Fifty-four of the 177 House Republicans abandoned the administration and the party's presidential candidate, Vice President George Bush, on the issue Wednesday. Nineteen of the Senate's 46 Republicans did the same last week.

On a 286-136 vote, more than the two-thirds needed to enact the law over a veto from Reagan, the House voted Wednesday to let workers caught up in plant closings or layoffs involving more than 50 of them know about it 60 days beforehand.

The Senate approved the same measure a week ago by a vetoproof 72-23 vote in the biggest legislative battle of the decade between corporate America and labor unions.

House Republicans aware of polls showing that more than 80 percent of the American public favor the notices are distancing themselves from Reagan and Bush on the issue.

"I don't think he'll be able to sustain a veto," said Rep. Marge Roukema, R-N.J., who led the House fight against the mandatory notices through the legislative process but voted for the bill Wednesday.

LeBaron is the son of the late Ervil LeBaron, whose Church of the Lamb of God is linked to slayings from Utah to Mexico.

If found to be the work of LeBaron followers, the four deaths in Texas last June 27 would bring to 18 the number of Texas. the polygamist patriarch's former disciples who have died investigators were in contact disappeared in the last

The senior LeBaron, 56, died in 1981 of a heart attack at the Utah State Prison. He had been sentenced to a life term for masterminding the 1977 gunshot slaying of Murray, Utah, naturopath Rulon Allred, a rival polygamist.

Although he has not been charged in the Texas deaths, Heber LeBaron was wanted for questioning in the execution-style slayings of three people, including an 8-year-old girl, in Houston and one similar shooting the same day in a Dallas suburb.

Oil spilled in Corpus harbor

CORPUS CHRISTI (AP) - An unexplained accident has caused the worst oil spill in the history of the Port of Corpus Christi, authorities say.

Officials said the tanker Nord Pacific, owned by a Singapore firm, was enroute to the Southwest Refinery late Wednesday when an unexplained accident caused a gash measuring eight feet by one foot in the side of the tanker.

The mishap caused an estimated 15,000 barrels of crude oil to be spilled into the harbor, officials said.

U.S. Coast Guard Lt. Paul Zukunft said the cleanup will take several days, but said the wind is blowing in a direction that will cause the oil to be pushed farther into the port and keep it out of Corpus Christi Bay.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials were to check for possible environmental damage early today.

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) - A Christina Adams, 22, and man wanted for questioning in Melanie Martin, 22, Anderson said. He said investigators were working to determine if those were their true identities.

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

The game can be cruel, particularly when the partnership presses to an aggressive contract with duplication of values. In today's deal, North and South were using the bidding system in which an immediate two-over-one response commits the partnership to getting to game. After South had bid two hearts, North could simply raise to three, setting the trump suit and leaving room for slam exploration. South was right in thinking that his partner had some slam interest. However, was it right for South to bid as much as he did?

South had 16 high-card points, but more important, he had a strong trump holding (A-Q). He also had aces in both minors. So he cue-bid four diamonds, and then, even after North bid only four hearts, continued by showing his ace of clubs. That was enough for North, who forthwith bid six hearts. The slam was not hopeless. On a good day, the club king would be onside, hearts would divide 3-2, and the spade suit would behave (either the king with East or the suit dividing 3-3). Still, needing all those favorable breaks made the odds for making the slam

Says election is stolen

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Opposition leaders say the governing party stole the presidential election, which final results say Carlos Salinas de Gortari won by the slimmest margin in the Institutional Revolutionary Party's 59 years.

The opposition won four seats in the 64-seat Senate, the Federal Election Commission said Wednesday, but easily retained control of the two-chamber federal legislature.

The centrist governing party, known as the PRI, had never lost a

presidential, gubernatorial or Senate race.

The PRI-dominated commission, which originally promised results the day after the July 6 balloting, said Salinas received 9.64 million votes, or 50.36 percent, far below the 70 percent the PRI has traditionally won.

Wife says pilot "law-abiding"

EL PASO (AP) - The wife of the helicopter pilot who says he was forced to break three inmates out of a New Mexico prison maintains that her husband is a law-abiding man despite a private detective's claims to the contrary.

Charles "Cheater" Bella, charged by New Mexico authorities with aiding an escape and conspiracy in connection with Monday's unsuccessful jailbreak, was expected to be released on \$50,000 bail today, said his wife, Carrol.

Bella has told authorities he was forced at gunpoint to fly his helicopter into the recreation yard of the State Penitentiary of New Mexico near Santa Fe and pick up three inmates.

On Tuesday, El Paso private detective Ivan Enriquez told the El Paso Herald-Post that Bella owned an airplane that was seized in Colombia by soldiers making a large drug bust.

But Mrs. Bella said Wednesday that Enriquez was lying, and that her husband tried to buy the twin-engine DC-3 after its seizure. 'There was nothing illegal about what Cheater was doing," she

Enriquez told police last week that Bella beat him up because of a dispute arising from the plane's attempted purchase.

Mrs. Bella said her husband suspected Enriquez was trying to bilk Bella out of \$25,000 he gave Enriquez to buy the aircraft. The plane was seized more than a year ago after it landed illegally in Colombia, she said.

