Snyder ISD sets budget hearing

A public hearing for the Snyder ISD budget is slated at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, a session planned prior to official approval of the document at the regular August meeting of the board.

The new budget--which totals just over \$12 million and is approximately \$300,000 less than the current year's--includes a proposed tax rate of 99 cents per \$100 valuation.

Approval of this rate is also scheduled as part of the board's regular meeting. The 99 cent level marks a 6 cent increase from the current rate of 93 cents.

For taxable property valued at \$50,000, the 6 cent increase would mean a rise in taxes of \$30 per year. The old rate would generate a tax bill of \$465 and the new rate, \$495.

While cutting operating expenses some \$300,000, an estimated 10 percent decline in the school tax base will cause the tax increase

The most current estimate is that a 99 cent rate will generate \$7.7 million in school taxes. To balance the budget, the district will still be required to pull some \$391,000 from its reserves, leaving a reserve balance of some \$3.3 million.

EPA & lead

WASHINGTON (AP) Environmentalists say a new government proposal to reduce dangerous lead in drinking water supplies is a step in the right direction, but one that doesn't go far enough.

The Environmental Protection Agency announced Wednesday that it plans to issue rules requiring half the nation's water plants, about 53,000, to treat water so that it contains less lead. The metal causes a variety of harmful physical and mental effects.

EPA administrator Lee A. Thomas said the plan will have "far more effect on the drinking water system than any rule we have ever put up.

There are numerous reasons why customers fail to return to a business. But many times the problem comes from within the organization, not from the competition.

The following answer to why customers leave was posted prominently inside a retail establishment

"One percent die; three percent move; five percent buy from friends; nine percent prefer the competition; 14 percent judge all business bad due to only one bad encounter; 68 percent leave because of indifference, rudeness or a lack of service from employees.



Starplex probe is ordered

DALLAS (\overrightarrow{AP}) — An internal investigation has been ordered into the construction and occupancy of the Starplex amphitheater in Fair Park, which has failed more than a dozen building inspections and apparently violates city building codes, city officials say.

The investigation was ordered Wednesday by Dallas Mayor Annette Strauss and City Manager **Richard Knight after there were** disclosures in the Dallas Times Herald that city building officials permitted PACE Entertainment Group and MCA Concerts Inc. to open the entertainment complex last month even though city building inspection records showed there were outstanding code violations.

"I asked for this information, because I can't imagine construction went just the way it was portrayed," the mayor said. "The intent of the city is not to let any project be opened until it complies with all code" regulations.

A full report on the matter will be presented to the city council at its next scheduled meeting, A FRIEND Knight said.

'I'll brief the council next DEAR FRIEND: If you are Wednesday, and at that time we'll bring all the facts out into the open," Knight said. "The story that is public so far is incomplete."

City building officials said they allowed the violations because Starplex was a high-profile city project with a tight construction

Public records indicate that the contractors poured the concrete foundation for the Starplex amphitheater and its accompanying buildings without permitting the city's building inspector to first inspect the foundation frame to determine if the steel reinforcing rods were properly placed. The project failed repeated inspections between March 29 and July 13 because the contractor did not provide inspectors with a report from a state-certified engineer affirming the foundation had been properly built, the newspaper reported.

Courageous bid, careful play

By James Jacoby

After a few decades of playing bridge, it's easy to get carried away by the nuances of bidding. South was sniffing around for a grand slam when he bid four and five no-trump. When North's response to five no-trump showed one king, it was certainly possible that the king was in clubs rather than in the trump suit. Thus, six hearts was a manufactured bid of convenience suggesting that North might bid seven with the spade king. North not only had the right king but also had four trumps, and for all he knew, his heart queen might be a good card. So he bid the grand slam.

The play had interesting elements. If declarer drew three rounds of trumps before attacking diamonds, he would come up short, since the diamonds did not split. If he ruffed two diamonds with the king and jack of spades, he might lose a trump trick to the 10-spot. Finally he hit upon the safest all-round play. After ruffing the club lead, he played dummy's spade king and then three rounds of hearts, discarding a diamond from dummy. Next came the ace of diamonds and a diamond ruffed with a low trump. Back to the queen of spades and another diamond ruffed with dummy's spade jack. A club ruff now enabled him to draw the last trump, and the king of diamonds made all the diamonds good.








