

U.S. ambassador killed in crash

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) - President Mohammad Zia ul-Haq and U.S. Ambassador Arnold L. Raphel were killed today when their Pakistani military plane exploded in the eastern part of the country, official radio said.

The Pakistan air force C-130 transport plane had just taken off from Bahawalpur, 330 miles southwest of Islamabad, when it exploded, the report said. The government statement read over radio at 8 p.m. (11 a.m. EDT) said that none of 37 people aboard was believed to have survived.

In addition to Zia and Raphel, the passengers included several senior Pakistani army generals, the radio said. An earlier report said the plane crashed after taking off from an airport in Lahore.

In Washington, State Department and congressional sources confirmed Zia and Raphel died in the crash. The sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said two Pakistani generals were on board and there were no survivors.



Pye says more minorities will join SMU freshmen

DALLAS (AP) — The number Southern Methodist University will increase by one-eighth this fall, as A. Kenneth Pye celebrates his first anniversary as president of the school.

Pye, who assumed his duties one year ago today, said significant changes have occurred at SMU since he took over at the height of the school's play-forpay football scandal.

"I'm happy with the direction the school is going," Pye told The Dallas Morning News. "But there is still much more to do."

Pye said he is pleased the school has attracted an additional 100 students for the coming year, boosting minority enrollment to 1,300 students. Of those students, Pye said there will be twice as many Hispanic freshmen, as well as more blacks and more transfers than usual from Dallas' community college system.

SMU had 32 Hispanics and 37 of minority students enrolled at blacks in its freshman class a year ago, Pye said. SMU offered several scholarships for minority students to increase the ratio.

Pye said he plans to appoint a faculty-student committee next month to devise ways to attract more minorities. A committee of Jewish faculty members and a committee of Jewish students also has been organized to find ways to increase the number of students from a variety of religious faiths.

In addition, the school offered 10 scholarships to recruit community college students this year.

"In order for us to provide a truly academic environment on our campus, we need to have a more diverse student body of various ethnic, religious and socioeconomic groups who can contribute to the education of each other and learn from each other," Pye said.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The operating diesel power National Science Foundation says it is working to clean up its act in Antarctica, where an environmental group says the federal agency's research bases are polluting the frigid environment.

"We're making progress," says Jack Talmadge, head of NSF's polar coordination and information section. "Nobody here wants to rape Antarctica. We want to preserve it."

Talmadge made the comments Tuesday after the Environmental Defense Fund released a report alleging that the agency's bases in Antarctica are violating U.S. environmental laws and an international agreement governing use of the frozen continent.

The environmental practices of the NSF ... would not be permitted anywhere in the United States," said the EDF, which frequently brings lawsuits against polluters in this country.

The group said the science agency is dumping untreated sewage and other wastes in Antarctic waters, engaging in open burning of some wastes and



generators without emissions controls

The report said McMurdo Sound, adjacent to the largest U.S. installation, is more polluted than virtually any U.S. waterway and that highly toxic polychlorinated biphenyls and heavy metals are being found in the tissues of penguins and seals.

"It is incredible that these practices are observed by the U.S. government in the most pristine environment in the world," said Bruce Manheim, the report's author and an EDF attorney and scientist. "Rather than addressing environmental threats in Antarctica, NSF has ignored them."

Talmadge said that many of the report's findings are true, but he said the agency is taking steps to improve environmental practices at its four bases.

Quayle topped the list

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - Dan Quayle's is not a household name, but it soon will be, because George Bush decided to make it one

Reaching across the generation gap for a vice presidential nominee, Bush took charge with a stroke that symbolized the change in Republican command.

Tonight, the Republican National Convention formally installs Bush as its nominee to succeed President Reagan.

AP analysis

In choosing his running mate, Bush bypassed more familiar names, defeated rivals, Republicans with power bases of their own. Quayle's constituents are back home in Indiana. He has a national constituency of one: George Bush.

Within hours after he arrived in New Orleans on Tuesday, Bush dramatized the passage of GOP power. He bid farewell to Reagan, then began telephoning about a dozen Republican leaders and officeholders to tell them he would not be asking them to join the ticket.

"I think we were all focusing on Kemp, Dole and Domenici, and the vice president pulled a fast one," said Rep. Henry Hyde of Illinois.

Quayle's name had been on the vice presidential prospect lists, but not at the top — except on the only list that counted.

Bush called Quayle shortly after 2 p.m. to say he was the choice. Then, at a riverfront welcoming rally, Reagan's vice president introduced his own choice for vice president.


