a new explosion rocked the rig as they headed toward it in a small boat. Police

Alan Reid told reporters 21 people were hospitalized, 13 of them in serious condition.

Soviets: protest crushed, but deny stories of deaths MOSCOW (AP) - Soviet been the scene of massive

authorities acknowledge that demonstrations by Armenians paratroopers crushed a protest by thousands of people who shut down a major airport in Armenia. But they deny activists' claims that soldiers killed as many as five protesters.

The activists, pushing for annexation of a predominantly Armenian region of the neighboring republic of Azerbaijan, charged Wednesday that Red Army troops killed demonstrators at the airport in Yerevan, the Armenian capital.

The latest round of protests began Monday with a general medical assistance" after the strike and intensified Tuesday ight with the airport clash, officials and Armenian activists said. On Wednesday, the situation did not appear to be stabilizing. The evening television news program "Vremya" said hun-dreds of thousands of Armenians thronged Yerevan's streets as the strike continued. The government daily Izvestia said mass transit was still shut down and the situation had worsened since Tuesday, when 26 factories and economic agencies in the southern republic were idled.

in bond approval, saying that if bids for the other 1,000-bed prisons are as high as the Snyder bid, an additional \$16.3 million would be needed to build the four units.

Of the money, \$11.6 million would come from bonds that were authorized by the Legislature but that prison officials had thought they would not need to use. The additional bonds will be considered in the future by the board.

Of the remaining shortfall projection \$3.5 million is to be made up through funds that had been earmarked in 1983 for prison psychiatric facilities. Instead of building new facilities, the Legislature allowed the prison system to take over a unit of Rusk State Hospital and make bond-funded improvements.

Prison officials have said one reason the Snyder unit bid was higher than expected is that the price of steel has gove up since. estimates were made, according to Glen Hartman, executive director of the Public Finance Authority. The authority earlier approved the bond issue.

Jim Lynaugh, state prison director, said construction of the prison units "will probably slip a few days, but nothing signifi-cant" as a result of the delay in bond approval. "The only one that will slip is Woodville, and it will probably


slip a maximum of 75 days," he said.

Of the four regional prisons, the Snyder unit is to be finished in July 1989; the Dayton facility in August or September 1989; the Marlin unit in September 1989, and the Woodville unit in October or November 1989, Lynaugh said.
