What single event originating from Snyder, Tx. has the capability of being viewed by almost 53 million people?

It's an easy question to answerthe AJRA National Finals Rodeo during its final night of competition in the Scurry County Coliseum on Saturday, Aug. 13.

The big numbers come with the sale of the telecast to nationwide sports networks with the FNN-SCORE National Cable Network contributing some 22 million viewers alone.

In addition, five television stations, from as far away as Florida, Ohio and Arizona, will carry the broadcast live on Saturday.

McNair also noted some unusual situations that occurred over the years. "For example, in the 1824 general election, Andrew Jackson out-polled John Quincy Adams in both popular and electoral

'The issue was thrown into the House of Representatives because a third candidate, Henry Clay, got enough votes to keep Jackson from getting a majority. Then, despite the fact that Jackson led by a fair margin, Congress gave

Another oddity that year was that all three candidates technically were running on the same ticket--Democrat Republican.

In 1888, there was an election in which the can-

didate with the most popular votes was not elected. Grover Cleveland got 5.5 million votes while Benjamin Harrison trailed with 5.4 million. However, Harrison had the most electoral votes, 233 to 168, and was named president

Four years later, Cleveland came back and won the popular and electoral vote over Harrison. There was a tie in the electoral vote between Thomas Jefferson and Aaron Burr in 1800, and Congress gave the nod to Jefferson.

The closest electoral vote of this century was in 1916 when Woodrow Wilson defeated Charles E. Hughes, 277 to 254.

Mathematically, it is still possible for a candidate to win the president's chair without a majority of the popular vote, but it has not happened in the last 100 years and appears unlikely to happen in the political climate of today.

DEAR LIVING: After living with a man for 22 years and bearing four of his children, you are entitled to certain rights. Get in touch with your local Legal Aid office, a women's rights group or your Family Services Association and find out what your rights are. You cannot force a man to marry you, but it will give you peace of mind to know to what you are legally entitled. Good luck.

DEAR ABBY: I have a question that only you can answer. I recently had a christening for my daughter and was told by my husband's family (specifically my mother-inlaw) that the gifts were supposed to be opened. She said everyone opens gifts at a christening.

Well, I didn't think it was appropriate since it wasn't a shower for me, it was for my daughter. Anyway, I didn't open the gifts and my mother-in-law was very angry. As she left, she was still commenting on how wrong I was.

College tuition goes up

NEW YORK (AP) — College tuitions will rise an average of 7 percent this fall, and students at the most expensive private schools can now expect their four-year education to cost upwards of \$80,000, the College Board said today.

Average "fixed charges" at private, four-year institutions tuition, fees, room and board will hit \$11,330 for 1988-89, up 9 percent from last fall, the board estimated in its annual survey of college costs.

Adding another \$1,600, which the board estimates the average student spends on incidentals like supplies transportation, the total budget for resident four-year private ing what others have brought school students will reach nearly

> "We are, of course, not at all surprised by these increases," said Bruce Carnes, deputy undersecretary of the U.S. Department of Education and an outspoken critic of rising tuitions. "We have stated that so far as we can see the price of college is going to go up at this rate forever.'

Average fixed charges at fouryear public schools will go up a more modest 5 percent to \$4,445 as legal. The couple living together for in-state students — or just over \$6,000 including incidental expenses.

Military AIDS-virus infection is at 1/5 general population

ATLANTA (AP) — The screen-screening active-duty personnel ing of high-risk groups like for the virus in January 1986. hemophiliacs and homosexuals has kept AIDS-virus infection in the military at about one-fifth of the general population, according to the largest study yet of a specific group of Americans.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control reported Thursday that 2,232 out of 1,752,191 military personnel on active duty on April 24 had tested positive for signs of exposure to the virus that causes AIDS — a rate of 1.3 per 1,000.

Federal health officials have estimated that 1.5 million Americans are infected with the AIDS virus; that would be a rate roughly five times the rate among active-duty military personnel

The study is the largest testing Defense Department began that concern.

The active-duty personnel AIDS infection rate, the CDC said, "probably underrepresents the ... prevalence in the civilian population for three reasons."

