"His primary interest as a businessman is to get a maximum return on his investment," Kluttz said.

In a Sept. 15 letter to Benton, Mernick said he "would welcome the opportunity to meet with representatives of any group or groups that are seriously interested in exploring ways of preserving or enhancing the Christian orientation of parts or all of the existing developed

Aaron Grubner, Mernick's attorney in Toronto, told The Charlotte Observer last month that Mernick wanted PTL because "it's a large tract of land, and I'm not sure those types of parcels are readily available."

Mernick, who entered the negotiations a month ago, outbid fellow Canadian Peter Thomas of Vancouver. Thomas offered \$113 million, \$46 million of it in cash, but not all would have been payable until September 1989.

By signing Mernick's contract, Benton agreed to stop negotiating with any other bidders and to file a motion with Bankruptcy Judge Rufus Reynolds recommending Mernick's offer by Friday

Other bidders may still present offers directly to the court, but Benton said his recommendation gives Mernick the upper hand. Reynolds has said a firm bid

must be submitted by Oct. 14 or he would order PTL's assets sold to pay creditors, who are estimated to be owed more than \$130 million. He is expected to hold a hearing on the bid in about

#### Finding a treatment for scleroderma

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have scleroderma. For about eight years the skin on my hands, wrists and forehead has tightened and become shiny. Now I'm having trouble digesting food. One doctor says the scleroderma has moved inside but no one offers any prognosis or treatment. Can you?

DEAR READER: Scleroderma is marked by progressive degenerative changes in the skin, joints, intestinal tract, lungs, heart and kidneys. The disease is chronic, of unknown cause and untreatable. Therapy is directed toward relieving symptoms.

Scleroderma is four times more common in women than in men. It typically produces taut, shiny skin, but it commonly causes peptic disease, characterized by heartburn and disorders in the way the esophagus propels food to the stomach. In addition, lung scarring, heart irregularities and kidney failure frequently appear during the chronic stages of the disease

When esophageal problems develop, patients are often helped by eating frequent small meals, using antacids and taking medicine that reduces the production of gastric acid.

The course of scleroderma is variable and unpredictable. Some patients experience only skin changes for many years. However, sooner or later, internal organs become affected; this requires special and individual treatment depending on which organs are involved.

Although most of the complications of scleroderma can be handled by

physicians specializing in internal medicine, you and your doctor may feel more comfortable seeking advice from other specialists, such as rheumatologists, gastroenterologists and so forth, as the need arises. At the very least, you are entitled to a thorough description of your disease and treatment of your symptoms. Ask your doctor about this. 
DEAR DR. GOTT: I went to a party where steak tartare was served. It tasted good, but is there any harm in eating raw beef? What symptoms should I look for?

DEAR READER: I believe that eating uncooked beef is unwise.

In the first place, meat that is commercially dressed and then ground in a supermarket or butcher shop can easily be contaminated with bacteria. These micro-organisms are ordinarily killed by heating, but can cause intestinal infctions, with symptoms of abdominal pain and diarrhea.

Second, beef tapeworm (taenia saginata) can infect humans who eat undercooked beef. People who eat beef tartare may be unwittingly ingesting the taenia cysts, which then grow in the human intestine. Symptoms of beef tapeworm infection are usually mild, and can include abdominal pain, diarrhea and weight loss. The diagnosis is established by an analysis of the stool, showing segments of the adult worm. Taenia saginata infection has been reported in New England and on the West Coast, presumably because patients ate uncooked beef.



#### A lucky misunderstanding

Here's an example of good luck at bridge. South pushed a bit when he jump-shifted to three diamonds, but he needed very little from North to make game or slam. Of course North got excited when he heard the jump shift, particularly since he had such good diamond support, which he could show by an immediate raise to four or five diamonds. However, since he also

wanted South to know about the ace of clubs, he first bid four clubs. South rebid his diamonds, and North now bid five, hoping that partner would believe he had slam interest. But North had bid five diamonds without using a bullhorn (that would violate ethical proprieties), and from view that five-diamond bid might just be a decision as to the best choice of game contracts. That's why South passed

Declarer won the ace of clubs, shedding a spade, and played A-K of hearts, throwing a spade from dum-my. He then cashed his spade ace and ruffed a spade. He ruffed a club back to his hand and ruffed a small heart. His hearts were now good, with the queen still to play, so he played ace of diamonds and a diamond, angry that he had not bid the slam. And here's the good luck. Because West held K-J-10 of trumps, the defenders had to take two trump tricks and slam would have gone down.

