#### 'Sweet' deal

DALLAS (AP) - Drug Enforcement Administration officers were poised to make the biggest cocaine bust ever in Dallas, but it turned out that the white powder they confiscated was for baking and not for snorting.

And the elderly man who attempted to pull off the sting wound up in custody and in the hospital instead of being in the money.

It turned out that the 100 kilograms of cocaine he was attempting to sell to agents posing as drug dealers was 220 pounds of flour and sugar.

#### Baby taken

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — Fighting back tears, a mother pleaded publicly to an unknown kidnapper to return her premature infant, as authorities warned that the baby's life may be in danger and offered a \$13,000 reward for his return.

About two dozen detectives were working against time today to find the woman who posed as a nurse as she kidnapped Christopher Michael Jones from his mother's room at Doctors Hospital. Doctors said Wednesday a lack of proper medical care would endanger the 6-day-old boy's life.

# Rains predicts record turnout

AUSTIN (AP) — More Texans secretary of state. than ever before will cast ballots in the upcoming general election, due in part to the state's liberalizofficials say,

Secretary of State Jack Rains on Wednesday predicted that 5.988 million people, 73 percent of the state's 8.2 million registered voters, would cast ballots.

"I think we'll set three records on Election Day. More people will vote than ever before. A larger percentage of registered voters will vote than ever before. And more eligible voters (about ever before," Rains said.

The presence of Texans on each presidential ticket is a big reason for the prediction, said Randy Erben, assistant

Authorities originally thought the four victims died as a result of cocaine laced with boric acid, a substance often used in roach poison, but autopsies performed by the Harris County medical examiner's office show the four died from large doses of heroin in their body, medical examiner Dr. Joseph Jachimczyk said Wednesday.

Earlier this week, police said the drugs taken by the victims was pure therefore causing their deaths.

"The heroin was enough to kill them whether it was pure or not pure," Jachimczyk said during

HOUSTON (AP) -- Four peo- Houston Police homicide division said the investigation into someone possibly tampering with the drugs was all but closed.

'We have no evidence to support that this was intentional," Gamino said.

'We did not find any evidence at all of boric acid in the (hospital) admission samples." Jachimczyk said. "Nor did we find any evidence of boric acid in four post-mortem samples."

Police have said the four close friends died after "speedballing" heroin and cocaine the weekend before their deaths

Jackimczyk said the victims died of heroin, but that traces of cocaine also were found in the victims. Whether the two drugs were taken together is unknown.

The cocaine residue found in the bodies was not lethal by itself, "but mix it with heroin and it's like dynamite," the medical examiner said.

# Gonzalez calls Howell complaint 'frivilous'

**BIG SPRING-Directors of the** Colorado River Municipal Water District moved last week to try and head off discharge of Natural Dam lake's salty contents into the Lake E. V. Spence water sh-

Management was authorized to negotiate contracts, with limits, which will result in cutting off flow thru and under the natural earthen plug on Sulphur Draw 10 miles west of Big Spring.

The dam may be increased five feet to elevation 2460.00, which would increase capacity by about one-third. Then the top and downside of the structure would be topped by roller compacted concrete so that the dam would in effect become its own spillway if ever it were topped.

\$2,500,000

Supply line pipes across Buzzard and Sulphur Draws, at the upper end of the lake, are being raised to prevent the possibility of cutting off service to the west should line-breaks occur in the underwater areas. This may run up to \$200,000

A budget of \$12,645,631 for 1989 was adopted. It is up less than one percent from last year.

Also adopted was a code of ethics to avoid conflict of interests by directors or officers of the district, and which has been signed by all of them.

Right of way easements were granted to All American Pipeline in Concho County and General Telephone in Coke County across district-owned lands. Franklin, who had three trials and at least five execution dates, was sentenced to death for the July 1975 death of Mary

The 27-year-old woman's disappearance from a San Antonio hospital prompted a highly publicized city-wide search. She was found in a vacant lot five days after her abduction, nude and bleeding from multiple stab wounds and barely alive. She died later in a hospital.

"I'm very thankful it's over," her mother, Patricia Crawford, said today. "I feel really relieved. I feel I can be at peace and Peggy can be at peace.

At the time of the execution, she said she was looking at a picture of her slain daughter.

"It's been a long hard day. It's been a very very long 13 years," she said.

Franklin spent his final day in a small cell adjacent to the Texas death chamber. After sleeping for more than two hours during the afternoon and visiting with his parents, he had a final meal of two hamburger patties.

Franklin was on parole for a rape conviction when he was arrested about four hours after the Moran abduction but consistently denied any involvement in the woman's disappearance.

"He just told me he was framed for something he didn't do," a fellow death row inmate, Johnny Penry, said Wednesday.

"He was very quiet and good natured," another inmate, Lester Bower, said. "He was about as mellow as anybody out there,' added James Beathard, a death row resident.

