# **Drought said** still in Texas

By the Associated Press

Heavy rains and flooding earlier this week may have dampened the drought in some areas of Texas, but they weren't enough to wash it away, officials said.

Ironically, while farmers and ranchers in parched southwest Texas are desperate for rain, producers in the nation's leading cot ton fields in the southern high plains aren't anxious for wet weather. 'We need some good hot, dry weather up until August. Exactly

what nobody else wants," John Gannaway, a cotton breeder for the Texas Agriculture Extension Service in Lubbock, said Thursday. In the Coastal Bend, millions of bushels of grain sorghum have

already been harvested and taken to elevators for shipment

Although the yield is down in some areas, the grain sorghum is of high quality, said Jerry Cotter, of the Port of Corpus Christi.

Cotter said the hit and miss rain showers this year produced good crops for some farmers, although their neighbors may have missed out

This week's storms, which dumped nearly 10 mehes of ram m Medina County in south central Texas and brought flooding to a good portion of West Texas helped those areas, said Chester Fehlis, who heads the state's county extension program.

We'll see some crop reduction, but few areas of total crop loss like you're seeing in the Midwest," said Fehlis.

# **Rural hospitals** seek more funds

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas' small- hospitals across the state for the town hospitals need more state money to keep operating, according to several lawmakers who say the gap between Medicaid payments to rural and urban hospitals is too wide.

At a Thursday news conference, they called on the Department of Human Services to use \$6.9 million to pump up payments to rural hospitals.

"If one is treated for pneumonia at a hospital in Bellaire (near Houston), the rate of reimbursement is some \$7,200. On the other hand, if you're treated in one of almost 100 rural



same disease the rate of reimbursement is something on the order of \$2,200," said Sen. Richard Anderson, D-Marshall.

The formula for reimbursing hospitals for treating Medicaid patients is set by state and federal officials. Anderson called on DHS to increase the "standard dollar amount" it sets as part of that formula.

"This imbalance is clearly out of reasonable proportion and threatens the continuation of rural health care in Texas," he said.

Anderson was joined at the Capitol news conference by Sen. John Montford, D-Lubbock, and Rep. Stan Schlueter, D-Killeen. Anderson said his new rural health caucus also includes Sens. Kent Caperton, D-Bryan, and Ted Lyon, D-Rockwall, and Reps. Jim Rudd, D-Brownfield, and Mike McKinney, D-Centerville.





### Allergy to cold isn't unusual

DEAR DR. GOTT: On our first really cold, windy day, I went for my daily walk. Before I arrived back home, my knuckles became red, swollen and itchy. I applied cortisone cream and as they warmed, they stopped itching. What could have caused this new senstivity to cold?

DEAR READER: You have de-

scribed a typical cold-sensitivity reaction, during which histamine was released into the skin, causing much the same reaction as any other allergy. This happens to all of us once in a while and, as an isolated event, should not be of concern. However, if you experience recurring attacks, check

with your doctor, because some diseases, such as those associated with temperature-sensitive proteins called cold agglutinins, can begin as a cold

allergy. DEAR DR. GOTT: I feel so inadequate and cheated. I am 37 and have never had an orgasm. I faked things for 16 years with my alcoholic husband, and now am having to fake responses with my new man. What can **vou suggest?** 

DEAR READER: Counseling. Indeed, you are being cheated; however, the chances are good that your lack of response has a psychological, not a physical cause. I believe that psychotherapy would help you to cope with your unresponsiveness, as well as

with your anger, guilt and frustration. I'm interested that you are "having to fake responses." Why? Perhaps if you were less concerned about maintaining a certain image, you could relax and begin being honest with your partner. It seems to be that this is a problem you both share, so honesty may be the first step in solving it. I think you will feel better about yourself if you will set aside the charade and allow your partner to share your secret. In this way, you can begin to work contructively. You've taken the obvious first steps: shedding an alcoholic husband and being honest with yourself. Now you are ready to grow. Seeking counseling and being honest

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

Grant Baze was the shrewd declar-er in today's deal who hoodwinked expert opponents into letting him get away with nine tricks in three notrump. After Grant had shown a balanced hand and 23-24 high-card points, North elected to just bid three notrump rather than search out a possible 4-4 heart fit. Still, after the low club opening lead, and with East holding the ace of hearts for a quick entry to allow him to lead back through declarer's club king, the chances were not good for the contract. Baze was lucky in that his adversaries were experienced players.

After winning the seven of clubs in his hand at trick one, he laid down the king of hearts, East, to deprive declar-er of an entry to dummy with the heart queen, ducked. Next came the jack of hearts, on which West discarded a low spade. East ducked again. The ace and king of spades were now played, and East congratulated himself for not taking that heart ace., Obviously his shrewd decision was going to deprive declarer of ever making a trick with the spade queen. Sure enough, when Baze played the 10 of hearts, that was also allowed to win. Unfortunately for the defense, declarer now exited with a club. West was able to cash four club tricks. He then had to lead away from his Q-10-4 of diamonds into the A-K-J to give Grant Baze his game in notrump.

East was shortsighted. He should have realized that West was going to be endplayed. Ironically, most beginners would have grabbed the heart ace and returned a club to set the contract.

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# National poll reveals presidential race close

NEW YORK (AP) - Nearly six in 10 voters say they already have made their choice for president in the November election, and a third of the rest have strong leanings, a Media General-Associated Press poll has found. Michael Dukakis has a slight leau.

Among those who said they have decided on a candidate. 48 percent in the national survey backed Democrat Dukakis and 42 percent supported Republican George Bush. Among strong leaners, support was evenly divided.

Other national polls have sought to measure the candidates' standings among all registered voters, a gauge that also has showed a close contest. A CBS News-New York Times poll Monday had it 47-39 for Dukakis.

### State drought said still lingering

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Fehlis also said that rains in northeast Texas will help save hay production that was running about 25 percent to 50 percent below average

"As big as Texas is, you can generally make a statement that we've got a drought just about any time that you would want to check," he said.

Fehlis said that while rains muddied fields in Central and South Texas, a parched band running south of Cotulla to Laredo is "still in pretty bad shape.'

But even high rainfall amounts may have been wasted, especially the thin-soil areas of the Hill Country that drain quickly. "It may have absolutely wiped out the drought in a few spots, but I wouldn't want to be more optimistic than that," said Larry Eblen, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service in San Antonio.

Gannaway said from Lubbock that cotton fields have received just the right amount of rain at just the right time.

"As of this minute we've got a good crop going," he said. The worst thing that could happen now is more rain, he said. The crops are usually harvested in October and November.

"We hear about all these people in the Midwest with the drought, and we can sympathize with them," Gannaway said. But, he added, "This generally tends to be the land of adversity, so we're happy not to have any now.'