First, homosexual men and injectable drug abusers are, because of rules, less common among military personnel than in the general population; second, persons with hemophilia are not eligible for military service; and ly. finally, military recruits who test not enlisted.

Even though infection rates are different between military personnel and the general public, the military data "can be used for monitoring levels and trends of ... infection in the United States," the Atlanta-based CDC said in its weekly report.

For example, the agency noted, blacks in the military were 3.6 times as likely as whites to be infected with the AIDS virus, and Hispanics were 2.5 times as like-

Jury awards Dallas deputy \$120,750 for unfair acts "We're tired of this, the good

DALLAS (AP) — A Dallas County deputy sheriff has been awarded \$120,750 in damages by a jury because he was treated unfairly when passed over for promotion to sergeant two years

The jury ruled Thursday that although black deputy Adolphus Smith recorded the highest written score on his sergeant's test, he fell victim to an unfair promotion system in the sheriff's department.

Jurors also ruled the sheriff's department has had a practice of promoting white deputies faster than blacks and has a disproportionately low number of blacks in supervisory positions.

Pardon is offered to fugitive

ROANOKE, Va. (AP) - James Lewis Manuel, who reportedly led an exemplary life in Texas after escaping 34 years ago from a southwest Virginia prison camp, has been offered a conditional pardon by Gov. Gerald L. Baliles.

Manuel, who turned 57 this week, is known as Jimmie Lonnie Manuel in Houston, where he has lived since about a year after escaping from Tazewell County Correctional Unit 31 on Nov. 15, 1953. At the time, he had 10 months and 18 days remaining on a two-year term for a burglary conviction.

Baliles has offered the pardon "in light of Manuel's exemplary life" and because of "the complete absence of further unlawful activity" since his escape, the governor's press secretary, Chris Bridge, said Thursday.

Mrs. Bridge said authorities reviewed Manuel's background and took statements from his family, friends and business associates.

The governor's pardon is conditional on Manuel not being convicted of any criminal laws for 10 months and 18 days after the agreement is signed, she said.

'He is relieved this great burden is off of him," said Manuel's attorney, Jim Rose of Houston.

Rose said Manuel "never told another living soul" about his escape because he did not want his family to be burdened. "He lived with this every day for almost 35 years."

Hertz overbilled more than \$13 the summer of 1985, when it learned that a federal grand jury was investigating the company, Andrew J. Maloney, the U.S. attorney in Brooklyn, told a news conference.

Those who paid Hertz for autobody damage during the period may be eligible for a refund ranging from a few dollars to several thousand dollars, according to assistant U.S. Attorney Jonny J. Frank, who led the investigation.

Maloney said the \$6.85 million fine was believed to be the largest ever imposed in a consumer fraud case.

U.S. District Judge Eugene Nickerson imposed the penalty during a proceeding in which the company pleaded guilty to mail fraud and agreed to make restitution.

Nickerson said that within the next 15 days Hertz must deposit \$13.7 million into a fund to be disbursed to individuals and insurance companies that were overcharged. Hertz will have to pay even more if the fund is insufficient, the judge said.

"Today's action by the United States attorney's office is deeply disturbing to me and everyone at Hertz," Frank Olson, chairman of the company, said. "We regret that improper practices took place and are fully committed to making full refunds of all overcharges.

John Martin, a lawyer for Hertz, said low-level managers in the company were responsible for the overbilling and top executives were unaware of the practices. Everyone responsible for the problem has been fired, he

The investigation began when a woman fired on another matter from a Hertz office in Massachusetts reported the billing practices to the Insurance Crime Prevention Institute, an organization funded by the in-

surance industry.

Maloney and other officials declined to identify her.





