# **Duke awaits** party's nod

ATLANTA (AP) — Michael running mate. Dukakis was poised tonight to accept the Democratic presidential nomination in a prime-time roll call of delegates energized by noisy and excited house. Citing waves of ridicule directed at long-awaited endorsement from Dukakis' one remaining rival.

The suburbanite son of Greek immigrants was capping a 17month quest for the nomination and the right to challenge Republican Bush in November.

Jackson, survivors from a field of seven, will have their names entered in nomination. Dukakis we come together," Jackson began the day with a comman-said, as his supporters waved a 1,161 for Jackson and had exercised his muscle by winning a brief and moderate platform.

Jackson, who captivated the convention with a forceful address Tuesday night, acknowledged the obvious this morning. Asked if he planned to endorse and work for the ticket, he said, "Oh, yes I am." He said his role "must be defined by Gov. Dukakis.

Dukakis toured the Omni convention hall and planned a relatively quiet day awaiting his nomination. He telephoned Jackson and told him his speech had been "terrific."

With Dukakis now knocking on the door, Jackson said his "mission" was to pave the way for a black to win the White House.

"My children and your children will get through those doors, and the White House is within reach," he told NBC's Bryant Gumbel, the "Today" show's black anchorman. "I am pushing back barriers and removing ceilings off of dreams every day. I see it as my obligation, in a real sense now my mis-

Dukakis will claim his prize with an acceptance speech Thursday night following the convention's ratification of his choice of a Southern moderate. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen of Texas, as

# Little interest in Alaskan fires

Wildfires in northern Alaska orado. have burned an area the size of Rhode Island and then some, but most people are oblivious to the blazes as the 49th state weathers its worst fire season in 10 years.

square miles of burned acreage is like a postage stamp on a parcel. Here stories of firefighting drama are rare; the terrain is flatter and less rocky, and the days longer, than in other wildfire states.

'We don't have snakes, we don't have darkness," said Bill Robertson, an Alaska Fire Service spokesman. "We have crews that go down to the Lower 48 and are amazed.

Fifty wildfires, one of them burning since April 16, continued to burn today in Alaska's interior. The Alaska Fire Service manned about one-third and monitored the others.

A similar outbreak in the Lower 48 would have fire managers scrambling to protect prime recreation lands and valuable timber. In fact, firefighters were working today to contain a 14,000-acre fire in Wyoming and had contained all

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) - more than 20,000 acres in Col-

In Alaska, the fires have been blistering spindly black spruce and other trees with little commercial value.

Crews have worked to keep the In far-reaching Alaska, 1,300 fires away from a few scattered cabins and to control those that sent bothersome smoke into Fairbanks and other areas, in some cases obscuring the mountains that draw thousands of summer tourists to the state. Officials also have been concerned about smoke impairing the safety of pilots in aviation-happy Alaska.

> But altogether, fire managers have taken a low-key approach to suppression. In some areas, wildlife biologists are looking forward to the enhanced habitat they say moose, bears and other animals will gain because the burned areas yield new vegeta-

"Our research shows that most wildlife moves away from fire, so they aren't usually threatened by it," said Fred Deines, fire management officer for the Yukon Flats National Wildlife Refuge. > The veteran must have been exposed on one of three active duty situations, participating in a test atmospheric detonation of a nulcear device, serving occupation duty in Hiroshima or Nagasaki, Japan, between Aug. 6, 1945 and July 1, 1946, or exposure while a prisoner of war in Japan.

Legislation signed by President Reagan May 20 authorized payments to veterans suffering from any of 13 types of cancer and their survivors. The law restricts compensation to those veterans whose disease became evident within 40 years of exposure except for leukemia which has a 30-year limit.

Doctors and other critics of steroids have long warned of the adverse side effects, including the long-term possibility of cancer, sterility and various other maladies or diseases.

The NCAA began a testing program two years ago that resulted in several football players, including All-American linebacker Brian Bosworth of Oklahoma, being barred from bowl games. Bosworth, who said he took steroids only once, now plays for the Seattle Seahawks.

Rozelle's first mention of steroids was in his 1987 message on prohibited drugs, which also mentioned cocaine, marijuana and amphetamines.

"The league no longer merely condemns the misuses of these substances," he said in last year's memo. "They are prohibited in any quantity for any purpose."

That phrase also was contained

But Rozelle went farther this year, noting that detection of steroid use during a campopening drug test will subject the player to random testing for "reasonable cause," similar to that imposed on those who test positive for other substances.

If such a finding is made at training camp, Rozelle said, the player will be re-tested within four weeks. If that test turns up positive, he will then undergo a complete medical evaluation by the team physician and the White said a Herschel Walker NFL's drug advisor, Dr. Forrest







I know how she feels because I am in the very same situation. I once read a book about "irregular people," and the message was very helpful. I copied it, and when I feel hurt and neglected, I read it, and it makes me feel better. Here it is:

#### Nervous habit causes concern

DEAR DR. GOTT: My granddaughter, 8, is constantly picking at and twitching her nose. I try to tease her out of it, telling her she's going to end up looking like Pinocchio if she keeps it up, but it does no good. What do you suggest?

DEAR READER: Does the child live with you? If not, leave the behavioral modification to her parents, who, with the help of a qualified pediatrician, will make the necessary adjustments.

Your granddaughter is probably smart enough to know that her habit is not going to make her nose grow lying does that, I think! Therefore, she er - have the right to express your ter's doctor about this. opinion about the child's behavior, but, for heaven's sake, don't harp.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My doctor advised me to go on a 1,000-calorie-aday diet, but wasn't more specific. What should I eat?

DEAR READER: You have several options. First, ask your doctor to refer you to a dietitian for specific advice.