Eyewitnesses provided the license plate number of a car speeding away from the hospital. The car was Franklin's.

Police also found the nurse's belongings in his garbage can and blood found on his clothing matched Ms. Moran's blood.

Cleveland didn't deny the affair. It was not certain if the child was his responsibility, but he didn't deny that either. And so the GOP played the story for all it was worth. Blaine's forces chanted the most popular ditty of the day, which was: "Ma, Ma, where's my Pa? Gone to the White House, ha, ha,

Michaelsen says the ditty was publicized in newspapers back then. He thinks it would be even more devastating on today's television news programs. Michaelsen says the modern media is more aggressive than that which has gone before, and, as a result, it has become a catalyst for underhanded campaigning. The mocking of Dan Quayle is an

example. Michaelsen says the media started the attacks against the Lepublican vice presidential candidate, primarily to relieve the tediur of the GOP nominating convention. He says the truth is that the media has a vested interested in promoting such shame and scandal.

Of course, the Democrats must share the blame. And the Republicans, for their part. Michaelsen says the parties do not normally bother with dirt when the contests are onesided, but that hasn't been the case this year. Bush and Dukakis have been neck and neck, and it has promoted desperation on both sides.

Republican candidates for the **Texas Supreme Court continues** without letup in political advertisements and comments.

On Wednesday, campaigners for GOP Chief Justice Tom Phillips displayed TV ads showing former prominent Democrats John Hill and John Connally, now a Republican, speaking out for Phillips.

Meanwhile, Phillips' Democratic opponent, Justice Ted Robertson, claimed that Phillips' limit on campaign contributions "is nothing more than a sham."

A 30-second Phillips ad shows former Gov. Connally saying, "Tom Phillips has everything it takes to be a great chief justice — intelligence, judgment and above all, integrity.

Former Attorney General Hill delivers basically the same

Karl Rove, campaign consultant for Phillips, told reporters the Connally ad is running in the more Republican areas of West Texas, the Panhandle and North Central Texas, and the Hill ad is running in South Texas and East Texas.

#### Tobacco heiress puts up bail

NEW YORK (AP) - Tobacco heiress Doris Duke says she put up Imelda Marcos' \$5 million bail because she is "disgusted, em-barrassed and ashamed" with the way the U.S. government has treated the former Philippine first lady and her husband.

"I have always believed that an accused person is innocent until proved guilty. I wish the rest of America agreed with me," Miss Duke, 75, said in written response to questions submitted by the Daily News.

Miss Duke, once called "the richest girl in the world," said she would gladly testify as a character witness for the Marcoses, whom she said she considers her "dear friends." The couple is charged with looting the Philippine treasury of more than \$100 million.

"I am disgusted, embarrassed and ashamed of my country's mistreatment of Imelda and her ailing husband, Ferdinand, Miss Duke wrote. "Why should America spend millions and millions of dollars prosecuting two people who for a generation have been our closest allies, including our Pacific outpost against communism?"

A lawyer for Miss Duke, Donald Robinson, said Wednesday the wealthy recluse posted the bond "because she knows that Mrs. Marcos didn't commit any crimes."

Miss Duke, who has a 2,700acre estate in New Jersey, pledged more than \$5 million in municipal bonds on behalf of Mrs. Marcos. A lawyer for Mrs. Marcos said she planned to visit with Miss Duke through the weekend even though she would be free to return to Hawaii as soon as the bail paperwork was completed.

#### FBI agents claim retaliation

EL PASO, Texas (AP) - The FBI has retaliated against at least five Hispanic agents who testified in or commented about a successful racial discrimination suit against the bureau, a lawyer

An FBI spokesman in Washington did not comment directly on the allegations Wednesday, but said any retaliation would be investigated by the

A 50-page affidavit, scheduled to be submitted today to U.S. District Judge Lucius Bunton, details retaliation against five agents in four cities, said Orlando Quintana, an Albuquerque lawyer affiliated with the legal team that represented the 311 Hispanic agents who sued the

In a 95-page verdict, Bunton ruled Sept. 30 that the FBI had discriminated against Hispanic agents by promoting them too slowly, assigning them lessdesirable jobs and affording them less recognition for their successes. Damages will be decided later.

Quintana said about 25 agents nationwide have complained about being harrassed or retaliated against for testifying or supporting the lawsuit.

FBI spokesman Gregory Jones, speaking from bureau headquarters in Washington, said: "Our response to that is basically any intimidation or retaliation would be illegal and intolerable, and would result in Michael Barber of Colorado City; an FBI inquiry.

Jones would not confirm whether the FBI is investigating the allegations. He said any such inquiry would be conducted by the bureau's office of professional responsibility.

The suit was filed by Bernardo "Matt" Perez, the No. 2 man in the El Paso FBI office, in January 1987. In the affidavit, Perez complains of being put under administrative inquiry for speaking with reporters after Bunton's verdict was announced, Quintana said.