Management of hemorrhoids

By Peter H. Gott, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Many people suffer from hemorrhoids, but very few talk about it. Please answer some questions. Can they be left untreated? Can they become malignant? Do any over-the-counter medicines help? Are they the sole source of rectal discharge's

DEAR READER: I've found that people are all too willing to talk about their hemorrhoids. In fact, a lot of TV advertising time is devoted to this common disorder. However, here

The lining of the lower rectum and anus is amply supplied with blood, which drains back into the body through a system of veins. These veins are usually unobtrusive; they carry out their business without making much of a fuss. At times, due to irritation or injury - such as constipation or diarrhea - these hemorrhoidal veins become inflamed and sore. They stretch and dilate, swelling to several sizes beyond normal. At this point, we become aware that something is not right. The hemorrhoid - now a purplish, squishy lump causes discomfort.

As the vein enlarges, however, other changes take place. Bloodflow within it is slowed and clotting takes place; this is a thrombosed hemorrhoid. If the swollen vein leaks blood that appears externally, it is a bleeding hemorrhoid. In some cases, when the dilated/thrombosed vein is inside the rectum, it can be pushed by the stool through the anus, and appear on the outside: a prolapsed hemorrhoid.

Unless the hemorrhoids are bleeding, they are not treated, except for comfort. Hemorrhage from a hemorrhoid can be a serious problem, requiring surgical intervention. However, for the most part, hemorrhoids are uncomfortable nuisances that will shrink with time. Once the acute phase is over, the hemorrhoid tends to shrivel, becoming a small protruberance of pink tissue: a hemorrhoidal

Medical treatment - in the form of suppositories and creams - is dein a battle against Dallas crime. signed to alleviate discomfort (pain and itching), facilitate bowel movements and reduce inflammation so that the hemorrhoid can be allowed to shrink normally. Sitz baths (sitting in about five inches of hot water several times a day) often will provide relief of symptoms.

Diarrhea and constipation may need to be treated as separate issues. urther inju such as might result from sitting on cold, hard surfaces - should be

Several types of surgery are used to treat problem hemorrhoids that are chronic or large. The distended veins can be injected (to aid shrinkage), removed, ligated (tied off to encourage shrinkage) or treated with lasers (to destroy them).

Hemorrhoids never become malignant: They are simply swollen, irritated, normal veins, not tumors. They are not the sole source of rectal discharge, which can be caused by any other irritation in the lower intestinal

In summary, hemorrhoids are swollen veins that will usually shrink by themselves, with the help of medical treatment to promote comfort. Problem hemorrhoids or those that bleed may require surgery.

Civilian jobless rate jumps to 5.4 percent

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's civilian unemployment rate edged up 0.1 percentage point to 5.4 percent in July as the number of jobless Americans climbed 170,000, most of them teen-agers, the government said today

The Labor Department's monthly survey of households nationwide showed only 41,000 more people at work last month, in contrast to an employment gain of 823,000 in June, when out-of-school teen-agers flooded the job market.

The unemployment rate for most segments of the population was unchanged last month. Teen-age joblessness, however, rose 1.6 percentage points to 15.2 percent.

Teen-agers accounted for 144,000 of the 170,000 rise in unemploy-A separate survey of business payrolls showed a much healthier

MEXICO CITY (AP) - The Workers' Party, agrees. three opposition candidates whose dramatic election-night stand galvanized public opinion against vote fraud stood side-byside to call for new elections unless their demands are met.

Cuauhtemoc Cardenas, Manuel J. Clouthier and Rosario Ibarra de Piedra Thursday renewed their charges of widespread, systematic fraud by the ruling Institutional Revolutionary Party, or PRI.

They demanded that the government clear up the charges and they vowed - as they did during their appearance on election night July 6 at the Interior Ministry — to reject the results of a crooked election.

Cardenas said the last chance to set things right will be when the Chamber of Deputies, sitting as the electoral college, meets Aug. 15-31 to review the results and formally declare a winner.

"The electoral process isn't over." he and the other two candidates said in a statement at a news conference that was their first joint appearance since election night.

Cardenas and Clouthier, candidate of the rightist National Action Party, both announced plans for demonstrations the night before the electoral college meets.

The two have been crisscrossing Mexico since the election, mobilizing public opposition to vote fraud.