Quayle, 41, is two years into his second term in the Senate, after serving two terms in the House. He's trim, athletic, Hollywood handsome and a skilled television campaigner. His congressional record is staunchly conservative, and he is a specialist in national defense.



In support of an estimated 3,000 colleagues holed up for a second day at the July Manifesto mine in Jastrzebie, workers at Morcinek mine refused early to take up their tools and launched their own occupation strike.

Andrzej Andrzejczak, head of the Morcinek mine strike committee, said: "We support all of the demands of the July Manifesto mine workers."

The mine is about 12 miles south of July Manifesto, where strikers were demanding legalization of the outlawed independent labor federation, pay raises and reinstatement of workers fired for trade union activites.

Police ringing July Manifesto, one of Poland's largest coal mines, today turned away area residents who tried to bring food to the strikers.

Andrzejczak said the Morcinek miners broke off talks with management when they were refused access to loudspeakers and contact with the strikers at July Manifesto. He said miners erected a large Polish flag atop the administration building and were blocking the complex's main entrance.

It was not immediately known how many workers were involved.

The second strike came as Solidarity strike committee members met with management and representatives of the Industry Ministry at the July Manifesto colliery.

Technicians set to seal space shuttle gas leak

Discovery's cargo bay to begin plugging a tiny gas leak that threatens to delay the first post-Challenger shuttle launch.

With the shuttle poised on the launch pad, the technicians today were to drill into the cargo bay wall and an engine compartment workers who planted the device to repair the tiny leak discovered a month ago.

The leak in a steering engine compartment must be stopped before Discovery can be launched in late September or early October.

The plan was to use a routing tool to cut two holes in the rear bulkhead of the 60-foot-long cargo bay and two more in the adjoining aluminum hull of the steering engine compartment.

The dual openings would allow a technician to reach about 12 inches into the compartment to clamp a clamshell-shaped device over the leak and fill it under pressure with a sealant. The device measures 4 inches by 1 inch and should fit easily over a fitting that is slowly leaking nitrogen tetroxide gas from a vent line.





FBI suit has big ramifications, according to Hispanic activists

His hygiene needs help

By Peter H. Gott, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm embarrassed about this situation. My boyfriend apparently practices poor hygiene after a bowel movement, as there are heavy stains on his underwear and skin irritation. Could this irritation cause me problems?

DEAR DR. GOTT: Your concerns - and the problem you describe are common. People are not always as fastidious about this sort of thing as they might be. Evidently, someone didn't teach your boyfriend about appropriate ways to clean himself after a bowel movement. His fecal staining could, indeed, affect you. If bacteria are spread during intimate activities, you could develop vaginal infections or inflammation elsewhere. In addition, I'd worry that his lack of bowel hygiene could reflect an unconcern about body cleanliness in general.

Since the immediate problem at hand appears to be bowel-related, I suggest that your boyfriend take special care to wipe himself thoroughly using soap and warm water, if necfrequently. Show him my response to your question and see if he gets the message

DEAR DR. GOTT: Just prior to my husband's stroke two years ago, he was very active. Now his right side is paralyzed. He is 85, and initially was very enthusiastic about recovery. DEAR READER: I think you should check with his doctor or, if he has one, his neurologist. When stroke patients reach a plateau and visible improvement is not forthcoming, they tend to lose interest and become depressed. This may require some medication or change in rehab program. In addition, your husband may be experiencing the consequences of another disease, such as hypertension or diabetes. He needs an examination and testing.

BIG SPRING--The sound financial position of the Colorado River Municipal Water district continued through July with income slightly over estimates and expenses substantially under.

Revenues of \$7,414,103 through the first seven months ran 2.35 per cent ahead of budget projections. Most of this came from \$223,753 more than estimated from water sales, or 3.19 percent. Expenses of operation totaled \$3,534,259 for the first seven months of this year, which was \$355,614 percent under projections or 9.14 percent.

Most of this was attributable to \$282,995 under-run in electric a energy demands. Some of this was due to a lesser volume of water pumped, but most from being able to satisfy demands from more approximate sources. For instance, 45.7 percent of lake water came from Lake Thomas in July, whereas the ratio had been running around 40 percent for the year.

Revenues were based on 9,014,411,940 gallons through July of which 9,014, 411,940 gallons were from wells and lakes and 621,215, 160 in non-potable water diverted for quality improvement but marked for oilfield secondary recovery.