Fernando Mata, an agent in the Miami field office, testifies in the affidavit that he has been put under administrative inquiry ostensibly for breaching national security during his testimony, Quintana said.

#### **Amnesty official** said charged

LAREDO, Texas (AP) - An amnesty official faces up to 15 years in prison if convicted on charges of accepting a bribe from undercover agents posing as Mexican citizens seeking legalization.

Daniel Meza, who has been an amnesty adjudicator with the legalization program since its inception May 5, 1987, was arrested by Immigration and Naturalization Service agents Monday night at a Laredo motel after agents handed him four \$100 bills.

Gary Renick, chief in-vestigator for the INS office in San Antonio, said Meza is the first amnesty worker in the San Antonio district — which includes Laredo, Austin and Corpus Christi - to be arrested and charged with bribery

Meza was charged Tuesday with soliciting a bribe and was later released on a \$25,000 personal recognizance bond.

"It went down fairly fast," Renick said. "It tells everyone if we have somebody dirty, we're going to clean it up.

But Renick said in the San Antonio district about 15 individuals have been indicted and convicted for selling documents that would make aliens eligible for legalization. He added that his office has about eight to 10 other investigations ongoing.

"The fraud is massive," Renick said. "We're concentrating very hard on it."

DEAR DR. GOTT: Do the two little ridges that run from the upper lip to the nose have any purpose'

DEAR READER: Not to my knowledge. These ridges, like the line you can feel with your tongue along your hard palate, are produced by the normal closing of the fetal head long before birth. During early fetal development each side of the baby grows independently during pregnancy, the two sides fuse. When the midline fails to fuse, harelip and cleft palate result.

DEAR DR GOTT: I have migraines. My daughter, now 20, has been having headaches since age 4. She also has blackouts. My son has epilepsy. One doctor said my daughter had seizures, one doctor said no. Two other doctors disagree over the results of her slucose tolerance test, but a strict do to that we initiated has certainly heiped her. What can we do to sort out this confusion?

DEAR-READER: You raise three possible diagnoses for your daughter: Migraine headaches or migraine equivalents, seizure disorder and hypoglycemia. Ordinarily, these conditions are easily separated by medical

Migraine equivalents (visual symptoms and irritability without headache) are diagnosed by the exclusion of other diseases; they often respond to the administration of ergot derivatives, drugs that constrict arteries.

I'm not sure why your daughter's doctors are in disagreement. To resolve the issue, I suggest that you request a referral to a neurological or diagnostic clinic of a teaching hospital. In such an environment, the specialists should be able to put everything together and solve the problem.

You should realize that a hypoglycemic diet (no alcohol or sweets; frequent high protein meals) will help many medical conditions. Therefore, a favorable response to these restrictions is not proof that hypoglycemia caused the symptoms.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My husband had a cerebral AVM in the right temporal lobe. A severe disorder developed after it "leaked." Would proton beam therapy be appropriate? My doctor doesn't know much about it.

DEAR READER: Nobody knows much about it. Proton beam (chargedparticle radiation) therapy, an experimental technique, involves the precise focusing of high-energy particles on a part of the brain. It is useful in "cauterizing" bleeding blood vessels in inaccessible locations.

malformations Arteriovenous (AVMs) are relatively common. Basically, high-pressure arterial blood flows too forcefully into a vein. With time, the weak venous wall will leak or rupture because of the pressure. If the malformation can be destroyed, sparing the surrounding normal tissue, the bleeding will stop.

Therefore, in theory, proton beam therapy could help your husband.

At present, proton beam therapy is available in only two of the nation's medical centers: the University of California (San Francisco) and Harvard University (Boston). © 1988 NEWSPAPER ENTERPRISE ASSN

# Gray County to stop voting restrictions

AUSTIN (AP) - Gray County tion Code provisions. residents who sign a pauper's oath no longer will be required to say they are surrendering their right to vote, the attorney general's office said.

That provision had been included in the oath because it is in the Texas Constitution, said Elna Christopher, spokeswoman for Attorney General Jim Mattox, Wednesday. She said the document also contains other outdated provisions regarding the right to vote that are not followed but have not been repealed.

"Everybody has just ignored it, except out in Gray County, to our knowledge ,'' Ms. Christopher said. She said officials instead follow Texas Elec-

Ms. Christopher added, "I don't think it was a malicious at- secretary of state's office. tempt by anyone in the county to disenfranchise people. I just think they didn't understand the

"As soon as we explained it to them, they were chagrined it had happened," she said. "We just told them to stop using it, and still there." they immediately agreed when law was explained to them."

Officials told the attorney general's office that the oath was being used in connection with indigent burials, Ms. Christopher said. Perhaps 40 relatives were required to sign the oath over several years in order for the county to pay for burials, she

According to Ms. Christopher, Gray County officials said there has only been one person who has come forward to register to vote after signing the oath, and that

person was allowed to vote after the county checked with the