Cardenas, the charismatic candidate of a leftist coalition and son of one of Mexico's most revered presidents, says the government stole the election from him. Mrs. Ibarra, a human rights activist who ran on the ticket of the tiny Revolutionary

Clouthier says there was so much cheating it is impossible to tell who won — but the combined opposition clearly outpolled the ruling party's candidate: Carlos Salinas de Gortari.

"From all the evidence, the Mexican people voted for change, rejected the political system of the ruling party and gave a majority to the candidates of the opposition," the three said.

The PRI-dominated Federal Election Commission says Salinas won with 50.36 percent of the vote, Cardenas got 31.12 percent, Clouthier 17.07 and the remaining 2.51 percent went to Ibarra and the candidate of a small, conservative party.

If the authorities "aren't willing to resolve the irregularities and cannot establish the results with clarity, they must annul the elections and call new ones," the three candidates said Thursday.





NEW YORK (AP) - Rep. Stanley Simon, 58; Wedtech Mario Biaggi was convicted of founder John Mariotta, 58, of racketeering in a far-reaching Scarsdale; former Small bribery and extortion scheme us- Business Administration ed to transform a tiny South Bronx machine shop into the multimillion-dollar defense contractor known as Wedtech.

After Biaggi's conviction by a federal jury Thursday, the leadership of the House of Representatives set Sept. 7 as the date for considering a recommendation from its Ethics Com-. mittee that it expel the 10-term Democrat.

"The overwhelming likelihood is that the recommendation will be followed," Rep. Ted Weiss, D-N.Y., said in Washington.

U.S. Attorney Rudolph Giuliani called on Congress to expel Biaggi, who was convicted last year on an unrelated corruption charge.



Once again, he feels like fighting, and once again he'll fight for a lot of money.







Dukakis, Bush are continuing their campaigns

Michael Dukakis is laying out his positions on environmental issues during a tour of the West, just as a poll indicated that region represents an untapped resource for Democrats. George Bush invoked the names of Kennedy, and Truman to show Dukakis has veered "far outside the mainstream" on foreign policy.

As Bush tried to portray the Democratic presidential nominee as occupying the liberal extreme, his own Republican party's right wing was telling the vice president to avoid 'establishment blue bloods' when choosing a running mate.

The warning from the Coalition for a Winning Ticket came as Gov. George Deukmejian of California took himself out of consideration.

In another campaign matter,

Bush chief of staff Craig Fuller confirmed Thursday that Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III would leave his post and become campaign chief before the Aug. 15 start of the

Republican convention in New Orleans. "We don't have to make the false choice, the fool's choice, between economic growth or environmental quality," Dukakis told students at the University of California at Los Angeles, "We can have both, and in fact we

must have both.' Dukakis' West Coast foray followed a trip into Mississippi, a traditionally Democratic state that helped send President Reagan and Richard Nixon to the White House. Dukakis lost the state to Jesse Jackson in this

year's Democratic primary. Dukakis spoke at the Neshoba County fair near where the bodies of three slain civil rights workers were found 24 years ago Thursday. Reagan campaigned at the fair in 1980 for his first

Dukakis failed to mention the killings when addressing the almost entirely white crowd, and referred only once to civil rights. "I talked about economic opportunity because that's the most important single thing that con-

cerns people," he explained. Bush, speaking to a Hispanic veterans group in Corpus Christi, Texas, criticized Dukakis for his support for a nuclear freeze and opposition to a new MX missile, the Midgetman missile and the Reagan administration's proposed Star Wars nuclear defense

system. "His positions ... amount to a rejection of America's role as a world leader and a repudiation of the Truman doctrine and the vision of John Kennedy," Bush said, referring to bipartisan foreign policy that evolved after World War II and focused on con-

taining communism. Dukakis, when asked whether he still supports a nuclear freeze, said, "Sure, and a comprehensive test ban treaty.'