Texan killed in plane overload

VICTORIA, British Columbia (AP) - A light plane was overloaded and the pilot probably was disoriented when it crashed off the northern end of Vancouver Island, killing all three people aboard, a coroner's report says.

The pilot, Francis Russell Arrowsmith, 62, of Mountain Center, Calif., and passengers Max Potter Hopkins, 58, of Grand Terrace, Calif., and his brother Donald Eugene Hopkins, 61, of Kerrville, Texas, died when the plane went down Sept. 1 south of the Port Hardy

Transportation coroner Ian Marshall said all three died from multiple impact and deceleration injuries, and his report classified the deaths as accidental.

Marshall said the pilot "probably became disoriented in weather conditions of low cloud and poor visibility.

Marshall made no recommendations, but his report said the oneengine Beechcraft Bonanza's was loaded to more than 3,610 pounds,

while the maximum allowable weight was 3,564 pounds. The men were returning from a fishing trip in Alaska and were on

a flight from Ketchikan to Seattle.

No evidence of favoritism

DALLAS (AP) — An investigation has revealed no evidence of faxoritism in a 14-month-old pistol possession case involving the daughter-in-law of Dallas Billionaire H. Ross Perot, police say.

Dallas County Commissioner John Wiley Price, who had filed a complaint with the department, said Wednesday the police department was practicing selective law enforcement.

Price last month asked for an Internal Affairs investigation into an incident in the spring of 1987 involving Sarah Perot, who was found in possession of a firearm during a traffic stop.

Officers did not arrest Ms. Perot although carrying a firearm in one's car is illegal with few exceptions in Texas because "she sincerely believed arrangements had been made for members of the Perot family to carry weapons because of their special security needs," officials said in a letter to Price.

"The officers corrected her misconception and decided that justice would best be served by not making an arrest," the letter

Large cells require study

By Peter H. Gott, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: What causes enlarged blood cells?

DEAR READER: Blood cells enlarge when, during their formation, their structure is altered. This can happen in red blood cells if the pigment molecule (hemoglobin) is disrupted by a congenital abnormality (such as thalassemia) or by a nutritional deficiency (such as pernicious anemia, a lack of vitamin B12).

Ordinarily, blood cells are not re-leased into the circulation until they are mature; immature forms are

larger than adult blood cells. Therefore, large blood cells may indicate that young cells are being inappropriately pressed into service. Leukemic white cells are very young and quite large. In addition, in the presence of hemorrhage, young (and large) red blood cells may appear in the circulation.

Large blood cells almost always mean that something is wrong and should be investigated

DEAR DR. GOTT: My daughter is 38 and had a hysterectomy two years ago. The doctor accidentally cut the bladder and she's had trouble controlling her urine since. What are her

DEAR READER: Her primary option is to consider having the damage repaired. She should seek an opinion

from a gynecologist who is familiar with the complications of hysterectomy and who is knowledgeable about reconstructive surgery. Your daughter's other option is, in my opinion, less attractive: to wear a pad and put up with an unpleasant situation. It seems to me that what she needs now is more information on which to make future decisions. I believe that another gynecological opinion is in order.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My husband has a problem with foot odor. He has tried numerous foot powders but his feet just dry out and crack. He has tried all-leather shoes and launders his socks daily, but it just gets worse. Do you have any suggestions, short of gas masks for the family?

DEAR READER: The presence of odor, cracking and peeling suggests that your husband may have a chronic skin infection of his feet. Various yeasts can cause this condition and are difficult to treat unless specific antifungus drugs are prescribed. Your husband needs to have skin cultures of his feet. With this test, a trained laboratory technician should be able to identify the source of infection. Your family doctor is the place to start or, if you wish, a dermatologist could

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LAREDO (AP) — An attorney for the Veterans' Peace Convoy says ten vehicles in a peace activist group's convoy have crossed the Rio Grande into Mexico despite efforts by federal authorities to block the caravan's planned journey to Nicaragua.





"To me, it's a stunner ... 10 years of fighting this plant (is over)," said Anthony Roisman, an attorney for the Citizens Association for Sound Energy, or CASE, during the last meeting of the Atomic Safety and Licensing Board in Dallas.

Opponents of CASE's pact withdrew their petition for a two-month delay. Had the petition remained in place, the delay would have prolonged the pre-hearing phase and made the Sierra Club and a citizens' group intervenors, the role abandoned by CASE in their

CASE's deal with the NRC and Texas Utilities, Comanche Peak's operator, ends the last major citizens' opposition to NRC licensing of the plant.

Doctor wins round

AUSTIN (AP) — A doctor and five clinics sued by the state for allegedly treating an estimated 14,000 weight-loss customers with a toxic chemical, used as a weed-killer, won a round in the Texas

The court on Wednesday, without writing an opinion, denied the state's appeal of a ruling by the 5th Court of Appeals in Dallas. The appeals court had reversed a trial court decision against Nicholas Bachynsky and the clinics, which operated in Dallas, Houston and San Antonio.

The customers were charged about \$1,400 each for treatment with 2,4 Dinitrophenol (DNP), the state said. It sued Bachynsky and the clinics for allegedly violating the Texas Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act and Deceptive Trade Practices Act, and for negligence.