Blueberries are a native American fruit; today's juicy giants are direct descendents of the tiny tart-sweet berries the Indians used in making pemmican, their fruit-and-meat traveling food. Size is an indication of quality, so bigger is better when you're buying blueberries.

BLUEBERRY BRULEE One 8-ounce container softstyle cream cheese with pineapple

One 8-ounce carton plain yogurt

3 cups fresh blueberries

1/3 cup packed brown sugar In a small mixing bowl stir together the cream cheese and yogurt. Place blueberries in shallow 8-inch round broilerproof dish. Spoon cream cheese mixture over blueberries. Sprinkle brown sugar over cheese mixture. Broil 4 to 5 inches from heat for 2 to 3 minutes or until sugar starts to melt. Serve immediately. Makes 8 servings.

Reasons for bowel problems

By Peter H. Gott, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Millions of people all over the world defecate in a squatting position, yet no toilet has ever been designed to accommodate this natural stance. Could this be contributing to our bowel problems?

DEAR READER: Interesting question. I think that the position during defecation is probably less a factor than the diet. In parts of the world where people squat, they also tend to eat far more roughage than we supposedly civilized people do. I believe that dietary fiber plays an important role in assisting people to evacuate.

However, you're right that we might be missing something here. In many underdeveloped countries. women birth their babies while squatting. I have been told that this is much less uncomfortable than our traditional Western method of insisting that women lie down. Some obstetricians are experimenting with the squatting position for delivery. Perhaps this position will come to be preferred for both birthing and defecation; then our toilets would become simply cultural curiosities.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My mother is 56, 5 feet 11 and 164 pounds. She recently had a bout with polycythemia that left her blind, and suffering from severe pain in her wrists, knees and legs. No drugs touch the pain, and an antidepressant just makes her sleep. What do we do now?

DEAR READER: Polycythemia, an abnormal increase in the number of red blood cells, is associated with thrombosis, the tendency of the blood to clot too quickly. Therefore, your mother's problems could be secondary to her blood condition, if her blindness and joint pains were due to thromboses in the tissues.

I think that your mother should see a hematologist, a specialist in blood diseases. If she were to obtain therapy for polycythemia, her blood would return to normal and she might be more comfortable. Ask her doctor about this

DEAR DR. GOTT: My son is in the service, married with four kids. His wife says he never talks to them, only answers her with grunts; also, he never calls me. Would the service help him if he needed a psychiatrist?

Death row inmate Tommy Jackson was scheduled to be executed next Friday for the November 1983 slaying of Rosalind Robison, 24, of Terre Haute, Ind., but State District Judge John Carter in Georgetown granted a stay Tuesday until at least Oct. 3 so newly appointed attorneys could prepare post-conviction appeals motions, attorney Hugh Lowe said.

"I'm not going to say he com-mitted it," Jackson said Wednesday of co-defendant James Otis Clary. "I'm going to say I did not. He plea bargained and he got a life sentence.

Ms. Robison, an engineering student, was found in a Williamson County gravel pile more than a month after she disappeared. She had been shot once in the head.

Jackson, 31, was arrested driving Ms. Robison's car. Clary received a life sentence stemmand testified against Jackson.

"I'm not a troublemaking-type person," Jackson said. "Things have happened in my life that were out of my control. I've been a victim of circumstances.

"But things have happened that I did do wrong. I have robbed.

Jackson said he was not aware of the stay when interviewed on death row.

"I'm somewhat in limbo right now," he said. "I don't know what's taking place. I really don't know what's happening.'

Jackson said he understood his attorney was Walter Prentice of Austin. Prentice said Wednesday he had turned over the case to Lowe, whose Austin firm was better able to handle the appeal.

Jackson said he knew the victim socially and ran into her the night she disappeared when she was at an automated bank teller machine in Austin. He said the woman had loaned him her car.

The Texas Department of Corrections account of Jackson's trial, however, indicates Ms. Robison was abducted from the university campus and was taken to the bank, where she was forced ing from the woman's slaying to withdraw money from the machine. Then she was taken to a rural area and fatally shot.

Jackson's stay this week left for the killing, also served 31 seven inmates with execution

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
Retail sales rose in July

The increase was about in line with the expectations of economists, who watch retail sales closely for early indications of the strength of consumer demand