Later aboard his plane, Dukakis said he originally supported a freeze "because we wanted to stop the administration from expanding the arsenal." 'Now, it's turned around and

we're talking about reduction. I'm for reductions now," he said. "I favor the development of certain arms systems. I favor deep cuts in strategic weapons systems." Deukmejian said he took himself out of consideration

because Democrats would gain control of the Statehouse in California if he dropped out. Sen. Gordon Humphrey, R-N.H., who heads the conservative coalition urging Bush to choose

someone from the right, said Thursday: "The problem of the Bush campaign is that it is attracted to establishment blue-bloods. What the Bush ticket needs is a transfusion of red corpuscles from the conservative wing of

our party. He said Sen. Dan Quayle of Indiana, Rep. Jack Kemp of New York and Gov. John Sununu of New Hampshire would be accep-

\$3.9 million drought proposal approved by farm lawmakers

WASHINGTON (AP) Both houses of Congress are expected to act next week on a \$3.9 billion drought aid compromise calling for a three-month dairy pricesupport increase but limiting feed assistance for livestock producers.

"The bill we have completed seeks to ensure the future for our farmers and ranchers," Senate Agriculture Committee Chairman Patrick J. Leahy, D-Vt., said Thursday night after a conference committee agreed to the

House Agriculture Committee Chairman E. "Kika" de la Gar-za, D-Texas, said floor action would come Thursday at the latest but that he would try for accelerated handling and final approval Monday or Tuesday.

Fast action also was expected in the Senate. Farm lawmakers in both houses were forecasting overwhelming approval for the election-year measure.

President Reagan was expected to sign the bill. Its \$3.9 billion price tag represents a steep cut from levels at which administration budget officials said with nasty fiscal repercussions.

At the core of the measure is a drought. Agriculture Secretary feature that would pay farmers with 65 percent of lost earnings would be reluctant to recommend beyond 35 percent of the expected harvest.

Larger payments would be available for farmers very severely hurt by the fierce heat and shortage of rainfall plaguing the nation's heartland.

The bill would furnish such producers with 90 percent of losses over 75 percent of their expected harvest. It represented a compromise between the 95 percent level the House approved and the 85 percent passed by the Senate.

Conferees fenced verbally without agreeing on much in sessions Thursday morning and early afternoon. Leahy and de la Garza finally went behind closed doors with top Republican members of the conference com-

'We're pawns in a much larger game," said Robert Schwartz, another defense attorney. "When the elephants fight, it's the ants that get slaughtered."

Princeton-Newport issued a statement defending the accused, and emphasized that the firm itself was not charged. It said the use of the racketeering statute against the defendants "is inappropriate and unprecedented."

Giuliani declined to comment on those allegations, but said indictment "stands on its own."

'This is a multimillion-dollar crime," Giuliani told a news conference. "It happened not once, not twice. It was a classic pattern of criminal activity.'

The indictment also alleged Princeton-Newport conducted fraudulent trading activity through Merrill Lynch & Co., but Merrill cooperated fully with the investigation and was not accus-

ed of wrongdoing.
Named as defendants were James S. Regan, 46, a managing partner of Princeton-Newport: Jack Z. Rabinowitz, 41, general partner; Charles M. Zarzecki, 40, in Princeton-Newport Arbitrage Partners, a subsidiary of Princeton-Newport; Steven B. Smotrich, 33, comptroller of Princeton-Newport; and Newberg, 31, securities trader in Drexel's high-yield bond depart-

ment until early this year. Each was charged with one count of conspiracy, one count of racketeering and one count of racketeering conspiracy. Former Hemphill Police Chief Thomas Ladner and Sabine County deputies Billy Ray Horton and James "Bo" Hyden were acquitted July 15 of violating the civil rights of Loyal Garner Jr., 34, of Florien, La., who died in a Tyler hospital Dec. 27 from injuries he suffered while in the Sabine County Jail after he was arrested for suspected drunken

The three men had also been indicted for Garner's murder. The first of the three separate trials on those charges was scheduled to begin Monday. Defense attorneys contend a murder trial would be double jeopardy - subjecting the men to two trials for the same crime, which is prohibited by the U.S. Constitution.

The state was given until Aug. 11 to answer the amended defense brief. The appeals court judges indicated they would not make a decision regarding the double-jeopardy issue until sometime after the state brief is

Both sides have promised to take the judges' decision to the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals if they lose. Haas told the Tyler Morning Telegraph that the issue "has the potential to go to the Supreme Court."