Presently, one of Applin's duties at Gentle Dove Ministries is to drive people to a business so they can apply for a job. She told one story of a former inmate who walked clear across town everyday so she could have a job. Eventually she was able to acquire a car.

Another new area which Gentle Dove Ministries is just beginning to explore is sending donations to missionaries throughout the world, regardless of denomina-

Applin said they are in the process of securing the names and addresses of missionaries for this

Even though Applin's Gentle Dove Ministries has begun to branch out into other areas, she said they have not forgotten their prison ministry work.

Gentle Dove Ministries is attempting to expand its prison ministry by mailing letters to all the prison wardens in the state of

In the beginning, Applin's prison ministry included women only, but that too has now changed. Men are included as well.

Applin has also started visitations twice a month to the Taylor County Detention Center as a direct result of a request from another inmate. She now has about eight inmates in Abilene she visits on a regular basis, traveling to and from in a vehicle donated to her by a supporter.

Applin continues to visit the local jail on Saturdays and her husband visits on Sunday. She said they have also been asked to set up branch offices in other locations.

She said closed files are kept of the letters they receive from inmates and a copy of each letter they mail out is also kept on file. "We try to write every two weeks," she explained.

officer. Michael Lee Lockhart, 27, sat motionless Tuesday after an eight-woman, four-man jury deliberated less than two hours before finding him guilty of the March 22 slaying of patrolman Paul D. Hulsey Jr.

"My son worked all his life in the system. He believed in justice and I believe this day justice was carried out," said the slain patrolman's father, Paul D. Hulsey Sr., a former Galveston police chief.

"I grieve very much at the loss of my son and I grieve at the loss of any police officer because when you kill a police officer, you kill a piece of America," he said.

Lockhart's attorney, Charles Carver, declined to speak with reporters, but Jefferson County prosecutors said they were elated about the verdict.

"The jury weighed it cautiously and came back with the proper verdict," said District Attorney Tom Maness. "The credit goes to A BARGAIN- 3-2-2, lg isolated a tremendous investigation on the part of many law enforcement agencies.'

The trial was moved to San Antonio because of extensive publicity in Beaumont. The sentencing phase will begin & 3766 Sunset, 3004 41st, 3011 Y. Thursday and Lockhart faces death by injection.

Lockhart, who also is wanted for slayings in Indiana and Florida, gained notoriety in San Antonio in August when he jumped out of a third-story window at the Bexar County courthouse in a failed escape attempt.

Carver said in closing arguments Tuesday that prosecutors did not present all the evidence that might have vindicated Lockhart, who once served time in a Wyoming prison on a burglary charge.

"They want you to find Michael Lee Lockhart guilty and later kill him because they want to show this community that we are good law-abiding citizens," Carver said.

"They want you to sacrifice this man so the appetites of the police officers in Beaumont can be satisfied because they lost a friend," the Port Arthur attorney said.

Prosecutors charge that Lockhart's rampage began after he stole a red Corvette in Ohio last November. He later drove the car to Florida, stole license plates from another car at the Tampa airport and then drove along the Gulf Coast before reaching Beaumont.

A calendar found in the Beaumont motel room where Hulsey died had notations showing Lockhart's net worth to be \$2.071 million on Jan. 20 and nearly \$4.2 million on Jan. 17, even though he was unemployed at the time.

Lockhart also faces a capital murder charge in the slaying of Windy Gallagher, 16, who was stabbed 21 times in October 1987 in her Griffith, Ind., home.

He also is charged with capital murder in the slaving of 14-yearold Jennifer Colhouer, who was found stabbed to death in the bedroom of her Land O' Lakes, Fla., home on Jan. 20.

Maness said in closing arguments that Lockhart was cool, calm and collected when he shot Hulsey.