"The court of appeals has stayed the murder trial pending their disposition of this appeal, Henderson said. "No new date has been set." But with both sides promising to appeal whatever decision is made, Henderson said it is likely that there will be several weeks' delay until the

trial date is set. Defense attorneys alleged Thursday the district attorney's office was pressing ahead with the murder case for publicity's sake, a charge Assistant District Attorney Christian Bryan termed "so ridiculous that it doesn't even require a response.

District Attorney Jack Skeen said after the hearing that the "indictments are based on the facts, and that is my only comment.

Paul Buchanan, represents Hyden, called the defendants "officers with good reputations" who had to "prove their innocence" in Hemphill and, if tried, must do so again in

"They find themselves on the front pages of newspapers and on television throughout the state and the nation, and then the district attorney in Smith County, with a tenuous venue factor at best, sees this trial as a chance to get publicity and has them indicted here," Buchanan said.

Defense attorney John Seale, who represents Ladner, said the case against the three "was not one thing in Hemphill and another at Tyler ... Hitting Loyal Garner Jr. with a slapstick was the issue in both cases.

"The contention by the state is that the officers knew that the conditions under which Mr. Garner was struck was unlawful. Any rational jury would know that for a law officer to hit someone without justification is unlawful," Seale said.

Much of the prosecution's presentation during the 85minute hearing focused on the differences between the civil rights charges and the murder indictment.



Officials: only way to stop beggars is to stop giving

EL PASO, Texas (AP) -Billboards urging people not to give to panhandlers haven't driven beggars away from the Interstate 10 access road. Neither have mass arrests.

Mayor Jonathan Rogers worries that only the accidental death of a beggar will persuade others to stay away from a 2mile-long stretch of access road east of downtown.

Some panhandlers, organized and determined, even "rent" children for \$1 a day to elicit more sympathy and cash. And some police and Border Patrol officials suspect that some of the beggars belong to an organization that transports them to various intersections, then shares in the day's take.

"It's just a matter of time until someone gets killed," Rogers said Thursday. "We have to hope to God it's not one of these women with the rented kids. The only way people are going to stop giving is when the first death happens. When's that going to happen? This afternoon?

On the busiest street corners, it's common to see two or three women walking past the stopped cars, rapping on windows and asking for change. Most of the

"It's certainly annoying to a lot of the traveling public," said Mike Williams, deputy chief Border Patrol agent. "I know I don't like it when somebody pushes a dirty rag across my windshield or knocks on my car window asking for money.'

But simple irritation isn't the only problem, said Williams, who worries that a beggar will be run over and that the children are neglected and abused.

"I've seen babies slumped in a heap under a stop sign in the hot sun," he said.

Most city leaders agree with Rogers that the only way to get rid of the beggars is to eliminate the supply of money that draws them across the border.

An anonymous group recently paid for four billboards that read: "Please don't give to beggars - they cause traffic problems."

City Councilman Ed Elsey, whose district includes the area where most panhandlers congregate, said Thursday that the beggars do more than tie up traffic. He said he has received hundreds of complaints from intimidated drivers.

Police cracked down Wednesday, when plainclothes officers arrested 36 people. Twenty-four beggars were turned over to the Border Patrol to be voluntarily returned to Mexico. Grijalva said the raids will continue periodical-

Plainclothes officers were used because whenever uniformed police try to approach the beggars, the panhandlers run away, sometimes onto Interstate 10. Because construction is being done one the interstate, lanes are narrow and traffic is heavy, making running out onto the highway extremely risky.

Williams said the Border Patrol has tried to arrest beggars, but that "our biggest concern is scaring them into traffic

The beggars probably would continue panhandling even if one died in an accident, Williams

"We're a border city," he said. "We've got border city problems.

Those problems include poverty and the ability of lawbreakers to elude authorities by slipping back and forth across the border with ease.

Most officials agreed that those who want to help needy people should give to reputable charities.

"As long as people are giving to (beggars), they're going to be there," Grijalva said. "There's many ways to give to bona fide charities. When you give to these people on the street, you don't know who they are.'
